As many travelers continue breaking out from their Lockdown Funk and the weather starts to cool off, perhaps it's time to think about something warm and tropical. Many warm weather travelers love to replay the Hawaiian option, time and time again. But farther afield than the usual holiday haunt there's the shining jewel of the Pacific, Tahiti. Ever considered it? While many have quickly been put off by price, now might be the time.

[Hawaii](#) fares in Business Class generally range from about \$1,000 to \$2,250 from Los Angeles and \$1,800 to \$3,035 from New York, for example.

The Pacific, however, is one big ocean with plenty to explore. Just ask the early Polynesian seafarers who sailed many thousands of miles in their double-hull canoes, navigating by the stars. Delta has a handful of dates with low fares on their new nonstop from Los Angeles to Papeete in Business Class for \$3,079, or \$2,657 if you are an Amex Platinum or Centurion cardholder, thanks to Amex's International Airline Program (IAP), as you can see below. New Yorkers can also fly via Los Angeles to Papeete for \$4,689 or \$4,161 with the IAP discount.

BUY 'EM DIRECT FROM THE AIRLINES

Buy miles from American or United when they're on sale at about 1.8 cents each. That equates to some serious savings as the chart below shows—**up to \$3,056 / 53% off**.

You snooze you lose on transcon flights... if you don't want to wake up at 4 a.m., or take a red-eye to arrive at 5 or 6 a.m., then read on

How do you solve a problem like the high transcon (NYC-LAX/SFO) Business Class fare? And I'm not just talking about cash fares. Mile costs are high too nowadays, making this a particularly tough cross-country nut to crack.

CURRENT FARE TREND

These days, transcon fares range from \$1,698 to \$3,898 in Business Class round-trip. That's a Grand Canyon of a chasm. **Flights are averaging around \$3,400, at a minimum.**

IS THIS A DOMESTIC OR INTERNATIONAL FLIGHT?!

Given the cost, why do I feel that when I buy a transcon ticket, I should be going to Europe or South America and not another U.S. state?

Oh wait, that's because I could fly in Business Class round-trip from:

- New York to Maui for \$1,537
- New York to Casablanca for \$2,061
- New York to Tel Aviv for \$2,999
- New York to *Johannesburg* for \$3,493
- Many destinations in Europe including Athens for \$3,100, Barcelona for \$2,987, Frankfurt for \$2,088, London for \$2,506, Milan for \$3,191
- New York to Santiago for \$2,932, or Sao Paulo for \$3,199

Out west, you can fly from Los Angeles to Tokyo, round-trip in Business Class on ZipAir for \$1,569, Sao Paulo for \$2,792 to Hawaii from \$1,099 and to Papeete on Delta nonstop for \$2,862, for example.

Or you could fly across our own vast country and pay *more*. Crazy. It's more cost-to-cost than coast-to-coast.

WAYS TO BEAT THE TRANSCON RIGHT NOW

Like I said, I'm not a fan of early morning or red eye flights. So what to do? I used to get strategic to beat these price gouges. For example, to score a nice nonstop flight on a widebody aircraft I'd drive an extra hour on the front end (Philly to Newark). But doing that now on top of a \$3,400 round-trip fare makes me feel cross.

THINK CONNECTIONS

Fares for flights that have connections can cost much less. On my last flight, for example, I just made a connection on a \$600 one-way First Class fare rather than drive an extra hour for the \$1,700 nonstop. In other words, I saved \$800 and an extra hour in the car, in exchange for having to make a connection. In some ways it was more convenient.

WHAT ABOUT MILES?

When should you think about using your miles for a transcon journey? Domestic Business Class mileage redemption rates have historically been around 25,000 one-way, then they went up to 50,000. Now, they're typically 60,000 to 70,000 miles each way.

Without a lot of options, is it time to consider paying 120,000 to 140,000 miles for a domestic Business Class round-trip? If you don't already have the miles and the fare is \$3,400+, as it often is, and you can buy American and United miles for around 1.8 cents each when on sale, the total cost comes to about \$2,160. That means you're still saving \$1,240 off many fares.

If you already have the miles, you're looking at getting in the neighborhood of 2.7 cents a mile in value, which is more than many people enjoy.



Reduce, Reuse, Recycle: A Second Life for Your Canceled AA Tickets

How to turn your unused or canceled AA tickets into cash

I make a lot of flight bookings.

Well, since I'm constantly talking about being an "[Opportunity Traveler](#)" I have to put my cash and miles where my mouth is, right? Part of that is chasing opportunities and being adventurous with my ticket buying.

And thanks to the Lockdown, now is the golden time to snag opportunities because most big carriers, including American, Delta, and United, *don't charge change fees*.

Which brings me to cars that travel 230 miles per hour.

One of those “opportunities” for me was the Mexico City Formula One Grand Prix in late October — an event that I would have loved to attend. So I booked a flight, even though I knew there was only a 25% chance I’d make it in the end, given work and other commitments. But the water does sometimes part.

