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The Citadel Youth Centre has been helping children and young people in Leith since 1980. Our youth clubs offer a wide range of social, recreational and educational activities, and are open to any child or young person in the community (aged 6 to 18). We also provide extra support for children and young people who need it most, including specialist projects for unemployed young people, young mothers and young people who are struggling at school. Increasingly, the Citadel is not just for young people, as we open our doors for a weekly Intergenerational Café, a Parent's Drop In, Family Days and a host of other community events.

Youth Clubs

ur youth clubs are as popular as ever. With clubs running five nights a week, there is something for everyone, including mixed clubs for three age groups, a dedicated Girls Club, and our increasingly popular Friday Night Games Club, which regularly attracts 20+ young 'gamers' a night.

Our club members have had a busy year with an action packed programme full of activities. Through the consistent support of our dedicated staff and volunteers, children and young people of all genders, aged 6-18 have been able to foster friendships and have fun in a safe and nurturing environment.

Club members have been supported to try lots of new things and have also learnt about different cultures as we followed the World Cup 2018 and celebrated a host of different cultural events. We also worked closely with a range of partner agencies, such as the British Red Cross who delivered an interactive Refugee and Migrant workshop and RUTS who facilitated boxing taster sessions in the Seniors and Inters. Other highlights included a Seniors joint football trip with Pilmeny Development Project, an Inters cycling trip with MYDG and a Games Club trip to PLAY EXPO in Glasgow.

Our summer was also a busy time with plenty more trips for young people such as Cosmos, Fox Lake and Laser Tag, as well as a new 3 week playscheme for Junior Club members and their families.

Finally, we've recently added a new club to the Citadel programme – an action packed Boys Club. Expect to hear more about that in next year's report.

Inclusion Project

ver the last year Citadel's Inclusion Project started for children aged 8-11 years old from BME backgrounds.

The Inclusion Project, in partnership with MCFB Footprints Project, created a group for 9 children to participate in weekly activities focusing on diversity and providing them with a space to have fun, try new things and meet new people. Since the Inclusion Group finished seven of the group members have joined the under 12's mainstream youth clubs. Additionally, 4 siblings and 4 members of their extended family have joined the clubs.

During the project the youth clubs included activities promoting diversity within their programmes, such as henna designs, making Nalesniki crepes and participating in a refugee and migrant workshop. Children in both the Junior and Inter club enjoyed trying new things from different cultures and learning why we should treat everyone equally. As part of the Inclusion Project a set of Inclusive Practice Guidelines has been produced to highlight good practice within the Citadel for staff and volunteers.

In September, a Locality Inclusion Fun Day was held to celebrate the end of the Inclusion Project and to showcase the work delivered by local organisations. The children had a fantastic time learning how to make samosas with Sikh Sanjog, creative story making with Stirling Publishing and voicing what equality means to them with EaRN. Since the Inclusion Project the children involved have spoken highly of Citadel's services and have told their families and friends about how much they enjoy coming.



The Citadel Families Project

he Citadel Families Project has grown in size this year, with more staff and more families involved in the project.

The Families Project continues to offer one-to-one support for primary aged children who have been able to explore issues such as feelings, friendships and issues at school, with the children's worker liaising with school and home. Furthermore, individual family support has been offered to Citadel parents and carers enabling them to meet with a family worker once a week and work towards goals of their own.

This summer, we re-designed our summer provision. Instead of running a programme of day trips, children under 10 were offered a week at the Citadel's summer playscheme where they were able to take part in a wide range of activities. Parents and carers were able to join in too – with many feeding back that this provision offered further benefit to families during the summer holidays.

Of course, The Families Project doesn't just offer groups to children. Over the course of the year, 19 parents and

carers have accessed the parents drop in. The group continues to be a safe and fun space for parents and carers to come together and share their experiences. We continue to make good use of our existing partnership with Granton Information Centre and Cyrenians Fareshare Food Programme.

