
Season's Greetings from President and CEO, Abby Katz Starr


Spotlight on the Recreation Team

At Union Villa, “Recreation” Means Fun – and So Much More

For Recreation Manager Lindsay Bailey and her team, recreation is about more than activities, it's about nurturing emotional, physical, cognitive, psychosocial, and spiritual wellbeing. “It's about creating an environment where people feel supported, connected, and like they belong,” she explains.

The Recreation Team ensures residents always have something to look forward to. From daily programs to special events, each activity offers a reprieve and a chance to connect. This fall, residents enjoyed a Fall Fest complete with a workshop and a petting zoo in the courtyard. Picture the amazement of seeing llamas, goats, rabbits and more!



These events don't just lift spirits; they also bring families together, creating moments of joy and connection even in challenging circumstances. Whether it's a lively musical act or a quiet afternoon in the courtyard, the team meets residents where they are.

Looking ahead, Union Villa is embracing Virtual Reality experiences with CareGivr allowing residents to explore new worlds or revisit places from their past.

The team also partners with Kayla, our music therapist, and Mia, our art therapist, who help residents discover new skills and a sense of pride in a safe, supportive space. To nurture the spiritual side, Pastor Jun provides pastoral care and leads inclusive services for all. And we can't forget the fun and laughter that comes from our Clown Therapy which is a form of therapy that uses humor, play, and performance.

When asked about standout moments, Lindsay recalls a trip to a local Bingo Hall where Union Villa residents outplayed the regulars much to everyone's delight! These experiences remind us that recreation is about joy, pride, and sometimes a little friendly competition.



Ultimately, recreation at Union Villa is about supporting every aspect of life. From celebrating seasonal celebrations, to cultural programs, the recreation team is always challenging themselves to engage residents in unique and meaningful ways.

Resident Profile

Meet Vladimir Galinsky

You'd be hard pressed to find someone more travelled than Vladimir Galinsky.

Born in the city of Stalingrad, now Volgograd, on May 26, 1955, he grew up in a Jewish family in Russia before he was drafted at eighteen years old into military service from 1973 to 1975. For two years, he drove a bus to transport pilots to their naval planes, part of a covert operation to search for enemy submarines and buoys that would mark the place where bombs were to be dropped. "Don't tell anyone!" Vladimir (mostly) jokes.

Despite the hardships of growing up in Russia and his dislike of the current president, Vladimir recalls the beauty of the country. He describes how the weather is similar to that of Canada, snowy and cold, but says Canada has more beautiful autumn colours.

For the 1980 Olympics held in Moscow, Vladimir trained to be a bartender. "I really liked it," he recalls. With the taste of the world, Vladimir set out on a Russian cruise ship, putting his new bartending skills to use. The cruise ship was part of the Black Sea Shipping Company that ferried Australian and English tourists around the Oceania region. Vladimir lists off the places he visited, including Sochi (Russia), Odesa (Ukraine), Sri Lanka, Sydney and Brisbane (Australia), and Auckland (New Zealand) – but not Japan. One of the highlights was his visit to Newcastle-upon-Tyne in England because it was the birthplace of his favourite singer, Alan Price, the lead musician of the band The Animals. There was "lots of excitement," Vladimir explains, to be in the same city as Alan Price.

Due to cheaper travel prices and competition, the cruise company no longer exists, but Vladimir remembers his work fondly. "I got paid to see the world and eat amazing food!"

In the mid-1980s, Vladimir moved to Israel, and currently has dual citizenship for Israel and Canada. He describes the landscape as a sort of paradise with the Jordan river, and recalls it as a "very



good place" where he could connect with his Jewish religion. He put the paper in the Western Wall at Jerusalem. Vladimir admires the writings of Solomon, whose writing about love "touches the heart like magic." He also enjoys the work of Russian writers Aleksandr I. Kuprin, who wrote about Solomon, and Mikhail Bulgakov's *The Master and Margarita*.

About twenty years ago, Vladimir came to Canada where he met his wife in Toronto. She now works at a cardiology clinic as a licensed ECHO sonographer with a combined thirty-eight years experience in her field in Canada and her home country, Kazakhstan. Vladimir proudly describes how her work saves lives and how she has received honours and distinctions.

Now living in Ontario, Vladimir describes how he feels much healthier and happy here at Union Villa. He used to be stuck at home, paralyzed after two strokes and a seizure, and he has since recovered after having a brain tumour removed. "People help me here," he says, and he feels supported. Even after all these years, however, his connection to Russia runs deep. "Don't tell anyone!" he jokes once more. We promise full discretion.
