The Middle School Child

As children grow, they begin to experience physical, intellectual, and emotional changes. The way they learn, feel, see the world, and relate to other people becomes different from when they were younger. These changes, along with demands from present-day society and peer pressure, create conflicts and tension in the adolescent, which are reflected in their behavior in school and at home.

Young people at this age show several contradictions and conflicts, which is normal. There is no "model" adolescent. All young people are individuals with strong and weak points and with positive and negative qualities. There are some common characteristics that should be kept in mind to understand and help the middle schooler in daily activities at home and at school:

- Adolescents have elevated levels of physical and emotional energy, which may contrast with long periods of idleness, generally disapproved of by adults.
- They take risks, are curious, and love danger and adventure, yet their feelings can be hurt easily. This is the time when they feel immortal, but they worry a lot about what their friends think about them.
- They want to be independent from their families, and at the same time, they need to be pampered and protected.
- They withdraw and want a private life, and at the same time, they worry about being accepted by their peers.
- They demand privileges but avoid responsibilities. At the same time, they are developing an awareness of social problems and the welfare of others.

Adolescents from other cultures sometimes face an additional burden as they develop their identities and try to comply with the requirements of home and school. On one side, they have the values and customs of the home that the family wants to maintain, and on the other, they have to respond to the demands of their peers and teachers, who have a different set of rules and customs.

The Benefit of Parent Involvement at the Middle School Level

The results of recent research are very clear: When parents are actively involved in their children's education, they do better in school. The academic level of the parents, their socioeconomic level, and their ethnic or racial origin are not determining factors for academic success. It is essential for parents to have a positive attitude regarding education, and to demonstrate trust that their children can do well.

When parents become involved, both students and school benefit:

- Grades and test results are higher;
- Students' attitudes and behavior are more positive;
- Academic programs are more successful; and
- The school is more effective.

The participation of all parents, including those with limited knowledge of English, is important to the academic achievement of their children. Such participation has many positive consequences for the family, the school, and especially for the young adolescent:

- The family has the chance to understand the school system better.
- The teachers can understand students who come from other cultures more easily.
- The students receive support from adults to confront the problems of adolescence-particularly where these problems are accentuated by the conflicting cultures of home, friends, and school.

• The school can become the natural extension of the home, aiding in the preservation of families' cultures and values.


There are many ways that parents can demonstrate to their adolescent children that they are interested in academic success and that they are available to offer support and protection when there are problems. Here are some suggestions:

- Talk with your child about what happens at school every day. Ask often if there are messages from the school.
- Spend some relaxed time with your children. Share a meal or a snack. Tell them often what you like about them.
- Listen to and share their worries. Support what you believe to be good about the school and offer your help to change any school practices that you believe could be harmful to your child.
- Avoid disciplinary lectures and arguments when your teenagers bring bad news home. Listen to their reasons and
 offer your help to improve the situation. It helps if your children know you believe they will be successful.
- Value their education by encouraging homework and reading. Help your children choose a good time and place to do their assignments and special projects. Provide the necessary materials and give them your unconditional support.

Parent Involvement in School

The way that parents become involved in the middle school can be somewhat different from what they were accustomed to in the elementary school. Generally, the building is larger, and it could be located farther from home. A middle school student may have several teachers, not just one as in the elementary school. The schedule is probably more complicated than ever before. They may be a little intimidated by it. Help them by talking about it and helping them get adjusted—one day at a time. Don't be surprised if your teenagers feel embarrassed when you go to their school. It is not uncommon for them to resent their parents' presence at school. Here are some suggestions to increase your involvement:

