












#### lincoln community and residents' association incorporated

Hello from LiCRA - Lincoln Community And Residents' Association. The recent meeting was held on the 17th March and work and planning is ongoing in a very busy environment. An opinion I would like to express on behalf of LiCRA and from community feedback is the creep toward a lack of democracy from our district council. Several important issues driven by the council at present are showing scant regard for robust consultation and giving clear messages that outcomes are predetermined regardless of public feedback. To the contrary, a shining light was the recent vote against the recommended 'Representation Reform' option. The council voted against decreasing the number of councillors and against dropping the elected Malvern Ward. Let's hope for this approach in the future.

High on our agenda is the Town Centre Upgrade. We have had strong feedback from the businesses in the old town centre and we have forwarded this on to the mayor and the councillors with the hope that a constructive meeting will be held to discuss some compromises. This project from the beginning has been a

case of what we are saying. The council has had a predetermined outcome and has not listened to the community so far.

Water Done Well – hmmm – another case of a predetermined outcome! LiCRA firmly believe from what we have been told, that the costs and risks for the rate-payer to create a separate organisation to run the districts Two Waters (drinking water and wastewater) is not worth it. That the option of bolstering the current 'in-house' water services department is preferred. We have lodged a submission along with many other similar ones and now we wait for the council vote.

Nothing to report yet on the future of the Lincoln Community Newsletter except to say that we are determined to keep it. We will continue discussions with The Selwyn Printing Company to achieve a good outcome for the community.

We have mentioned our sculptures previously and we are proud of the work done by the previous Lincoln Community Committee with the support of Cr. Grant Miller. We are working on installing informative plagues at two of them.

We are keen to hear perspectives from the community on these issues or any others that concern you so please get in touch.



# On International Zero Waste Day, meet the Lincoln alum making a difference

Have you ever stuck around and seen all the waste left behind after an event? Ever watched someone throw their rubbish into the wrong bin without a second thought?

Well, Kate Gislason noticed - and it irked her. She wanted to make a difference, so she started Without Waste (WOW), a company focused on waste minimisation and diversion at events and for businesses.

March 30 was International Zero Waste Day, so what better time to share the impact she's making.

As a fresh graduate, Kate had \$1,200 in her account, but was driven towards her purpose. Now, her three-year-old company is growing fast — and with it, waste is shrinking.

You may have seen rubbish pickers at events like Electric Avenue, the Twizel Salmon & Wine Festival, Carl Cox at Airborne, our very own Garden Party or the recent Two Minds Festival in Christchurch. These crews weren't just cleaning up; they were from WOW, working to ensure waste went where it should.

"I've always just been fascinated by how I can make things easier for people," Kate said.

"Without our services on the day, the public typically don't know enough to get things in the right bin. Recycling gets rejected, and ultimately, everything goes to landfill."

Waste sorting at events is a big part of WOW's work, ensuring rubbish goes through the right streams while educating people at the bins. Behind the scenes, WOW is involved in research, planning and implementing waste minimalisation processes for the event.

"The first year an event works with us, we're essentially figuring

out what kind of waste they produce, where the opportunities and challenges are. Then, we create a comprehensive report with realistic goals to help them improve."

And it's working. The Kiwi Junior League Festival is a great

"In comparison to the year before, we reduced waste by 90%. That was a huge win, and we're aiming for them to be a zerowaste event this year."

Outside of events, the WOW Business branch helps organisations like Lyttelton Port work towards zero waste goals through audits, workshops, and project planning.

"We don't want to be the ambulance at the bottom of the cliff, just sorting waste and sending some to landfill. Instead, we want to work with events and businesses long-term to eliminate waste altogether.

"In a perfect world, our job wouldn't even need to exist - but right now, that's just not the case."

Originally from Michigan, USA, Kate first came to New Zealand for a semester abroad at Lincoln University in 2020, studying a Bachelor's in environmental management. She never left.

"Coming from the States, Lincoln was super useful in giving me an understanding of environmental policies, regulations, and especially Maori history - all things that were really important for me going into the New Zealand business world.

"I also came out with great connections, many of who I've linked up with on cool events with WOW!"

With new branches opening in Auckland and Queenstown this year, Without Waste is expanding its impact. It's new fleet of reusable cups was recently trialled at Two Minds Festival, and it's looking for more events to take part in its feasibility study.

So, what's Kate's simple tip for you?

