TOPLINE: CALGARY ELECTION OCTOBER 20, 2025

METHODOLOGY

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These are some of the findings from a study undertaken by Canada Pulse Insights for Rogers CityNews with the sample and data collection experts at <u>Sago</u> from September 30 to October 6, 2025, among a random selection of Canadian adults (n=410 aged 18+) who are members of the Sago online panel located in the city core of Calgary, Alberta. For comparison purposes, a probability sample of this size has an estimated margin of error (which measures sampling variability) of +/- 4.8% 19 times out of 20. The results have been weighted to match the population according to census data which ensures the sample is representative of the adult population in the city core of Calgary. Discrepancies in or between totals when compared to the data tables are due to rounding.

MUNICIPAL POLITICAL PARTIES

[In some recent municipal elections, groups of candidates—including a mayoral candidate and candidates in various wards—have run together as a "municipal political party." These local parties do not use provincial or federal party labels, but they allow voters to elect a team that would govern city hall as a group with shared principles and policies. Alternatively, voters can choose individual candidates for mayor and council without any party affiliation. Which approach do you prefer in municipal elections?

- Elect a mayor and councillors **individually**, based on each candidate's platform, policies, and views: 85%
- Elect a **slate** from a municipal party—led by a mayoral candidate and including councillors—based on shared platform, policies, and views: 15%

Note: 4-point scales have been collapsed/combined to form 2-point scales i.e. very/somewhat and not very/not at all, very good/somewhat good and somewhat bad/very bad, etc.