- Get to know several teachers, not just one. Don't wait for a problem to talk with your child's teacher.
- Keep in touch with the guidance, Child Center of NY, or Attendance Mentors. They generally know all of the students in the school, and they can keep you informed regarding the progress and behavior of your child.
- Read all information on school policies and curriculum carefully. Normally, we send this information home at the beginning of the school year. We also will contact you during the year through AutoDial and Google Gradebook.
- Keep informed about your child's grades and test results, especially in any subjects in which he or she has problems.
 Ask for help if it is needed and take advantage of our after-school programs.
- Request periodic meetings with the teachers. If you don't speak or understand English, ask for a translator or bring a bilingual friend or family member with you. Request information concerning programs that the school offers for students with limited English proficiency in the native language. Be sure your child is placed in the program that best meets his or her needs.
- Get to know other parents and form support groups to work on problems and issues of mutual interest.
- Answer notes and other correspondence the school sends. If you do not understand these messages due to language problems, ask the principal to send them to you in the language you understand.

Attendance Requirements

It is important that students are present each day that school is in session unless serious reasons prevent them from being in school. Frequent absences interfere with student learning and developing conceptual understandings. This makes It is difficult for students to achieve high levels of achievement. There are times, however, when it is in the best interest of all concerned for students to stay home.

If your child is going to be absent, s/he must bring a note from home or the doctor that explains the reasons for her/his absence. All students are expected to make up any work that s/he misses. Teachers will give children an opportunity to make up all assignments. It is important that your child understands that attendance is an integral part of our grading system and is one of the factors that impact promotional decisions.

Uniform Grading Policy

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As such, the following information summarizes the grading requirements which will ensure that we meet these expectations. Please note that parents, students, teachers and administrators must work collaboratively to help our students meet their academic goals.

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GRADING SYSTEM

Student academic achievement will be based on the degree of mastery of the Next Generations Learning Standards, Teacher Instructional Goals, and Student Learning Targets as outlined in the curriculum units for each subject. The goals also reflect the Next Generations Learning Standards and address the skills and concepts needed for College and Career Readiness.

Ebbets Field Middle School is a learning community in pursuit of academic excellence. Consequently, we offer students a curriculum that offers a variety of learning experiences as we maintain a balanced curriculum.

Curriculum offerings include, but are not limited to: language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, music, computer technology and physical education. The information used in grading needs to be appropriate to the grade level and subject being considered. Prior to instruction, students are informed of the class expectations and how grades are determined.

TIMELINE FOR AWARDING INTERIM AND FINAL GRADES

We provide report cards to parents four times during the school year- in November, February, April and June-informing them of the degree to which student success in learning and in mastering learning standards. Report cards provide reinforcement for students and reflect progress and achievement of students' work at the grade level they are assigned. Grades serve the function of providing students and families with information and guidance.

Grading Elements

Scale of Marks Award

Our school uses percentages. Students who earn a 65% or higher have passed their class. Students who earn a 55% and below have not passed their class.

The following chart is used to determine what performance level the students receive based on a percentage score. The performance level is what will appear on the student's report card.

Make-up Work

Teachers provide students reasonable opportunities to make-up for missing work. Students may have one week after an assignment is due to submit missed work due to absence.

Promotional Policy

Promotional Criteria include:

Pick Up Policy

As a rule, we discourage parents from picking up students prior to the scheduled release time; however, emergencies do occur. Ebbets Field Middle School will not release a student unless s/he is picked up by an adult who is listed on the home emergency (blue) card. Anyone wishing to pick-up a student will report to the Main office. The school secretary will confirm the adult's relationship with the child by checking the blue card and cross-referencing it with a photo identification card. The adult will sign your child out. After this time, the child will be located and instructed to report to the main office with her/his books, coats, etc.

Rapid Dismissal

In the event of an emergency (snowstorm, city wide emergency, etc.) it may become necessary to conduct a rapid dismissal and/or early release. If this occurs, we will follow emergency protocols as outlined in our school safety plan or a higher directive. If this should occur, you can get information by calling 311 or checking the websites at www.schools.nyc.gov and http://efms352.org.

