## Getting around in Oslo

### 1. Getting into town from the airport and to Hotel Gyldenløve

There are both ordinary and express trains going into town. The express train, [Flytoget](#), leaves every 10 minutes and takes about 20-25 minutes depending on destination. To get to the University or Hotel Gyldenløve, the easiest option is to get off at the station Nationaltheateret and then take any westbound subway (T-bane) one stop to the Majorstua T-bane station.

From Majorstua T-bane station, walk straight down Valkyriegate/Bogstadveien for 5-10 minutes to get to the hotel ([Google Maps](#)). **Please remember that if you check-in after 16:00 on your day of arrival, you will need to pre-pay this night before arrival at the hotel.**

From Majorstua T-bane station, you can take the subway two stops to get to the stop closest to the *Campus Blindern* of the University of Oslo, which is called *Forskningsparken* (see below).

The two restaurants where we will have dinner are located in Majorstua, close to Hotel Gyldenløve (see addresses and links to Google Maps in the program).

### 2. Paying for public transport

Public transport is quite expensive, particularly if you buy your ticket on the train. It is practical to buy a multi-journey ticket called *Reisekort*. This is a plastic card that is “charged” with money where you buy it. It can be used for a number of journeys. It can be bought in most kiosks/7-11’s/convenience stores. When you start a new journey, the card must be validated. There is now also a mobile phone app that takes credit cards. This app is called *RuterBillett* and is available for Android and IOS devices. It requires registration of a credit card, which may or may not work depending on your card.

### 3. How to get to the University campus and the Harriet Holter building

The Department of Sociology and Human Geography is at the University of Oslo main *Campus Blindern*.

**IMPORTANT:** Note that the main campus is a little bit outside the city centre, and **MUST NOT NOT BE CONFUSED** with the older university buildings downtown in Karl Johans gate.

The easiest way of getting to the University Campus by way of public transport is take either

- **trams** no. 17, 18 or 19 to the stop *Universitetet Blindern*.
- **subway** (T-bane) lines no **4 Sognsvann/Storo**, or **5 Ringen/Vestli/Storo** to the stop ***Forskningsparken***. From here you must walk approximately 200m towards the red brick 12-story buildings on the right of the subway line, or take tram one stop to “**Universitetet Blindern**”.


### 4. Finding the Department of Sociology and Human Geography

Once you are at the *Campus Blindern*, you should find the social sciences building complex on the left hand side when entering the campus area from Niels Henrik Abels vei (where the tram tracks runs). The street address of the department is Moltke Moes vei 31.

The Department of Sociology and Human Geography has its offices in *the Harriet Holter building*. This is a four-story building just next to the tower block above (not really visible in the picture). The map below outlines the routes by foot from the tram stop *Universitetet Blindern*, and the metro stops *Forskningsparken* and *Blindern*. The green cross indicates the Harriet Holter building. In the Department of Sociology and Human Geography, most of our program will be in Room HHH-201, just by the elevator in the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor. The pre-meeting will be in Instituttstyrerrommet, which at the end of the corridor (2<sup>nd</sup> floor) on your left hand if you walk up the stairs. Direction to both rooms will be marked with a sign when you arrive.
