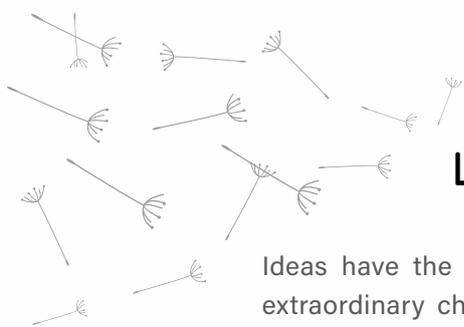

EdelGive's story is not defined by a single idea, but by thousands of ideas that work together, in harmony, to drive our success.

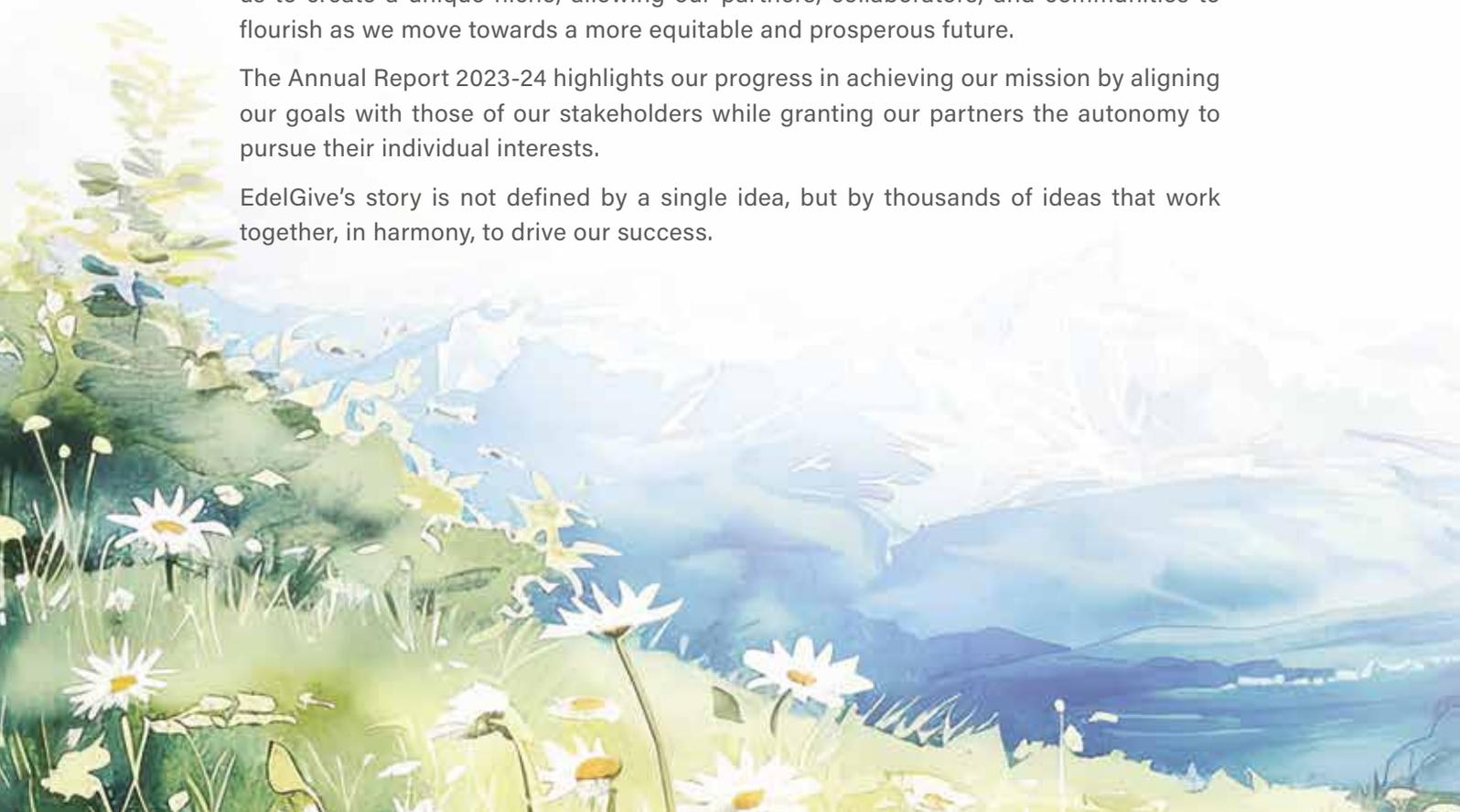
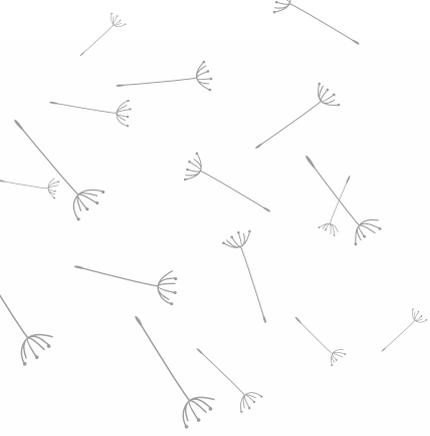


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Executive Chairperson's Letter

Let a hundred flowers bloom, let a hundred schools of thought contend, said Mao in 1956. This slogan was intended to foster the proliferation of intellectual thought, a blooming of diverse viewpoints in the field of science and the arts but soon unleashed a harsh campaign against critics and intellectuals.

Its thought, however, has endured in our collective imagination as May a Thousand

Flowers Bloom - as a metaphor for the celebration of diversity, the encouragement of ideas, creativity and innovation, embodying the belief that human progress, foundationally, needs the flourishing of multiple perspectives and approaches, an environment where diverse thoughts and ideas are nurtured and allowed to thrive.

There is a cautionary truth about Annapurna IV, the fourth

highest peak in the Himalayas that stands 7,500 metres tall today.

Geologist Jerome Lave's research suggests that around 1190, an enormous landslide slashed perhaps 500 metres from its height, one of the biggest landslides ever recorded. The displaced rock would have apparently buried the entirety of Manhattan to about the height of the Empire



State building. Unlike business where big is beautiful and the mantra Too Big To Fail is heard all the time, nature has a way of rightsizing itself.

Along with the right size, Nature also believes in Diversity. There is no “winner takes all” here. Indeed, Charles Darwin believed that

“it is not the strongest of the species that survives, nor the most intelligent, but the one most responsive to change”.

Responsiveness to change means adaptation and adaptation is not possible without resilience.

I believe that the role of philanthropy is to let a thousand flowers bloom – ideas, approaches, organisations. In recent times, funders have been very scale focused. We are all aware of the outsized challenges we face today and want to see all citizens have equal access to opportunity and move out of the cycle of marginalisation and poverty. Finding answers to population-scale problems have meant working with governments and state actors to bring about systems change. Civil society organisations have refined their programmes to enable unit-sized delivery of services so that they

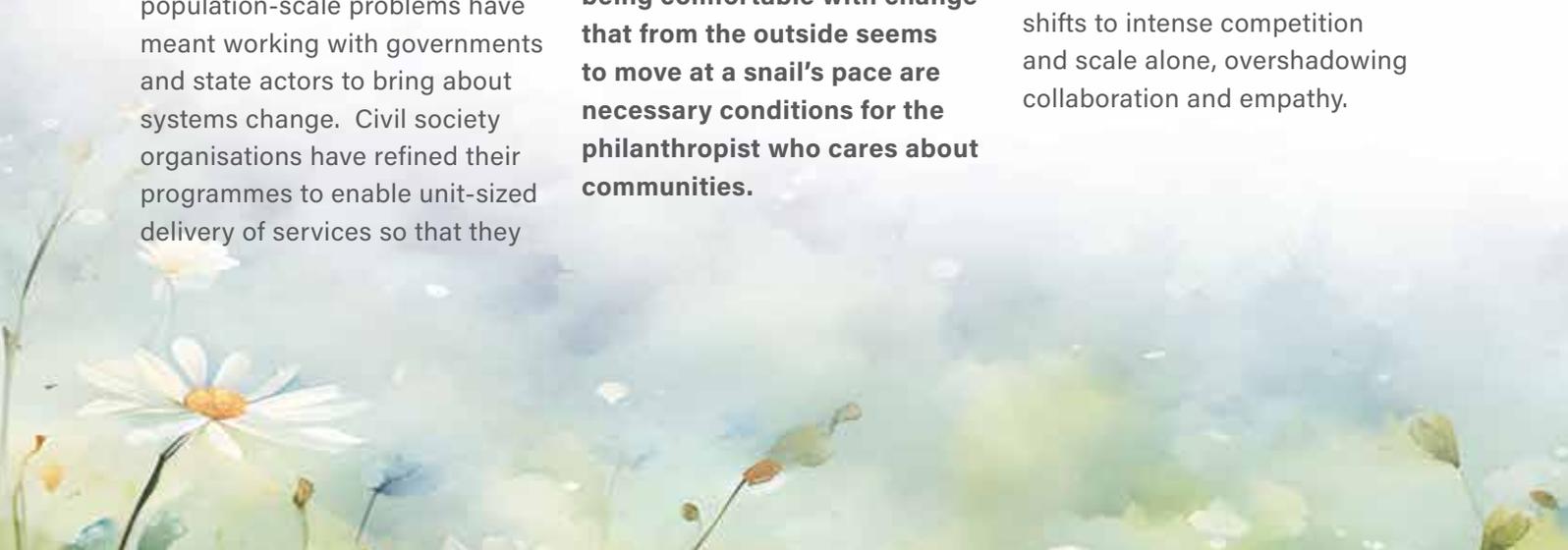
can expand their reach. Besides, as private philanthropy has grown substantially and provided large grants, organisations that have successfully evolved to deliver impact at scale have been the beneficiaries of such largesse, perversely and inadvertently reducing the space and funding for grassroots CSOs.

