



Yurak is a non-binary, multi-disciplinary artist based out of Iqaluit, Nunavut. Their anaana, Aluki Kotierk is Inuk from Iglulik, Nunavut and their ataata, Mauricio Rojas, is Kichwa from Peguche, Ecuador.

Yurak has been a creative all their life. Starting with drawing portraits in middle school they quickly moved into paints, lino prints and pottery as they took several art classes in High School. In 2020 they created their first exhibition on the side of their childhood house for the community to view. Since March of 2023 they have been a full time artist, providing digital illustrations, printing workshops and stick and poke tattooing as their main services. They sell their prints, hoodies and beadwork at community craft fairs. Overall Yurak creates to elevate Inuit self-love and celebrate Inuit brilliance through their artistic vision.

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Ullukut,

It brings me great joy to share with you, on behalf of the Board, the second Annual Report of the Annaumakkaijiit (Annauma) Community Foundation. In the past year, Annauma has experienced remarkable growth and exciting developments. In Inuktitut, there is a word dedicated to the act of getting ready for a trip - **parnakpugut**. Parnakpugut is the theme of our 2023-2024 Annual Report. Parnakpugut implies careful analysis of the environment, thorough problem-solving, and meticulous preparation. It's a deliberate and steadied approach toward preparation. In our case, we have been setting the stage, fostering sharing, relationships and networks. We have been preparing to effectively deliver funding and support that strengthens Inuit values, skills, and worldview in a manner that encourages lifelong learning and nurtures collaborative community relationships.

After hiring our Executive Director last summer, two new staff members joined Annauma this spring, bringing our operational team to full capacity. We've dedicated our time to building strong organizational systems to support the activities of the foundation, which is crucial for long-term sustainability and success. We have also collaborated with more caring partners across the country, combining shared resources to support communities across Nunavut. Sharing is the most traditional means of philanthropy, and sharing collective fortune is an act of compassion. It is the heart of Annauma's granting philosophy.

One of our most significant achievements this year was successfully implementing our consensus granting program. This program is community-led and firmly rooted in the traditional Inuit way of sharing and decision-making. During program sessions, representatives from the participating organizations come together to share their projects, hear inputs and suggestions from one another, and collectively decide on how available funding should be allocated between them. This reciprocal exchange inspires collective decision-making, presenting the opportunity for programs to take shape in real time, inspired by people within the community, and placing shared decision-making power in hands of local leaders.

As board president, I am excitedly looking ahead to the promising future that awaits in 2024-2025 as we embark on this journey. By the time of our next Annual Report, we will have facilitated consensus-driven granting sessions across all of our priority areas. In addition, we will have presented our very first Community Nominated Award to an organization based in Nunavut. We will continue to work with our caring partners, all levels of government, and local organizations to ensure our communities' voices are heard, supported, and reflected in our work. Follow along, join us as we work toward our vision that Inuit communities are healthy and confident, and have what they need to thrive.





GRANTING ADVISORY COUNCIL

To honour our commitment to reflecting our community and remain in touch with community needs, Annauma has launched a Granting Advisory Council (GAC).

Consisting of both board and community members, the Granting Advisory Council provides strategic guidance and advice to the foundation on matters related to granting programs. An example of this is reviewing expressions of interest for consensus granting cohorts and making recommendations on direction and selection. Their expertise helps Annauma remain impartial in our efforts to support organizations across Nunavut.

Consensus Granting

In January, Annauma launched its inaugural consensus granting program. Consensus granting is rooted in Inuit Qaujimajatuqangit and focuses on the principles of Aajiiqatigiinniq, decision-making through discussion and consensus, and Ikajuqtigiinniq, working together for a common cause.

Annauma's consensus granting aims to simplify the granting process, reduce the administrative burden on grantees, and focus on trust-based philanthropy. This includes a commitment to building relationships based on transparency, dialogue and mutual learning. At Annauma, we believe that our community knows the best solutions to the problems they are experiencing.

Annauma's approach to consensus granting follows a simple and thoughtful process:



Our Board of Directors approves the funding allocation, so the cohort is informed about the amount of funding available.

A public announcement is made for expressions of interest for one of Annauma's priority areas: Inuit Children and Youth, Education and Learning, Arts and Culture, Community Health and Wellbeing.

With support from our team, Annauma's Granting Advisory Council reviews the expressions of interest to determine the cohort. Once a cohort convenes, they begin the process by making two important decisions together. First, how they want to make decisions together, and second, how they will know when they have reached a group consensus.









Granting sessions are facilitated in Annauma's office by our team. Our goal is to ensure all cohort participants feel welcomed, included, and heard. Using a record of the meetings, we create project descriptions, and compile meeting summaries. This allows us to bypass traditional granting practices and focus on allowing participants to share from their hearts.

By sharing their ideas, insights, and perspectives, the participants help to strengthen one another's project ideas, and even identify ways in which they might collaborate. One participant shared it felt like gathering around the kitchen table with the community, rather than sitting in on an official meeting. Here's some feedback from others who have taken part:

"I really enjoyed this because it took away all the anxiety of writing a grant application. I didn't have to worry about whether I was using the right language or the right words, or whether my writing was consistent throughout. The experience of working on this pilot was much more fun than spending a whole day in front of my computer. So, I really appreciate it."

