Dear Friends,



## Our Process

Our staff and volunteers sort and pack food at our three locations.



Food is sourced from retailers, manufacturers, farmers, producers, and government nutrition programs.

Our neighbors receive their groceries through pantry distributions, hunger-relief partners, and other programs.

Fresh produce, prepacked boxes, and pantry staples are delivered across our service area to Foxwood Food Center, mobile pantries, and hunger-relief partners.

## Programs

### Foxwood Food Center

Our grocery-store-style pantry where guests choose foods to accommodate their personal preferences, allergies, and other dietary restrictions.

### Mobile Pantries

We help organize massive distributions at schools, community centers, and places of worship to deliver groceries directly to communities in need.

### Children's Programs

Our Sack Packs and Summer Bags ensure food-insecure children have enough to eat during their weekends and summer breaks.

### Hunger-Relief Partners

We supply food across a wide network of food pantries, senior centers, mobile pantries, and children's programs.

### Produce Delivery

Our fleet delivers millions of pounds of fresh produce to our Hunger-Relief Partners across 20 counties, reducing barriers to accessing nutritious food.

### Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) Outreach


We assist individuals across our service area with the SNAP application and recertification process.

### Teaching Garden

In our on-site garden, we grow produce for Foxwood Food Center, start seedlings for local community gardens, and teach about self-sufficiency and caring for the land.

### Retail Rescue

Meat, dairy, produce, baked goods, and pantry staples are donated by local grocery stores and distributed to our partners, saving millions of pounds of good food from landfills.



## The 2025 Government Shutdown Crisis

The 43-day federal government shutdown in fall 2025 **disrupted SNAP access for over 100,000 families** across our region. During November, many neighbors were forced to make difficult choices between basic necessities and food.



When federal systems faltered, the Chattanooga Area Food Bank and our network of partners responded at scale—moving more than **2.3 million pounds of food** in a single month to meet an elevated and ongoing level of need.

### Our Emergency Response

Pasta, sauce, and peanut butter were offered to partners at no cost.



An additional prepacked box was provided to our guests at Foxwood Food Center.

Operational hours were extended and volunteer shifts were expanded.



The greatest impact happens in collaboration.






