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WHY CHANGE MATTERS

We still live in a world where parents will skip a life-saving surgery to provide for food or choose to leave their families for years to sustain them. Students give up their dreams of education to chase opportunities that will cover everyday needs. This is the reality because poverty is still prevalent. The rapid development of technology and the way information is shared, as well as how education & services are distributed, contribute to people living in poverty's exclusion from the normal day-to-days of our world. This exclusion leads to the inability to access the basic requirements for life.

This is very much the case in Armenia. Besides indicating the low level of income to live and meet basic needs, poverty levels also show that people are deprived of access to food, water, electricity, education, healthcare and sometimes even basic human rights. Dilapidated infrastructure throughout rural communities is also commonly observed.

Armenia faces all these challenges with the rural areas being the most vulnerable and affected, with 34.2% of the population living in poverty. In 2018, the poverty rates in Yerevan (27.7%) and rural (34.2%) communities present a large gap. Despite the World Bank-reported growth (7.6%) in 2018, poverty levels still remain high, with the rural population being the most affected.

Sometimes, poverty is not seen as a problem that can be solved, but merely an unchangeable state to live with. The psychology of a 'receiver' or one who always asks for help still prevails in our society, the post-war and post-earthquake years being far in the past. Although the Velvet Revolution proved that a generation of 'change-makers' and 'action-takers' is starting to form, the change needs to happen systematically and faster.

CHANGE THROUGH EMPOWERMENT

It all began with a glass of water back in 2003, when COAF Founder & Chairman Garo Armen first travelled to Armenia. While visiting the village of Karakert, he asked an elderly man sitting on his front porch for a glass of water and was shocked to learn locals lacked access to clean water. This encounter laid the groundwork for what would become COAF.

Garo realized swift action needed to be taken to revitalize rural regions of Armenia. Karakert became the first village community where COAF launched its efforts the following year, with the renovation of one of the local schools being the first major project implemented. COAF soon realized the needs in villages went beyond just infrastructure improvements. Creating education, health-care, social services and economic development programs designed with a community-based holistic approach in mind were needed as well.

COAF remains committed to providing children, youth and their families with opportunities to realize their potential and reach for the stars. Empowering people living throughout rural Armenia, has brought about dramatic results in terms of individuals defining their own futures and being active participants in the ushering of a new Armenia after enduring many setbacks throughout history.

COAF's Education programs seek to empower students to shape their own futures and take their communities to new heights. Through implementing non-formal extracurricular education programs, using project-based real-life learning and improving the learning environment, COAF aims to improve the quality of education in rural communities of Armenia.

IMPACT & ACHIEVEMENTS

390 Aflatoun social-financial program's students implemented 12 business projects and used the revenue for 11 social projects.

627 students participated in Summer Schools on media literacy, arts, environment and ethnography.

492 Student Council members implemented community development projects.

1203 students participated in after school programs of arts, crafts & sports.

71 kids of Tavush Judo clubs participated in a regional championship. 4 students won medals: 2 bronze and 2 silver.

80 students graduated from the English Clubs in cooperation with the British Council.

354 Debate Club students became more media literate, aware on political, social topics and able to discuss their points.

321 students made an informed and aware choice of profession through the Professional Orientation program.

102 COAF Alumni gained employability skills.

250 adults from 10 regions of Armenia graduated from the Social English online program in cooperation with the U.S. Embassy in Armenia.

200 works of 245 students were showcased at different exhibitions.

70 teachers and school principals learned new teaching methods and education management skills.

Village programs

HEALTH THROUGH PREVENTION

COAF works to improve the quality of primary health services in the villages with programs that promote the wellbeing of the entire community. COAF Health programs focus on disease prevention through promoting healthy behavior starting from primary school age. We conduct hands-on training for local health providers, improve physical conditions of rural health facilities, and implement dental & health screening interventions.

IMPACT & ACHIEVEMENTS

6 school cafeterias in Myasnikyan, Vahagni, Aygehovit, Vazashen, Odzun and Shenik renovated and Brushodromes established.

COAF Supportive Supervision Program ensured the majority of local health providers to comply with standard protocols for 0-5-year old childcare guidelines.

2587 people were screened for early detection of breast, thyroid, prostate cancer.

12 cases of cancer were early detected and complications prevented.

1357 teeth were treated among 218 kids.

331 students had knowledge and skills increase on healthy lifestyle topics.

