Foundation Bids Goodbye to Our Wounded Warrior and Friend

The Foundation hosted a bittersweet event on May 12 to bid farewell to Kayla Saska, a beloved participant in NMCGRF's Warrior Transition program, which provides a Vinson Hall apartment to sailors who are recovering from injuries or illness. More than 50 residents and staff showed up at the Penthouse Lounge to wish Kayla well as she prepares to transition out of the military and leave Vinson Hall after a year and a half.





Kayla's story is well known to most of her friends at Vinson Hall. At age 18, she thought she had her life all planned out when she joined the Navy and became a radar technician in 2017. "I loved my job! I was ready to do the full 20 years in the Navy," she said. But while serving on board a destroyer, she had two unfortunate accidents. When she and another sailor were carrying a 100-lb box of supply parts down a steep ladder, he lost his grip and the box hit Kayla, knocking her down and injuring her knees and head. A month later, a second shipboard fall re-injured her knees and back.

In early 2024, Kayla moved in to Vinson Hall, after seven surgeries at Walter Reed in two years. She was in a wheelchair with knee braces, but that didn't keep her down. After getting involved in adaptive athletics, Kayla competed in the Warrior Games and Invictus Games – chalking up gold medal wins for Wheelchair Basketball, Rugby, Shotput and Discus. She was also named the Navy's 2024 Wounded Warrior of the Year.

With her ready smile and buoyant nature, Kayla, now 27, instantly won the hearts of Vinson Hall residents. Family is incredibly important to the Arizona native, and family is what she has found at Vinson Hall. "I love it here – it's like I have a hundred grandparents!" And because of their encouragement and guidance, Kayla's post-Navy plans now include college. She was recently accepted to the University of Missouri and will attend next year on a full

At her farewell party, Senior Director of Philanthropy & Engagement Michelle Crone made opening remarks and presented Kayla with NMCGRF-branded swag – a gift to help her settle in to college life. Kayla took the mic to thank the Foundation and the residents for their gift of community and friendship. Sherm Eagan, Vinson Hall Residents' Association President and friend, thanked Kayla for her friendship on behalf of all residents.



After remarks and a group photo, residents took turns saying goodbye to Kayla, shaking hands and giving hugs. Vinson Hall's other Wounded Warrior, Kwadwo Asare, also attended with his two children. Thank you, Kayla, for adding so much to our lives at Vinson Hall. We will miss you, and we wish you all the best!

The additional tabletop frames added to the show's success, according to Emmy Simmons, an artist and member of the Visual Arts Committee. "In past shows, lack of an adequate number of tabletop easels and frames limited the quality of presentations," she said. The Foundation's funding to expand

the art display this year "added to the look of the show and the pleasure that our Vinson Hall community takes in viewing the artwork."

Maureen Kammerer, an artist and one of the organizers of the event, expressed a similar view. "I was really impressed with the quality and variety of the work being produced by Vinson Hall artists. NMCGRF Brings Flowers To Campus for Memorial Day

In honor of Memorial Day, our friends from Memorial Day Flowers Foundation stopped by on May 25 to deliver a plethora of gorgeous flowers to Vinson Hall residents in gratitude for their service to our nation. Every year, the Memorial Day Flowers Foundation – an organization that works with private, public and corporate sponsors to donate flowers in honor of veterans and civil servants nationwide – brings hundreds of thousands of flowers to the graves at Arlington National Cemetery, while setting

aside buckets of flowers to bring to VHRC residents.

This is the fifth time our campus has received this Memorial Day floral gift from this organization, a partnership that the Foundation established during the centennial celebration of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery in 2021. The flowers, which come from growers in Colorado, Ecuador and California, were distributed to the common areas of Arleigh Burke Pavilion and The Sylvestery, and to the Vinson Hall Front Desk area, where residents were invited to come pick them up. It has long been our goal to set up a historic archive for our community, by organizing and digitally scanning newsletters, newspaper clips, photos and documents, all of which have

been sitting mostly forgotten in boxes in a closet. This project was right up Harper's alley.

Thanks to Harper's help every weekday in May, all 56 years of Vinson Hall's original newsletters have now been digitally scanned and organized. This is a terrific start on building this historic archive for Vinson Hall. Thank you, Harper, and best of luck at Vanderbilt!