"Say goodbye to buying anything with the word 'disposable' in it. Things like paper towels - if it's disposable, I'm sure you can find a reusable alternative."

Next time you're at an event - like our beloved Garden Party look out for Kate and the team.

# Lincoln University's Student and Visitor Centre opened by Hon Dr Shane Reti

Te Whare Wānaka o Aoraki Lincoln University's revamped main entrance and new Student and Visitor Centre were officially opened on 27 March by Minister of Science, Innovation and Technology and Minister for Universities, Hon Dr Shane Reti.

The opening celebration, attended by Lincoln University staff and students, leaders from neighbouring research institutes, partners, construction contractors and other stakeholders, was held at the new Student and Visitor Centre in the north block of the George Forbes Building.

In his speech delivered prior to cutting the ceremonial ribbon, Dr Reti said the redeveloped George Forbes Building will be an asset to Lincoln University's world-class campus. He also spoke about Lincoln University's strong history of quality education and collaboration with domestic and international partners, which set Lincoln apart.

Lincoln University Vice-Chancellor, Professor Grant Edwards, said the new facilities delivered an enhanced campus experience for students and visitors alike.

"Our new Student and Visitor Centre, complemented by a revamped statement entrance, provides an expansive and accessible space where all visitors to campus will feel welcome, and where our students can come to study, collaborate, connect, relax, enjoy some quiet time, and to engage with any of our student support service providers.

"One of Lincoln University's most distinctive attributes is our celebrated student experience, where our students are supported to succeed in their studies while also developing their social connections, pursuing their recreation goals, exploring new interests and nurturing their physical and mental wellbeing.

"Our rich and diverse campus environment, now enhanced by these new student-focused facilities, is a vibrant and thriving hub where our people can live, study and work."

Guests who attended the 27 March opening event were invited to tour the new facilities and to visit a number of Lincoln University's other new and recently redeveloped buildings.

The opening of the new facility rounds off a six-year redevelopment project for the George Forbes Building which also comprised structural strengthening of the central tower block and the creation of an expansive and vibrant new student social space in the south block, which opened in July 2020.

The reconstructed main entrance to Lincoln University features a wide and welcoming forecourt presided over by a poureated by Ngāi Tahu artist Fayne Robinson, opening into a remodelled internal space that reflects the needs of students and visitors, including state-of-the-art technology services.

The new student-focused areas extend to the Level 1 mezza-

nine floor, where the international and domestic student administration offices are co-located with a parents' room, a wellness room for quiet reflection and a sensory room with neurodivergent-friendly features.

The Student Engagement Team, incorporating Marketing and Student Experience, have been relocated to the southern side of Level 1, in the former Council Room, which has been renovated and refurbished.

The new Student and Visitor Centre is part of Lincoln University's wider Campus Development Programme which has delivered major projects such as the University's award-winning science facility, Waimarie, opened in September 2023, the redevelopment of Whare Hākinakina Lincoln University Gym and the restoration of the earthquake-damaged Category 1 historic buildings livey West and Memorial Hall, reopened in February this year.

Further campus projects, including an ambitious and extensive decarbonisation programme which supports the University's goal to be carbon neutral by 2030, the construction of a 1.5 MWp Energy Farm demonstrating high-value agrivoltaics, and an overarching visionary landscaping masterplan, are in various stages of development.

# Integral Health Dairy Farm opens to the public

Lincoln University is doing a lot of important work in agricultural health and it's important you can see what's going on.

That's why in March the gates of the Integral Health Dairy Farm (IHDF) were opened to the public. The event hit maximum capacity with 100 people eager to learn more about what the future of dairy farming could look.

The IHDF, residing at the Ashley Dene Development Station, uses an alternative system of dairy farming. It's focused on a holistic view of farming and has shown measured improvements in the health of soil, plants, animals and the community. It's a demonstration of how these current dairy farms could feasibly transition to more sustainable, healthy methods.



It's not just our academics who are driving this change. Agriculture and Life Sciences students are a key part of developing and testing these methods.

Along with milking an artificial udder and taking a few milk-flavoured lollies, guests were invited to check out four different informational stations throughout the day.

The first gave them a quick introduction to the farm and its goals. They were given a brief overview of the purpose of the farm and why it was better for cows, the environment, the community, and the milk that would go to market.