We need balance therefore – large CSOs should rightfully own the systems change space. Large funders should back institution building. Grassroots CSOs on the other hand, work best with communities and drive sustainable, long-term change – being placed in and of communities, they enjoy a level of trust that is enviable. When it comes to norms and mindsets, grassroots CSOs have a long history and experience of using approaches and practices that almost invisibly and insidiously change behaviors and beliefs.

Nurturing these organisations requires patience and time. Investing in their capacity as much as their programmes, caring for their well-being and being comfortable with change that from the outside seems to move at a snail’s pace are necessary conditions for the philanthropist who cares about communities.

Darwin’s Survival of the Fittest has captured our imagination a century and a few decades later that competition, not collaboration seems the only way for progress. What is increasingly clear however, is that the problems of the planet can only be solved through individuals, communities, institutions and governments working together. In fact, we are now able to witness many examples of intricate collaborative systems within and between species that help them evolve and thrive. Similarly, we need to relentlessly pursue collaboration to save our planet and ourselves. Besides, constant competition in our daily lives and the workplace is harming our mental health and wellbeing. We will not progress as a race unless compassion and altruism drive our behaviors.

What if philanthropy approached our world like gardeners tending to a vast, diverse garden? As humans, we have the potential to nurture groundbreaking ideas that could lead us to a better future. Yet, often, our focus shifts to intense competition and scale alone, overshadowing collaboration and empathy.



Imagine a garden where plants are scrambling for sunlight and water, each one struggling to outgrow the others. This is what our competitive world can feel like—where the drive to be the best can overshadow the beauty of collective growth. To move from merely surviving to truly thriving, we need to shift our mindset. Let's envision a garden where every plant is given space to grow and contribute. This is how we should approach our ideas and innovations—by creating environments where everyone has the opportunity to thrive.

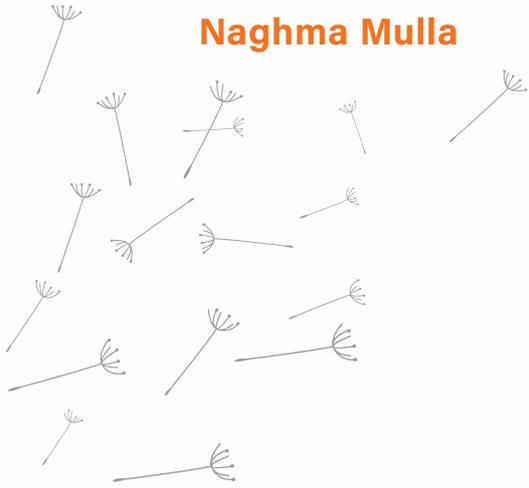

CEO's Letter

"But the Emperor is naked!"

The young boy had yelled, and the crowd had burst out laughing. Everyone could see he had no clothes on. The Emperor was supposedly wearing clothes so fine, they were invisible. But to the crowd, he simply looked naked. Perplexed, but fearful, they aligned to the requirement and gave the emperor what he was seeking... acknowledgement, applause and cheer.

The Mighty Emperor heard the child and turned red with fury and then shame. This is when we readers are informed that he learnt his lesson, and everyone lived happily ever after.

But that's not what happened...

In reality, the Emperor continued the parade gloriously unclothed in spite of the laughing crowds. Taking a cue from him, his ministers began clapping for him again and kept repeating

how wonderful he was looking. The crowds stopped laughing and confused, slowly resumed clapping.

The Emperor announced that everyone should be wearing invisible clothes. He asked for an impact report of the advantages of invisible clothes as against clothes that one could see. The need to build capacity of those who could not see invisible clothes was recognised and a systems-change approach was developed to manufacturing invisible clothes. Small tailoring shops would be disallowed and factories for large scale production of invisible clothes would be set up.

Very soon, more people started wearing invisible clothes because they were meeting Sustainable Development Goals.

The Emperor was declared as the beacon of sustainability in an unsustainable world. The little boy, who as a child had yelled out a visible truth, was

now an adult, in charge of the Ministry of Invisible Clothes.

And everyone lived happily ever after...

Emperors are forces of power, resource and authority. Their self-image gets reinforced everyday by empires designed around their wishes. It is after all an ecosystem where everyone is aiming for collective and individual success aimed to satisfy the Emperor. Exceptional things must happen to disrupt proceedings of the Court.

On the other end of this spectrum of power stands the humble gardener who has control on effort but not on the result of his efforts. Every element in a garden does what it needs to do and cooperates with other participants. Even then, exceptional things must happen to make it work.



If ever they should believe they are Gods of the gardens, nature will find a way to remind gardeners of their true role. It is not ordinary to have a thousand flowers bloom.

When I had entered the development sector to join a young EdelGive, with not much exposure beyond my little world, I was ill prepared for what I saw.

The extent of marginalisation in the world, the number of biases that further distance us from the poorest, weakest, most deprived people was a shock to my senses. Problems are large, inter-generational, and deeply rooted in society. Which meant any system needed to serve multiple complexities. Hence, any system that offered one solution for the masses was flawed or incomplete.

We learnt about and of the system the hard way, with a small corpus, a young team, but with an army of community based organisations (CBOs) and their leaders who became our friends, philosophers and guides. They taught us, and we listened.

EdelGive became a foundation informed by doers, and GROW became the systems platform that brought them together.

GROW is a grant fund that has 100 portfolio CBOs, all small and mid-sized operating across India in some of the most deprived places. It brought them together to build organisational strength so they could focus on the missions each one of them had. I was trying to explain this powerful idea to a well-meaning funder who responded...

“Are there even 100 GOOD NGOs in this country? If you find them, share some names with me. I personally think there is a dearth of good work in India. People don’t think big here, just keep going after small problems. We need systems change work, not these tiny efforts.”

This is not the first and won’t be the last time this has been said. Usually, it comes from a sense of frustration that things don’t change fast enough.

We were putting funds, systems, expertise in the right place but our approach may not necessarily be addressing the need, because needs were relative to people and contexts. We are not solving anything; we are cooking Birbal ki khichdi.

Miffed by Akbar’s refusal to acknowledge his error in a particular case, Birbal sent a message to the Court that he will not attend till he finished cooking khichdi. After two days of his non-attendance, Akbar went to see Birbal. Birbal had put all the ingredients in a cooking pot and was cooking khichdi on a flame which was lit five feet below the pot. Akbar was shocked. It was obvious no khichdi would ever cook on a flame that didn’t do its job.

Akbar, unlike the naked Emperor, was quick to acknowledge his mistake and learn his lesson. We, however, continue to put our chosen ingredients in the pot with a flame that is too weak to cook anything of consequence.

With this reality, how could EdelGive with its small grants believe that our support could change anything or impact any lives? We chose to be gardeners. And in that choice we learnt how difficult it was to relinquish control while working harder than an Emperor.

Philanthropists can be gardeners. Their patient capital, empathetic support can go a long way in the relief that disenfranchised and marginalised people can receive.



The question to ask is, are we the gardeners we need to be?

Almost everyone in the philanthropic sector is now working on systems change which is a great thing. However, we have no common understanding of what the system means in development. And in our attempt to simplify it, we cannot make it the Emperor's invisible clothes of our sector.

The “system” is not a monolith especially in the development sector. Ideally, it should allow for multiple ideas to flourish, where social innovation thrives. Social evils take generations to be eradicated, so we believe there is something wrong with the role CBOs are playing in the solution.

There is a belief that systems change will be done by us- the resource holders, the philanthropists, the intermediaries, experts and consultants and that large scale problems need large scale solutions.

Scaled solutions can come from local empowerment to solve problems, from nurturing social innovations. We need large scale structures that fuel local solutions.

Social innovation is at the heart of development work which can then be accelerated by long term thinking, government participation and community interests. **And then a thousand flowers WILL bloom.**

If we truly care, we need to start paying for robust systems and pay for good ideas to be tried, pay for failed attempts so that they become institutionally geared to do better. Like the gardener who toils and ensures the land is nurtured to have a thousand flowers bloom, our efforts must address the resource needs for a sector in dire needs of resources. Our support can be the flame that ignites the system to start working for its purpose.

