GENTLEMEN:-

With reference to letters addressed under date of July 20, 1921, by the Honorable Acting Governor of Porto Rico to that Honorable Commission and to this office, requesting the annual report of this department for the fiscal year 1920-21, I have the honor to submit herein the following information, which contains a brief narration of the work of the Insular Police effected during the period mentioned.

ORGANIZATION:

The department was formed by the following officers, earning the salaries indicated below:

No changes were made in the organization of the personnel the Insular Police during the fiscal year.



The Chief of Insular Police had the superior command and supervision of the department, serving as his immediate assistants the Adjutant, Chief of Information, Chief of Detectives and all civilian employees or clerks detailed on office work at Police Headquarters.

**EXPENSES:**

The total of moneys appropriated by legislation for the maintenance and operation of the Insular Police during the fiscal year 1920-21 amounted to \$767,767.67. The total expenditures for the year represented \$765,275.27. See exhibit "I".

On January 31st, 1921, when submitting my suggestions to the Honorable Governor for his consideration and recommendations to the Legislative Assembly, I strongly recommended an increase in the salaries of Seventh and Eighth Class District Chiefs, indicating the following amounts as salaries per year:

Seventh-Class District Chiefs at \$1,200 each.

Eighth-Class District Chiefs at 1,150 each.

This requires an additional appropriation of \$3,372.00.

The above recommendation was made due to the small salaries paid to the mentioned officers, who have large families, and, in many instances, much responsibility rests upon their shoulders, and because they, most assuredly, deserve the increase.

I also mentioned the 10% pay for the minor officers and guardsmen doing permanent duty at San Juan, indicating that the sum appropriated for this purpose should be increased to \$14,400.00. Due to the rapid expansion of the city, which brings as result the increase in population and the establishment of new commercial firms, additional wharves, warehouses, and the enormous traffic of vehicles, etc., it has been necessary to increase the police personnel in the city and its suburbs, and occasionally, many temporary transfers are made for service in San Juan district. \$8,745.00, which was the sum appropriated for the fiscal year 1920-21, resulted very insufficient.



The items for Transportation and Rent of Quarters should be also increased. Proprietors are charging more and more each year, and, unless the erection of government buildings is planned and obtained, we will have to pay the prices charged by the owners of private buildings occupied by police stations. The frequent strike movements, numerous accidents, investigations, summons from the courts, etc., cause great expense in the way of transportation. The prosecution of stills owners also require long trips and helps to exhaust the appropriation.

Other increases recommended were for Pay for Reenlistments; Stationery and Printing; Lighting and Water; Telegraph and Telephone and Automobiles and their Supplies.

#### APPOINTMENTS AND SEPARATIONS.

During the fiscal year, 127 guardsmen and 5 third-class detectives were originally appointed and 1 guardsman was reinstated to an equal position; 8 district chiefs, 2 corporals, 103 guardsmen and 6 detectives were honorably discharged and 6 guardsmen and 1 detective died, while 5 guardsmen were dismissed for cause. No special call for recruiting had to be made, with exception of those made in the various districts for enlistment of special guardsmen for temporary duty during the election period. Of those, 1,200 were appointed and served for a period of six days, being discharged immediately after the elections.



### PROMOTIONS AND REENLISTMENTS.

The following members or officers, who were found qualified in accordance with regulations to fulfil the duties of higher grades, were promoted in order to fill vacancies resulting from resignations, etc.

Notwithstanding the above named changes, at the close of the fiscal year there still were 6 guardsmen positions vacant in the force.

### DISCIPLINE OF THE FORCE.

Notwithstanding the increased work bore by all the members of the Insular Police during the fiscal year, due, specially, to enforcement of the new laws, such as prohibition and those forbidding gambling and disorderly-houses, in connection with which, the police has earned much to their credit, the discipline and obedience to rules and regulations were strictly held in force and all cases of misconduct reported were properly and promptly dealt with and offenders were duly punished, either with reprimands in general order, extra duty, fines or dismissal from the organization, in accordance with the nature of the charges and the offense committed.



The fines imposed on members of the Insular Police during the fiscal year represented a total sum of \$613.00, while other disciplinary punishments for minor offenses numbered 122.

