ROMANS 11:1-36

"As regards the gospel, they are enemies for your sake. But as regards election, they are beloved for the sake of their forefathers. For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable." (Romans 11:28–29, ESV)

Review the Sermon Read Romans 11:1-36. What evidence does Paul offer to prove God has not written the Jewish people off? Why have the Jews been set aside? What is the expected result of Gentile inclusion? And what will be the result of Jews, on a massive scale, accepting Jesus as Messiah? What is Paul's warning to Gentile believers? Assess your Life Can you name someone you have written off at some point in your life? Do you know of anyone who was saved or restored after being considered a hopeless case? Are you more drawn to the "kindness" or the "severity" of God in your attitude toward others?

How should Romans 11 inform your attitude toward evangelism (reaching lost people with
the gospel)?
What does Romans 11 teach you about the character of God? How does this motivate you