We can of course be Emperors of our domains, wearing invisible clothes and continue to parade ourselves and our chosen ideas. There will always be our loyal crowd and court jesters giving us the validation we seek.

We can have reports that confirm our practices are the best and celebrate our intelligence to the cheerleaders. There will always be an audience for that too.

Acknowledgement, applause and cheer from a complacent ecosystem is available if that is what we seek. Honesty is not as prevalent as one believes.

However, there will come a day when one innocent voice will yell out at us...

“But he is naked!”

For the sake of everything good in the world, I hope that does happen.

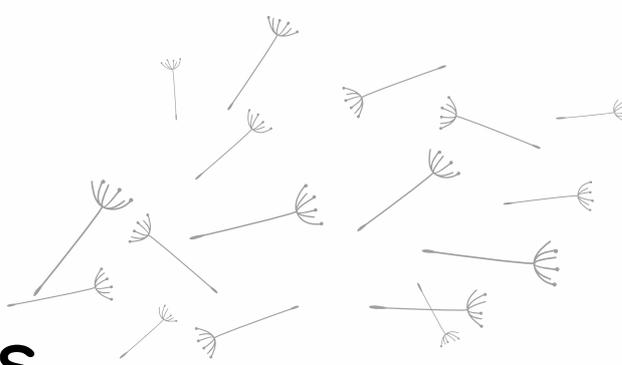

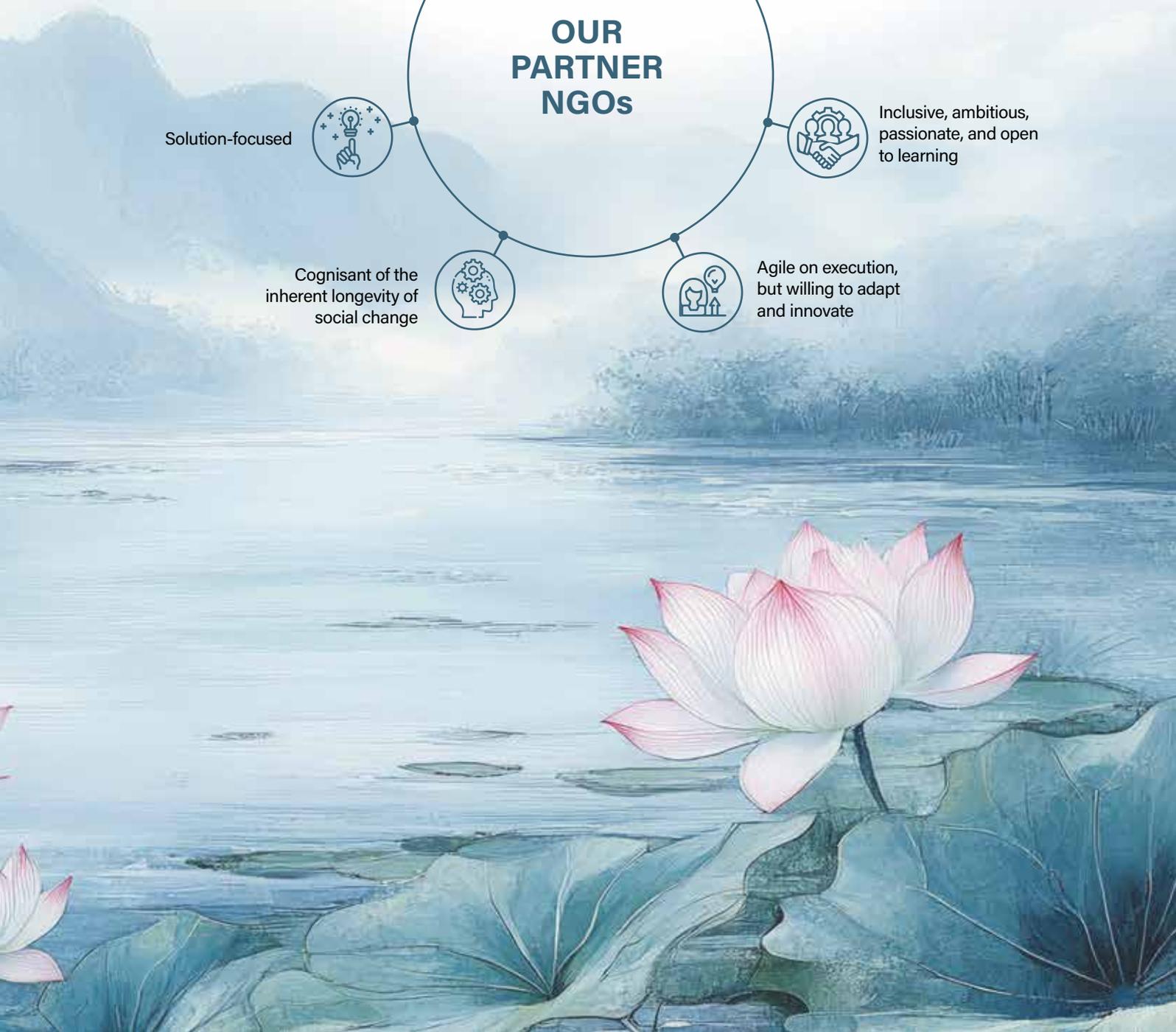


Investments

Coalition for Women Empowerment

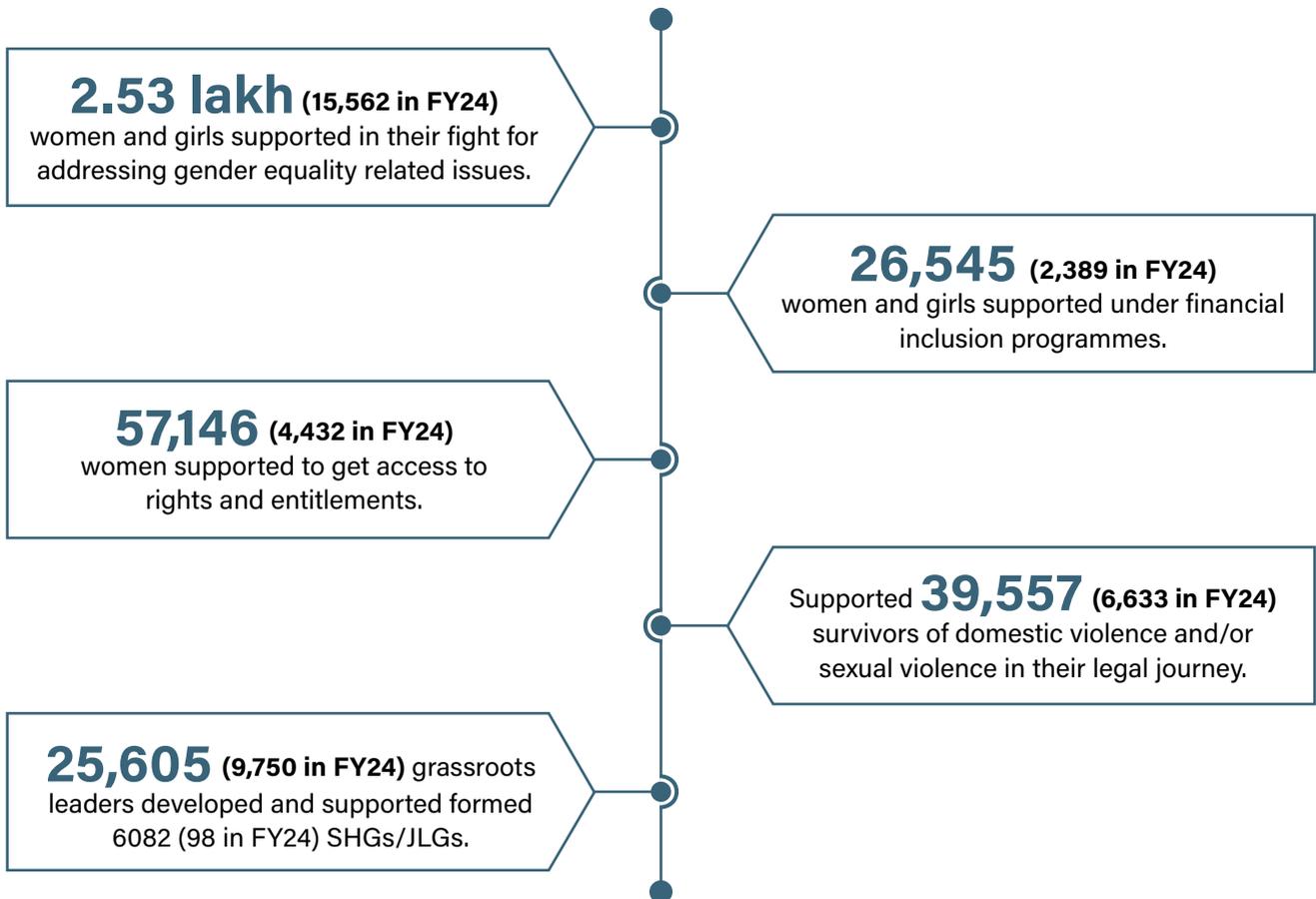

Case Study:

A VICTORY FOR NAINA BEN AND WOMEN'S FEDERATIONS

Born into a conservative community with defined traditional and societal norms for women, Naina Ben is a shining beacon of change. She dreamt of changing the lives of women in her village, but perhaps even Naina Ben herself was unaware of the extent of her future success. Witnessing and being subject to restricted mobility, limited access to education, and a lack of economic opportunities for women in her village left Naina Ben determined to challenge the status quo. She was unwavering in her decision to transform her life and the lives of the women in her village.