Schools Work

ith financial support from the Pupil Equity Fund we now have Citadel staff based in four local primary schools; Leith Primary, Trinity Primary, Victoria Primary and St Mary's (Leith) RC Primary school. Family support is delivered in a variety of different ways, such as one-to-one support; group family sessions; family learning and children's one-to-one/group work sessions. Topics covered in family support can include out of school children's provision; advice and information for parents with children with additional support needs; employability support and much more.

We also have staff members working in two local secondary schools, Drummond CHS and Trinity Academy. They mainly work with pupils from S1-S4

through a mixture of one-to-one sessions and group work sessions. Some group work sessions delivered focus on gender based issues, for instance learning about girls rights (Drummond). Single gender group work is delivered as well as mixed gender

t's been a busy year developing this new service for young people in North East of Edinburgh with work focusing around two main areas:

Capacity building for youth workers: There has been a series of training days for anyone who works with young people in the North East. These days have focussed on core youth work skills, mental health, inclusion and risk taking. They have been widely attended and are a great networking opportunity for those involved in youth work.

North East Youth Ambassadors: This is a group of young people aged 11-18 from all over the North East Locality. They have been working on two main projects; firstly they have been developing ideas for how to make their areas better. They have presented their ideas to the Locality Leadership Team who have taken their ideas on board and will hopefully influence future plans. Last and most exciting, they have been working hard all year to develop a Year of the Young People event. In November this year they will host the North East Youth Awards to celebrate and highlight all the good that young people do. Watch this space next year to hear how

Young Mums

ver the course of this year we have continued to work with young mums in the local community, and provide a weekly crèche for their babies and toddlers so that they can play, learn and develop.



Whilst the babies and toddlers are in the crèche, we have been delivering group sessions that support young mums to increase their social, emotional and physical well-being in a positive and non-judgemental

environment. Many of the sessions also offered practical advice and support on topics such as healthy sleep, money management and affordable meals.

Looking forward, we are excited to be going into this new term launching a pilot for a second day of young mum's work with a focus on attachment parenting which will provide activities for mum and baby to take part in together.

ur Girls Club had an amazing 34 evening sessions this year for girls in the local community aged 11-15 years old. We had a mixed programme of weekly activities such as cooking, sport, arts and crafts, and a number of issue based workshops which covered friendship, kindness and gender stereotyping.

The highlight for girls club this year was the summer programme day trip to Blackpool. Ten girls along with a handful of volunteers took to the Pleasure Beach to challenge themselves on the scariest of rides and screamed their hearts out, but most importantly we had a fantastic day and LOTS of fun!

Girls and Young Women

his year the Citadel has been working with a group of girls aged 12-15 years old from Drummond Community High School as part of an on-going partnership with Plan International UK. We worked with the group during the school term from January to July talking about girl's rights issues across the UK alongside learning about being assertive and staying safe in the city.

As part of programme we also attended a 4 day Youth Action Camp (YAC) during the summer break in Oxfordshire. Whilst there, we met with 3 other groups from around the UK, and collectively identified a number of issues that all of the groups are facing regardless of where they live in the UK. These issues are; period poverty, street harassment, bullying in schools, racism, body shaming, girl gangs and organised fights.

Moving forward, the girls will soon be using an app designed by themselves and Plan International UK to help engage with other girls in their communities to find out their views on these issues. Once the information has been collected they hope to meet with local decision makers in their community to create a long lasting positive change. Watch this space!

15 + Employability Support

Futureheads Project

ver the past year the Futureheads project has supported 63 young people from the Leith and North East Edinburgh area move into positive destinations or employment.

We continue to offer extra support and specialist programmes in addition to our ongoing advice, help and support for young people experiencing additional barriers to employment. In the last year we have held 42 Careers Café sessions with a total of 407 contacts with young people where we continue to liaise in partnership with Skills Development Scotland, RUTS, Link Living and Venture Scotland to name a few.