Drs. Rose and Roland Simpsons from the UK visited Vahagni, Dsegh, Tumanyan, Arevatsag villages, consulted 150 patients with local doctors and nurses, as well as family medicine students.

UK-based professor Gevorg Hopaian and Lorky Libaridian from Royal College **General Practitioners** delivered courses on Family Medicine for 15 medical students.

COAF Child and Family Services follow a holistic approach to child and family issues through multi-disciplinary service provision by social workers, psychologists, speech therapists and educators providing individualized and group services and therapies to children and their families.

IMPACT & ACHIEVEMENTS

3 “Sunny” Child Development Corners established in Dzoragyugh, Yeghegnut and Shenik.

291 parents and teachers participated in workshops to learn games and make toys to use with children.

83.6% of children in therapy overcame their speech and learning difficulties.

53.2% knowledge increase was observed on speech therapy related topics among villagers.

5 awareness raising topics implemented by social workers: human rights, parenting, elderly, people w/ disabilities, domestic violence.

18 local psychologists trained.

COAF joined the international PopUp Festival for emotional intelligence awareness raising.

COAF Drama Therapy troupe performed at the COAF’s 15th and Tumanyan’s 150th anniversary event in Dsegh’s Tumanyan Museum

The COAF Economic Development program focuses on business and infrastructure development in villages. In the framework of the program, the village is thoroughly assessed and evaluated to identify competitive advantages and investment opportunities. Based on this and closely working with the local government and the residents of the villages, business and infrastructure projects are designed, developed and implemented that are unique and specific to each community.

6 school cafeterias & Brush-odromes established and renovated in Myasnikyan, Vahagni, Aygehovit, Vazashen, Odzun and Shenik.

3 “Sunny” Child development corners established in Dzoragyugh, Yeghegnut & Shenik kindergartens.

1 SMART Safe Room established in Vazashen.

Solar panels installed at Aragatsavan school.

3 playgrounds and sports grounds established in Meghrashen, Zorakan and Vardakar.

2 Health facilities renovated in Karinj and Vahagni.

A GROWING SMART ECO-SYSTEM



A RASPBERRY FIELD IN PARTNERSHIP WITH UNDP

COAF launched the Sustainable Income through Effective Household Management project in partnership with the UNDP aimed at developing a specific product value chain, through raspberries. The project components included berry seedlings provision, drip irrigation system establishment, training on berry production and cultivation. 81 local households from 3 SMART settlements have participated in the trainings and each of them has started a berry production. The capacity of the COAF SMART Center in Lori is used as a hub for training, product promotion and marketing, as well as a demo site.

A FOREST NURSERY IN PARTNERSHIP WITH MY FOREST ARMENIA

COAF's partnership with My Forest Armenia plants seeds of growth in Debet, empowering sustainable development in the region. By empowering local communities, under the direction of scientists and expert foresters, the goal is to decrease carbon in the atmosphere, sustainably increase forest coverage and preserve biodiversity using numerous endemic species.

1 NEW SMART ROOM

Opened in September 2019 in Vazashen

A new SMART room was opened in Vazashen, a borderline village within only one km distance from the state border. With three SMART rooms in the region a new project was initiated in partnership with Startup Club Armenia Foundation to educate local youth in entrepreneurship, identify and develop local startup ventures, prepare pitches and find investors to bring them to life. About 50 students participate in the clubs from three communities.

OUR NOVEL CURRICULUM

Based on one year of piloting an educational program at COAF SMART Center since its opening in May 2018, the educational model was in the making in the first half of 2019 to suit the three unique age tracks and to ensure continuous learning. The inception of the new model started from September 2019 from one community to another, gradually growing into the following network of future SMART citizens:

SEED

3-6 years old

Seed age track students cover a comprehensive 3-year program that emphasizes emotional, social, mental and physical development. Students aged 5-6 are also prepared for transition from kindergarten to school.

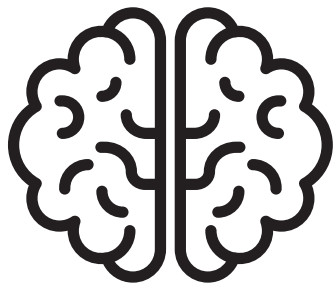

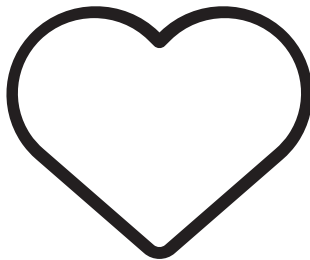

1. SMART ESSENTIALS

To become a SMART Citizen, students are required to take one program in each dimension of the 3H theory. Students select one of two program offerings in each dimension, which sets their 3 classes twice a week schedule for 15 weeks.