Visitors/Volunteers

All visitors/volunteers must report to the main office, room 301A, to register and make your presence known. You will be issued a visitor badge from the School Safety Agent upon arrival to the school building. If you would like to see a teacher, or a member of administration, make an appointment with the parent coordinator. If an appointment is not feasible the parent coordinator will see if s/he can guide you as to how your needs will be addressed.

Communication

Each month a newsletter is compiled and distributed by the Parent Coordinator and PTA. This newsletter will include notices about up-coming meetings and special programs. Communication between home and school is crucial to student success. We ask that parents check their children's book bags for notices that are sent home. Parents should also check bulletin boards in the main Office, the first floor and parent coordinator's office or just ask the Parent Coordinator for notices that may have been sent out whenever you visit your child's school.

Ebbets Field Middle School 352 will prepare a monthly calendar to inform families of events and important dates including: standardized assessments, end of marking period, report cards, back to school night, Parent Teacher Association meetings, Family Movie Nights, and any other special school event. Please impress upon your children that any correspondence from school should be brought to your attention.

The principal will hold open evening office hours the first Monday of each month 5:30pm to 6:30pm (in-Person or Virtual) should you have any concerns and or questions.

Homework

Every student at Ebbets Field Middle School will have homework in every major subject--every single night. If your child tells you otherwise, request a meeting with the teacher, school counselor and/or the parent coordinator. Don't delay as this can seriously impact your child's conceptual understandings of important content and impact their academic performance.

In addition to homework, every student is expected to complete projects and performance tasks in each major unit of study. This work is mandatory and will increase their essential understandings and deepen their individual learning. While there is no set formula, we believe that homework is a natural extension of the lesson and should reinforce it thereby deepening our students understanding and learning. To accomplish this end, our teachers assign homework. As a rule of thumb, homework should take between 10 and 30 minutes in every major content area.

- Grade 6 20 minutes in each major subject
- Grade 7 25 minutes in each major subject
- Grade 8 30 minutes in each major subject

Bus and Metro Card Policy

As a rule, middle school students are not bussed on yellow school buses. Instead, the students who live more than a mile from the school will receive Metro Cards. There are two exceptions: some sixth graders and special needs students do receive bussing. The decision as to who receives bussing and who receives Metrocards lies solely with the Office of Pupil Transportation and the Office of Special Education.

Eligibility criteria:

- Grade 6 and resides at least ½ mile and less than one mile from their school, he or she is eligible for half fare on Public Transportation.
- Grade 6 and resides 1 mile or more from school, he or she is eligible for General Education Transportation (Yellow School Bus) or free fare on Public Transportation.
- Grades 7-12 and resides between ½ and ½ miles from school, he or she is eligible for half fare on Public Transportation.
- Grades 7-12 and resides more than 1½ miles from school, he or she is eligible for free fare on Public Transportation.

Students who meet the criteria, will receive a Metro Card. However, there is a limited supply. If a student continuously loses his/her MetroCard, the school may not be able to replace it. Please speak to your child about personal responsibility so that we can keep these incidents to a minimum.

IEP students may be eligible to take the Yellow School buses. If you have a concern about the bus company, please contact the Parent Coordinator. Expressing your concerns with the bus driver delays the driver, who has the responsibility of getting children to and from school safely.

Bus Behavior

Any student who violates our school code of conduct or the New York City Department of Education's Uniform Code of Discipline will participate in our Restorative Practice sessions. Proper conduct is required of all students riding the school bus. The safety of students will not be jeopardized by inappropriate behavior. The bus driver is the authority on the bus; parental support for the driver is essential.

Written notices from the Principal, Parent Coordinator, Guidance Counselor or Behavior Specialist will inform parents of inappropriate behavior. Students may be suspended from riding the school bus if the behavior continues to interfere with the operation of a safe and orderly transportation.

Discipline Policy

The faculty of Ebbets Field Middle School is committed to creating a safe and effective learning environment where every child can meet and exceed the standards in a risk-free and supportive environment.