Naina Ben reached out to Utthan's team members when they started working in her village, Naldhari. She has since been an active and invaluable part of Utthan. Inspired by the experiences of the members of successful women's federations established in other areas, Naina Ben found her purpose. To better understand the village and women's needs, she started assisting the team with WASH training and awareness programs

and attending meetings with the villagers. Naina Ben continued her home visits to follow up on the construction and use of toilets, wash areas, and soak pits.

Now, Naina Ben was ready to start realising her ultimate goal: to form and maintain a women's federation in her village. Undeterred by the initial resistance, Naina Ben was steadfast. The federation continues to provide a supportive

environment for its members to share their experiences and address issues faced by them.

Naina Ben's journey from a determined individual to the leader of the women's federation is an inspiration for Naldhari and surrounding villages. One hopes that her journey will encourage others to form similar federations and break free of traditional norms and societal pressures.

Collaborators for Transforming Education

In 2016, the Collaborators for Transforming Education was formed when EdelGive partnered with the Department of School Education and Sports (DSES). The goal was to revolutionise education through this public-private partnership, aiming to empower students and improve learning. Initially focusing on four districts, their efforts quickly expanded to seven districts in Maharashtra, thanks to the support of multiple funders and three nonprofit organizations.

CTE is implemented in three phases:

Phase I



School Transformation Programme

The primary focus was to test and demonstrate innovative result-oriented processes at the school, cluster, and community levels to improve learning outcomes.

Phase II



District Transformation Programme

Initiated in July 2018 with the objective of the programme is to improve learning outcomes at the cluster, district, and state levels through capacity building for teachers, improving classroom interactions, and establishing relations between various government forums, such as the Shikshan Parishad (SP), School Management Committee (SMC) and the Gram Sabha.

Phase III



State Transformation Programme

Initiated in July 2023 with the objective to implement systemic reforms across the state of Maharashtra that will significantly increase learning outcomes within the education system.

Case Study:

EDUCATION GRAM SABHA ENSURES IMPROVEMENT IN SCHOOL INFRASTRUCTURE - CTE

The progress of a child in a school is heavily reliant on a teacher's competence and effectiveness. While teachers play a vital role in the child's education and growth, community and parental support is also crucial. The support from parents and the community at large fosters a positive environment for the overall development of children.



Building the confidence of both teachers and students.

And one such exemplary teacher is Ms. Kumbhar from the Adulpeth Zila Parishad school in the Adul cluster of Satara district, Maharashtra. Ms. Kumbhar joined her school six years back and teaches first- and second-grade students. The school had a well-maintained building with about 40 students. But apart from that, the school was lacking in other areas. The school did not have clean drinking water, a compound wall or a separate washroom for boys and girls.

The school was a part of the intervention plan in the District Transformation Phase (DTP). As the best practices were applied to the school, a School Management Committee (SMC) was formed

and started regular meetings. The members convened to identify strategies to fulfil the school's and its students' basic requirements. The Gram Panchayat came forward with funds to build a compound wall around the school building, procure a computer, projector, and printer for the daily needs of the school. In addition, SMC members put in time and effort to fulfil other necessities, like, levelling the playground, provision for digital classrooms, availability of safe drinking water and construction of separate washrooms. Within five years, the school infrastructure had improved beyond recognition, providing a secure and pleasant environment for students and teachers alike.

Furthermore, an Education Gram Sabha was organized which aided the SMC to put forward their concerns and requirements to the Gram Panchayat and secure the required funding.

However, infrastructural improvements must be accompanied by quality education. To achieve this, monthly Shikshan Parishads (SP) were regularised. Shikshan Parishad is a platform for teachers to share their concerns and experiences and support each other. This platform is an indispensable part of capacity building for teachers and for creating a learning plan for students. CTE members are working towards regularising the SPs and improving their quality. The

teachers attend the SPs, discuss ideas for effective classroom practices and conduct outcome-based learning activities for their students.

SPs also enabled teachers to create learning plans for each child based on their existing learning level. The teacher's commitment accompanied by regular parent-teacher meetings, helped the confidence level of the teachers and students. The quality of education improved, and this was visible in the improved learning outcomes of the students. The

number of children enrolled in the school also increased to about 60 students.

Despite all improvements, engagement from parents, who work as daily wage labourers, is still a challenge. But the path is paved for reforms and quality education for all children. The Adulpeth Zila Parishad school is an outstanding example of streamlining processes and including community and parents to transform the school and improve the learning capabilities of students across grades.

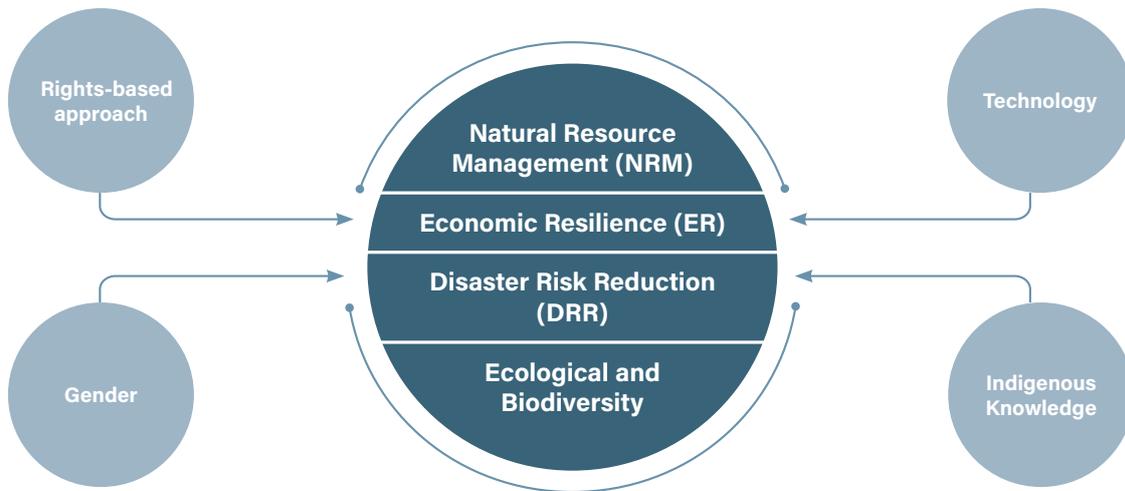
COMMUNITY RESILIENCE AND CLIMATE ACTION (CRCA)



EdelGive Foundation recognises that climate change is an interconnected issue, influencing varied sectors and disproportionately affecting those who have minimal contribution to climate crisis. We aim to transform climate change from a "tragedy of the commons" into a catalyst for positive action.

We work with organisations to mobilise resources, coordinate interventions, and build community action, focusing on community-based, inclusive, and nature-respecting approaches. By engaging diverse stakeholders, we aim for both ecosystem-wide and local impact.

In alignment with our priorities, we have identified four strategic areas which are influenced by cross-cutting themes of gender, rights-based approach, technological integration, and tapping into indigenous knowledge of the communities.



Natural Resource Management: We promote sustainable agriculture and water management through initiatives like water structures, solar irrigation, and lake rejuvenation to address water scarcity and ensure food security.

Economic Resilience: We enhance economic resilience in vulnerable communities by

supporting livelihood projects, skill development, and women-led Farmer Producer Organisations.

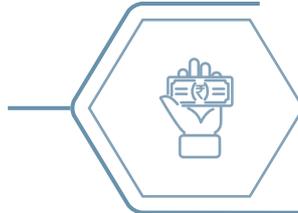
Ecological and Biodiversity Conservation: We support ecosystem conservation by rejuvenating lakes and protecting indigenous seeds, aiming for long-term environmental sustainability and community resilience.

Climate Smart-Agriculture (CSA): Our portfolio organisations enhance farmer resilience and productivity by promoting climate-smart practices, including resilient crops and sustainable irrigation, in alignment with government policies and collaboration with local departments.

Outreach and Impact

In FY24, EdelGive has supported **11 projects** of **9 NGO partners**, working with the most vulnerable communities across **9 states** in India. Over the years, CRCA initiative has achieved significant impact:

Average 49% (FY24) enhancement in annual income of farmers.



Brought under irrigation over 3,419 (427 in FY24) hectares of land, for enhanced agriculture yield.