2. SMART 1:1S

The SMART Education Counselor conducts individual meetings with every student to assess their learning progress, as well as to provide professional orientation resources for further career and education.

3. SMART PROJECTS

During the third level of each essential program, the instruction transitions from teach-centered to a collaborative learning experience. By utilizing project-based learning, students define and implement community SMART projects.

4. SMART TRIPS

The purpose of these trips is to introduce students to exemplary institutions and demonstrate real-life application of knowledge in each field. SMART Trips are carried out both in Lori region and beyond.

5. SMART CONNECTS

“SMART Connects” gathers the COAF community together with professionals in different fields who share their success stories and lessons learned.

6. SMART WORKSHOPS

In addition to essential courses, it is mandatory for students to participate in one intensive workshop related to their program led by international or local experts. This learning format helps to projectize knowledge and achieve results within a short timeline.

THE QUALITATIVE IMPACT

A URBAN MEETS RURAL

Students from the two most populated urban communities of Lori – Vanadzor and Alaverdi are now on the SMART map. They travel daily to rural Debet, (COAF SMART Center), a community with a population of roughly 900 to receive non-formal education, starting a unique dialogue and exchange of values.

B THE INDIVIDUAL TOUCH

COAF SMART Center is a unique educational institution with an interdisciplinary team of specialists who work with each student individually, in groups and within families to solve complex issues. The team consists of Counselor, Psychologist, Social worker, Education analyst, Education programs manager.

C AUTOMATION OF LEARNING MANAGEMENT

In order to automate the learning management easier with over 1700 students, COAF has partnered with Tutor Platform to build a tailor-made digital platform. The platform serves as a database for SMART Citizen app that is used for news, messaging, as well as accommodating a gamified e-learning experience.

THE QUANTITATIVE IMPACT

A A 24/7 EDUCATIONAL HUB

With over 250 students visiting daily on weekdays, and over 700 students on weekends COAF SMART Center has become a 24/7 education hub.

B GROWING NUMBER OF STUDENTS

In less than 4 months, over 40% of school students from rural beneficiary communities have joined SMART Citizenship curriculum.

C JOB CREATION FOR LOCALS

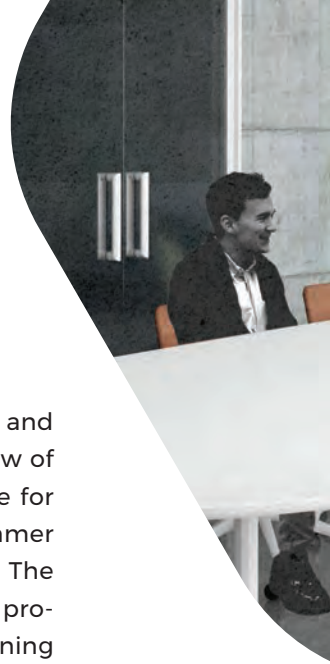
Over 90% of our Lori team are local, meaning that 50 educators, artists, and others have gained opportunities to fulfill their professional potential at COAF SMART.