So if I ended up canceling the trip, I would lose nothing except a bit of time. But it doesn’t take long to book and I love the process—fantasizing about exotic experiences can be as good as being there (fantasy often exceeds reality)—so frankly, I don’t see it as losing anything. I’ll just need to rebook within 12 months if I don’t use the ticket. Which leads me to the topic of this report.

FIRST A COUPLE OF AMERICAN AIRLINES DEFINITIONS:

Flight Credit: A “Flight Credit” is issued when a customer cancels their flight. These are valid for one year from the date of purchase and the new booking also **has to be in the same name as that of the Flight Credit.**

Trip Credit: A “Trip Credit” is any residual value that isn’t used from a Flight Credit. **It is transferable, meaning you can use that trip credit for anyone.**

A TICKET THAT’S AS GOOD AS CASH

Given that my name is on the ticket, I have to be the one who takes the make-up flight. This is the one called a **“Flight Credit.”** For someone like me, it’s no big deal because I’m flying all the time if not making fantasy bookings. But what if you only take one or two flights a year? Or you fly a lot like me and are booking for friends or family that don’t fly as much. Maybe your job makes it hard to take a lot of trips. In those scenarios, wouldn’t it be great to make these unused tickets available to your spouse, a family member, or a friend?

Lean in, dear reader... I’m about to show you how you can turn a **Flight Credit** into a ticket that *anyone* can use — which is basically like turning it into cash.



CONVERT YOUR UNUSED FLIGHT TO CASH

It's quite simple.

You take your AA Flight Credit and exchange it for the **cheapest ticket you can find, in the name of the original traveler**. The amount left over becomes a Trip Credit (more commonly called a "travel voucher"), which is valid for a future booking — **for anybody**.

For example, let's say you have a \$1,000 ticket. You cancel it, and now have \$1,000 value in the form of an AA Flight Credit. You exchange the AA Flight Credit for (let's say) a \$49 one-way coach ticket from Orlando to Austin, leaving you a remaining value of \$951, which is now in the form of a trip credit (an AA voucher). That **\$951 trip credit is now valid for anybody to use**. "Here you go, hon, visit your cousin in Omaha!"

We found a \$49 flight, but you might be able to do better. Either way, you're essentially turning your unused ticket into a usable ticket for someone else. It's like converting it to cold hard cash. I know of no rule that says you must use the \$49 ticket. So, do you have any tickets lying around waiting for a cash conversion? You know what to do.

Some award seats never show up online. Here's how to find 'em

If you are a [bags-packed dream-trip opportunist](#), or a willing-to-[upgrade-till-the-end](#) maestro, fasten your seatbelt. I have a secret strategy that can open up discount award space for \$27,000 tickets you won't be able to snag any other way.

What's a Waitlist?

Waitlisting is where you're put on a list for seats that aren't currently available in the *booking category* you desire. Airlines have historically used waitlists as an *insurance policy* when they don't sell all their seats, in

that excess inventory is released to those on the waitlist. In this case today, we'll examine Emirates' liberal release of their premium seats for discount miles redemption close to departure.

(Similar to [Lufthansa's lucrative First Class close-in opportunity.](#))

Enter Emirates Waitlist

When it comes to award waitlisting, there are good waitlists and bad ones.

Bad Waitlists: One bad example is United mileage upgrade waitlists, which seldom clear. One reason is because anyone can do it online, so everyone does.

Good Waitlists: Emirates is a great example of a good waitlist. Why? You *can't* do it online. And almost nobody knows about it. That means the **waitlist line is relatively short so you're more likely to win the waitlist lottery.** Many travelers (especially younger ones) refuse to speak to anyone over the phone. They actually do everything on their phone; they just don't use it to speak to anyone. This hang-up equals more opportunities for you.

HOW TO GET THE GOODS THAT NEVER MAKE IT TO THE MARKET SHELVES

With Emirates waitlisting, you not only get access to seats you wouldn't otherwise, but you essentially beat your travel competitors to the draw as they will never see these seats on the airline's website.

Think of it like a grocery store. When people go to the store and see no tomatoes there, they either give up and move on to the next thing on their shopping list — **OR** they ask a store employee if there are any tomatoes *in the back.* That's kind of like what waitlisting is – access to the stuff that never actually makes it to the shelf. It's like you're going straight from the warehouse to your cart.

There are many people who just keep checking seat availability online (the grocery store shelf) every day. And there are other people who tell the “back room guy” to notify them when a box comes in — bypassing the shelf and going straight to their basket.

WAITLISTING AWARDS WITH EMIRATES IS A MANUAL (OVER THE PHONE) TASK BUT NOTIFICATIONS ARE AUTOMATIC

Once you've waitlisted an award flight, you'll be emailed when a seat becomes available, before it's even displayed on the website. **A secret seat**, if you will. That's huge. There's a whole stash of inventory that never makes it to the market shelf, but you can still park your patootie on it.