The second station was about the different options available to the animals in their day to day lives. A range of plants grow among the pastures, providing cows a choice in diet. They also have access to dedicated medicinal plantings. Cows can self-medicate by grazing at the edge of these fenced-off spaces. The plantings create a physical shelter from wind and sun, and provide safe space for insects, birds and small animals.



The cows also have access to scratch brushes. These help remove dirt and parasites from their skin. It's also enjoyable for the animals and provides enrichment.

The third station was all about the technology used to monitor the animals and the land. These devices are vital to ensuring the farm is productive and sustainable.

The final station invited guests into the farming shed to see how the cows are milked, and how the many changes across the farm benefited the milk produced there

Guest feedback showed lots of praise for how clean the farm was, and how great it was to actively consider the health of the cows and environment.

Another open day at Integral Health Dairy Farm is already being lined up with more spaces for people to attend.

# Future Selwyn digital tool recognised with major planning awards

The Selwyn District Council (SDC) has been honoured for its innovative work on the Waikirikiri Ki Tua Future Selwyn by the New Zealand Planning Institute (NZPI).

In March, SDC received two NZPI Best Practice Awards in the Strategic or Non-Statutory Planning category as well as the Digital category for Waikirikiri Ki Tua Future Selwyn, which will guide the council's planning and decision-making for the next 50-100 years.

"This recognises the outstanding work of our team and their commitment to thinking long term and including our community in decision making," says Mayor Broughton.

"Waikirikiri Ki Tua Future Selwyn is about planning for the future with foresight and flexibility."

Strategy Team Leader Ben Baird, Senior Strategy Planner George Sariak and Strategy Planner Ryan Mayes received the awards on behalf of the Selwyn District Council at the NZPI annual conference in Invercargill.

Baird says the web-based tools created by council showcase what can be achieved with in-house resources to deliver an outstanding digital place-based, future-focused spatial strategy.

"We believe that Waikirikiri Ki Tua Future Selwyn is at the forefront of spatial planning in Aotearoa New Zealand, balancing

storytelling, exploratory scenarios, data-driven evidence-based planning, collaboration, futures-thinking and spatial direction," says Baird.

Waikirikiri Ki Tua Future Selwyn was developed to create a strategic approach to intergenerational wellbeing, sustainability, resilience, growwth, change and development for the district.

"We wanted to align existing strategies, polices and plans at Selwyn District Council, so we paddle as one towards a better Selwyn."

Baird explains that creating Waikirikiri Ki Tua Future Selwyn within the ArcGIS Experience Builder technology lowered the technical barriers allow SDC staff to co-develop the website and to make it easily accessible for residents and other users.

Baird says the project started in 2020 during the pandemic "when we realised that our future was more uncertain than ever before".

"It became apparent it was no longer realistic to set out one unwavering path towards our desired future. Instead, we must accept there are many possibilities in our future and be willing to adapt and evolve as we move forward towards our desired future."

# There are only two days with fewer than 24 hours in each lifetime

If you have followed Death Café Lincoln over the last few years you may have noticed one quote that crops up on a regular basis, "There are only 24 hours in each lifetime, sitting like bookmarks astride our lives: one is celebrated every year, yet it is the other that makes us see living as precious."

The quote is from the British doctor, Dr Kathryn Mannix, a specialist in the field of palliative care, who is now sharing her experiences and messaging with the world as a successful author and renowned public speaker.

This March saw Dr Mannix leave her native shores to spend three weeks touring New Zealand, for a variety of events that included an evening speaking in Christchurch. It was only appropriate that Richard Marchant, host and facilitator of Death Café Lincoln, was there alongside several others from the group.

"What Kathryn talked about was incredibly inspirational and so aligned with everything Death Café stands for, especially the benefits of normalising conversations about death and dying in the same way that we openly talk about birth," Richard said. "It was no coincidence that some of the things she talked about came up in conversation a week later at our monthly meet-up."



# EPIC – The Irish Emigration Museum, Dublin (on the Liffey) to Lincoln, NZ (on the Liffey)

The model sailing ship s.v. Pleiades, on display in Pioneer Hall connects with many migrant stories, but especially that of the Carr/Thomas family who arrived in Lincoln in the 1870s.

At our special event on Saturday 12th April, descendant, Judy Patterson will tell us about that story and her exploration of EPIC, the 'truly astounding' Irish Emigration Museum in Dublin, on the river Liffey.



EPIC houses 20 themed galleries outlining the migration of the lrish, how they took their culture with them and the ways in which the lrish diaspora has impacted on the countries they settled in.

