

# Lincoln Town Centre upgrade planting more than 50 new trees in tree swap for new town centre design

As part of the Lincoln Town Centre upgrade, Selwyn District Council are planting more than 50 new trees to increase the town's tree canopy, creating a vibrant green space for residents and visitors to the main street. To maintain key underground infrastructure and accommodate the new design, five existing trees will be removed.

The Council's Executive Director of Infrastructure and Property Tim Mason says the trees' removal is necessary due to their impact on underground infrastructure, safety concerns, and alignment with the new town centre design.

The trees to be removed are the three London Planes at the Gerald/Robert/ William intersection and the London Plane and Norway Maple at the Gerald Street and Lyttelton Street intersection.

The trees will be removed as part of the construction once a contractor is on board for stage one of the upgrade work, which will start over summer 2025/2026. A tendering process to award this contract is set to begin shortly.

"An independent arborist was engaged to complete an Arboricultural Impact Assessment, evaluating the effects of the proposed design on existing trees and vegetation," says Mason.

"Although five trees will be removed, through a comprehensive review process, the project team implemented design modifications and mitigation strategies that enabled the retention of seven other trees that were conflicting with the design."

"New trees will be planted nearby with improved soil systems to support healthy growth and enhance the streetscape."

A variety of tree species and sizes will be planted, including some more mature trees to help provide a more established feel at the end of construction, says Mason.

The design to increase the tree canopy in Lincoln is about providing additional shade, promoting biodiversity and potential birdlife, and adding seasonal interest and colour to the main street

"We understand how important it is to protect existing trees where we can, and we're looking forward to seeing the new trees take shape in Lincoln."

Mufa from Hammer Hardware is in the process of setting up a business collective that will need to make every effort to protect their interests. # E.Bike Group update

Community Care Lincoln Supporting our Community

The E.Bike Group, of Community Care Lincoln, continues to flourish, with a membership of 26 and a waiting list of people keen to join. We are a mixed bunch of mainly retirees, with a good percentage of both women and men, including several couples, mostly from Lincoln and Prebbleton.

The Group meets at the Community Care Centre at 1pm on a Tuesday, weather permitting, and bike in all directions from there. Most of the group bike to LCC, but will peel off towards home on the return journey.

Destinations include Rolleston, Templeton, Selwyn Huts, Coes Ford, Motukarara, Tai Tapu, Halswell, Longhurst, Wigram, Hornby, Cashmere, Hagley, etc.

The route is usually pre-planned by the group's coordinator – with a different destination each week. Members are advised of the general direction we will head, but never quite know the exact route – as this can change as we often pass a new side alley to explore. Quiet country roads are often travelled, or we follow one of the many cycle-ways which now abound Selwyn and this side of the City. The 'Christchurch City Council Bike Map' (available from city libraries and bike shops) and 'Google Maps/ and Street View' are the resources used to plan the routes, as well as local knowledge. Riding through some the many newly developed sub-divisions is always popular, with surprise expressed at the speed with which they change.

After an obligatory coffee stop and the chatter that ensues, we hop back on the bikes for a more direct ride home. Many of the group also own caravans, and are often away exploring – which is fortunate for the coffee shops as we only average about 15 riders each week, meaning they aren't overwhelmed – but they are often pre-warned we're coming. Distances travelled vary, but usually between 30–40 km, but occasionally more if conditions are favourable.

Fortunately, to date, only minor oopsies have occurred, the latest being a cut hand after a run in with a wheelie bin. On a couple of occasions, tyres weren't checked, or the bike battery wasn't charged, requiring more pedal power to get home – with a head wind guaranteed when this happens.

# Helen Keller Celebration - 23rd to 30th June

Author Helen Keller was both blind and deaf due to a fever when 18 months of age. She went on to become an activist, a disability rights advocate and famous author. On 30th June 1925 Helen addressed Lions international Convention in Ohio, USA, she challenged Lions members "I appeal to you, Lions – you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind – will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in my crusade against darkness?". Moved by Keller's words, the Lions were ready and willing to take on the challenge and thereafter have raised funds across the world to support those with vision impairment and/or complete blindness.

Our local Selwyn Lions Club supports this cause by collecting used spectacles and donating monies to various causes. We have increased our Low Vision puppy dog sponsorship this year to mark the celebration of 100 years since Helen's speech. Our local club will be holding a display in collaboration with, and at, the Lincoln Library for one week leading up to 30th June to acknowledge Helen's strength and raise local awareness. The display will be on the right just inside the main door of the library. There will be a receptacle in which to place your used spectacles so that we can recycle them to be given to the people that need them in other countries by Lions in those countries.





# Lions Clubs Cancer Trust - skin cancer screening bus

Our local Club was fortunate to host this free cancer screening service in Lincoln recently, bookings were filled in record time. A GP, two local nurses and bus driver, Paul, all donated their time for free! One of our members also provided free diabetes checks and another sold protein bars as a fundraiser for ovarian cancer. # Lincoln University celebrates highest-ever graduation numbers over three ceremonies

Te Whare Wānaka o Aoraki Lincoln University awarded 1,613 qualifications at its Te Whakapōtaetaka Graduation Ceremony on 8 and 9 May, the highest in its 147-year history, and surpassing its previous high in 2024.

The 2025 total of 1,613 qualifications conferred is an increase of 22% on the 2024 total of 1,320 qualifications conferred.