#### PROPERTY:

On June 30, 1920, the value of unexpendable property on hand was \$67,705.47. That acquired during the year was valued at \$10,901.07, and property worth \$8,358.93 was dropped from the books, following the instructions of the Auditor of Porto Rico.

#### HORSES.

From the \$8,358.93 worth of property dropped, \$305.00 represented the value of three horses which were killed, for having become affected with contagious disease.

The following statement shows the number of horses owned by this police department on July 1, 1920, those killed during the fiscal year, and the number of horses on hand on June 30, 1921:-

No horses were purchased nor sold during the year.

The horses of the department covered 58,089 miles during the year. With this average of miles, it is clearly demonstrated that police horses had considerable work, notwithstanding the fact that they had rendered service for a good many years.

These animals have been of a very valuable assistance to the police, in connection with the persecution of criminals, investigation and seizure of distilleries throughout the rural sections, attending citations from the courts and for making short trips between neighboring towns, during transfers of officers and prisoners. The increase of the present supply of horses is urgently necessary.



### AUTOMOBILES.

On June 30, 1921, this police department owned nine automobiles, namely; 1 Marmon car, No. 2, one (1) Peerless car, No. 29 and seven (7) Ford touring cars Nos. 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28 and 30.

During the fiscal year, these automobiles traveled 73,155 miles and the cost of their up-keep was \$9,489.31. The Marmon car was at the service of the Insular Police. It was purchased on March 1st, 1920, and from July 1, 1920, to June 30, 1921, covered 12755 miles, at a cost of \$4,099.58, or an average of 24 cents per mile.

Ford cars have been at the service of the police districts of Arecibo, Guayama, Mayaguez, Ponce, and three (3) at San Juan. These cheap vehicles traveled altogether 60,400 miles, the cost of their up-keep for the fiscal year was \$5,389.73, thus bringing an average cost of 8.9 cents per mile. The Peerless Patrol car became worn and was placed out of service by the beginning of the year.

This department is still in need of more automobiles and their increase is therefore recommended. The districts of San Juan, Ponce and Mayaguez should be furnished with a Patrol-car each, of the type of the old Peerless, which had to be condemned. Such large and important districts as Caguas, Juana Diaz, Fajardo, Humacao, Yauco and Vieques, ought to be furnished with a car each. This might be obtained with little expenses to the government, but their use would, no doubt, greatly improve the service in those towns. The use of automobiles represents much efficiency and economy of time and labor. Good horses are difficult to obtain and the majority of the houses rented for police stations, lack of stables and other accommodations for the proper care of these animals.

### BICYCLES.

At the beginning of the fiscal year, we had 66 bicycles, which value was \$2,630.42, plus 4 more which were purchased during the year at a cost of \$270.00, there were 70 of these vehicles available for the service of the department. Bicycles traveled 35,264 miles during the year and their up-keep was economical.



### UNIFORM FUND.

This fund is a no-fiscal year appropriation. Money is facilitated in the manner of a loan from the fiscal year appropriation "Salaries", properly authorized by the Governor and Treasurer of Porto Rico, and the money is destined to pay for purchases of uniforms and its materials, which are sold to members of the force and they pay on the installment plan, by deductions made from their salaries on the monthly pay-rolls.

The total purchases made from this fund during the past year amounted to \$26,514.41, and on June 30, 1921, the value of stock on hand was \$8,952.29.

### RELIEF FUND.

This fund is formed with moneys collected from officers punished with fines and 20% of donatives or rewards awarded to members of the force. It serves to financially assist officers who become wounded and crippled and to donate certain sums to the widows and heirs of deceased policemen and who are left in destitute condition.

In addition to help furnished to disabled officers and their relatives from the Relief Fund, it has also been the practice of the department to raise subscriptions for the succour of such officers or their relatives, to which collections every member assists donating 50 cents each guardman, 75 cents the corporals and sergeants and \$1.00 the district chiefs, in each case. With the passing of a new law for the compensation to retired officers and their families, in the future, policemen and their heirs will be properly attended by the government.

In addition to the above, a special subscription was raised amongst the members of the Insular Police for the erection of a building at the Insular Anti-tuberculous Sanatorium, Rio Piedras, which collection produced the amount of \$1,008.00.

