SLEEPING JOSPEH ~ WHY PRAY TO HIM? "The LORD pours gifts on his beloved while they sleep." Ps 127:2

Four times in a dream Joseph bar Jacob 'heard' the 'voice' of the Lord speaking to him through an Angel. Each time he was given insight and direction. Each

time, when he awakened, he immediately acted. Is it Joseph's obedience to the voice of the Lord that gains for him answers to prayer even while he sleeps? Or is it something more?

On the occasion of his first dream, Joseph was a man torn between two loves. Evening and morning, he declared his first

Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength. Deut. 6:4

Joseph's second love had been publicly declared when he was betrothed to his beautiful soulmate, Mary. Tradition holds that both Joseph and Mary, in preparation for the coming of the Messiah, had separately taken vows of virginity. This shared secret bound them together in a love deeper than any human affection. Lk.. 1:27-34; Num. 30:3, 6-8; Jerome in 382-383, Para 21

However, the Gospel of Matthew tells us that when the grace they had awaited actually came to Mary, the young groom was caught off guard.

Now the birth of Jesus Christ was as follows: when His mother Marv had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child by the Holy Spirit. And Joseph her husband, being a righteous man and not wanting to disgrace her, planned to send her away secretly. Matt. 1:19



On my desk, I have an image of St. Joseph sleeping. Even when he is asleep, he looks after the Church. Yes! We know that he can do that, So when I have a problem, a difficulty, I write a little note, and I put it underneath St. Joseph, so that he can dream about it! In other words, I tell him: "Pray for this problem!"

However, God had another plan.

An angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife; for the Child who has been conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit. "She will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins." Matt. 1:20-21

As the fog of sleep began to lift, did a well known Messianic prophecy whisper in his heart?

Behold, the virgin shall be with child and shall bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel -God with us."

When Joseph was fully awake 'he did as the Angel of the Lord commanded him, and took Mary his wife into his home, and when the Child was born they named him Jesus. Now Joseph's two loves were incarnate in the womb of Mary; and, worthy or not, he would guard and cherish them

The circumstances surrounding Jesus' birth were perplexing yet they continued to confirm the messages of the angel to both Mary and Joseph. A census having been called, the new husband had to take his wife, nine months with child, to Bethlehem, the city of his ancestor King David. A cave and a manger were all Joseph could provide for the Child's birth. However, shepherds came paying homage to the babe and speaking in awe of a sky full of angels. Later, when Joseph

presented the boy to his Heavenly Father in the Temple, a rejoicing prophet greeted them. Taking the child in his arms he exclaimed:

Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your Salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel. Lk. 1:29-32

Mary and Joseph were amazed at what was being said about their Son especially when Simeon blessed them saying to his mother:

This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too. Lk. 1: 33-35



While Mary kept all these things cherishing them in her heart, Joseph's mind turned toward keeping his little family. We can conclude from Scripture that he provided them with a small home and took up his carpentry trade in Bethlehem. Here the three Magi found Mary and the Child.

Having determined, by the sighting of a star, that a long-awaited King of the Jews had been born, they went to Herod in Jerusalem inquiring:

"Where is He who has been born King of the Jews? For we saw His star in the east and have come to worship Him." Matt.2:3

Very troubled when he heard this news, Herod gathered together all the chief priests and scribes to determine where the Messiah was to be born. They answered, "In Bethlehem of Judea." Herod encouraged the Magi to find the new born King and tell him so he, too, could do him homage. The Magi followed the star until it settled over Joseph's home:

After coming into the house, they saw the Child with Mary His mother; and they fell to the ground and worshiped Him. Then, opening their treasures, they presented to Him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Matt.2:8-11

Why these gifts that were meant for a king, a priest and the burial of the dead.? Were these, too, confirmations? Did they confirm the boy's name, 'God saves'? Or Simeon's prophecy that left them with a vague sense of foreboding?



That night two men dreamt. One was a Magi warned of Herod's treachery and told to go home by another route. The other was Joseph:

Now when the Magi had gone, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up! Take the Child and His mother and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is going to search for the Child to destroy Him." So, Joseph got up and took the Child and His mother while it was still night, and left for Egypt. Cf. Matt. 2:13-15



News of the slaughter of all the boys in Bethlehem, from newly born to two years old, may have reached the Jewish community in Egypt because Joseph decided to stay there until the death of Herod. There the Angel broke into his sleep for a third time:

But when Herod died, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt, and said, "Get up, take the Child and His mother, and go into the land of Israel; for those who sought the Child's life are dead." So, Joseph got up, took the Child and His mother, and came into the land of Israel. Matt.2:19-21

