What barriers limit people feeling welcome?

- Finance
- Environment
- Communication
- Attitude
- Language
- Understanding



How do we identify barriers?

We can review:

- Place
- People
- Policies
- Procedures

This is what an ‘access audit’ or access assessment’ is.



Finding barriers

Things you may want to think about:

The flooring / ground / surfaces

Parking

Seating

Entranceways, doorways, steps/lift access

Lighting

Sound / background noise

Toilet facilities

Signage

Distances between facilities e.g. to car park, to toilets

Staff / volunteer training

Public transport links

Sight-lines

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and box

Barriers

Physical barriers

May mean more difficult way into, or movement in spaces

Mitigations

Install (mobile) ramps or handrails

Widen aisles,

Open double doors to narrow doorways

Lower counters or tables and provide a step

Remove obstacles on routes through spaces

Have access champions





Barriers

Sensory barriers:

May mean difficulty in sensory processing

Sensitivity to loud noises

Sensitivity bright light

Mitigations:

Pre-warn about any sensory impacts

Reduce volume, dim lighting

Provide a Chill Out Space

Barriers

Cognitive barriers:

May lead to difficulty understanding
instructions
directions
or signage

Mitigation:

Simplify language
Avoid jargon
Provide Easy Read



Barriers

Language barriers:

May mean slow or disrupted communication

Mitigation

Spoken language interpreters

British Sign Language interpreters

Offer translated materials and programmes



Barriers

Environmental barriers:

May mean difficulty navigating a space or feeling comfortable in it

Mitigation:

Add more lighting if underpowered

Reduce noise levels

Provide variety of seating options eg seats with/ without arms, beanbags, floor mats

Allowing time before the show for people to orientate themselves in the space



Barriers

Time:

May mean needing more time to enter or leave spaces, access toilets, refreshments or other facilities

Mitigation:

Allow more time

- between opening space and start of event
- between end of event/ performance and closing space

Brief Ushers/volunteers to avoid rushing
