ETTIQUETE WITH THE QURAN



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This session emphasized how the Qur'an is not just a book to read, but a life-changing trust (amanah) that elevates people spiritually and socially when approached with love, respect, and sincerity. The transformation of individuals like Abdullah ibn Mas'ud highlights how the Qur'an redefines true honor in the sight of Allah.

Key Concepts & Lessons

1. The Qur'an as an Amanah (Trust)

- The Qur'an is a mighty, heavy trust offered to the heavens and mountains, but only humans—despite being self-oppressive—accepted it.
- If it were revealed to a mountain, it would crumble out of fear of Allah.
- The Qur'an must be approached with humility and reverence.
- Allah Himself promises to protect the Qur'an, but it is our duty to carry it with dignity and integrity.

2. Passionate Engagement with the Qur'an

- The Sahaba (Companions) interacted with the Qur'an emotionally, physically, and spiritually.
 - Kissing the pages, weeping, contemplating single verses for hours.
- Example: Ikrimah ibn Abi Jahl, a former enemy, transformed completely due to his deep love for the Qur'an.

- The Qur'an was treated as a beloved friend, not just a text.

3. The Transformative Guarantee

- Unlike other texts or tools, the Qur'an is not just capable of change—it guarantees transformation for anyone who:
 - Approaches it sincerely.
 - Applies prophetic etiquettes in reading.
 - Reflects deeply on its meanings.

4. Honor Through the Qur'an

- True dignity does not come from wealth, fame, or status—but from closeness to the Qur'an.
- Allah honors people through the Qur'an and disgraces others through it if they reject or neglect it.
- The Qur'an is the ultimate source of elevation or degradation.

Focus on Abdullah ibn Mas'ud: A Living Example

5. His Honor and Praise

- The Prophet ﷺ said: Whoever wants to hear the Qur'an as if it was freshly revealed, listen to Abdullah ibn Mas'ud.
- He received full legal endorsement from the Prophet ﷺ for his religious rulings.

6. His Conversion Story

- As a 12- or 13-year-old shepherd, he encountered the Prophet ﷺ and Abu Bakr.
- Refused to milk a sheep that wasn't his—demonstrating trustworthiness.
- Witnessed a miracle when the Prophet made a dry sheep produce milk.
- His heart was moved by the Prophet's presence and words.

7. Physical & Social Status

- Very short and thin—his legs were so small even the Sahaba laughed when he climbed a tree.

- The Prophet ﷺ reminded them: His legs are weightier than Mount Uhud in Allah's eyes.
- Despite no wealth, tribe, or prestige, he was spiritually towering.

Historic Milestones

8. First Public Qur'an Recitation at the Kaaba

- The Muslim community wanted to make the message public.
- Even senior Sahaba like Uthman were considered but deemed too valuable to risk.
- Young Abdullah volunteered, despite his vulnerability.
- Recited Surah Ar-Rahman—captivating the crowd.
- He was beaten severely by Qurayshi leaders like Abu Jahl until unconscious.

9. His Response to Persecution

- After revival, he said, "I've never felt stronger. I'd do it again tomorrow."
- Demonstrated unwavering resolve, courage, and trust in Allah.

Confrontation with Abu Jahl at Badr

10. Abu Jahl's Death

- Killed by two young Ansari boys motivated only by his oppression of the Prophet.
- Ibn Mas'ud was sent to finish him off.
- Abu Jahl mocked him to the end, calling him a "little shepherd."
- Ibn Mas'ud, with dignity and silence, delivered the final blow—a symbolic victory of truth over arrogance.

Elevating the Forgotten

11. Allah Elevates the Lowly Through the Qur'an

- Abdullah was ignored and mocked by society.
- But due to his deep connection to the Qur'an, he became "the Great Carrier of the Qur'an."

- Allah redefines value based on spiritual sincerity, not appearance or status.

The Qur'an's Ongoing Role

12. The Qur'an Elevates or Degrades

- Like Abdullah is remembered with reverence and Abu Jahl with contempt, your relationship with the Qur'an determines your legacy.
- One's spiritual worth is determined not by might but by how much Qur'an is in their heart.

13. The Qur'an as an Intercessor

- On Judgment Day, family ties will fail.
- The Qur'an will say, "This person used to read and honor me—please help them because of me."
- It will advocate for those who built a relationship with it.

14. The Qur'an as Spiritual Investment

- People plan endlessly for worldly security (401Ks, insurance).
- But the real investment should be in Qur'an recitation and understanding.
- It provides spiritual currency that pays off in the Akhirah.
- Even a few minutes of quiet reading daily can build this wealth.

Final Reflections

- Every Muslim has access to the same honor Abdullah ibn Mas'ud attained.
- Begin with daily engagement, love for the Qur'an, and conscious reflection.
- Let the Qur'an be your source of strength, identity, and intercession.