#### OFFICERS CHARGED WITH CRIMES:

Thirty-two complaints were presented before various courts, during the fiscal year, accusing police officers of crimes, as follows; 1 for abuse of confidence, was acquitted; 16 for assault and battery, of which, 6 cases were filed and 10 are still pending final decision of the courts; 4 officers were accused of unlawful search of premises, 1 being acquitted and 3 remained pending by the close of the year; 5 were denounced of having violated article 138 of the penal code, of which cases, 2 were filed and 3 were held pending final action of the court; 1 officer who was charged of violation



of article 238 of the penal code, was acquitted and his case filed; 3 denouncements were presented accusing officers of disturbing the peace, but after careful investigation by the courts, were filed; one policeman was charged of false pretenses, but he was found to be innocent and acquitted, and one denouncement accusing an officer of seduction was filed by the court.

The above stated is enough to prove malicious intent on the part of the persons who preferred charges against these police officers in courts, as in every occasion, the policeman proved that there was no real ground for complaint and that the attitude of the complainant was principally due to grudge and ill-feeling against the officer, who, ordinarily, in a previous epoch, had to deal or intervene with the complainant for some overact on the part of the latter.

Whenever a police officer was viciously denounced, the department assigned money to pay for his defence, although this recourse was scarcely needed, as the judges tried the cases with utmost impartiality. All denouncements and complaints against police officers were always subjected to a thorough investigation by this office, and if found that the accused officer had surpassed his authority and the action of the law, he was also punished for his conduct.

#### ARRESTS:

The following table shows the number of arrests made during the fiscal year 1920-21, separating cases tried from those held pending at the close of the year, convictions and acquittals:

The total number of arrests made during the previous fiscal year was 42,857, which compared with the arrests effected this year or 44,467, show an increase of 1,610 cases.

From total number of arrest made during this year,

740 were felonies and consisted of 253 cases of burglary, 66 cases of grand larceny, 66 of homicide, 42 murders, 56 attempts to kill, 29 cases of cattle stealing, 32 of embezzlement of public funds, and the remainder for rape, seduction, mayhem, perjury, arson and other serious crimes. #### FUGITIVES.

During the period covered by this report, 260 persons escaped from the insular penitentiary, district and municipal jails, reform school, insular insane asylum, boys' charity school, insular courts, U. S. Department of Justice, U. S. Navy and Department of Justice of Cuba. A total of 89 of these fugitives were located and delivered to the corresponding institutions.

From insular penitentiary and camps established along the roads, 26 prisoners escaped and 16 of them were recaptured; 49 fugitives belonged to district and municipal jails, but from these, 31 were re-arrested and turned back to the jails; boys escaped from the Reform School numbered 3 and all were located and returned; persons wanted by the courts and declared fugitives from justice counted 155, from which number 31 were arrested and brot to justice; 1 person wanted by the U. S. Department of Justice could not be located, but one required by the Cuban Authorities, was rounded and sent to proper destination. From the Boys' Charity School evaded 9 boys and 7 were located



and delivered back to the school; 15 enlisted seamen who deserted from the U. S. Navy, are still running at large, and a crazy-man who ran away from the Insane Asylum, is still uncaught.

In addition to the re-capture of the above named persons, the Insular Police identified and detained a good many minors, who had fled away from their homes and were eagerly wanted back by their parents. Most of them belonged to poor parents and had become attracted to the big towns, after hearing about the wealth and the new things that could be enjoyed at those big places.

#### MURDERS AND HOMICIDES.

The number of murders and homicides committed during the fiscal year, 108, if compared with that corresponding to the previous year, 35, shows a high increase of 73 cases of these serious crimes. (See Remarks).

#### PROHIBITION AND THE ILLICIT TRAFFIC OF ALCOHOLIC DRINKS

Violations of the Prohibition Law have kept the Insular Police constantly very busy, hunting illicit stills and the clandestine transportation and sale of booze. Notwithstanding the work carried on previous years to suppress the continuation of the illicit traffic, the fact that persons arrested and denounced for such violations, obtained, in many instances, comparatively very slight punishments, inclined them to repeat the violations and still added more violators to engage in the nefarious traffic.



These circumstances, consequently, required harder work and constant vigilance of the members of the department, and the interest and perseverance of the Insular Police, has given, during the past year, very excellent results.

During this last fiscal year, the police seized 1,206 stills, which number throws an increase of 698 stills over the previous year's figure; and 17,654 quarts of intoxicating liquors also came into the hands of the officers.

