

We hear you on that last point! The challenge is that most contacts are committee members whose


details change regularly, but we'll try to bring that information back in a way that stays current.

Repair Cafe

Lincoln Envirotown would like to thank all those from our community who brought items to our Repair Café at the Rolleston Community Centre last Saturday for free repair or assessment and thereby retained things in circulation rather than discarding them.

They would also like to thank the many repairers of all manner of things including jewellery, bikes, electric appliances, and clothes for voluntarily giving up their Saturday to provide generous and professional services. People were also invited to bring a limited number of knives and scissors for sharpening to keep them working efficiently.

Other volunteers gave up their time to run the streamlined "meet and greet" and check in system which enabled people to leave their items and receive a text later when repairs were complete. Others engaged themselves in preparing the food and refreshment required for this large contingent.

The event saw tremendous take up; 109 items were brought in for assessment and of these 80 were repaired, with another 11 being deemed repairable with further attention and parts.

Lincoln Envirotown is fortunate in the long-term support they receive but for this particular event very grateful thanks are due to The Laboratory and New World Lincoln who enabled us to thank and feed a great team of volunteers.

Apart from achieving the purpose of keeping much out of landfill, this event is always an enjoyable occasion where volunteers and the community enjoy catching up.









GARDEN PARTY IN NUMBERS

The Lincoln University Students' Association (LUSA) once again delivered an event that showcased not just excellent entertainment, but a genuine commitment to student wellbeing and community responsibility. With 1,969 attendees flooding the university's rugby fields, the atmosphere was electric as students celebrated the end of lectures in style.

The entertainment lineup didn't disappoint, featuring 10 acts across two stages including crowd favourites SACHI, PRINS, Flaxxies, DARTZ, and TREI. But what truly set this year's Garden Party apart was LUSA's commitment to looking after their students.

Over 10,000 servings of free food were distributed from five separate stations, offering everything from sausage rolls and hash browns to pancakes and savouries. Students never went thirsty either, with 7,000+ free non-alcoholic drinks given out across seven stations, plus five dedicated water stations – ensuring everyone stayed fuelled and hydrated throughout the day.

Beyond the music and food, eight additional free activities kept the crowds engaged, from henna and face painting to inflatable attractions, creating an inclusive festival atmosphere that catered to all tastes.

The numbers behind the scenes tell an equally impressive story. LUSA coordinated with 26 suppliers to deliver the event and implemented 20 separate initiatives designed to mitigate any negative impacts on the local Lincoln community – a response to concerns raised in previous years about student behaviour and community disruption.

The result? Great weather, epic vibes, happy students, and most importantly – no incidents. It was a textbook example of how to run a large-scale student event responsibly.

Garden Party's return was particularly significant given its cancellation in 2023, when the scaled-back "Lawn Party" replacement was axed due to poor ticket sales, raising community concerns about unsupervised celebrations throughout Lincoln neighbourhoods.

For LUSA and the student body, Garden Party 2025 wasn't just about continuing a beloved tradition – it was about proving students can celebrate responsibly while being good neighbours to the Lincoln community. Mission accomplished.











SELWYN LIONS CLUB OCTOBER

Selwyn Lions Club Quiz night – our recent fund raising event for child cancer, at The Rock in Rolleston, was a resounding success. Teams had a ball competing against each other for the honour of being the top team on the night. There was plenty of banter, a couple of sing-alongs revealing the answers to questions and a hard fought battle to the end. The winning team, Quizessential deserved to their title. Runners up were The B Team and 3rd was Harcourts Hotshots.

The event raised almost \$1,700 for child cancer. Our grateful thanks to The Rock, Rolleston, our sponsors and the teams for your support for this worthy cause.

Repair Café, Rolleston - Lincoln Envirotown runs a bi-

annual Repair Cafe to save items going into the landfill. The general public are invited to bring in their items to have them repaired for free. Their event in October was again successful with over 100 items given a new life. Anything from sewing machines, clothing and sieves to teddies. There were 16 bikes; 47 electronics; 6 pieces of jewelry; 21 sewing repairs and 19 people also brought in at least 2 knives each for sharpening. Three of our members enjoyed supporting Lincoln Envirotown. Jo and Lois served food and drinks to the repairers while Pam ensured customers were contacted to pick up their goods once repaired.

