### The Impact of Kindness in the Workplace

#### [The Humankindex: Kind Leadership and Innovation, Fast Company \(2021\)](#)

**Summary:** A national study of over 3,000 U.S. employees found that organizations with high “Kindness Quotient” scores were dramatically more innovative and purpose-driven. Employees at kind organizations were 5x more likely to rate their workplace as innovative, 120% more likely to feel purpose, and 89% more likely to generate new ideas.

**Top Finding:** Kindness has a causal relationship with innovation capability and long-term competitive advantage.

#### [Consumers Choose Kind Companies, Baringa \(2023\)](#)

**Summary :** A global survey of 6,028 employed consumers found that 81% of U.S. respondents prefer buying from companies they perceive as kind, and 57% have boycotted brands they view as unkind. Kindness was defined through transparency, fair pay, integrity, and community care.

**Top Finding:** Kindness yields a direct financial advantage, strengthening consumer trust, loyalty, and willingness to pay—especially among younger consumers.

**Summary:** Synthesizing decades of research, HBR shows that daily acts of kindness drive measurable gains in engagement, retention, and productivity. Recognition and supportive behaviors release dopamine, serotonin, and endorphins, chemicals strongly linked with performance and well-being.

**Top Finding:** Kind leadership produces higher productivity and retention, positioning kindness as a cultural performance driver rather than a soft skill.

**Summary:** Pulling from mental health and HR data, this article highlights that kindness reduces loneliness, increases safety, and boosts retention. Importantly, 77% of job seekers prefer companies that explicitly list kindness as a value, and 89% of younger workers rank mental health and kindness as top workplace priorities.

**Top Finding:** Kindness programming improves talent attraction and retention, workplace safety, and organizational productivity.



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#### [The Influence of Kindness on Academics' Identity, Well-Being and Stress, PLOS ONE \(2024\)](#)

**Summary:** In a study of 182 professionals, structural equation modeling revealed that receiving dignity-affirming kindness at work increases well-being, strengthens organizational identification, and substantially reduces stress.

#### [Google's Project Aristotle \(Multi-Year Study\)](#)

**Summary:** Google's analysis of 180+ teams found that psychological safety, not talent, seniority, or workload, is the strongest predictor of high performance. High psychological-safety sales teams exceeded targets by 17%, while low-safety teams underperformed by 19%.

**Top Finding:** Psychological safety, a core expression of kindness in team dynamics, is the number one driver of team effectiveness and innovation.

#### [Everyday Prosociality in the Workplace, UC Riverside / Coca-Cola Iberia Study \(2018\)](#)

**Summary:** A month-long intervention with 88 employees at Coca-Cola Iberia showed powerful ripple effects: receivers of kind acts performed 278% more prosocial behaviors, witnessed 10× more kindness, and experienced strong gains in happiness. Givers reported lasting increases in job satisfaction and reduced depressive symptoms.

**Top Finding:** Kindness spreads through “positive contagion,” generating self-sustaining cycles of improved climate, well-being, and performance across organizations.