Arrests made for possession of illicit stills were 1,026, which compared with 587 made during the previous year, shows increase of 439 arrests; and persons arrested for dealing with booze were 827, or 301 more than during the fiscal year 1919-20.

Stills and liquors were held in the possession of the Insular Police until the proper charges were filed at the courts, the courts turning back the property, after final disposition of the cases. From the 1,026 denouncements for illicit stills, 575 resulted in convictions, 244 persons were acquitted and 207 cases were still held pending by the end of the fiscal year; and cases of illicit traffic of liquor, resulted in 186 sentenced, 79 acquitted and, by the close of the year, 565 cases were held pending by the Federal Court.

Exhibit "H" shows the number of stills and quantity of liquor seized, also number of arrests in connection thereto, at each district, indicating sentences, acquittals and cases pending court decision, respectively.

#### PROSTITUTION:

Prostitution, considered as one of the dangerous evils in Society, is very difficult to eliminate in Porto Rico. Nevertheless, the campaign carried against this bad element during the war years, proved to be very healthful and the number of prostitutes in the island was, generally, decreased. For a couple of years, many prostitutes were kept away of the cities and specially, away from military posts of San Juan and Cayey, but after the peace declaration and the rearrangement of affairs, lawyers entered into their many tricks within the law and since then, the effective segregation of these class of women has seemed impossible.

In my previous annual report, I made some careful recommendations to remedy the evil of prostitution throughout the communities of this island, but with exception of the work performed by the police, which I must state, has been strenuous, beyond discussion, nothing else has been done to restore these women to decent living.

The work effected by the Insular Police is better sketched in Exhibit "G", which shows the 1,600 arrests made in connection with these prostitutes, indicating the various crimes or offenses committed; such as disturbance of the peace, assault and battery, violations of articles 288 and 289 of the penal code, crime against the public health and security, indecent exposures, violations of municipal ordinances and other minor offenses.

#### SUICIDES:

During the fiscal year covered by this report, 150 suicides and 108 attempts to suicide were registered. 110 males and 40 females committed suicide, while 33 males and 75 females attempted it. These numbers include several young boys and girls, whose main cause for suicide was love affairs. A good proportion killed themselves due to bad health, old age and mental derangement, while others committed



the acts due to financial distress and family troubles.

In every case, the police practiced a thorough investigation and communicated facts to the local judge or district fiscal.

On December 20, 1920, and under proper authority, this department sold 2,250 old revolvers, for a firm of the United States, with agreement that said old weapons were to be carried to the States, so that no further use of same would be done in Porto Rico. This sale of old seized weapons produced \$450.00, which money was added to the Insular Police Relief Fund.

#### FIRES:

During the fiscal year 1920-21, there occurred in the island 312 fires, or 50 cases less than those of the previous year. 160 of these fires developed at cane-fields and caused damage and destruction to 1,656-7/16 cuerdas of plantations, total losses being estimated at



about \$100,000. From the various investigations practiced in all cases, the police noticed that 43 of these cane fires had been the work of criminal hands, although in many instances it was impossible to obtain the required evidence to apprehend the criminals. Fifteen (15) persons were arrested and prosecuted in this respect. (See Exhibit "E".)

Fires on various other kinds of property numbered 152, causing but one (1) death, a very young child, who fell from the arms of his mother, during the huge fire occurred at Puerta de Tierra, San Juan, during the early morning of May 1, 1921, and material losses represented more than \$3,000,000, while insurance carried amounted to \$2,101,348.00.

A good average of these other fires appeared to be of incendiary nature. Every case was thoroughly and earnestly investigated and on eight or ten occasions, generally connected with the apparent destruction of commercial establishments, the criminals were delivered to the district fiscals, with considerable evidence. The slow market and sudden decreasing of prices which prevailed during the major part of the year, can be estimated as the real motive which inclined merchants and other property owners to dispose of their business, fearing great losses or total ruin, and many obtained their insurance money in this way.

# ACCIDENTS:

In addition to accidents from fires, during the fiscal year, there occurred throughout the island 1,174 accidents from various causes. This number includes 601 automobile accidents, 142 were of serious nature and the remainder, 659 were slight cases; while 373 resulted from various other causes, such as burns, drowning, explosives, falls, labor, derailments and overturning of railroad and other vehicles, etc.

