

General Rules for Exhibiting:

- 1. All entries must be made by the owner, joint owner, actual grower, or producer.
- 2. Application for entries in all departments must be made on the fair entry online application. There will be computers available at the Fair office for your convenience. If you wish you can provide information on paper and give it to the Fair office.
- 3. Every article or animal at the Fairgrounds will be under the control of the St. Joseph County Grange Fair Association.
- 4. All exhibits shall be judged in competition to receive premium money.
- 5. Premium checks will be available on the last Saturday of the fair or Sunday during the release of exhibits.
- 6. Premium checks will be cashed within 90 days of the fair or will be forfeited back to the Fair to plenish the premium fund for future fairs.
- 7. The Fair Association reserves the right to withhold premiums in a case in which regulations have not been complied with, or that fraud or deception has been practiced or attempted.
- 8. Any Exhibitor has the right to protest or appeal a decision, or complaint which must be put in writing and provided to the fair manager or Board President. The Executive Committee with then hear the protest and or appeal, and a decision will be provided within 24 hours of receiving a complaint.

General Rules for Still Exhibits

Still Exhibits will be accepted on Friday from noon to 8 PM and Saturday from 9 am to 2 PM. Judging will take place after 2 PM on Saturday.

- 1. All exhibitors will enter through the Fair Entry Application. Computers will be available at the Fair Office in August for your convenience.
- 2. Still Exhibits will be released at 10 PM on Saturday of the fair or Sunday from 9 am till noon. Free admission to grounds Saturday night after 930 pm to obtain your Exhibits.
- 3. Premium checks will be available during pick up of projects. If you cannot come during these times to obtain your projects, please contact the Fair Office.
- 4. No exhibits are released early unless special consideration from the Executive Committee. We understand that emergencies may arise and we will work with you for a resolution.
- 5. Any projects not picked up from the Fair will be destroyed after October 31.
- 6. Upon these conditions, only entries will be accepted.

Testing Rules for Livestock

The Fair has the legal authority to require drug testing under the Animal Industry Act. Act 466 of 1988, as amended, in section 40(3). "A Fair, exhibition, exposition or show authority may require additional testing or vaccination of animals before entry and during the fair."

1. St. Joseph County Grange Fair follows MDARD rules, testing, and guidelines.

Livestock General Rules

1. Livestock exhibitors must follow the most current year of Animal Health Requirements for Livestock exhibited in Michigan. www.michigam.gov/mdard

- 2. Livestock entries will be accepted utilizing the Fair Entry online application. Please note, that 4-H is not integrated with the Fair application. FFA and other youth may enter utilizing the Fair Entry On-Line Application.
- 3. Livestock pens and classes will be paid in advance of the start of the Fair, either via Fair Entry or at the Fair office.
- 4. Stalls will be filled at the discretion of management according to barn availability.
- 5. Exhibitors need to verify all entries 24 hours before the start of the open livestock show.
- 6. Animals must be on the grounds before 3 PM Sunday of the fair unless other arrangements have been made with the Open Class Livestock Director.
- 7. Open Livestock released after 10 PM on Saturday of the fair. Trailers and semis must not be parked by the barns until midnight for loading. Reminder for last Sunday, all livestock and campers must exit before 10 am.
- 8. All walkways in the barn must be clean from 10 am to 10 pm for public visitation.
- 9. No livestock in the camping area.
- 10. Exhibitors/family members must be present with livestock when not in the barn. This means no tying to the trailer and walking away.
- 11. If Livestock needs to leave early, please see the division superintendent for discussion.
- 12. Animals entered into the fair open classes must be shown and judged, and then will be awarded premium money if placed.
- 13. All animals will be expected to have documentation of proof of pedigree, breeding, age, or ownership. This must be provided upon entry to the fair and be available for State Vet.
- 14. It is the expectation that all animals will be exercised daily. Stalls cleaned daily. Manure bins are available for your convenience.
- 15. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any animal to the fairgrounds for any reason.
- 16. Parking of trailers, semis, and trucks for all animals will be in designated areas.
- 17. No smoking in barns.
- 18. No dogs in barns.
- 19. Upon these conditions, will entries be accepted.

Rules: All entries made through the Fair Entry Application

- 1. The age of the cow will be computed as of September 1st. before Fair
- 2. The exhibitor must be prepared to present a certificate of registry for all cattle to the superintendent 48 hours before show time. No animal will be exhibited without approval from the superintendent.
- Horns-cattle shall be polled or dehorned properly, except for calves. Horns are acceptable as required by a specific breed.
- 4. Animals that are shown in group classes must be shown in individual classes.
- 5. No milk will be accepted for Grade A milk unless it has been milked in a Fair milking parlor.
- 6. All bulls must be safely secured by a nose ring over one year of age.
- 7. The fair expects stalls to be clean and maintained during the Fair.
- 8. Walkways are cleaned before public viewing each day from 10 am to 10 pm.

Rules for Beef Cattle:

1. The age of the cow will be computed on September 1 preceding the Fair.

- 2. The exhibitor must be prepared to present a certificate of registry for all cattle 48 hours before the start of the show. The superintendent may check all certificates and the identity of all animals.
- 3. Horns- cattle shall be dehorned properly, except for calves. Horns are acceptable as required by specific breed.
- 4. No Bull over one year of age shall be allowed at the Fair unless a substantial nose ring and a handler can manage the Bull.

- 2. All Chickens need to be Pullorum tested with proof of paperwork and be free of parasites (lice, mites, etc). Testing and examination will be done at check-in.
- 3. An individual chicken may only be entered in one class
- 4. Check-in for Chickens starts Friday, September 12, 2025, from 1 PM until 6 PM
- 5. Feeding, watering, and cage cleaning are required daily by owners.
- 6. Bedding and feed provided
- 7. Chickens will be released last Saturday of the Fair at 10 PM

- 3. Judging will be on cleanliness, uniformity, and market size.
- **4.** Items will be disposed of during the fair if spoiled.
- **5.** Youth age is computed on the Birthday date. There is a separate youth division, however, Youth may enter into the Adult Division for Farm–Garden and Orchard Products.
- **6.** All still projects premiums as follows: 1st place \$3. 2nd place \$2. 3rd place \$1.
- 7. The judge's specialty award is \$10. Second place is \$5.