For the first time in 2025 Lincoln University's Te Whakapōtaetaka Graduation Ceremony was held over three sessions, one session for each of the University's three faculties: Faculty of Environment and Design, Faculty of Agribusiness and Commerce, Faculty of Agriculture and Life Sciences. The ceremonies were held at the Christchurch Town Hall, preceded by full-regalia processions in which graduating students marched to the Town Hall from the Christchurch Art Gallery, accompanied by their academic mentors and members of the wider Lincoln University staff whānau.

Additionally, the University hosted a Campus Celebration Day on Wednesday 7 May to reintroduce the spirit of graduation to the Lincoln campus and foster connections between staff and current students.

The Campus Celebration Day began with Rā Whakamana, a ceremony for graduating Māori and Pasifika students, where friends and whānau came from all over Aotearoa to support the graduating tauira in celebrating their academic achievements.

Other events included a lunch for PhD students, a celebration for Sports and Future Leaders and the Chancellor's Reception in the evening. The University's 2025 Bledisloe Medallist, Dr Robyn Dynes, gave an address to staff, students and the wider community.

Lincoln University Vice-Chancellor Professor Grant Edwards said the pleasing growth in graduate numbers underscored the University's strategic approach to addressing industry demand for skilled graduates while meeting the needs of students pursuing an education in specialist land-based disciplines.

"The strong and sustained growth in our graduating cohort complements our growth in enrolments in recent years, and signals Lincoln University's increasing influence in shaping the future of the land-based sectors in Aotearoa and globally.

"Lincoln University stands apart as the only specialist university among New Zealand's eight universities, and our specialisation for the land-based sector allows us to prioritise applied impactful research and educational programmes that are directly relevant to the challenges and opportunities facing the agrifood, tourism and conservation sectors.

"In an increasingly fast-paced world, land-based industries are facing significant productivity, economic, environmental and social issues, and Lincoln graduates are uniquely equipped with the knowledge and skills needed to address those challenges to help shape a more sustainable and productive future for the benefit of industry and our communities.

"Our graduates are capable, motivated, practically adept, committed to leading positive and lasting change, and are typically highly employable. The proportion of our 2023 student cohort who were in paid employment within 12 months of graduating is an exceptional 82%."

Providing its students with a world-class student experience is paramount for Lincoln University, an objective that is clearly demonstrated through its outstanding student satisfaction rating of 85% (2024 Student Experience Survey) and 80% recommendation rating.

"We are committed to delivering a distinctive Aotearoa end-to-end experience for all our students within an enriching and inspiring environment that supports them to thrive and achieve their goals.

"Complementing our park-like campus, our learner success framework, which focuses on participation, retention and qualification completion, ensures that every student is empowered to succeed at Lincoln University," said Professor Edwards.

# **Awards**

Five Lincoln University Awards, comprising honorary doctorates and medals, were presented at Graduation.

An honorary doctorate was awarded to Andrew Macfarlane in recognition of his career spanning farming, farm consultancy and leadership roles.

The Lincoln University Alumni International Medal was jointly awarded to Samuel Martin and Leighton Pace, co-owners of the London-based company Exterior Architecture, one of Britain's leading landscape architecture companies.

The two recipients of the Global Science Medal are Emeritus Professor David Palmer, whose career was dedicated to studying Batten disease, and Professor Julian Rayner, whose work on the malariacausing Plasmodium parasite has contributed to life-saving improvements in malaria healthcare.

The University's top medal, the Bledisloe Medal, was awarded to Dr Robyn Dynes in recognition of her outstanding career during which she has led multi-disciplinary, agriculture-focused research and adoption programmes that are both science- and industry-leading.

# lincoln envirotown community gardens

Last month I discussed our practice of using green manure to replenish our garden plots over the winter. This has been cut and "dug-in" to the soil, and the areas have been covered with a thin layer of straw to avoid having the soil exposed. Other recent tasks have included stripping the bean fences of the dried stems and seeds (we have plenty for next season), pruning the black current and raspberry bushes, and planting winter crops.

Our featured volunteer this month is Graham Burge. He writes:

"Jenny and I moved from the UK to New Zealand in 1974 and have been residents of Lincoln for 16 years. This followed retirement from full time employment in Auckland, having previously lived in Southland and Dunedin. I started at the Community Gardens around 15 years ago, so I guess that makes me one of the longest (and oldest) volunteers. My interest in gardening started in Auckland although the climate there is not the best for growing produce. When we moved down to Lincoln, I was able to indulge my passion for gardening more fully, with a larger garden, better climatic conditions, and certainly better soil. I was at the Lincoln Farmers Market one Saturday morning and heard about the Community Gardens, and the rest, as they say, is history."

As a retired engineer Graham has practical skills that make him a great asset for the Community Cardens. For example, he dismantled and re-assembled the glass house.



During the month, Barbara brought a keen team from Lincoln Kidsfirst Kindergarten to tend their plot, and discover that what else is happening in the Community Gardens at this time of year.





Also this month, Tony Bywater conducted another bonsai workshop for beginners. After a thorough briefing, the participants were assisted by Tony to transform a small tree into bonsai form, and he provided tips for nurturing their tree. Heath MacFarlane and his eight-year-old son Fergus were among the participants this year. Each year Tony also offers a refresher workshop for those who have attended the basic workshop in previous years.