From serious automobile accidents, 18 men, 3 women, 8 boys and 3 girls resulted killed, and 85 men, 15 women, 36 boys and 12 girls became seriously wounded; slight automobile accidents caused minor physical injury to 342 men, 80 women, 86 boys and 26 girls; and other classes of accidents caused death to 142 persons, consisting of 81 men, 14 women, 29 boys and 18 girls, and resulted physically injured, some in serious condition, 312, or 236 men, 27 women, 41 boys and 8 girls.

The following table shows persons killed or wounded from the various different classes of accidents, indicating ages and sexes:-

In every case, the police practiced a thorough investigation, rendered personal assistance to the wounded and proceeded to the arrest of the drivers, when facts showed that they had violated the law.



In connection with automobile accidents, the police made 362 arrests, as follows; 1 for assault and battery, 18 for homicide, 313 for violations of the automobile law and 30 for violations to article 328 of the penal code; and from other classes of accidents, 14 persons were arrested, to wit; 11 for homicide and 3 for violating article 328 of the penal code.

During the investigation of the majority of the above named cases, it was discovered that the misfortune was due to negligence or foolishness on the part of the persons concerned.

SERVICES RENDERED TO OTHER  
DEPARTMENTS OF THE GOVERNMENT.

During the past fiscal year, the Insular Police rendered services to other government departments and branches thereof, including also the American Red Cross, a private institution working very closely to the War Department and Treasury Departments of the United States.

Not only officials in charge of insular and municipal bureaus, but federal government officials also called on the Insular Police for important work and assistance for the better dispatch of their business. Notwithstanding the great burden of work pending on this department, due to elections, strikes, prohibition and other regular duties of the force, a hearty cooperation was extended to all officials who needed our help and the results were very excellent to the public service and to all persons in charge of the business. During the year, investigations and correspondence of the U. S. Bureau of War Risk Insurance, connected with allotments and allowances for the relatives of the soldiers, were perfectly attended, and many inquiries from lawyers and bureaus in the U. S. were properly investigated and replied. This has expanded our relations with several heads of police departments of the U. S. and several foreign countries from which policy we expect to enlarge our facilities abroad, with mutual advantages for ourselves and those cooperating with us.



The following table gives the names of the various departments, bureaus and institutions of the island, for which these services were rendered, indicating the equivalent numbers of policemen and days engaged and numbers of arrests and denouncements made in connection thereto:

These services to other departments took much part of the time of the Insular Police. The marshals and sub-marshals of both insular and federal courts, delegated much of their duty to the officers of this department, such as locating witnesses and delivering subpoenas for attendance to court, serving warrants for arrests in cases in which police had no intervention, etc.

For work pertaining to the office of the U. S. Marshal, Federal Court, alone, the police traveled 1861-1/2 miles, serving 399 citations and 63 warrants of arrest. New federal laws have augmented the work of that court and in the majority of the cases, witnesses and the accused live out in the country.

#### ELECTIONS:

In the work of arranging for the regular elections celebrated on November 2, 1920, the Insular Police had a great participation; all lines of electors formed at the entrance of registration and voting posts had to be carefully watched and attended by policemen. The registration of electors lasted from March 5th to June 30th, 1920. All-



electors had to be photographed, identified, etc. At the elections, there were altogether more than 1,200 polls, requiring the presence of an equal number of policemen, when we had but 577 guardsmen to attend all services. Besides, regular policemen were more needed at parades, meetings, conventions, etc.

Due to the aforesaid conditions, 1,200 youngmen were called and enlisted on October 30, 1920, to serve as special guardsmen during the period of the elections. The total sum appropriated for elections expenses was \$24,000.00, but this amount was insufficient and expenditures surpassed that money in about \$3,000.00 more.

Strict impartiality and attention to duty was the motto of this police department, during the electoral campaign of 1920. Everything ended satisfactorily and many were the congratulations received from prominent leaders of all parties involved in the affair.

#### STRIKES:

With the high wages which had prevailed during the two previous years, due to increased demand on Porto Rican goods; such as sugar, molasses, coffee and tobacco; the agricultural and manufacturing corporations of the island had paid a good average of their profits to their workers, but had not contemplated plans for reductions, when prices began to fall very suddenly. On the other hand, workers, in their majority, had forgotten to practice economy, as they never imagined that prosperity would so promptly come to its end.

