Happy New Year! On behalf of the TRACKS Board, we hope everyone had a wonderful holiday season and we send our best wishes to all our members for a happy, healthy and active 2025.

TRACKS was quite busy in 2024. Our biggest achievement was building the LumberJack trail (formerly referred to as the *shortcut loop*) connecting two points on the original 'Blue Ridge' trail. This trail is 3.25 miles long and gives users different options when hiking the Blue Ridge trail. Our second project was building two short connector trails from the Mountain Meadows sports complex to the 'Hitching Post' trail in Woodland Park. These connectors are 0.15 and 0.25 miles in length. Pinetop-Lakeside hopes to have Mountain Bike events in the future and will use these connectors. By the time you read this, we will have installed rollover gates on these as they enter the forest. And of course, the trail crew worked diligently maintaining our trails.

For 2025, there are three projects in the queue; the expansion of the Buena Vista trail system, the Show Low Bike Course north of the city, and the reroute of a section of the Chipmunk trail from marker 8 to 18. These projects will proceed at a slower rate than we would like, but the Forest Service is dealing with a manpower shortage. They are the final decision-makers and will have to make sure there are no effects on wildlife, archeological concerns, etc. !!

APACHE SITGREAVES NATIONAL FOREST By Stephanie Rainey

Bringing your dog to the Apache-Sitgreaves National Forests

I enjoy taking my dog, Trixie, hiking with me on trails on the A-S Forests. It helps Trixie learn how to socialize and behave when she sees other dogs and people. But problems can occur when dog owners let their dogs run loose. Every year, I receive calls from the public complaining about dogs running lose in the forest. This year in the Black Mesa Ranger district, a 10-year-old child walking on a trail was bitten by a dog and the owner grabbed the dog and ran off, leaving the injured child on the trail. Another instance, a poodle was killed (by an under-restrained dog who broke his thin leash) in a campground.

Please Remember:

- Dogs must always remain under the owner's control.
- Dogs must be leashed in developed recreation sites-meaning an area that has been improved or developed for recreation such as campgrounds, picnic areas, day use areas, trails, parking lots, etc.).
- You must clean up pet waste and DON'T leave the poop bag in the forest! Carry it out, because no one is going to pick up the bag for you and now you've created litter. It's best to carry a small trowel, dig a hole, and deposit the dog waste in the hole just like when properly disposing of human waste.

Federal Regulations regarding dogs

- Failure to have a dog on a leash can lead to a citation under 36 CFR 261.8(d).
- Within developed recreation sites, you can be cited under 36 CFR § 261.16j.
- Within the rest of the forest, you can be cited under 36 CFR 261.8(d).

The Apache-Sitgreaves National Forests is dog-friendly, but there are rules and regulations regarding dogs in the forest. These rules are meant to keep visitors safe, whether you are camping, hiking, horseback riding, or biking.