To accomplish this goal, each teacher implements a classroom discipline plan. These plans are aligned with the school-wide discipline plan. These rules govern the cafeteria, halls, gymnasium, and school yard. These plans specify rules that cover the expectations for student behavior. Students must see the relationship between her/his actions and their respective consequences. The school-wide discipline plan is always in effect at the school.

In addition, the NYC Department of Education has developed a Uniform Code of Discipline of which you will be able to view in multiple languages from http://schools.nyc.gov and http://efms352.org. This document explains the relationship

between the incident and the consequence. When it comes to discipline, this document is the foundation that will go our practices. However, our school does follow Restorative Practices Principles and Culturally Responsive Teaching gears towards the improvement of student behavior and in creating and maintaining a school climate that is safe for school community.	that
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Cellphones and Other Electronic Devices

As per Chancellor's Regulation A-413, all New York City schools are required to establish a cell phone policy that reflects the Chancellor's Regulation. Ebbets Field Middle School cell phone policy is as follow:

For the 2024-2025 school year we have partnered with Yondr; a company that provides all our students with secure pouches to store their phones in for the day. Students are expected to arrive and depart from school with their pouches intact as well as carry their pouches in their book bag throughout the day. Failure to follow this policy or if the student is caught using their phone during school hours, it will result in the students' phone being taken away and a parent meeting with an administrator.

We understand that this policy may be an inconvenience for some. However, to ensure a safe and productive learning environment, we need to limit distractions which is why we have partnered with Yondr. If your child must be picked up early or in the case of an emergency, feel free to contact the school's main office at 718 941-5097, Monday -Friday, 8am-2:40pm.

If you're student forgets or loses their pouch, and or their cellphone is not in the Yondr Pouch assigned the following a 3-strike system will be followed:

- 1. Verbal warning from the teacher and or EFMS staff followed by confiscation of the cell phone (give cellphone to the behavior specialist) for the day with a call to the parent.
- 2. Parent meeting with the Behavior Specialist to discuss our cellphone Policy (In-Person or remote)
- 3. Disciplinary meeting with Parent and an Administrator

Dress Code

The EFMS has a dress code. All students must wear the school uniform which is a royal blue collared shirt with khaki or black pants, or skirt. On gym days, students must wear the gym uniform which is the gray sweatpants with the royal blue T-shirt. The school shirts and Gym uniform can be purchased from the school or at Ideal Uniform Store located 1816 Flatbush Avenue Brooklyn, N.Y 11210

Students will not be allowed to wear.

- Shorts
- Blouses or tops that contain spaghetti straps, midriffs, bare backs, or low cut necklines
- Sandals, flip flops, or slippers
- Clothing that advertises tobacco or alcoholic products
- Do-rags, caps or any other head dress unless it is for religious or cultural observance
- Clothing that is connected to any gang affiliation

Emergency Information Cards

Every child at Ebbets Field Middle School must have a home blue emergency card also known as a "blue card." Your child will receive a blank emergency card during the first week of school. You must fill it out completely and carefully. We rely on this document to reach you in the event of an EMERGENCY. Anything listed on the card is confidential. Your child will only be released to individuals listed on the car. You are responsible for notifying the school in writing if there is a change with whom you want your child to interact.

Please make every effort to keep all this information current. Anytime you change an address or phone number, you should request another card from the school secretary in the main office, . For emergency and administrative reasons, it is very important that an up-to-date student address record be maintained. Notify the school office immediately if you have a change of address or emergency phone numbers during the school year.

Field Trips

Field trips are scheduled throughout the school year to supplement curriculum and provide our students with an experienced-base thereby deepening their understanding and increasing their content knowledge. You will receive notices of most field trips at least one week before the trip. You are required to sign a Field Trip Permission Form in order for your child to participate. Should a field trip extend beyond the regular school day, it is imperative that you indicate how you want your child to leave the school upon return. All trip slips will have a box that you will check. One will read (allow my child to leave the school grounds immediately after s/he returns). The other reads, (I will pick my son/daughter up upon her/his return). You must check one of the two boxes.