Tobacco plantations and factories had been overloaded and very soon, the Porto Rican American Tobacco Company and other firms dedicated to that business, found it impossible to continue the increased production that had been sustained during the war years. To impair the trouble, it occurred that many boxes and packages containing millions of high-class cigars, were returned from the United States, in bad condition, and no orders were received for some time. This, the firm claimed, forced them to make re-arrangements as to the number of workers to be employed, and such attempt on the part of the Tobacco Company, created great discontent amongst the cigar-makers and tobacco-strippers. The Company, after considering its situation,



shortened the period of labor to five days in the week. At first, this was encountered with great opposition on the part of the affiliated cigar-makers and the women tobacco-strippers employed in the many factories of the company. New arrangements and plans brought a further reduction of the laboring days, then the men and women being offered but four days in the week. This second measure aroused the strike sentiments of the tobacco laborers and they immediately commenced their attempts for abandoning the works of the company and forcing them to employ all the gangs, for the whole laborable periods.

It will be remembered that sugar had reached such high prices as fifteen and eighteen dollars per hundred pounds and, consequently, agricultural laborers had been paid wages of from \$2.00 to \$3.50 per day. But when the sugar market also came down, prices obtained being no higher than seven dollars the hundred weight, the central owners also announced the reduction of wages to \$1.00, \$1.25 and \$1.50. This change, of course, met the disapproval and resistance of the farm workers and those others engaged in factory operations at the sugar-mills.

At the beginning, the situation promised bitter problems and enormous strike movements were expected. But, notwithstanding the system of organization into which the laborers had become affiliated; they lacked of financial resources to fight long strikes, and they also had against their propositions, the lack of sympathy from the other trades and the rest of the population of the various communities. The majority of the people were not interested, as in former epochs, considering that the reductions had their sources abroad. Therefore, although there was noticed much effervescence, the various strike movements resulted easy to control, by the essential employment of good tact and impartial judgment, when called to deal in cases relating thereto.

In addition to the tobacco workers and the agricultural laborers, the employees of the Porto Rico Railway, Light and Power Company, operating the trolley-cars and a small train between San Juan-Santurce, Rio Piedras and Caguas; and the mechanics, engineers,



firemen and other employees of the American Railroad Company, had their personal motives for strikes. These two corporations exploit the main services of railroad transportation available throughout the island, and consequently, the paralización of their traffic also caused serious inconveniences, obstructing the traveling of passengers and the transportation of merchandise, mail and other commodities, from one end of the island to the other. The police obtained its hardest share in these two conflicts also, but firmly stood by its duties, until all things were practically settled again.

Cigar-makers and women tobacco-strippers started strikes on August at Cidra, Juncos and Aguas Buenas; these were small groups, but they initiated the tobacco-strike throughout the interior sections; by October, the cigar-makers at Peñuelas, Bayamón, Cayey, San Lorenzo and Manatí, had seconded the movement; some, occasionally, returning to work for a couple of weeks and then turning back to strike; and on January 20th, those employed at the factories of Utuado, San Juan, Ponce and other towns, joined the strike, making a final declaration or manifest to all their comrades of the whole island.

They claimed with persistence that everyone of the cigar-makers and tobacco-strippers, who formerly worked at the factories of the Company, should be employed and given while time and wages. They were, altogether, about 8,000. The Company closed its factories for about three months, but in April, 1921, refusing to enter any contract or agreement with the affiliated cigar-makers or their leaders, adopted what was called "open shop policy", and also discontinued factories at Ponce, Bayamón, San Lorenzo and other towns, establishing new ones at Arecibo, Caguas, Aguadilla, Sabana Grande and Las Piedras, and with this scheme, succeeded in obtaining the labor required to manufacture the cigars necessary to attend demands. This plan of the Company was welcomed by many of the strikers, who had been exposed to misery and hunger, due to lack of work and money to support themselves and families. The police department, in view of probable collisions between strikers and non-strikers, exercised all measures



and precautions, so as to render proper protection to workers and property, maintaining peace and order at all places.