Supported (construction or repairs) 1,911 (348 in FY24) watershed structures for water conservation.



Strengthened 8 Farmer Producer Companies (FPCs).



Funded ₹ 767 crores (₹ 446 crores in FY24) towards Sustainable Livelihood Programmes, over the past 7 years (2017-2024).



Trained 2,52,221 families (69,051 in FY24) on sustainable agriculture practices.

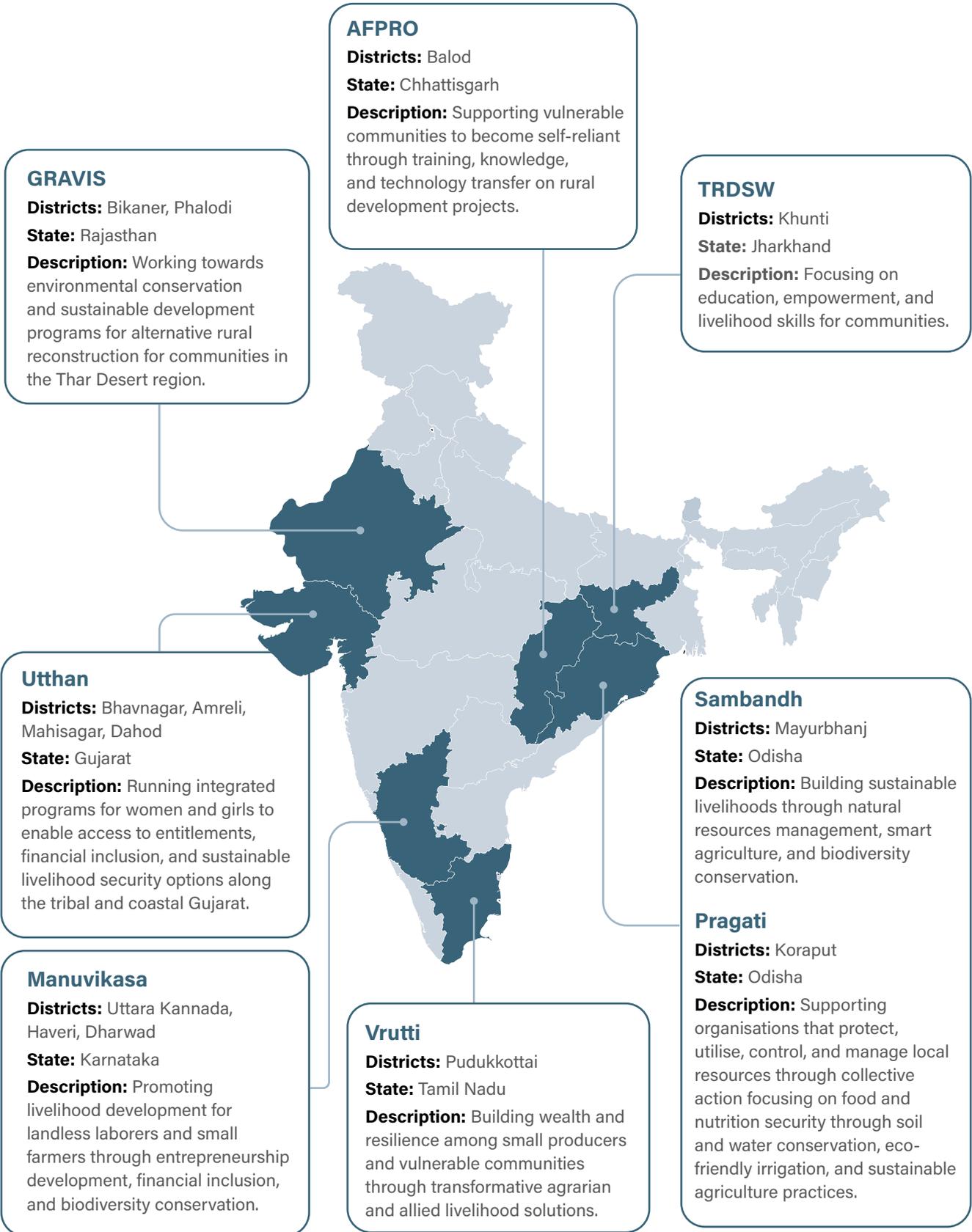

Case Study:**EMPOWERING TRIBAL WOMEN:
KAMALA BHATRA'S JOURNEY
TO SELF-RELIANCE THROUGH
AGRICULTURE - PRAGATI**

Kamala Bhatra is a tribal woman from the Makaput village in Chitra Gram Panchayat in the Kotpad block. She lives with her husband and three children. The family depends solely on paddy cultivation during the Kharif season. However, the income of INR 30,000 generated from agriculture is not enough to sustain the family. During every agricultural season, Kamala had to take a loan to procure raw materials such as seeds, fertilizers, pesticides etc. Although Kamala and her husband wanted to grow vegetables, they lacked a source of irrigation and the funds.

Kamala came to know of Pragati's work in the block and her life took a positive turn. After meeting the team, Kamala became a member of a Farmer Producer Group and started attending meetings to learn more about best agricultural practices. She received training on half-acre model farms and organic farming. With Pragati's support, Kamala managed to build a well for irrigating her piece of land. She availed of a loan from Pragati to purchase and install a solar pump.

The loan came with easy repayment after the cultivation of crops. Additionally, she also received INR 5,000 to buy saplings for the half-acre vegetable model farm.

Kamala started cultivating vegetables such as beans, cauliflower, onions etc. as per seasonal demand in the market. There was no additional expense to irrigate the farm and Kamala had obtained knowledge on preparing and using organic

manure through trainings conducted by Pragati. Selling vegetables in the local market earns Kamala a net profit of INR 8,000 to 10,000 per month. Kamala opened a bank account and saved a minimum of INR 1,000 each month. With initial intervention and support from Pragati, Kamala has become independent and self-reliant and no longer needs loans to invest in her farm.

The GROW Fund

The GROW (Grassroots Resilience Ownership and Wellness) Fund is EdelGive's flagship initiative, designed to bring together leaders from the social sector to support a group of 100 NGOs in their pursuit of organisational sustainability and growth. The GROW Fund collaborative aimed is to shift the philanthropic landscape toward grant-making with strategic emphasis on building capability and resilience of the nonprofits as well as amplifying their programmatic impact.

GROW was created in response to the challenges faced by NGOs, particularly those that were on the front-line, providing critical support to communities devastated by the pandemic. This initiative aimed to engage a diverse range of stakeholders—including high-net-worth individuals (HNIs), philanthropists, corporate social responsibility (CSR) programs, and consultants—to drive meaningful change within the non-profit sector.