The Irish Embassy estimate that 1 in 6 New Zealanders have Irish heritage is confirmed by the detailed mapping project, *Irish in Aotearoa NZ*, 2020. Lead researcher, Sonja Tiernan, Professor of Irish Studies at Otago, noted that while in other countries the Irish tended to stay and marry within their own communities, that didn't happen in New Zealand, many people having just one Irish parent or grandparent.

That integration may explain why The Society hasn't looked more in depth at Irish emigration in the district, although there has been research on some notable characters, including Patrick O'Reilly, A P O'Callaghan, and James Edward Fitzgerald, as well as a history of the Catholic Parish of Lincoln. Fitzgerald left a legacy of street names, including Lincoln's Kildare and Leinster Terraces. The *L1 stream*, now known as *the Liffey*, was renamed informally by the community in the 1970s to mark his Irish connections.

Irishman, Maurice Harnett, builder of St. Patrick's Church (1957) and the Lincoln Community Centre (1961) is remembered for demanding the highest standards from tradesmen and volunteers alike during the construction of what were these landmark Lincoln buildings.

Two local Irish communities are known. One included the families who settled near Patrick Henley's *New Headford* farm (1862–), and the Roman Catholic Church and School on 'Shands Track', and another the families from Northern Ireland who settled at Killinchy, near Dunsandel, in the 1860s. With 1 in 6 of us, possibly more, having an Irish connection, there are many more stories that could be told!

Come along to hear Judy Patterson's talk about EPIC, The Famine Way Memorial and Walk, the Jeanie Johnston migrant ship, and an amazing link between Lurgan, Co. Down and Christchurch, New Zealand. Share your story over afternoon tea.





#### lincoln envirotown community gardens

We recently held our "Green Fingers Galore" celebration when Errol and I visited several gardens in Lincoln and Rolleston to observe sustainable gardening practices in action.

The Lincoln Primary School Garden has developed greatly in recent years into an exciting (and productive) teaching resource. This is due to the sterling efforts of David Boustead and Peter McNaughton of Lincoln Rotary Club, the enthusiasm of staff and students to actively engage in growing vegetables, and the support of local businesses Lincoln Hammer Hardware, Lincoln New World and Freeman Irrigation. We saw a garden with barely a square metre of bare soil growing over 20 varieties of vegetables and fruit trees. Four worm farms and four compost bins dispose of food waste generated by the school. This was an extremely encouraging visit.



Lois Thomas has been in her villa at Liffey Village for just five years, but she has converted a barren patch of land into a highly productive garden. This was achieved through hard work in replenishing the soil and planting wisely. Today she has 16 types of vegetable and 10 fruit trees growing in small space. No part of the garden has exposed soil because of the thick layer of straw that Lois has distributed. Lois returns all organic material to the soil, and also applies horse manure, liquid sea weed, and blood and bone.



Keith and Leigh in Te Whariki were confronted with a similar challenge as Lois, especially unpromising soil quality. But by opening up the clay soil with a fork and applying gypsum and

compost, after just three years they now have an attractive small garden with several raised beds and numerous flat areas. No space is wasted, and vegetables, herbs, flowers, and fruit trees thrive together.

Alpine strawberries have been allowed to spread, covering the ground for moisture retention, and improving the soil texture. Currently, they are growing 15 different vegetables and 8 fruit trees and bushes. These include peach, hazel nut, feijoa, greengage, blueberry, and sour cherry. A 4000-litre tank has been installed to capture rain water off the roof for the dry periods, and there are four compost bins for grass clippings and borage.



Selwyn District Council's Stormwater, Drainage and Watercourse bylaw consultation is now open for our community to share their feedback.

The aim of the new bylaw is to protect the health of our water by managing and controlling discharges into the Council managed stormwater and drainage networks.

The Council is making minor changes to bring our bylaw up to date, including identifying and monitoring high risk sites to protect the health of our water and to provide clarity on the responsibilities of land owners and the Council.

Executive Director Infrastructure and Property, Tim Mason says it is important that Council updates this bylaw to reflect the latest requirements around stormwater and drainage, and it is in line with the requirement that all Councils regularly review their stormwater and drainage bylaws.

"We've reviewed the bylaw, and we are keen to hear the community's feedback on this draft bylaw, whether it covers the areas it should, or if there are any updates they think we should make."






