Truck Drivers Play an Essential Role



Though some drivers are currently making good money, the job itself is not a first choice for many potential workers. 18-20 year old's who seek jobs after high school if they don't go to college are not an option because interstate truck driving is not allowed under the age of 21. And while there are talks about allowing this demographic to come on board, many in the industry believe the consequences would hurt carrier economics and raise safety concerns.

Over the last few years, the industry has seen turnover rates of nearly 100%, meaning, for every 10 drivers hired, 10 drivers are lost. But according to the American Trucking Associations, it also saw a record easing in shortage last year, from 78,000 versus 80,000 in 2021. 1. Driver Shortages

With the average age of a truck driver being 47 and to keep up with demand, the industry must hire nearly 1.2 million new drivers over the next decade based on the reasons highlighted in the following chart.
