#### **Foxwood Food Center**

We provide emergency food assistance to individuals and families in a grocery-store-style setting.

## **Community Partners**

We work with over 250 agencies to supply their food pantries, senior programs, mobile pantries, sack packs, and other programs.

We ensure children and their families continue to receive food while out of school for the summer

#### **Retail Rescue Programs**


Meat, dairy, produce, baked goods, and pantry staples are donated by local grocery stores and distributed to our partners, saving good food from landfills

#### **GUEST SPOTLIGHT**

Sherry Jenkins currently lives in Sale Creek, Tennessee, but she's been all around the Chattanooga area. She grew up in Hixson, lived in Georgia for a while, then moved to Sale Creek to manage property owned by her cousin who's ill and unable to care for the house alone. Her goal is to clean up the property and make a home for him. "It's not easy, but that's what I'm trying to do," she says. "It was like a rain forest when I got there. It was just covered with trees. You couldn't really tell what was there anymore, until I started clearing it out." She lives in a camper on the property. playing host to a variety of animals. "I've got five cats," she says with a laugh. "Two I brought with me, and three just showed up." She explains that a nationwide shortage of cat food has forced her to buy a different brand than usual, and her cats don't like it. "They'd rather go outside and catch mice." Sherry has one dog, and she looks after her son's dogs while he's at work. She proudly states she's a breast cancer survivor and has been cancer-free since 2015.

In each of Sherry's stories, she lends a hand wherever it's needed, without a second thought. Whether it's a kitten or a cousin who needs a proper roof over their head. Sherry steps in. Then, food prices started soaring last fall, and Sherry needed help. She's known about



the Chattanooga Area Food Bank for a while, but only started visiting the Foxwood Food Center about six months ago. "I knew it helped a lot of people," she says, "but I just didn't need it...I should leave it for somebody else to have it." But, she says, she's at a place in her life where the amount of money coming in doesn't cover her food costs. She likes coming to Foxwood because she can choose the foods she wants. "It gives you a sense of still feeling like vou're in control of something." Sherry's off to work in the evening, and she'll keep looking for food to satisfy her picky group of cats.


Clay Davis is a new addition to our fleet of volunteers, quickly becoming a regular at our Foxwood Food Center. He helps our staff provide emergency food assistance to individuals and families in our service area. Clay has spent some time in our warehouse.

sorting food and packing items into the Emergency Food Boxes, but he particularly loves the work at Foxwood. He stocks shelves, talks guests through their options, then loads groceries into quests' cars. "It's exhilarating. You feed off the job vou're doing and the gratitude people give vou." he says. He mentions a strong camaraderie among the volunteers, that everyone's there for the same purpose, and everyone helps however they can. There's a bond that forms, "and then you gradually learn the ropes, and you show somebody else."

Clay is spreading the word about Foxwood and our need for consistent volunteers. "I'm trying to get more people in. We have a group at church that was looking for a place to volunteer, and I think they're lined up to come over here [to Foxwood]." Clay makes it clear he's in for the long haul. "I still haven't learned what all goes where, but they're very patient with me and they'll tell me. Hopefully, I'll be of more and more help as I get along in my career here."







