Foundation Pairs Residents and Students in Celebration of Earth Day



What a pleasure it was to bring students from The Potomac School and Chesterbrook Elementary School to campus for our second annual intergenerational celebration of Earth Day! Last year, the Foundation launched this new tradition to build on VHRC's partnerships with local schools,

and on April 21 residents and students once again joined forces to beautify our grounds.

The students arrived by bus from The Potomac School, a K-12 college preparatory private school located just three miles from our campus. About 36 middle and high school students were quickly dispatched in six works groups to one of our building entrances. They were paired with VHRC residents who shared their gardening wisdom while working alongside the students, digging, raking and planting pots and flower beds. In an hour, the work was

done and everyone assembled at one side of the Willow Oak building near Kirby Road. At that point, about 14 5th and 6th graders from Chesterbrook Elementary School's Eco Club walked over to join the Potomac students, teachers, residents and staff who had gathered for a tree planting ceremony.





Following remarks by CEO Rob Roe, two 12-foot spruce trees, selected by Nova Arborist, were then placed in holes that had been pre-dug by our landscapers, Alpha & Omega Solutions. After the students helped shovel soil around the roots of the trees, the Office of Philanthropy & Engagement treated the students and

volunteers to boxed lunches, cookies and lemonade.

The Earth Day service project was truly a joint effort. Senior Director of Property
Management Denese Arnold, as well as residents Susan
Cheatham and Carl Schone, chair of the resident Operations
Committee, worked together to create a work plan, choose the plantings and recruit resident volunteers. "I want to send a



special thank you to all who planned and executed our second Earth Day celebration," said Carl, who was pleased to see the scope of the event evolving. "The addition of Chesterbrook Elementary School expanded our outreach to a near neighbor community, and it is always a pleasure to meet the students from the Potomac School."



The feeling was mutual. Said Potomac's Director of Service Learning, Joy Webster, "Our students had such a wonderful time gardening with and getting to know your residents. We have really enjoyed being a part of the tree planting as well, as it truly does feel like a lovely, lasting connection between our communities." We couldn't agree more! For us, Earth Day at VHRC has become a great way to celebrate both our gorgeous green space and our community connections in McLean!

McLean Eagle Scout Builds Planters Funded by Foundation

Continuing our long tradition of supporting local scouts, VHRC hosted Amrit Singh from McLean Boy Scout Troop 128 by providing a site for his Eagle Scout service project. On April 11, Amrit and a group of fellow scouts assembled three midsized raised planters with wheels and locks for the courtyard of



Arleigh Burke Pavilion. The project, which took the boys more than four hours to complete, included assembling the planters and filling each with soil so that ABP's Gardening Club could use them for planting fruits and vegetables. As the scouts worked, ABP residents stopped by to watch their progress and enjoy the sunny afternoon.

The Foundation has a history of partnering with Boy Scouts in our area and



funding their Eagle Scout projects on our campus. Some of these projects include the benches, trellis and tables built for the Sports Park fire pit area, the staining of the Willow Oak fence, and a meditation garden created near the putting green. In coordination with resident Jack Hannon, who has

been involved with Troop 128 for more than 40 years, Life Enrichment & Special Events Manager Mirna Fuentes worked with Amrit to bring his vision to life at ABP. Amrit, a junior at Fairfax County's Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology, is pleased with the results. At NMCGRF, we appreciate our ties with McLean's scouting youth, and look forward to continuing those partnerships in the future!

The Gift of a State-of-the-Art Video Conferencing System

Thanks to a generous gift to the Innovation & Enhancement Fund from resident Rooney Peck, the Foundation was able to provide Vinson Hall with new video equipment in the Penthouse Conference Room. This month, the new state-of-the-art videoconferencing system was installed, which includes a 75-inch television and sound bar, a hidden computer, a wireless keyboard, and a



camera that will track participants in the room during Zoom calls.

"The new system in the Conference Room will give resident committees the ability to have meetings with off-site participants and will also allow clubs to make professional presentations," explained IT Committee chair Pete Linn. Thank you, Rooney, for this generous gift to our community!

NMCGRF Toasts Oldest Residents

It was our pleasure to support one of our



favorite annual events: VHRC's birthday celebration for our oldest residents, those who will turn 95 or older this year. The Office of Philanthropy & Engagement created the invitations that went out to 41 members of the community for the April 11 event, which was organized by Life

Enrichment & Special Events Manager Mirna Fuentes. After welcome remarks by CEO Rob Roe, Chaplain Scott Harrison spoke next, putting the lives of the honorees – eight of whom will be 100 years or older – in historical perspective. He noted the presidents who were in office when they were born (as early as Woodrow Wilson), the prices of everyday items at the time (19 cents per gallon for gasoline), and the events they lived through (the Great Depression, WW2, the Korean Conflict, the assassination of John F. Kennedy, the Civil Rights era, Woodstock and Watergate, to name a few). He then introduced each honoree in attendance, and each received a long-stemmed red rose donated by the Philanthropy & Engagement team.

Then Scott led everyone in singing the birthday song and raising a glass to toast the honorees. The oldest VHRC resident in attendance, Jane Peak, who will turn 105 this year, cut the cake, which had been decorated with "4,013 Remarkable Years" – the total of all honorees' ages combined. Happy birthday to all 41 of our remarkable residents from the Foundation!