'Home at last!' Joseph must have sighed. But when Joseph heard that Archelaus, Herod's son, was reigning over Judea in his place he was afraid to go there. Again, the angel came. His message

confirmed Joseph's concern for the Babe,

Then after being warned by God in a dream, Joseph left for the regions of Galilee, and came and lived in a city called Nazareth. This was to fulfill what was spoken through the prophets: "He shall be called a Nazarene." Matt.2:22-23

Four times Joseph 'heard' the Lord speaking to him through an angel and each time when he awoke he acted. To some it can appear that Joseph was merely acting in obedience. But, "God sees not as man sees, for man looks at appearances, but the Lord looks into the heart." 1 Sam. 16:7

What if Joseph the righteous 'lover of the Law' was more like the bride in the Song of Songs? When she awakened from her dream she exclaimed: "I was asleep, but my heart was awake. It is the voice of my beloved who knocks." Cf. Song of Songs 5:2

What if this was the prayer of Joseph's heart?

O God, you are my God, for you I long;

For you my soul is thirsting.

On my bed I remember you.

On you I muse through the night

My soul clings to you;

your right hand holds me fast. Cf. Ps. 63:2-9

And, what if, the Lord responded?

Since he clings to me in love, I will free him.

Protect him for he knows my ways.

When he calls I shall answer: "I am with you." Cf. Ps. 91: 15-16

Could it be that even now, our Heavenly Father recalls finding Joseph's heart awake and clinging to him in love even while he slept? Could this be why the prayer of Joseph is so powerful - that whenever he calls upon the Lord, the Lord answers, "I am with you?"



O St. Joseph, you are a man greatly favored by the Most High. The angel of the Lord appeared to you in dreams, while you slept, to warn you and guide you as you cared for the Holy Family. You were both silent and strong, a loyal and courageous protector.

Dear St. Joseph, as you rest in the Lord, confident of his absolute power and goodness, look upon me. Please take my need (mention your request) into your heart, dream of it, and present it to your Son. Help me then, good St. Joseph, to hear the voice of God, to arise, and act with love. I praise and thank God with joy. St. Joseph, I love you. Amen.

A Life Transfigured on the Mountain of the Lord

Sr. Anne Mary of the Trinity, OP ~ A Faithful Friend and Daughter of the Church ~ by Sr. Mary Elizabeth, OP

We begin this story on the life of Sister Anne Mary of the Trinity, not where her journey started, but where it

ended. In January 2022, Sister Anne Mary traveled with her companion, Sister Mary Joseph from Ortonville to Farmington Hills to begin yet another chapter in her life as a Dominican Nun. Unknown to any of us at that time, this would be

her final chapter.





Sr. Anne Mary of the Trinity was born in Brooklyn, New York on June 22, 1932 to William and Florence Kearney. She grew up in a

strong family. Her mother was of German descent and her father Irish. She had two older brothers, Bill and Ken, who always kept a close eye on their little sister and never ceased to keep things light with their Irish wit and charm. Family life being the foundation of her upright life, Sister Anne was never short of edifying family stories of steadfast faith, practical German wisdom and good Irish humor.

During a family visit, Sister told her brother, "The nuns say that if a girl sleeps well, eats well and laughs well, she has a vocation." Just then a stout and joyful looking

sister passed behind Sr. Anne. Her brother smiled lovingly at Sr. Anne and quipped, "I think that sister has a vocation."

Proud of her Brooklyn roots, she loved to tell stories about growing up





in New York with her two best girlfriends, Jane and Regina. They were so often together that they acquired the nicknames, "Faith, Hope, and Charity". Sister Anne credited Jane with being the



impetus for her religious devotion and vocation. It was Jane who led Barbara and Regina to this or that Church, for this or that novena, and they willingly followed.

When Jane entered the Monastery of the Perpetual Rosary in Union City, NJ, Barbara, who had followed her to all those novenas, followed her into the Monastery. Becoming a Postulant in 1955, Sr. Anne was very happy with the Dominican monastic life. She was formed in the life by her Novice Mistress, Sr. Martin di Giambattista, who would become a lifelong friend. Sr. Anne made her first Profession of Vows on May 11, 1960 and final vows three years later. After Profession Sister served as bursar making use of the banking skills she had learned working at a bank after H.S. graduation.





From the beginning, the charism of the sisters was "simplicity." They started with hardly a penny in their pocket relying on Divine Providence for everything. They literally built the Monastery with their own hands. Eventually a small number of sisters would come, take vows and share their life.



But in 2016, Sr. Martin went to her Lord and by November 2022 only two sisters remained. Although the vision had in on way faded they realized that it could not be lived with just two.
