
A Message from the President

FPCC Library/Information Technology & Community Learning Center Highlights

Fort Peck Community College has spent the past three decades investing and enhancing its academic and vocational offerings. The board members and administrators continue to recognize the need for expansion of the college's physical facilities and student amenities to attract and accommodate more students from a larger geographic region. This forward thinking secured funding from Title III (\$300,000), U.S. Dept of HUD (\$800,000), and an FPCC Match (\$200,000) for a total project cost of \$1,300,000 for phase one of the Library/IT center. FPCC held a traditional ground breaking ceremony on June 22, 2011 and construction began in July. Architects, contractors and local construction workers are involved in the construction. The first phase will begin with an open veranda that will welcome students and visitors to the 6,000 sq. ft. library with private study carrels, wireless network, digital resources and hard copy books for entertainment and study. A large community classroom will accommodate students, faculty, staff and community members with digital resources, computer technology and a quality learning space for study and remedial education. This phase of construction has been designed to add on the IT Center and Tribal Archives. It is projected in the year 2013 that the Auditorium will be added on to complete the overall facility.

FPCC Faculty Housing Highlights

As a part of the college expansion, FPCC found they needed a recruitment tool to entice future faculty and staff to become a part of our FPCC family. The Board of Directors decided to go after funding to build faculty housing. The end result was a single family unit complete with three bedrooms, two baths, full basement, a double car garage, fenced in yard and patio, and complete landscaping. The second unit is a single family town house duplex. These are two bedroom/two bath units, complete with a full basement, double car garage, fenced in yard and patio and complete landscaping. Funding sources for this project came from the U.S. Dept. of HUD (\$800,000), FPCC-EC match (\$9,180) for a total project cost of \$809,180. Architects, contractors, and the students of the building trades division completed this project in June 2011. The units were ready for occupancy in the fall of 2011. FPCC regards these facilities as a meaningful faculty and staff recruitment incentive provided to NE Montana.



FPCC Co-Ed Dormitory Project Highlights

With a growing number of students wishing to attend Fort Peck Community College it was decided by the FPCC Board of Directors to build co-ed student housing to meet those needs. Funding for the project came from U.S. Department of HUD (\$600,000), USDA-RD (\$200,000) and an FPCC Match for (\$87,195) for a total project cost of (\$887,195). Architects, various local contractors, and specialty contractors were used in the planning and construction; and under the direction of the building trade's instructor, FPCC students were able to get some real world experience under their belts and satisfaction of a job well done. The project was completed in June 2010 and occupancy began that fall. The dormitory has 10 double occupancy rooms and a single room for the R. A. This facility is safe, secure, accessible, and affordable. Complete with state of the art technology, a kitchen and commons area, on-site laundering facilities, handicap accessibility, and within close proximity to the main campus; it is an attractive addition to our growing campus. Fort Peck Community College believes that a strong and healthy learning environment will provide the cornerstone for success.
