

## Posters in the European Parliament – United in Research How to write an Abstract

Thank you for your interest in participating in the exhibition “Posters in the European Parliament – United in Research”.

This event invites Bachelor’s degree students from all over Europe and of all academic disciplines to present their research at the European Parliament in Brussels on November 10, 2026. The event is part of the *Posters in Brussels* Erasmus+ project and connects student research with European policymakers and the wider public.

The exhibition aims to highlight the diversity and societal relevance of student research across Europe. The audience includes Members of the European Parliament (MEPs), parliamentary staff, representatives of European institutions, students, and members of the public.

### Your abstract should

- state your specific research topic or research question,
- explain how your project was designed and conducted,
- describe the methodology used,
- and summarize the key findings.
- It should also explain why your research is relevant for European-level decision-making and for society in general.

### The following questions may help you structure your abstract:

- What is your research topic or question, and what motivated you to pursue it? What knowledge gap or challenge does it address?
- What are your key findings and conclusions?
- Why are your results significant for policymakers and the public?
- What are the next steps or future implications of your research?

**Formal Requirements:** A Maximum of 250 words can be submitted. References and bibliographic citations are not required in the abstract.

**Title:** Choose a clear and engaging title that attracts a broad audience beyond your field. The title may be formulated as a concise statement or a question.

**Language:** The language of the event is English. All abstracts and posters must be submitted and presented in English.