We also ask that all parents sign a "walking permission slip." This slip will allow your child to walk to participate in an array of activities that deepen understanding and activate learning. These trips might include: a neighborhood walk to identify geometric shapes in local architecture; a walk through the botanical gardens to identify various plants and flowers, etc. Parents may not be notified of every one of these trips in advance. This slip allows the classroom teacher some spontaneity and offers our students an element of surprise and intrigue.

During a field trip, all students are reminded that school rules are in effect. The classroom is mobile for the day and students will act accordingly. Failure to do so may result in the loss of field trip privileges in the future.

The specific places that classes visit dictate how many chaperones are needed. Interested parents should complete a chaperone volunteer form on the reverse side of the permission slip. When more parents volunteer than are allowed, names will be randomly chosen.

EFMS does not have a bank account for field trip funds. When making payment for your child's trip, please send in cash or a money order in an envelope to your child's teacher.

Health Services

In accordance with state regulations, every student entering school for the first time shall have a completed medical history and physical examination. Furthermore, every student in grades K-12 must have all required immunizations and dental screenings. Failure to be fully immunized will result in exclusion from school. There is no grace period or exception. As immunizations follow schedules, this problem most frequently impacts sixth graders.

During school hours, the health aide or school nurse deals with illness and minor accidents. The nurse/health aide confers with students, staff and parents and manages all student health records. It is important, therefore, that the nurse is notified of any and all health issues that impact your child. Exclusion from school will occur for chicken pox, scarlet fever, ringworm, impetigo, pinkeye, head lice, scabies, and any other infection deemed contagious by a medical professional.

If it is necessary that a student take medication in school, all medications must be in their original containers. And provided to the nurse A written permission slip from a parent or guardian is required as well as from the physician if medication is to be given for a period longer than one week. No medication will be administered unless these guidelines are met. Further, MEDICATION MUST BE DELIVERED TO SCHOOL BY A PARENT OR OTHER ADULT LISTED ON THE EMERGENCY CARD. All medication is administered by the school nurse.

Lost and Found

Parents are encouraged to label ALL belongings including clothing. Your child's name should be put into each and every item. All lost items are retained in the main office. Items will be held for up to 30/days. Encourage your child to claim any missing possessions from the lost and found area.

Lunch/Breakfast Program

The EFMS is a universal breakfast site. This means that all students are permitted to eat breakfast at no charge. Federal assistance for lunch is available through the completion of a lunch form application.

The Application for free and Reduced Price School Meals should be filled out and returned to the school to determine eligibility for free or reduced-price school meals. Eligibility is based on the household size and monthly gross income. Full-price lunch is \$1.50. Reduced lunch is \$0.50.

Permission Slips

Internet: All students are given a Student Internet Use Agreement at the beginning of the school year. An explanation regarding the use of the Internet during school is required to be discussed and signed by all students and their parent(s)/guardian before a student is allowed the use of the internet.

Photo Release Form: A letter is sent home in the beginning of the school year with regards to this policy. If you do not fill out and return this permission slip, your child will not be able to participate with the rest of the class at these photographic opportunities.

Parent Teachers Association

Ebbets Field Middle School has (PTA) or Parent Teachers Association. Its membership is drawn solely from parents and/or individuals with a parental relationship with one or more students at the school. Chancellor's Regulation A660. These regulations are available in the main office and at http://schools.nyc.gov

School Leadership Team (SLT)

Every school in NYC has a school leadership team. The purpose of the team is three-fold:

- 1. Develop a Comprehensive Education Plan

Parents make up half of membership; the remaining half is comprised of teachers, school staff, union and Parent Teacher Association representatives. Schools have the option of adding students and community representatives.
