

Resident Profile

Meet Annie McCrorie

Born Anne Stuart Ramsey on July 18, 1933, Anne McCrorie's childhood in urban Glasgow established her love of activity. With an older sister and brother, Anne's family moved to different addresses around the city. She recalls how she loved to play tennis, badminton, and later, go out dancing with her boyfriend at the dance hall, a popular pastime. She also the cinema, where she particularly loved the Flash Gordon films, as well as actors Roy Rogers and Dale Evans, and the films of duo Rock Hudson and Doris Day with their iconic '50s and '60s style.

Anne later took computer operating training, and in her early twenties, studied to become a social worker. "I loved it!" she recalls, describing her career and how she "went to troubled families and tried to help them with their problems." With her heart for helping others, she continued to work in the field after she was married, despite the unpredictable hours and evening calls. Later, when her father came to live with her and her family, she was able to work for the hospital, where hours were more defined. "You knew you could leave them because you knew what would happen," Anne explains. She would be able coordinate care with the nurses—a change to her previous role.

In 1953, Anne married James McCrorie. They moved back and forth between Canada and Scotland, first travelling by ship and later by plane. Her brother-in-law was already established in Ontario and helped them to get settled. Her sister also moved to Canada, and so Anne has had family on both sides of the Atlantic, including cousins still in Scotland. She recalls her first impressions of Ontario, saying it was "scary but curious" and she enjoyed discovering the city since "it was good to know where to go."

Anne and James (since passed) have one daughter, Moira, along with three grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren. Moira lives close-by in



Ontario, and Anne lived with her before coming to Union Villa. "My daughter is very good to me," Anne says of their time together and their bond as widows. It is clear how important family is to her as she talks about her grandsons who both live in Ontario and her granddaughter, Claire, who lives in B.C. She proudly shows off the little figure of a highland cow on her side table, complete with a tartan bow. Claire brought it for her as a Christmas present from a recent trip to Scotland, the love of the country clearly passing from grandmother to granddaughter.

Back in Scotland, Moira showed Claire the dress shop that Anne used to visit in Glasgow, but Anne says most things in the city have changed. "I would love to go back just once more," she admits.

Even into her nineties, Anne is eager to stay active. She is grateful to be in Union Villa and able to use her walker to continue to stay mobile, and she is glad to see her daughter is able to now travel to see family. Having been in Union Villa over a year, she says she is thankful that the staff are so nice and understanding.

"My daughter tells me behave myself because I'm always on the go," Anne says with a bright smile.