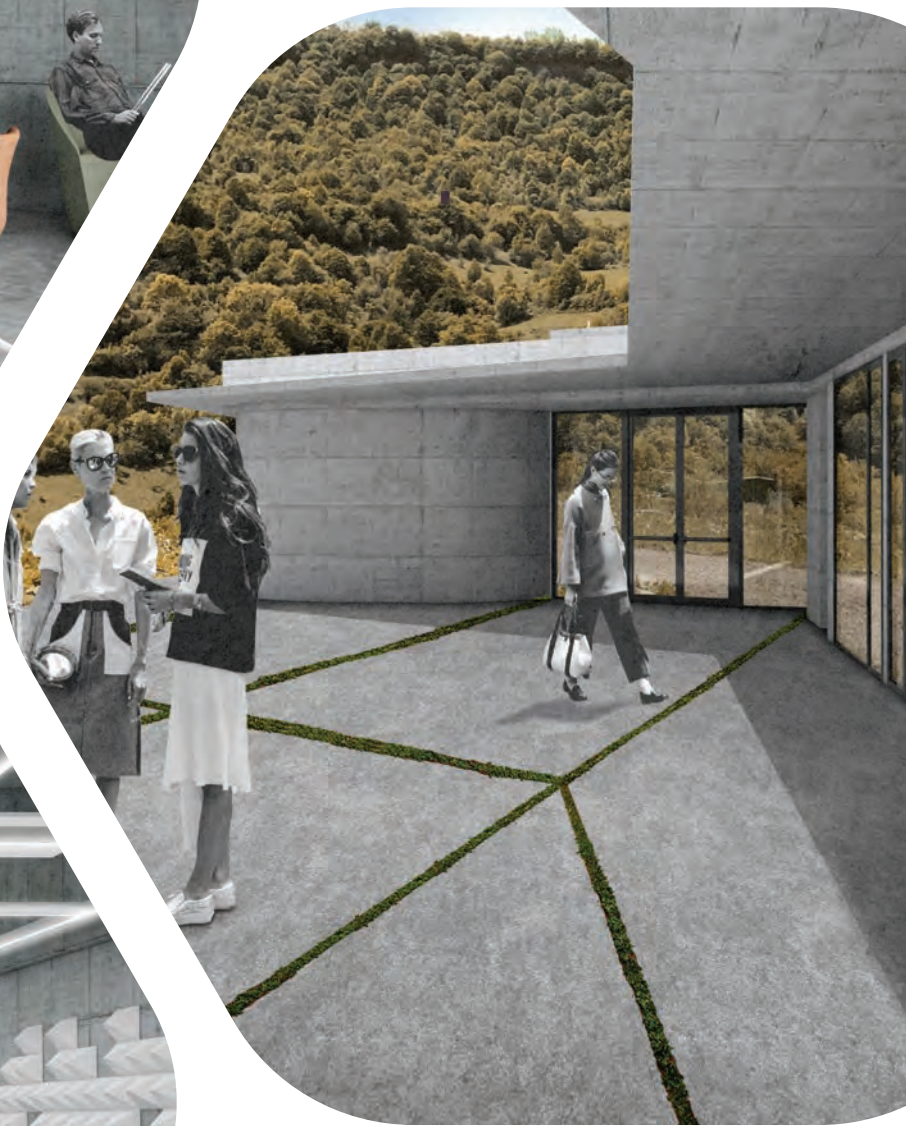


AN EXPANDING COAF SMART CAMPUS

CONFERENCE CENTER

The Conference Center will be a part of the social enterprise generating revenue and reinvesting into COAF's programs in the region. It will promote an even higher flow of people and organizations to Lori. The idea is to become the main regional venue for local and international organizations in conferencing, professional training, summer schools and exchange that will provoke economic activity in rural communities. The Conference Center will set a new standard for organization of conferences and professional conventions, implement best practices in the field and become a learning environment for the business and a platform for professional development extending COAF SMART Center capacities. It will consist of two conferencing venues and 22 hotel rooms that will be managed in combination with the 12 rooms of the Concept Hotel currently functioning on site. The Center will be enhanced also with technological solutions ready to meet a wide range of challenges. Besides the in-house services there will be outsourced options for tourism related activities, printing and publishing, transportation and other complementary products and services.