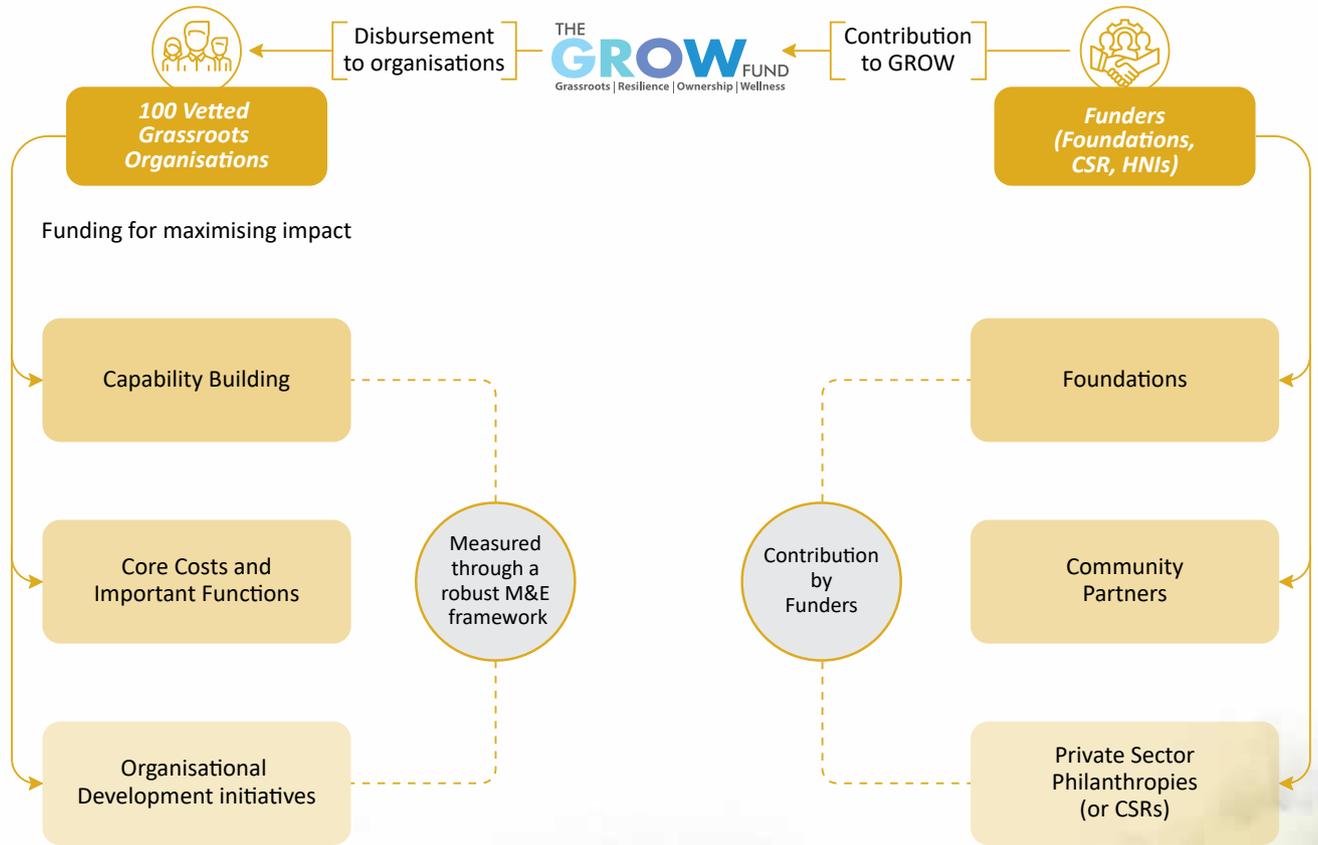

Capacity Building

Over the two years of the GROW Programme, organisations were given the opportunity to conduct training sessions based on skill mapping, prioritising individuals with leadership traits, often consulting external experts to identify and develop suitable roles for these individuals. These activities aimed to develop and strengthen leadership capacity, improve organisational performance, and align with the organisation's vision and mission.

Organisations focused on providing training sessions to develop technical skills, improve communication strategies, and facilitate the integration of technology solutions into their operations. These sessions addressed specific technological gaps, increased awareness among employees, and enabled efficient utilisation of digital tools and platforms. Feedback from employees was collected to identify specific training needs, and appropriate training interventions were implemented to address these gaps.



Organisational Development

Under Organisational development, NGOs focused on technological implementation, fundraising, and strategy. For technological implementation, organisations started implementing software solutions and digital dashboards to track programmatic operations and manage data more efficiently.

Organisations made it a priority to stay updated with emerging fundraising trends and practices to explore new channels for funding. This included researching and adopting innovative fundraising strategies to enhance credibility, transparency, and donor retention. Organisations onboarded dedicated fundraising personnel with the right skill set and knowledge of the sector who planned and executed fundraising efforts. Together they designed plans,

established robust structures, and streamlined fundraising operations to ensure efficient and effective fundraising activities across traditional, retail and digital channels.

A voluntary component of the GROW Fund was designed to equip 25 organisations with customised quarterly discussions, and track mechanisms to see the growth in their OD journeys.

The outcome was encouraging, with over 11% organisations integrating the learnings into their work, post phase 1. This rose to 24% in phase 2 and further 38% in phase 3.



Organisational Diagnostic Endline Study:

The GROW Organisational Diagnostics Baseline and Endline Study was a comprehensive evaluation designed to assess the organisational capacity of the GROW Fund's organisations. This report delved into the outcomes of the assessment, aiming to illuminate the programme's impact on improving organisational performance and agility towards higher maturity levels.

The results showed a significant increase in average organisational capacity scores from the Baseline (73.4%) to the Endline (85.7%), indicating an overall improvement.

Communications emerged as the domain with maximum movement across the clusters and with substantial average score movements.

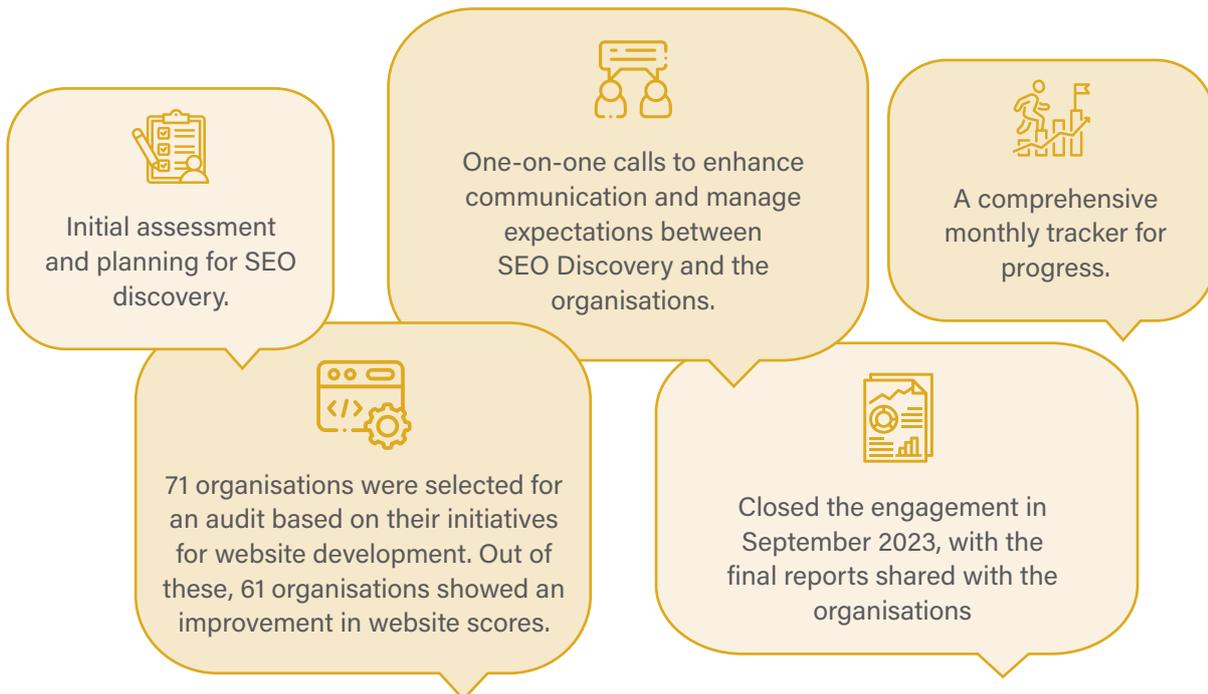
To conclude, the GROW Organisational Diagnostics study provided valuable insights and emphasised the importance of effective communication strategies, robust fundraising initiatives, and strategic partnerships in enhancing organisational maturity and performance.

Key aspects of the programme:

Website Development and Audit

The GROW Fund supported and oriented organisations to develop or revisit their websites to serve as both an active and accessible source of information and an effective marketing tool. A website audit was conducted to understand the organisation's needs to plan for the digital strategy and to offer customised digital capacity building throughout the program.

This resulted in:



Learning Resources

A Learning Management System called "The HUB" was developed for the NGOs to access the resources to support their development and encourage the adoption of capacity building solutions. The HUB was launched in December 2022 with content

resources curated from Common Capacity Building sessions and supplementary learning resources. Additional content from subject matter experts and agencies for domains such as Fundraising and Communications, nurturing a second line of leadership is in progress.

Governance



All organisations received grants in four tranches post a rigorous financial compliance process.



These meetings were attended by various agencies funding and community partners and aimed at fostering collaborative thinking.



A Joint Analysis Group (JAG) spearheaded the budget utilisation analysis for the 2 years of the GROW fund and found 91% utilisation to date. Below is an overview:

To ensure a strong mechanism for accountability, transparency, and equal participation in the GROW fund, multiple forums such as the GROW Funders Committee, the Operating Committee, and Working Groups were institutionalised to review and direct the progress of GROW.



Organisations used the budget by investing in team-building workshops, retreats, and technology adoption as well as focusing on Personnel salaries, communications, fund raising and leadership development.



Various organisations have had the opportunity to plan a 10-year strategy and revise their mission and vision.

Avanti Fellows is proud to be one of the 100 changemakers of the Grow Fund. This, being a non-programmatic fund, has greatly helped us over the past two years (FY23 & FY24) in building the core functions of Fundraising, Communications and Human Resources. Besides building the core functions, the fund has helped support the overall operations by holding capacity-building sessions for key functions.

The organisational development initiatives through external consultants in the first year of the grant helped in refining Avanti's vision, mission, and value system. The consultants worked with the core leadership team members, to further create a roadmap for Avanti's impact work. All of the organisational development activities led to the development of the leadership capacity of the core team and the refinement of our ideas on scale, impact,

strategy and organizational culture.

The Fundraising and Communications function at the start of the grant comprised only a one-person team.

The grant helped onboard a Partnership & donor management specialist and a Communications specialist, both of whom have greatly contributed to the fund growth and visibility of our work over the past two years.

