# **LLM Comparison for Litigation Use Cases**

The following table compares major AI models across key litigation functions. Ratings are based on current capabilities as of October 2025.

# **▲ IMPORTANT NOTE**

Models tested: ChatGPT-4o, Claude Sonnet 4.5, Gemini 2.5, Perplexity Pro, NotebookLM.

General chatbots show materially higher hallucination rates on legal queries than legal-tuned tools.

Always verify Al-generated legal content. Individual experiences may vary.

# 1. RESEARCH: Prompt the Prompt

The difference between a basic prompt and an expert prompt can be dramatic. Rather than accepting mediocre results, ask the AI to optimize your prompt for you.

# **Basic Approach (Suboptimal)**

#### **Basic Prompt**

Write a short memo about whether COVID-19 counts as a 'casualty' under force majeure clauses. Give arguments on both sides and a conclusion.

# **Expert Approach (Optimized)**

#### **Optimized Prompt**

Start by asking the AI to improve your prompt:

I want to research whether COVID-19 counts as a 'casualty' under force majeure clauses. Please create an optimized prompt that will generate a comprehensive, practitioner-ready analysis with arguments on both sides, case citations, contract drafting implications, and litigation strategy considerations.

# **Key Elements of an Optimized Legal Research Prompt**

- Define the role: "You are a seasoned advocate and contracts expert"
- **Specify deliverables:** Arguments pro/con, controlling framework, top arguments with authority, drafting implications
- **Set interpretive tools:** Canons of construction, ordinary meaning, ejusdem generis, noscitur a sociis
- Demand citations: Treatises, Restatements, leading cases with parentheticals
- Require structure: Clear headings, lead with conclusions, tight prose
- **Define quality standards:** No hallucinations, mark uncertainties, concrete examples

#### **Additional Optimization Techniques**

- Iterative refinement: Ask follow-up questions to deepen analysis in specific areas
- **Jurisdiction specification:** "Focus on California law" or "Compare approaches in the Second and Ninth Circuits"
- Format requests: "Provide as a table" or "Create a decision tree" for complex analyses
- Audience targeting: "Prepare for a sophisticated federal judge" vs. "Explain for a jury"

# 2. RESEARCH: Verify Accuracy and Uncover Hallucinations

### **△ △** CRITICAL WARNING

Al hallucinations remain a critical concern in legal practice.

General-purpose Al tools (ChatGPT, Claude, Gemini) are especially prone to fabricating cases and statutes when used for legal research.

Never rely on Al-generated citations or legal analysis without rigorous verification through official legal databases.

Even legal-specific AI tools can produce errors.

# **Verification Prompts**

#### **Verification Prompt 1**

I suspect that some of this analysis is flawed. Please review your previous response and identify any statements that might be incorrect, any citations that might not exist, and any logical inconsistencies. Be rigorous and critical.

## **Verification Prompt 2**

For each case you cited, provide: (1) the full citation in Bluebook format, (2) the holding in one sentence, (3) a URL where I can verify the case exists, and (4) your confidence level that this citation is accurate (High/Medium/Low).

#### **Verification Prompt 3**

Cross-check your legal analysis against the following authoritative source I'm providing [paste relevant section]. Identify any discrepancies or areas where your analysis conflicts with this authority.

#### **Best Practices for Verification**

- Cross-reference multiple sources: Ask different Al tools the same question and compare results
- Request source documents: "Provide the PDF or link to the actual case" helps catch fake citations
- Verify through legal databases: Always confirm citations in Westlaw, Lexis, or court websites
- Look for red flags: Unusually perfect facts, citations that seem too good to be true, or dates that don't align
- Challenge confidently stated facts: "Are you certain about this statute number?" often reveals Al uncertainty

# **Red Flags for Hallucinations**

- Citations with incorrect reporters or unusual case name formats
- Statutes with section numbers that don't exist in the actual code
- Holdings that perfectly support your position without any nuance
- References to cases or statutes from jurisdictions where they don't exist
- Inconsistent dates or procedural history that doesn't make sense

# 3. SUMMARIZE AND ANALYZE Documents

All excels at analyzing large volumes of documents, depositions, emails, and contracts to extract key information, identify patterns, and flag issues.

# **Document Analysis Prompts**

# Deposition Analysis Please list all times when \_\_\_\_\_ contradicts herself in this deposition transcript. For each contradiction, provide: (1) the page and line number of the first statement, (2) the page and line number of the contradictory statement, (3) a brief explanation of why they conflict.

