




OUR LADY STAR OF THE SEA

Take not your eyes from the light of this star if you would not be overwhelmed by the waves; St Bernard

The origin of the title "Star of the Sea" can be traced back to the ancient maritime traditions. where the North Star, the 'stella maris' was considered a guiding light for seafarers, leading them safely home. Sea Captains used a 'sextant' to determine their true course on the trackless deep. Christian seamen claimed this title, Star of the Sea, for Our Blessed Mother, as their protectress and intercessor when faced with difficulties and dangers at sea. Can the Rosary be our 'sextant' when we are 'storm tossed and unconsoled' Is. 54:11 on the Sea of Life?

Historically, the sextant was a vital instrument in determining a

seafarer's location on the pathless sea. Where on the darkest of nights, through vast HORIZON expanses of the ocean, without landmarks and sunlight, it was easy to get off-course



locating the North Star, a sailor could align its image, reflected in the sextant's mirrors with the horizon to mark the ship's position on a nautical chart and determine their course.

For St. Bernard our Blessed Mother is our dependable North Star:

Take not your eyes from the light of this star if you would not be overwhelmed by the waves; if the storms of temptation arise, if you are thrown upon the rocks of affliction, look to the star, invoke Mary. When you follow her, you will not go astray; when you invoke her, you will no longer be in doubt; when she supports you, you will not fall; when she leads you, you will surely come to eternal life, and will find by your own experience that she is justly called *Maria*-that is, *Star of the Sea*.

The words of the Hail Mary give us the key to the

source of her light. Every time we pray, "Hail Mary full of grace the Lord is with Thee" she re-lives the moment of Christ's

conception in her womb. And she remembers the words of the angels to the shepherds, "And they shall call him, 'Emmanuel,' which means "God with us."

When the way became uncertain, that prophetic word became her simple light. It became her guiding star reminding her that she was *Theotokos*, literally, the 'God bearer." She was the one trusted to bridge heaven and earth by her "Yes," by her dedication, and by her constancy – as

constant as that North Star. Cf. North Star, friarmusings.com, 1/1/17

Our Blessed Mother gave her Rosary to Saint Dominic exhorting him to ponder the prophetic message, "God is with you" in all of the Joyful, Sorrowful and Glorious moments of Christ's life. Just as Mary had "kept all these things, pondering on them in her heart" St. Peter exhorts us: "Moreover, we possess the prophetic message that is altogether reliable. You will do well to be attentive to it, as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. 2 Peter 1:19

By the light of a star reflected in the mirror of a sextant, a seaman can find his course on a dark and pathless sea. In a similar way, by fixing our attention on the prophetic light, radiating from each Mystery of the Rosary, Our Blessed



Mother assures us that we will never be lost, storm tossed or unconsoled.