In addition to supporting the Communications specialist, the grant also helped develop communications infrastructure with a computer system, video camera, tripod and other essential equipment for the Communications specialist. The partnership and donor management specialist has helped increase our funding by over 6 Crores since the start of the grant. Six new CSR donors have been onboarded

over the past two years with the support of the Partnership and Donor management. 100% Donor reporting deliverables are being fulfilled and continued engagement is maintained with four existing and six new donors. The communications specialist has developed and implemented the annual communications plan & calendar, each year. The communications activities over the past two years of the grant have helped increase Avanti's outreach to complement the fundraising initiatives. The social media following and engagement on LinkedIn have increased to a following of 15,000 people, to date. There are 10-15 social media posts every month which are posted across platforms, which has increased the engagement on our posts. The organisation's website has been developed and is up to date with our programs, impact and partnerships. New initiatives like the annual newsletter, Student impact summary booklet to highlight the student results and placements in top engineering and medicine colleges, an organisation video highlighting the work and impact of Avanti Fellows in the secondary education space working with 6 large public school systems across 20 states and 6 UTs have also been implemented by the

Communications specialist. The fundraising and Communications department has grown to be a 4-member team by the end of the Grow Fund grant period and has matured & strengthened to help the organisation create a greater impact in upcoming years.

The funding support for the Human resource manager has helped in the development of organisational policies, recruitment framework, performance metrics, and activities related to personnel development. The organisational policies that have been updated with the help of the HR manager are Travel Policy, Child Protection Policy, POSH Policy and Asset management guidelines, and the new policies that have been developed with the help of the HR manager are: Safeguarding policy, Diversity & Inclusion policy and Whistleblower Policy. The development of performance metrics has helped better tracking of the KRA and KPIs and has contributed to the enhancement of organisational productivity. The recruitment framework has helped in managing the hiring requirements and attrition rates, better. Overall, the Grow Fund has greatly helped in streamlining the Fundraising, Communications and Human resource function and added value to the organisation

