Relief Partners across 20 counties, reducing barriers to accessing nourishing food.


RETAIL RESCUE


Meat, dairy, produce, baked goods, and pantry staples are donated by local grocery stores and distributed to our partners, saving millions of pounds of good food from landfills.

"I come here when I don't have money for groceries," said Carrie. "They always do good. They meet my food needs for at least three or four days, until I can get a paycheck to buy groceries. I'm just low on cash and needed some help with food."

"We've been coming to cooking classes here. Then, we started coming to make the boxes," said Trina.


Trina and Elizabeth not only receive food from the Community Resource Center of Chattooga, but they also volunteer.

"That's what I want to do," Trina continued. "I want to donate all the time I can to the Lord. There's no way I can ever pay him back for what he's done for me, but there's a way I can start and put back just a little bit of what he gave me. If it means anything to anybody, that little bit matters."

"They're awesome people at CRC," said Elizabeth. "I had nobody and kept praying to God to send me an angel, and he sent Trina, and she wouldn't give up on me and she wouldn't quit, and this place won't either."

"I arrived here under very dire circumstances, with the high cost of living and having to pay my bills," said Rose. "I have a medical condition, and when I came here and explained my condition to Angie and the fellow workers here, they showed me a lot of empathy and compassion, and they've always tried to meet my dietary needs to maintain my health.

"I am a living testimony of survival thanks to the food bank, because times are hard. I just keep on going. I don't know what I'd do without them."




"We were staying in our Chevrolet Suburban," said Seth.