Cuddle Hearts working bees – our club holds monthly working bees to support Lisa Paget's project making cute little hearts for Mothers and babies in the Christchurch NIC Unit. We were privileged to have Lisa attend our October working bee at Jane's, to show us how to trim, press and pack the hearts for distribution. Sanitising is crucial throughout the process. We succeeded in completing 1,200 hearts this month.

SWELL – Senior Lifestyle Expo – each year our Club has a presence at this event – it is a great avenue for promoting what we do in our community. This year SWELL was held in the Rolleston Sports Centre. A number of people voiced interest in joining our Club, which was very exciting.











LINCOLN COMMUNITY GARDEN

Our series of workshops has continued with Sally Price's September presentation on how to improve our soil's physical attributes and health. The participants got some hands-on experience by combining sand, clay, potting mix and water in the right proportions to make a small ball of soil with the optimum texture – not too wet or too dry.

We are very grateful that the new owners of Lincoln Hammer Hardware, Sam, Manny and their family, will continue to support the Community Gardens, continuing the great relationship we had established with the previous owner, Mufa.

Recently, Errol and I paid a brief visit to New York, and amongst the skyscrapers of Manhattan we discovered a community garden. Members of the local community pay a US\$20 annual fee to receive a key to the garden. Some enjoy using the garden as a green haven amongst the concrete of the city, and for and additional fee they are permitted to grow vegetables. We made friends with a mother and her daughter who were spending time there. The notice outside had a long list of dos and don'ts in four languages.

MARK YOUR CALENDARS FOR THE 2025 PARADE



Spring has arrived, and as we enjoy the warmer weather it brings, naturally we all begin to look ahead to the season of celebration. In the lead up to Christmas there are many events, parties and engagements, but there is nothing that brings our community together quite like our own Lincoln Christmas Parade.

The Lincoln Christmas Parade has been a staple in the town's Christmas celebrations for almost 50 years. Since its establishment, there have only been a couple of occasions in which the parade has not gone ahead, one such occurrence was during Covid. Fortunately it will be in full swing again this year, in no small thanks to some very dedicated committee volunteers. With the committee membership currently sitting at 10 people, a major figure in the committee is Roger Morgan, whom along with his fellow committee members, has dedicated countless hours to the planning and preparations of this popular event. The planning for this year's parade begins immediately after the previous year's event wraps up, demonstrating the year-round commitment required to pull off such a beloved community tradition. On the day there are many more volunteers ensuring everything runs smoothly, they are easily identified by their Santa helper vests.

A far cry from the quiet humble village beginnings of some 40 years ago, the parade has grown into one of Lincoln's most anticipated annual events. Several thousand locals are expected to attend this year's event, to enjoy the parade boasting approximately 50 floats complete with penny farthings, old tractors, school

bands and classic cars. The market will have upwards of 75 stalls, selling food, crafts, clothing, jewellery and plants. There will also be bouncy castles, face painting and balloon animals to keep the little ones entertained throughout the day. Once again this year the Lincoln fire department will be present, as well as the Rotary Club fundraising for their good cause. And lastly and certainly not least, of course Santa himself will be there, whom I have it on good authority, loves seeing the kids and families at our event.

Due to the redevelopment of Gerald Street commencing soon, this year's Christmas Parade and market has been rerouted. The parade will leave from the event centre, with the route starting at North Belt. It will run past Lincoln Primary, onto James Street, turning onto Gerald Street, then up Kildare Terrace back towards North Belt. The stalls will be situated on North Belt, Kildare Terrace, Liffey Place and around the Liffey Reserve, creating a wonderful festive atmosphere throughout the heart of our town.

When asked what inspires you to be involved in this event Roger responds "Everyone on the committee lives in Lincoln and loves our town. The event is historical and dear to our hearts. We all get a kick out of seeing the joy and excitement of the families attending the event. It's what makes all the hard work worthwhile."

Roger also wanted to give a special thanks to HEB for sponsoring the traffic management this year, and the Lincoln Community Trust for their generous contributions. Without the support of local businesses and organizations like these, bringing this scale of event to life simply wouldn't be possible.

