Our youth clubs offer a wide range of social, recreational and educational activities, and are open to any child or young person in the community. We also provide extra support for children and young people who need it most, including specialist projects for unemployed young people, young mothers and young people who are struggling at school. Increasingly, the Citadel is not just for young people, as we open our doors for a weekly Intergenerational Café, a Parent's Drop In, Family Days and a host of other community events.

We had a high number of achievements of full Bronze Awards, with 4 young people gaining these. We also had our first young person achieve their Gold Award.











As we worked our way through March 2020 we realised that things were about to change. When we arrived at work on 16th we soon realised that we had until the end of the week to prepare ourselves for a 'lockdown' and that we were not going to back in the Citadel building for the foreseeable future. We organised laptops, set up I.T. systems like Teams, WhatsApp and Zoom realising that we were about to experience a steep learning curve. The final team meeting on Friday 20th March was eerily strange. We sat together sipping coffee and tea, eating biscuits quietly – each of us unsure of what lay ahead. What was paramount on everyone's mind was how were we going to continue to offer support and services to the children, young people and families who rely on the Citadel.

Meals to families:

It soon became apparent in the first few days of lockdown that many families were going to need practical support in terms of accessing food and nutritious meals. With children not going to school where they could get free school meals and food shortages in supermarkets, we decided to look at ways we could offer support. Help was not far away when we were approached by two chefs, Roisin and Matthias Llorente who owned Bia Bistrot. Roisin and Matt wanted to cook for us if we could cover costs of ingredients, and with the support of an amazing #Friendof Citadel who offered to underwrite those costs we were up and running. All we needed now was a way to deliver them! Again help was close by when we met up with the Team Captain (Jamie) of Leith Rugby Club. Within days we had a full squad of volunteers with vehicles and our first meals went out to 43 families (112 meals) on 03/04/20.

POST COVID19:

We delivered meals every Monday, Wednesday and Friday for 15 full weeks from 3rd April – 10th July


We delivered between 440 – 464 meals per week to up to 43 addresses

Meals met dietary requirements including gluten free and Halal. As well as meals, we delivered fresh bread, fresh fruit and occasional treats

We delivered surprise birthday cakes to over 20 lockdown birthdays

Meals went to young mums, families with children and teenagers, young people living on their own and pensioners in the community

We had a team of 17 volunteers and 4 staff who delivered 6404 meals driving a total of 2715 miles!







Ryan McKay shares his experience of working at The Citadel Youth Centre and how our service has adapted to support those most in need during the current public health crisis.

WORKING REMOTELY

Like the vast majority of workers across the country our staff are now in lockdown and are adapting to working remotely. With the closure of our building, the need for us to continue providing support remotely during this unprecedented time has been vital. For a service primarily focussed on delivering direct face to face support, this transition has been challenging; but equally transformative. In the words of Karen Salmansohn:

"The most challenging times bring us the most empowering lessons."

My colleagues and fellow practitioners are incredibly adaptable – Their response in recent weeks has been nothing short of remarkable. I have been amazed at the sectors willingness to





embrace the current challenge. Wherever possible digital solutions have been found for delivering direct services. Real critical engagement has taken place with practitioners across the country coming together to share best practice. This adaptability makes me confident we will be able to support as many local people as possible.

Our shift to remote working has not been without its difficulties, yet I feel overall the experience has undoubtedly improved The Citadel as an organisation and my experience as a practitioner. Ironically the current health crisis may have been the shock our sector needed to bring us closer together and to place service users at the centre.