We also continue to work in close partnership with local secondary schools offering them a range of bespoke programmes to suit their pupil's needs. Over the last year we have supported over 25 pupils in this way, many of who have gone on to access other Citadel services.



15+ Employability Support

Activity Agreements

nother part of our employability service at the Citadel is to be able to offer young people the extra support of joining an Activity Agreement.

An Activity Agreement is a voluntary contract between a young person (aged 16 – 19) and their Activity Agreement coach at the Citadel.

We work closely with four local secondary schools, Trinity, Drummond, Leith and Broughton as well as alongside Skills Development Scotland and our Activity Agreement adviser. People who sign up to be part of an Activity Agreement do a minimum of 4 hours of activity with us each week however some young people are with us 3-4 days a week. This can be anything from getting support with their CV and Job applications, to developing their skills through volunteering and work placements.

As part of their Activity Agreement this summer 14 young people signed up to our exciting "Think Outside the Box" programme. Activities included opportunities to work with Bare Branding printing bags and t-shirts, going gorge walking with Venture Scotland and escaping from one of Edinburgh's brilliant and frustrating Exit Plan rooms. The programme finished in style with some open water kayaking and archery with Bridge 8 Hub with a final trip to the Go Karts!

This was a very successful group in terms of attendance, motivation and encouraging anxious young people with low confidence to really push themselves out of their comfort zones and to try something different. It also showed how the great partnerships we have developed over the years with different organisations, enabled us to provide exciting opportunities for young people that they wouldn't usually have the chance to experience.

Citadel Connect

itadel Connect is a volunteering programme for 15 – 19 year olds who are at risk of being not in employment, education or training (NEET). Opportunities to take part in workshops, awards, qualifications and volunteering taster days are followed by a big volunteering project chosen by the young people.

Our first Citadel Connect group involved 12 young people who gained experience in team building, volunteer skills, conflict resolution, money awareness and everyday first aid. In this programme the group also volunteered for Re-Act (a local refugee charity) making up school packs for refugee children and the Water of Leith Conservation Trust, gaining their Saltire Awards in the process. Some of the initial group have successfully moved on to college and jobs; others have started their big volunteering project of choice, a dog education programme with the Dog's Trust.

The next Citadel Connect group is due to start in mid-November!





Awards and Achievements

e have continued to support young people to achieve their Duke of Edinburgh Awards this year, currently having 5 Bronzes,

5 Silvers and 3 Golds working towards completion.

This year we were very lucky to receive £2400 funding for our Duke of Edinburgh Award programme from the Diamond fund. A certificate and cheque was presented to us by H.R.H Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex on his visit to the Citadel in July.

Later that same month two of our Gold participants were lucky enough to take part in the 8 day Tall Ship sailing race from Sunderland to Esjberg, Denmark on board the Lord Nelson sail training ship for their Gold Residential section.

We also had another two young people complete their Gold canoeing expedition training this season, two Silver participants completed both their Practice and Qualifying hillwalking expeditions and finally two Bronze candidates are hoping to complete their hillwalking expeditions by the end of this season.



Intergenerational Work

ver the last year our intergenerational work has gone from strength to strength. Our weekly intergenerational café New Spin which is delivered in partnership with Pilmeny Development Project has continued to provide local young and older people with a safe space to meet and socialise each week.

This year we have also continued our focus on food and for each session we have encouraged all our New Spinners, staff and volunteers to eat healthy and nutritious meals together. By taking this approach we have been able to challenge food poverty while providing food in a dignified way.

This year also marked the end of 3 fantastic years delivering our schools based Old's Cool Intergenerational Project, which is funded by the Paul Hamlyn Foundation. Highlights this year included the production and launch of our Old's Cool Intergenerational Practice Toolkit, which was launched at our final celebration event back in June 2018. Our toolkit provides guidance to stakeholders on how to deliver their own Old's Cool programme and it has been disseminated nationally through both Education Scotland and Generations Working Together.

"She acts childish like us sometimes, and it's great!"