1982: LINCOLN'S FESTIVE TRADITION BEGINS

From its humble beginnings in December 1982 to today's spectacular event drawing several thousand attendees, the Lincoln Christmas Parade has become one of our community's most cherished traditions - and 2025 marks over forty years of festive celebration! Brian Everest recently confirmed that the first Christmas Pageant and Parade was definitely held in December 1982, sharing the thank you letter his father, Dick Everest, received from The Lincoln Community Committee. Brian recalls the original route: "the assembly point was in North Belt by the Primary school. Then down North Belt, East Belt, to South Belt. The Parade turned in what was Pyne's yard, and continued back up West Belt to Gerald Street and along to just past the hotel." His father and Uncle Ron brought a McCormack traction engine, a McCormack steering WD6 Tractor, and a McCormack Deering Binder, with Fred Ford sitting proudly on the binder. The success of those early parades is remembered as being due largely to Brian Carter, Lincoln's 'unofficial mayor', and a dedicated committee of local business owners. Spokesman Erie Duffell from the Lincoln

Drapery and Gift Centre was optimistic when asked by The Guardian in November 1982 if it would be a hit: "it

can't miss, it'll be super." And super it certainly was!

decorated bikes and trikes ridden by local children, all making their way to the fete at 'Village Square' for dancing demonstrations, stalls, and refreshments. By 1983, organiser Alex Mackrell noted, "Christmas just used to come and go in Lincoln and now we have people saying they want to be included." From 1983, floats gathered at the Ellesmere Country Club (Edward Street, now the Ecaf site), following the parade route along Edward Street, East Belt, North Belt, and West Belt to Gerald Street - a route used faithfully until recent times. The parade has only been cancelled a handful of times: once in 2014 due to weather, and during the Covid pandemic. Today's parade continues those early traditions – Father Christmas, decorated floats, fire engines, tractors and vintage cars, pipe bands, and those beloved decorated bikes. What began as twelve floats has grown to approximately fifty, yet the heart remains the same bringing our community together to celebrate Christmas.

The 1982 Parade on Saturday 18th December set the

traditions that followed - Father Christmas leading

twelve floats representing Lincoln organisations,

LINCOLN TOWN CENTRE UPGRADE RECEIVED BLESSING TO BEGIN

A karakia whakawātea / site blessing led by Ngāi Te Ruahikihiki has prepared the way for work to begin on the upgrade of the Lincoln town centre. The blessing on Tuesday morning marked the beginning of stage one works on the long-term project to revitalise the town centre and prepare it for the future.

Waikirikiri Selwyn Mayor-elect Lydia Gliddon spoke at the event, attended by the three new ward councillors for Kā Puna Springs Ward: Aaron McGlinchy, Denise Carrick, and Sarah Barnsley at their first official event as Councillors.

"This upgrade is not just about infrastructure –
it's about people. Stage one will deliver a safer,
greener, and more welcoming town centre
putting people at the heart of Lincoln.

Mayor-elect Gliddon says the blessing marked the

"I want to thank our previous councillors for their foresight and acknowledge the Lincoln community who

have waited a long time to see this come to fruition. This project is about future generations of Lincoln."

Last month the Council awarded Fulton Hogan the contract to deliver stage one of the upgrade from Kildare Terrace to West Belt. Stage one works, with the contract awarded for approximately \$10.4 million, includes:

- Over 50 new trees to enhance the town's green canopy
- Signalised intersection at Gerald Street and West Belt
- A 40km/ph slow speed zone to improve safety
- Cycle lanes and multiple pedestrian crossings
- A new public plaza on Gerald Street

Lincoln is Selwyn's second-largest township, with its population increasing by approximately 10% annually since 2020. Gerald Street currently sees around 11,000 vehicles daily, projected to rise to 16,000 by 2045.

Work will begin this week, including site preparation such as tree clearing, utilities trenching, and island removal to prepare for underground service upgrades and future layout changes.