Very soon after the Tobacco Company placed in force their "open shop policy", many cigar-makers and women pertaining to other small factories and concerns, accepted work at the re-opened and new shops, and by May, 1921, the new gangs were giving excellent results, while the affiliated cigar-makers and tobacco-strippers, who still supported the strike, were losing more and more ground each day. By the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1921, the Tobacco Company had enough workers to sustain their business record.

Although several disturbances of the peace and assaults were registered during this strike situation; including some 40 arrests for minor offenses; the tobacco workers conducted themselves peacefully and in but one case, the history of their strike was spotted. This occurred on April 23, 1921, at Aguadilla, while a new factory was being inaugurated. Three strikers fell on Mr. Emilio Iglesias, foreman entrusted to enlist new workers and form the gangs for the new place, shooting him by the back, from which wounds he died. The aggressors were immediately arrested and placed in the hands of the district fiscal.

The strikes of the agricultural laborers were not so serious as that of the tobacco workers. These commenced striking on November, just when cutting and grinding of cane was begun at the districts of Guayama, Guánica and Arecibo; but the attempts affecting these towns were soon quiet down, laborers voluntarily accepting reasonable reductions in wages; but between January 7th and February 28th, stronger movements arose at Guánica, Guayama, Juana Diaz, Yauco, Maunabo, San Sebastian, Yabucoa, Caguas, Trujillo Alto, Vega Baja, Arecibo, Aguadilla, Juncos, Arroyo and Salinas. Centrals are situated and operated at each of these towns, with exception of Trujillo Alto, which yields its cane for Central Vannina, of Rio Piedras. These strikes involved altogether some 8,098 laborers.



In connection with the movements of the agricultural laborers, those occurred at Guanica, Aguadilla, Yabucoa and Maunabo, deserved special attention and occupied a good number of policemen, to watch near the centrals, patrol along the rural roads bounding cane-fields, giving protection to non-strikers and attending order at the meeting and parades. The strikes started at Guanica on November 26th and renewed on January 7th, lasted until the beginning of February and represented 600 men. That of Yabucoa was declared on January 30th, lasted until February 22nd and included about 400 laborers. The agricultural strike started on February 21st at Aguadilla, also affecting the district of Aguada, and represented 500 peones, ending February 28th. The first movement at Maunabo commenced on January 18th, involving 300 men and lasted until January 27th, but the largest, which was really an attempt, began on February 24th, ending on the 28th, and contained 2,000 laborers.

Very limited was the number of arrests originated in connection with the strikes of the agricultural laborers; being noticed but in three or four occasions; two laborers, strikers, were arrested at San Sebastian, for assault and battery and violation of the labor law, respectively; seven were arrested at Yabucoa, for intimidating non-strikers or violating the labor law; and two more were denounced at Vega Baja, for a similar violation to the labor law. (See also Cane-Fires.)

On April 16, 1921, at 6 p. m., all motormen and conductors of the Trolley-Cars of the Porto Rico Railway, Light & Power Co., at San Juan, Santurce and Rio Piedras, abandoned their work. A series of internal regulations issued by the Company, which compelled the employees to observe strict attention and courteous conduct during the course of their work on the cars, had been considered as a matter of dignity by the latter and they requested of the Company the annulment of said rules, alleging that they had not been consulted and that they were against their dignity.



The Company persisted on its decision and succeeded in continuing the operation of the street-cars, by detailing to their management other permanent employees, including traffic inspectors, clerks, mechanics, etc. They also published an advertisement offering positions as motormen and conductors and hundreds of applications from excellent youngmen were immediately received at the Company's office. The Superintendent selected a good number of these youngmen and taught them the work of the strikers, and each day the number of cars on the track was augmented.

From the day the movement started, wide precautions were taken by the Insular Police to prevent any disturbance and to protect the lives of the persons traveling in the cars, as well as the property of the Trolley Company. On April 15th, three cars were stoned, and the same action on equal number of cars was repeated on the 17th. On April 24th, at Martin Peña place, revolver shots were made at one of the cars, none resulting wounded by bullet. At the same instance, several stones were thrown on the same vehicle, two of the passengers resulting wounded. On April 26th, new shots were made at a trolley-car in Rio Piedras.