The Two Waitlist Winners

Somewhat similar to [Lufthansa's close-in release of First Class seats](#), Emirates generally releases seats three days prior to departure. Moreover, I've noticed that the odds of them releasing the seats are 50% or better.

So who can benefit from this?

Winner #1: The Bags-Packed Opportunist

You always have your bags packed and ready at the door, so to speak, so you can pounce when that world-class First Class bucket-list opportunity comes knocking. Perhaps you're retired, a business owner who makes your own schedule, or maybe you're a digital nomad.

Either way, for you the opportunity is inevitable. It just comes down to when.

Winner #2: The Upgrader Till the End

You've already booked a ticket, but it could use improvement either because:

- A) It cost more than you wanted to pay (in miles or cash), and/or
- B) It's in a lesser class of service than you want (say Premium Economy or Business, and/or

- C) It's not on your ideal airline (has average seats or for whatever reason), and/or
- D) It could be more convenient (number of stops, routing, airports, connections times, dates, etc.),

AND

- E) You're open to upgrade opportunities after you've already bought a ticket.** (One of my favorite things to do.)

This happened to me recently while traveling through the Baltics. I was wandering around the area when something came up that required me to return home. My first thought was to book what was most convenient and that was a LOT Polish Airlines flight. [But my first thought isn't always my best one.](#)

Then I thought to myself, hmmm...

1. What's the best flight I could take home from the region? (Emirates was high on that list.)
2. Italy (one of my favorite countries) has an Emirates A380 flight from Milan back to the U.S.
3. I'm always down for Milan.
4. But there's seldom any discount award availability in First Class on Emirates.

Enter Emirates Waitlist

I made like a tortoise, and waitlisted all the flights Emirates would let me: three. In my experience, this is almost a total guarantee, as long as you're flexible on dates. What an awesome ending to a trip. I get to hang out in Milan for a few days on my way back to the U.S. from a three-week trip to the Balkans and Baltics, where I hit country #108.

I'd go so far as to say, why not always return from Milan on any European trip? If not starting there?

Seriously.

Lake Como, Florence, Venice, Verona, and even the Alps are all an easy train ride away if you've exhausted Milan and want to expand your horizons.

By the way, as my trip was winding down, if the **Emirates First Class A380 from Milan** didn't open-up, I could always just fly home from **Vilnius, Lithuania, in Business Class on LOT Polish Airlines**.


It's easy. All you have to do is pick up the phone, dial Emirates at 1-800-777-3999, and maybe wait on hold five minutes, if that. Put on your iPhone earbuds and enjoy some Barry Manilow or Beethoven, and make dinner or clear the dishes while you wait. Personally, I can be more productive while on hold with airlines than I am otherwise. A perfect distraction that allows me to focus. It's never been a big problem for me, and once you speak to a reservationist, they're happy to put you on the waitlist for up to three flights for your discount award. You just have to ask.

INCREASING YOUR ODDS

The more seats that are empty going in, the better the odds of your waitlist clearing, obviously.

How do you know what flights have the most empty seats?

One way is to go to Expedia and do a search on the route and date you're considering. Then in the search results, click on the exact flight you're looking at. Then click on "choose your seat" (see below). Then view the number of empty seats. While not always 100% accurate, it's indicative, and if there are no empty seats, that's a bad sign for sure.



In general, I'd guess if you're a week out from departure, and see four or so seats open (is the case much of the time), waitlisting is worth pursuing. With less than two seats, your odds are slim.

Also: Be aware that there are 14 seats in First Class on A380s (New York-Milan, Houston, Los Angeles, New York, San Francisco, Washington, DC – Dubai, and beyond), and eight Seats on B777s (New York-Athens; Boston, Chicago, Dallas and Orlando – Dubai, and beyond). In general, the more seats on the plane, the more potential empty seats to open-up.



Pluck a Canuck Poaching Fare for Big Savings to Asia

Canadian connections can now save you up to 54% in Business Class

Premium fares to Asia are high, and are only getting higher. If you don't want to pay \$8,000+ and don't mind having two of [the three C's: Cost, Comfort, and Convenience](#), keep reading.

Now that Canada has broken free from the Lockdown ice age, there are some hidden Business Class opportunities **from** the U.S. **via** Canada to a range of Asian cities on Air Canada, All Nippon, and Japan Airlines.

When you do a search for nonstop fares from Chicago to Tokyo or other Asian cities, Business Class is currently \$8,000 to \$10,000 on major U.S. and Asian carriers. However, we found that fares from many U.S. cities with connections through Canada can drop 50%+!

ASIA FARES FROM THE U.S. VERSUS VIA CANADA THAT SAVE UP TO 54%

The chart below shows the smarts of a Canuck detour. Look at that third example. Fly direct from San Francisco to Tokyo on JAL for \$9,813 or go via Vancouver, Canada, and pay just \$4,541 (54% less).