#### **Contract Analysis**

Analyze this contract for provisions that favor one party over the other. Create a table with three columns: Provision, Which Party Benefits, and Why This Matters.

#### **Email Review**

Review these 50 emails and identify: (1) any statements that could be construed as admissions, (2) evidence of intent or knowledge, (3) timeline of key decisions, and (4) any privileged communications that should be withheld.

#### **Contract Comparison**

Compare these two contracts side-by-side. Identify all material differences and assess whether the changes favor the buyer or seller. Present as a table.

#### **Advanced Analysis Techniques**

- Pattern recognition: "Identify recurring themes in these 100 customer complaints"
- **Timeline creation:** "Create a chronological timeline of all events mentioned in these documents with citations"
- Entity extraction: "List all individuals, companies, and locations mentioned with the context of each reference"
- **Gap analysis:** "What information is missing from these documents that we need to prove our case?"

Use NotebookLM for longer documents (it handles up to 50 sources and 500,000 words)
Claude excels at nuanced analysis of complex contracts and legal documents
Break large document sets into batches for more thorough analysis
Ask for citations to specific pages/paragraphs to facilitate verification
Request both summaries and detailed findings for different audiences

# 4. STRATEGIZE Legal Arguments

Use AI as a strategic thinking partner to develop arguments, anticipate counterarguments, and refine your litigation strategy.

# **Strategy Development Prompts**

#### **Opposition Strategy**

I will oppose this motion for summary judgment. Please help me think through my best arguments by: (1) identifying the weakest points in the moving party's brief, (2) suggesting three strong counterarguments with supporting authority, and (3) anticipating how they might respond to each argument.

#### **Socratic Questioning**

Ask me a series of questions that will help me plot my strategy for opposing this motion. Focus on factual gaps, procedural opportunities, and potential alternative theories.

#### **Devil's Advocate**

Act as devil's advocate. I'm planning to argue [your theory]. What are the three strongest counterarguments I'll face, and how should I preemptively address them?

#### **Theory Evaluation**

I have three potential legal theories for this case. Help me evaluate each one by assessing: (1) likelihood of success, (2) resource requirements, (3) strategic risks, and (4) potential damages. Present as a comparison table.

#### **Socratic Method for Strategy**

Have the AI ask you strategic questions to uncover weaknesses and opportunities:

#### **Oral Argument Preparation**

I'm preparing for oral argument. Please ask me 10 tough questions, one at a time, that the judge might ask. After I answer each one, critique my response and suggest improvements. Start with the hardest question.

#### **Discovery Strategy**

Walk me through my discovery strategy by asking me questions about what I need to prove, what evidence I have, what's missing, and who has the information I need.

# 6. PERSONIFY Decision-Makers and Preempt Concerns

You are a federal judge who has read the opening brief and then the opposition. What concerns would you most want addressed in a reply brief? What arguments from the opposition were most persuasive?

#### **Opposing Counsel**

Act as opposing counsel. After reading my motion, what would be your top three arguments in opposition? Be aggressive and find every weakness.

#### **Appellate Judge**

You are a skeptical appellate judge hearing oral argument. I'm arguing that [your theory]. Hit me with the three hardest questions you'd ask from the bench.

#### **Juror Perspective**

Assume you're a juror with no legal background. After hearing these facts and this legal argument, what questions would you have? What would make you skeptical?

#### **Advanced Applications**

#### **Judge-Specific Analysis**

#### **Judge Analysis (After Independent Research)**

Based on Judge [Name]'s published opinions and known preferences [provide background], how would this judge likely view our motion for preliminary injunction? What arguments should we emphasize or avoid?

#### **Multi-Perspective Review**

#### **Three-Perspective Analysis**

Review my brief from three perspectives: (1) as the judge, (2) as opposing counsel, and (3) as a neutral third party. Identify concerns from each perspective and suggest how to address them.

#### **Reply Brief Preparation**

#### **Reply Analysis**

After reading the opposition brief, you are the judge. What questions remain unanswered? What points need more development? Which arguments from both sides are most persuasive?

# **♀ Pro Tips**

Ask for specific concerns, not just general feedback

Use this technique before filing to identify weaknesses early

Try multiple iterations: 'Now be even more skeptical and find additional problems'

Never trust Al-generated information about specific judges—verify all judicial background through reliable sources