COMMUNITY CARE LINCOLN WAS A FINALIST IN THE SELWYN 2025 AWARDS



Community Care Lincoln's (CCL) services are primarily for people of retirement age and others who have mental and/or physical disabilities. While CCL provides a range of services for its people this award was for its contribution in promoting active lifestyles. Given the age of its people, CCL's contribution is obviously focused more toward active recreation and play rather than vigorous sport. These activities range from two walking groups and a cycling group for active retirees, through "Fitness for Seniors" in cooperation with Lincoln University which organises thrice-weekly safe exercises for senior adults and allows a limited time in the gym. SAYgo is a set of weekly gentle exercises designed to help those with limited movement, and the least rigorous exercise occurs in group known as the Tuesday Friendship Club where some of the activity borders on play, but may provide more exercise than the participants do at home. Even the CCL service to enable people to hire mobility aids can assist people to exercise.

The CCL volunteers deserved the recognition they received at the Award Ceremony for their outstanding work especially given that except for one part-time manager, all the effort from Board level to leaders of activity groups is voluntary.

Overall community well-being is maximized if all groups in the community contribute to their fullest extent. CCL's focus is to provide help so that the elderly can share experiences with each other and contribute their wisdom to the community, for as long as they desire. Age appropriate exercise, as part of a group, is one of the ways that CCL assists the elderly to remain healthy. In CCL, the more able members are helping the less able.

For all the CCL groups, exercise and social interaction are almost equally important as after a ride or walk etc it is considered a vital part of the experience to stop at a cafe. Lasting friendships develop from this. Members of the Senior Exercise Group, who use the gymnasium at Lincoln University, find that being part of a group helps motivation, and the coffee shared after the exercise builds friendships. The carers of people who come to the Tuesday Friendship Group frequently remark that the people they care for exclaim that Tuesdays are the best days of the week where they can connect with their friends. Also, people who join one CCL group tend to join other CCL groups so that their circle of friends keeps expanding.

The activity that LCC supports helps to prepare for a future that values every stage of life. When older adults become visibly active in community spaces - walking groups in parks and cycling groups on cycle-ways, they reinforce community perceptions that later life should include vitality and engagement rather than decline and withdrawal. A FAMILY STORY ROOTED IN THE SOIL

The Gill brothers, Gurwinder and Amrinder, started four years ago with two hectares of leased land, growing produce for markets and hospitality in Christchurch.

As demand grew, they went from a small honesty box to a shed on 1210 Shands Road. Now, the farm has expanded to 25 hectares and a bustling, colourful shop full of fresh produce.

Gurwinder came to New Zealand in 2010. He studied here and then worked for another local grower

for 10 years, learning the trade and dreaming of building a family business. Today, he and Amrinder run it with their partners, children, and a small team. It's a family story that keeps growing.

SPARKING CREATIVITY IN YOUNG ARTISTS

For Anna Coursey, Lincoln has been home for five years—a place where she rediscovered her creative spark and began turning inspiration into something that now brings joy to others.

"We moved to that garden plot and I just was inspired to start creating," Anna says, smiling, and in a floral shirt that perfectly matches her love for painting blooms hydrangeas being a particular favourite.

Anna paints from her home studio in Lincoln, where her passion for art has grown into a thriving small business. What started as a personal creative outlet has evolved into Art Spark—a space where Anna now teaches over 30 local children, each bringing their own creativity, imagination, and ideas to her classes.

"I just love how the kids come to art classes with their own ideas," Anna says. "There's a project for every lesson, but I work with what they bring too. It follows a theme, but my idea might spark a different idea, which sparks another. It's always interesting how every time, they all create something totally different—developing their own style and creativity. That's what I love about it."

Anna's classes aren't just about paint and paper—they're about giving local children a creative, healthy outlet,

helping them develop confidence, and supporting the local economy by keeping artistic opportunities right here in the community.

When she's not teaching, Anna continues her own artistic practice. Her work is regularly showcased at major art shows, and she's currently preparing to exhibit her latest pieces at the Liffey Gallery this December (see more details in the Liffey section of this newsletter).

Anna also serves on the Liffey Gallery Committee, helping connect Lincoln's vibrant art scene with the wider community through exhibitions and social media.

"It's therapeutic," Anna reflects. "We're all creative in a way, we all want to create—no matter what that looks like. Perhaps these days we just need more chances to do that."




