She chairs the Cities for Financial Empowerment and sits on the boards of the National Policing Institute; Center for Community Progress; Sandy Hook Promise; and the Lyric Opera of Chicago. Julie spent 27 years on the policy staff at the Chicago Coalition to End Homelessness (CCH), with 17 years as the Director of Policy. In her role, she worked on policy research, policy development, advocacy strategy, coalition building and facilitation, and legislative and administrative advocacy. She worked on a wide range of issues towards addressing homelessness including affordable housing, health care, public benefits, criminal justice reform, education, and living wages. Julie led a statewide coalition to create, develop and pass the state's homelessness prevention program, a statewide rental subsidy program, and the first funding for housing in the state's capital budget. She also supervised the work to put the Bring Chicago Home ballot measure on the ballot. Since leaving CCH in 2023, she has worked on political campaigns and supported organizational functions of the United Working Families organization during a time of staff transition.



Maricela Garcia

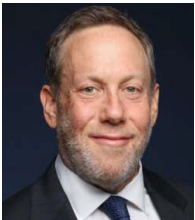
Mujeres Latinas en Acción

Maricela Garcia, Interim President and CEO of Mujeres Latina in Acción since 1973, empowers Latinas with culturally relevant services. She led Gads Hill Center as CEO for 12 years, focusing on education and community engagement. With 20+ years in nonprofit leadership, she was Executive Director of the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights, founding Executive Director of the Latino Policy Forum, and Director at UnidosUS.

A Guatemalan immigrant, Garcia arrived in the 1980s, founding Casa Guatemala and co-founding Women for Guatemala. She served on boards like the National Immigration Forum and Latino Policy Forum.

Garcia holds a BA from Northeastern University, an MSW from the University of Illinois at Chicago, and was a Harvard Kennedy School fellow. She completed executive programs at Kellogg and Harvard Business School. Awards include the Chicago Community Trust Fellowship and Casa Guatemala Human Rights Award. Named a top Chicago leader in 2001, she co-authored 2021 articles on COVID-19's impact on Latinos.

Dan Lurie is the President and CEO at the Metropolitan Planning Council a Chicago-based, regionally focused think tank. Dan is a nationally recognized policy leader who has crafted and implemented innovative inclusive economic growth and social safety net programs at the highest levels of government and civil society. An attorney, he is a veteran of Chicago's City Hall, the Obama-Biden White House, the National Endowment for the Arts, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Washington, D.C. think tank New America, and the Chicago Transit Authority. Before becoming CEO at MPC, Dan founded the Municipal Governance Initiative that is addressing the state capacity crisis threatening local governments' ability to solve critical social problems. Prior to MGI, Dan was the City of Chicago's Chief of Policy where he oversaw the City's policy design and program implementation, from democracy reform to housing to transportation and land use to environment to the care economy, including former Mayor Lightfoot's whole-of-government project to reduce racialized intergenerational poverty and economic insecurity while strengthening the social safety net.

Dan is known for fostering partnerships that advance bold policies confronting race and gender inequities, and for reaching new consensus that, as he likes to say, "expands the aperture of the possible".

He is a graduate of the University of Michigan (B.A. and JD) and lives with his family on Chicago's Northwest Side.

Ralph Martire is executive director of the Center for Tax and Budget Accountability (CTBA), a bipartisan think tank promoting equitable workforce, education, fiscal, and economic policies, and the Arthur Rubloff Endowed Professor of Public Policy at Roosevelt University. At CTBA, he has driven legislative successes, including the 2018 Evidence-Based Model of Education Funding, a state Earned Income Tax Credit, and corporate accountability laws. He has taught fiscal policy and education finance at various universities and the International Fulbright Scholar Program.

Martire serves on the Illinois Board of Higher Education's Commission on Equitable Public University Funding (2021) and the Professional Review Panel for Illinois' school funding formula (2018). He was part of the federal Equity and Excellence in Education Commission (2011-2013), co-authoring the "For Each and Every Child" report. His political roles include deputy issues director for Dawn Clark Netsch's gubernatorial campaign and issues director for David Wilhelm's Senate run.

An elected school board member for Oak Park River Forest High School District 200 since 2019 and former president of River Forest District 90's board, Martire has received the 2007 Champion of Freedom Award from the Rainbow PUSH Coalition and the Adlai Stevenson Award for Public Service. He is a frequent media commentator on tax policy for WTTW and WPWR and a columnist.

Andrea Sáenz is President & CEO of The Chicago Community Trust, one of the nation's oldest and largest community foundations. Previous to his appointment, Mr. Rehwinkel served as the Illinois Director of Banking for four years—appointed by Governor JB Pritzker in June 2019. As Director of Banking, Mr. Rehwinkel focused on major reforms to improve equity in banking and consumer protection. In 2020, Mr. Rehwinkel issued wide ranging guidance and policy relief to help vulnerable Illinoisans during the COVID-19 Global Pandemic, including a forming a multistate agreement with student loan servicers to provide financial relief options on private student loans and a partnership with seven large retail banks to provide free check cashing services on stimulus check for unbanked Illinoisans.

Prior to his role as Illinois Director of Banking, Mr. Rehwinkel served in both Illinois state fiscal office—first as the Director of Policy for the Illinois State Treasurer and then as the Chief Economist and Director of the Bond Division for the Illinois Office of Comptroller. García's commitment to organizing is rooted in her family's experience with wage theft, housing and food insecurity, language barriers, and in early memories of civic action alongside her parents.

Rocío García is currently the Senior Organizing Director at Grassroots Collaborative, a coalition of community and labor groups across Chicago and Peoria. She leads the People's Unity Platform—created to bring together the people's agenda ahead of the 2024 municipal election and currently leading the “Babies Before Billionaires” campaign aimed at getting \$1 billion in progressive revenue.