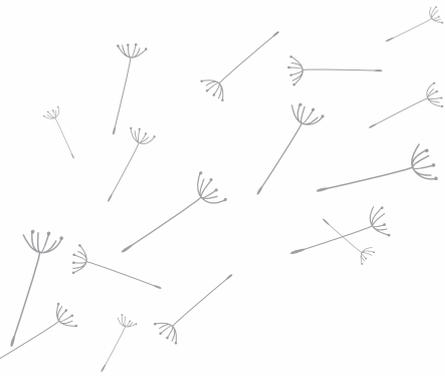

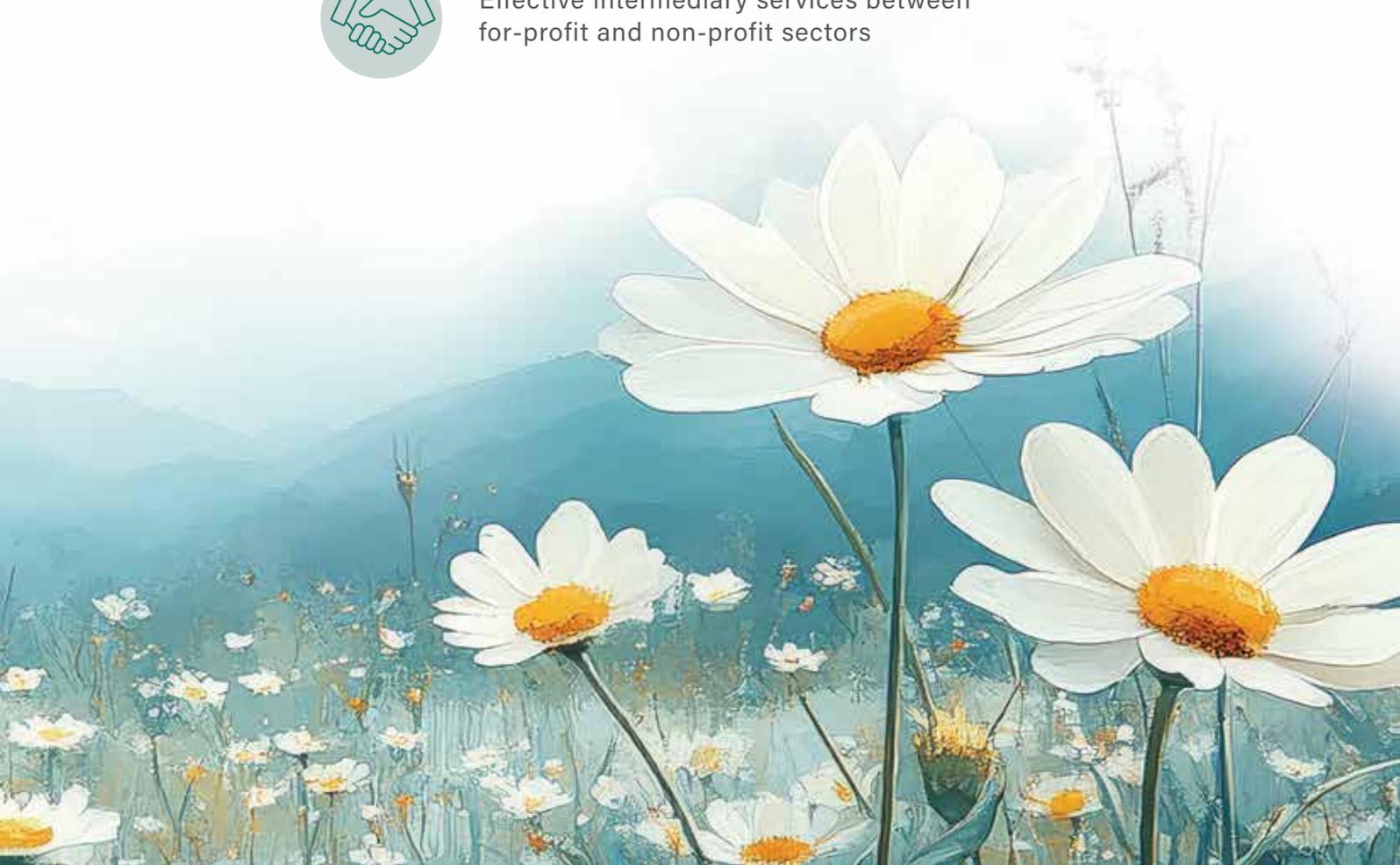

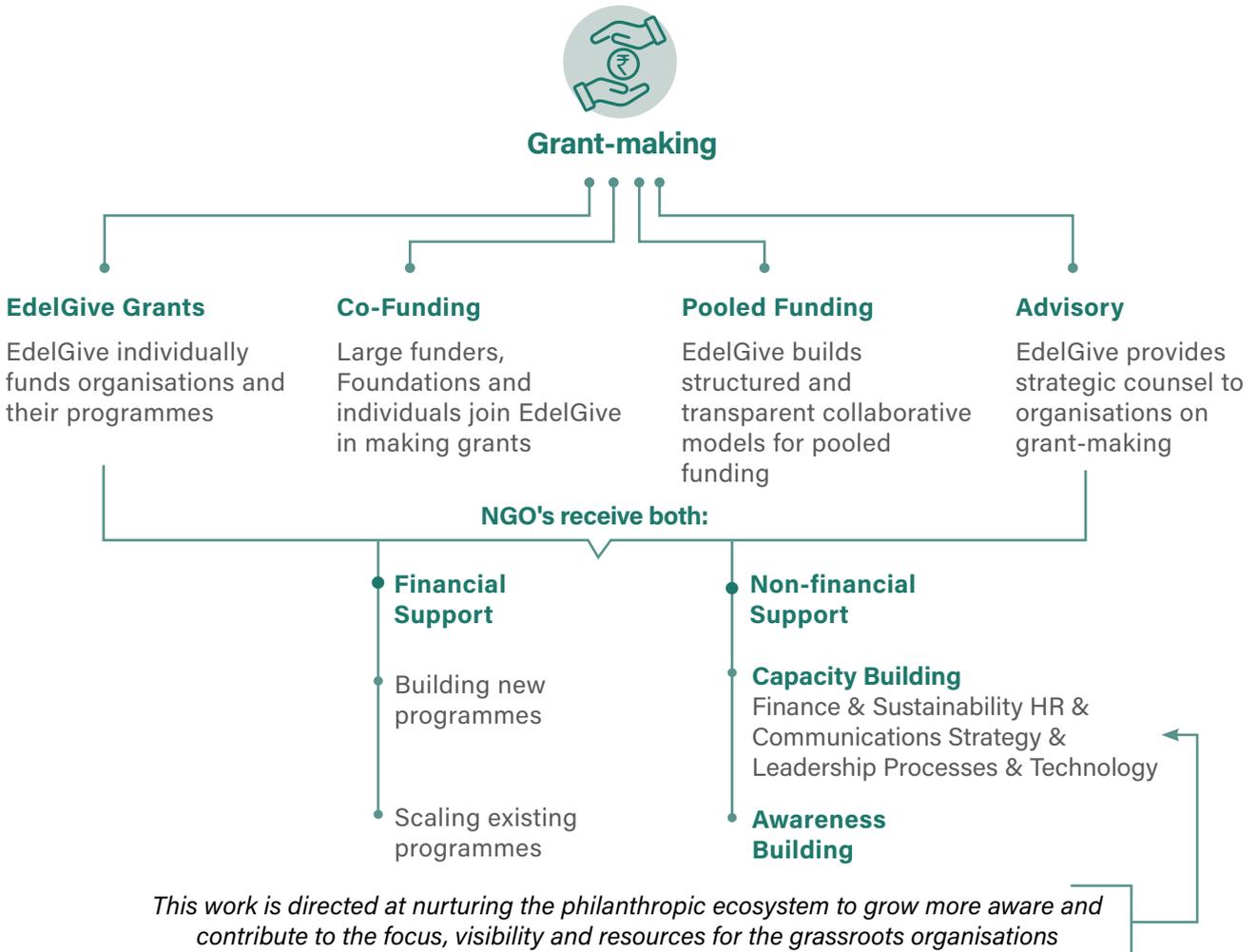

Collaborators for Transforming Education



In 2016, EdelGive initiated the Collaborators for Transforming Education (CTE) program to bolster the Government of Maharashtra's Quality Education Program. The objective was to address various challenges impeding the quality of learning among students by implementing systemic reforms. The intervention aims to scale up from 4 districts to all 36 districts in Maharashtra. CTE is collectively funded Tata Trusts, Sita Devi Malhotra Trust, Great Eastern Shipping, Dalyan Foundation, HT Parekh Foundation, Credit Suisse, Douglas B Marshall Jr. Foundation and Soujanya Colors. The NGO partners are Gyan Prakash Foundation (GPF), Kaivalya Education Foundation (KEF), and Quality Education Support Trust (QUEST).

Since 2016, the Collaborators have positively impacted over one million children, gaining the trust of government stakeholders and becoming a highly esteemed partner. Their success has earned them recognition and invitations to share best practices with organisations like UNICEF and The World Bank.

Coalition for Women Empowerment



The Coalition for Women Empowerment (CWE) was initiated by EdelGive in 2019, bringing together funding and grassroots organisations as stakeholders united by common mission to facilitate social and economic empowerment of women and girls in India. CWE focuses on addressing gender-based violence, enabling grassroots level leadership, access to legal justice, rights and entitlements and employment and entrepreneurship assistance.

The CWE has received support from Chintu Gudiya Foundation, Ford Foundation, Packard Foundation and Forbes Marshall.

India Climate Collaborative



The India Climate Collaborative (ICC) is a pioneering initiative dedicated to unlocking philanthropic capital, pinpointing key climate priorities, and building an ecosystem for effective funding in India. By harnessing collective action, the ICC seeks to strengthen the Indian climate philanthropy landscape, promoting equitable and impactful climate solutions.

ICC's key highlights from the period include:

- **Earth Exponential**

The ICC launched this platform to connect corporate philanthropy with high-impact climate projects, securing over INR 8 Crore for five projects and onboarding 20 more across areas like Nature, Cities, Farms, Jobs, and Resilience.

- **India Clean Air Connect Portal**

This digital hub promotes air quality improvement across India by providing ecosystem information, event updates, and funding opportunities.

- **Harit Bharat Fund**

This fund supports local restoration champions with capital, mentorship, and progress tracking. It's backed by six partners including WRI India and Sangam Ventures.

- **Indian Agrivoltaics Alliance**

The Indian Agrivoltaics Alliance platform aims to integrate low-carbon energy with agricultural improvements, offering technical assistance and fostering dialogue among stakeholders.

- **COP 28**

At this event, the ICC co-hosted discussions on the G20's Green Development Pact, philanthropy's role in equitable transitions, and financing for energy transitions, while facilitating dialogues among global south communities.

- **Maharashtra Climate Consortium**

The ICC, with partners like WRI and WOTR, is helping the Government of Maharashtra achieve its low-carbon goals, focusing on clean energy, transport, agriculture, and sustainable cities.

Migrants Resilience Collaborative



EdelGive remained a key strategic partner in the Migrants Resilience Collaborative (MRC), an initiative led by Jan Sahas, benefiting approximately 6.1 million households this year. The MRC facilitated 4.2 million social security benefits and recovered INR 6 crore in compensation and lost wages for workers.

Key highlights include:

- **Community Engagement**

Jan Sahas established a robust network, training 1,593 volunteers and 275 organizations, and organizing 2,109 One Nation One Ration Card (ONORC) camps in Maharashtra, Chhattisgarh, and Madhya Pradesh to ensure migrant workers' access to rations.

- **Mission BOCW**

This initiative, active in seven states including Delhi NCR and Karnataka, partners with 11 developers and an investor, operating across over 90 sites to support workers' welfare.

- **Government Engagement**

In Punjab and Chhattisgarh, the MRC enhanced social protection through collaborations with local and state government agencies, improving the implementation of welfare programs and training field staff.

Pay-What-It-Takes



The PWIT India Initiative was launched to address the issue of chronic underfunding faced by NGOs in India. This underfunding often limits their growth, and ability to achieve impact, thus holding back progress on the pressing social issues in India. The initiative is led by The Bridgespan Group and five anchor partners – A.T.E. Chandra Foundation, Children’s Investment Fund Foundation, Ford Foundation, Omidyar Network India, and EdelGive Foundation

Over the past year, the initiative focused on various outreach efforts:

- **Awareness Generation**

Published over 10 articles, reaching around 1.2 million readers through industry channels like IDR and mainstream media such as Forbes India. Held a session on organisational resilience with the ILSS Fundraising cohort, involving more than 20 organisations. Developed a compendium of PWIT-aligned approaches from 10 to 15 funders and hosted a third learning circle in Delhi with over 7 global foundations, including Packard, Ford, and CIFF.

- **Publications**

Released a Year 3 research paper on PWIT-aligned practices of 14 funders in India, including EdelGive Foundation, and published a directory of approximately 100 intermediaries supporting NGOs in India.

- **Enabling NGOs**

Conducted True Cost computation workshops in Kolkata, a session on financial resilience for the ILSS fundraising cohort, and participated in major industry events like India CSR Summit, Samagam 2023, and AVPN South Asia Summit.

CAMPAIGNS



UdyamStree - national campaign to promote women entrepreneurship

In its endeavour to promote women entrepreneurship as a key driver for women’s economic empowerment in India, EdelGive launched the UdyamStree campaign in 2021.

Some of the key impacts of the campaign include – educating 2800 women on government schemes across 4 districts, of which 2040 women received benefits under relevant schemes and loans with a collective value of more than Rs 26 lakh disbursed. partnership with FICCI to foster women entrepreneurship, and with State Education Department of Maharashtra to sensitise young minds, around entrepreneurship being a viable career option. Under the campaign, EdelGive also engaged with key government institutions and government representatives to amplify the communication and outreach.

The campaign was awarded on several occasions which included the Best Campaign in Not-for-Profit and Association Sector Campaign in the sector awards category at Fulcrum Awards 2022, and Gold Award under the Not-for-profit category at the SABRE South Asia Awards 2022.



Stree-Leads: Women in Leadership

Following the success of UdyamStree campaign to boost women's entrepreneurial spirit, EdelGive's mandate pivoted from women entrepreneurship to women's participation in the workforce. In 2023, EdelGive launched the Stree-Leads campaign to support women in leadership.

To bring together and sustain a network of aspiring and seasoned women leaders on a common platform.

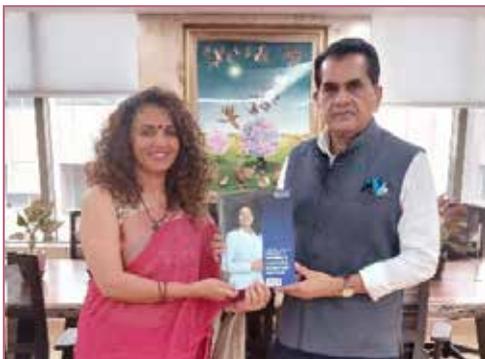


To leverage the insights and experiences of seasoned women leaders and mentors from across sectors to inspire greater female representation in the private sector roles.

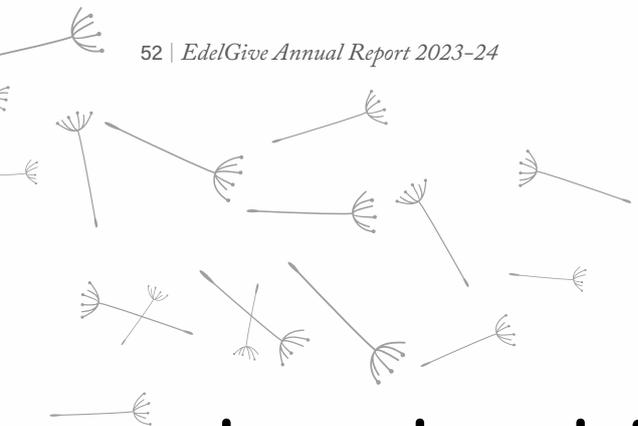