Once there is a collective understanding of what consensus means for the cohort, the participants have an opportunity to share their project ideas, receiving feedback and insight from their peers. This process helps to build an understanding of what each organization wants to do and how it will benefit the priority area.

reached a consensus on the projects, they focus on determining the funding allocations. Following the principles of Inuit Qaujimajatuqangit, each organization only asks for what it needs. This is a collaborative process of sharing and receiving, with participants working together to ensure that each organizations is sufficiently supported.



Once the funding allocations are determined, the participants collaborate on identifying self-determined accomplishments. Reflecting on their collective goals, the cohort envisions what success looks like for them and what they will want to share about each of their projects. Together, they develop a list of questions they will use to evaluate and report back to the cohort on.

Before wrapping up the granting session, the cohort decides on a time to reconvene. The reconvene meeting is an opportunity for the participants to share about their projects and to hear about the successes, challenges and stories from the other initiatives.



PILOTING OUR PROGRAM



Our first cohort brought together four Iqaluit-based organizations with the common goal of supporting Inuit children and youth, the first of the five priority areas chosen by Annauma's board. This cohort had a total funding allocation of \$240,000. It is our pleasure to announce the contributing participants, and their programs:

The Arctic Children and Youth Foundation aims to support staff members who are not currently receiving housing stipends, increasing employee wellbeing across the organization. Iqaluit Music Society is organizing a training camp specifically for teenagers who volunteer at their summer music camp. By participating in this camp, the teens will have the opportunity to strengthen their leadership and musicianship skills. Nunavut Bilingual Education Society is working on a resource manual for parents and caregivers to support learning Inuktitut at home. In effort to combat the shortage of certified tradespeople, Skills Canada Nunavut plans to run a junior apprenticeship program, introducing youth to potential career opportunities in the trades industry.

We look forward to continuing to learn from the consensus granting participants as we develop this new approach to granting in Nunavut. Annauma is committed to continuously listening, learning, and adapting.

COMMUNITY SERVICES RECOVERY FUND

Through the Government of Canada's Community Services Recovery Fund, Annauma had the opportunity to partner with Community Foundations of Canada and provide financial support, totaling over \$300,000, to community service organizations prioritizing the needs of Inuit communities in Nunavut.

The fund provided crucial support to charities, nonprofits, and Indigenous Governing Bodies throughout Canada, helping them strengthen and transform their organizations in the wake of the pandemic. Administered collaboratively, it involved the participation of the Canadian Red Cross, Community Foundations of Canada, and United Way Centraide Canada.

Working as an advisor for Community Foundations of Canada, Annauma identified four organizations to invest in, they were:

- **Pitquhirnikkut Ilihautiniq/Kitikmeot Heritage Society** is undertaking transformational strategic planning, strengthening their capacity for Inuit-led governance;
- Arctic Children and Youth Foundation is redesigning its organizational strategy and operations;
- **Iqaluit Humane Society,** is developing an operations plan and strategy for an animal rescue and wellness center, and;
- **Qikiqtani Inuit Association** is implementing a decision-making tool to serve their increased capacity and future initiatives.

Annauma takes pride in collaborating with these organizations, as well as Community Foundations of Canada, to help foster an equitable future for Nunavummiut.











CARING NORTH CAMPAIGN

The \$10 million Caring North Campaign is Annauma Community Foundation's inaugural fundraising program launched in 2022. Its aim is to support community-led initiatives that directly impact and improve the lives of Inuit in Nunavut.

Annauma's work is grounded in caring for each other and for Inuit culture and language, which are a core part of life for Nunavummiut. Through the Caring North Campaign, Annauma engages with donors who listen deeply, are open to new insights, and see this partnership as an opportunity to learn and support Inuktitut Philanthropy.

As of March 31, 2024, Annauma raised a total of \$8,158,970 in donations and future pledges towards the \$10 million goal for the Caring North Campaign.

CLAIRE & STU KENNEDY'S STORY


Giving back was always a priority for Claire and Stu Kennedy, founders of DJ Specialties, a small business in Iqaluit. Over the years, they personally witnessed the positive impact that businesses can have when they give back to the community.

Knowing DJ Specialties had benefited from support the community had shown them, they felt it was only right to reciprocate. "We operate in a part of town where people of all income levels support us. When we give back to the community through Annauma, we're really giving back to all the people who have supported us," Stu explains. "For us, assisting those in need and giving back to our supporters felt like the way life should be. It's about helping others that have supported you. We don't need to keep track. When you do help out, it makes you feel good. It's a natural human response."

Claire and Stu were motivated to donate to Annauma because they were confident the foundation recognized the needs of the community. "Annauma's focus is on helping the community and improving the lives of individuals and families. They collectively have more insight than we do," says Stu. "Our relationship with Annauma feels like the most effective way to make a difference."

Stu believes it's important for people to understand that Annauma is driven by a genuine desire to create meaningful and positive change in the lives of Nunavummiut. PLANS FOR THE UPCOMING YEAR

With 2023-24 being the year of building and piloting our consensus granting program, we recognzie that the majority of our granting to date has been focused in Iqaluit; however, Annauma is planning to expand granting to all three regions of Nunavut. First, it will expand within the Baffin region then strategically to the rest of the territory. Understanding there are many differences from community to community, and amongst the three Inuit regions, we continue to look for ways to adapt to all communities' needs.

Through our listening and learning philosophy, we've heard essential insights from our granting cohorts into the challenges they face in the sector. We aim to continue having these conversations and meaningfully engage with the sector to inform our approach to sector development. Annauma will be developing a sector development strategy that will aim to help strengthen the nonprofit and charitable sector of Nunavut, supporting organizations to realize their dreams and become what they want to be.