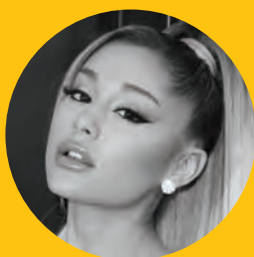

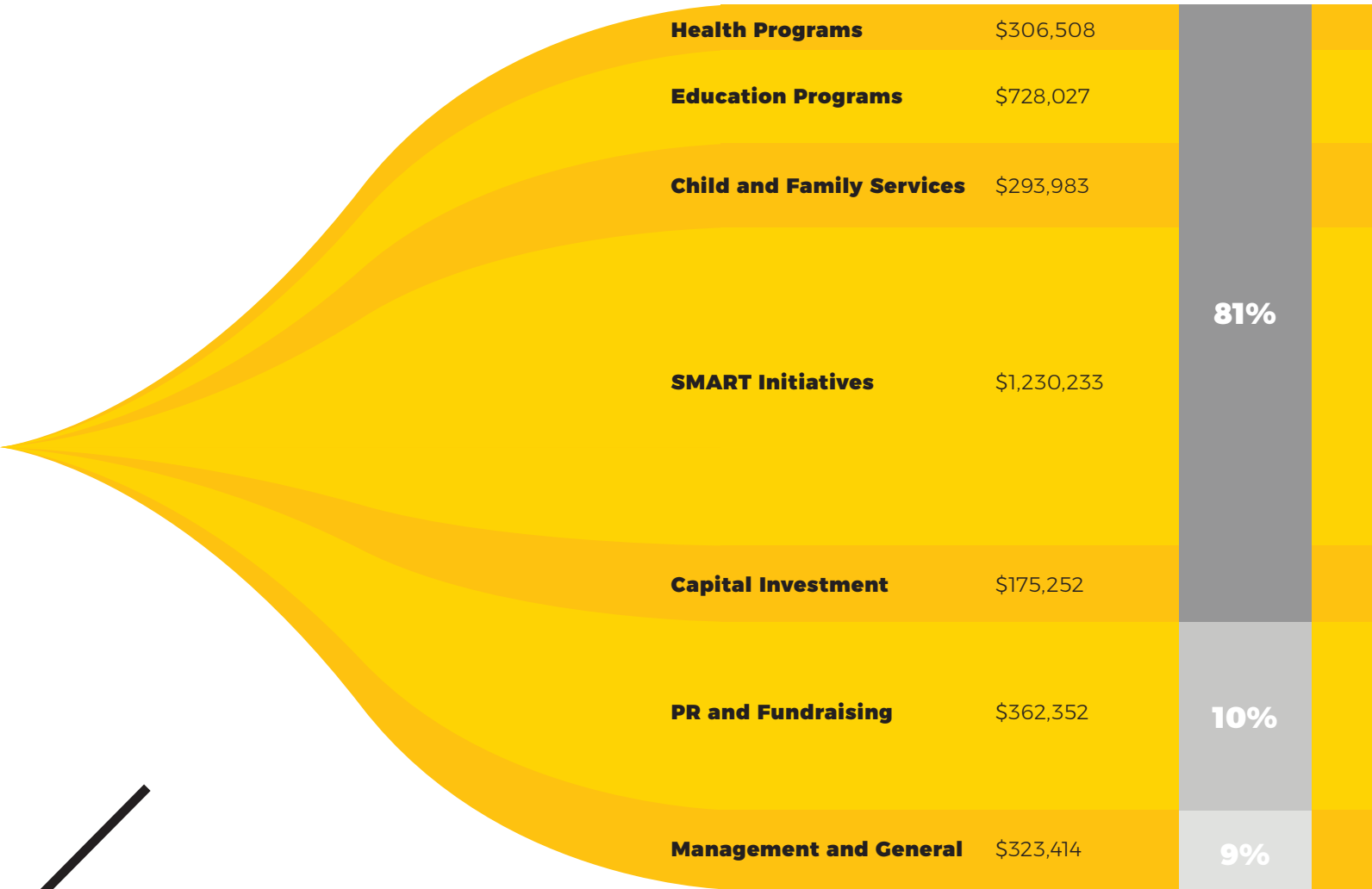

THANK YOU

I am reminded of our last gathering as a COAF community at our gala in December and its stark contrast with the reality we now experience. In a few short months, the COVID-19 pandemic has gripped the world and illuminated just how precarious our global health and unity are. I would be remiss if I began my letter without acknowledging this reality and affirming that COAF remains steadfastly committed to our mission to advance rural Armenia.



This past year was enormously successful for COAF. We solidified our programs and expanded our impact to include over 107,000 beneficiaries. We continued to develop our village programs throughout Armenia, growing from 10 to 28 villages in the province of Lori alone. We launched our expanded SMART Campus with a Concept Hotel and Conference Center. At the end of the year, we celebrated a record-breaking gala, raising \$6M USD. This will help us continue to advance and innovate programs for the benefit and well-being of the children of rural Armenia.

The most exciting of all our accomplishments, however, was the introduction of our COAF SMART Citizenship Curriculum, the highlight of 2019. This curriculum was piloted at our SMART center in Lori, Armenia, and offers a unique education model targeting cognitive, emotional, and psychomotor skills. It has been very rewarding to watch students from throughout the Lori region holistically develop through this program and thus embark on the journey to becoming active participants in civic society. The success of this curriculum and of our traditional programs made 2019 an incredibly important year for our organization overall.

I am grateful for your support, both in 2019 and especially during these challenging times. The breadth and scope of our work can continue to flourish only through the strength of our community. I know your dedication to the youth and families of Armenia is as unwavering as ours.