As stated above, the trolley-car service was never entirely suspended, and although during the first days of the strike, the people were afraid of becoming injured and prescinded from using said vehicles, they very soon became convinced of the effectiveness of police protection and renewed their custom of traveling by that line. The circumstance that there were also about a hundred jitneys or passenger automobiles doing transportation service between San Juan and Martin Peña, Rio Piedras, offered advantages to the public and spoiled the projects of the strikers. The government had no complaint against the Company, but upon suggestion of the strikers, both parties were called to arbitration, without results. By April 25th, there were eighteen cars doing the traffic and the number was augmented daily. By April 29, 1921, from a total of some 140 strikers, 68 had returned to work, while the rest were not needed.



All attempts for destruction of property and assaulting non-strikers, etc., were carefully and actively investigated and attended to by the police and detective, arresting several persons for disturbance of the peace and violations to articles 444-A and 506 of the Penal Code. By May 10th, the trolley traffic was normal and the strike was considered ended.

Coinciding with the time of the strike of the motormen and conductors of the Porto Rico Railway, Light & Power Company and its personal causes, occurred the strike of the engineers, firemen, brake-men and mechanics, etc., of the American Railroad Company of Porto Rico. These men, numbering about 600 in total, abandoned their works on the trains, shops and stations of the Company, due to a lack of understanding in the dismissal from the service of the Station Agent, Mr. Nenadich, of Aguadilla. They claimed that said employee, a member affiliated to the Mechanics' Lodge of Porto Rico, has been dismissed without a strong cause and requested his immediate reinstatement. This the company refused to do and therefore the strike.

Railroad traffic was suspended from April 20th to the 25th, when, after a conference between both parties and with the intervention of the Senate of Porto Rico, it was agreed to renew service and the trains and shops, etc., were placed in operation, again.

On May 10th, a second strike was declared by the same employees of the American Railroad Company and on the 13th of that month railroad traffic was again paralyzed, due to abandonment of work by the machinists, firemen, mechanics, etc. This time, they asked that two mechanics, who had refused to join them on the previous movement, be retired from the shops, "Talleres", at Santurce. The Company would not accede to the request, expressing that they considered those two mechanics as efficient and loyal employees and needed them at Santurce Shops. It was said that, then, the strikers proposed that the two non-strikers, which they called "strike-breakers", be transferred to other places, but that this was also refused.



This department, immediately and in view of the circumstances, issued instructions to all district chiefs of the towns situated along the railroad line, warning them about the possible dangers and indicating all possible vigilance on stations, bridges, tunnels, switches, etc. The strikers, although appeared peaceful and quiet, they congregated at their lodge, situated very near the Santurce Shops, where they discussed their plans and they boasted of having enough money to support their families, while fighting out in behalf of their proposition.

On May 19th, after all preparations necessary for the case, the first train was run from San Juan to Ponce, carrying only the mail and employees required for the operation of the machine and collection and delivery of the bags. This train went custodied by police officers armed with shotguns and no overact was attempted. From that date on, a train was run from San Juan to Ponce, every two days, suspending the night trains. On the 25th, the special train between San Juan and Arecibo was also placed in service, and by the 28th, passengers started once more to buy their railroad tickets.

The termination of cane transportation and grinding at the sugar-centrals, left a good number of machinists, firemen, switchmen and other railroad and shop employees without employment. The American Railroad Company, imitating the the procedure of the Trolley Company, made a call in the newspapers, offering such works to the unemployed and immediately applications were rushed into the manager's office. Experts were placed on the work of driving the engines, while others were detailed as fire-men, brake-men, station agents, telephone operators, etc., and a good force was thus obtained and others were offered and accepted training. This system was expected to bring serious troubles with the strikers, who, would undoubtedly realize the approaching of their failure, and would surely employ all their means to cause terror and incline the new workmen to leave their positions. Therefore, extra measures were taken and placed in force by the police department, from which, at San Juan alone, more than twenty officers were absolutely destined to watch along the track, culverts, bridges, buildings, shops, etc.; while from two to four



police, armed with shotguns, accompanied the trains from one terminal to the other.

Several derailments have since then occurred, but none seemed to be the result of damages caused by the strikers. Occasionally, dynamite cartridges have been found and picked up from certain points of the railroad track; one forming something like a bomb had been placed near the station and office building at San Juan, but did no action; another, looking like a rocket, was thrown during the night into the yard of the Shops, at Santurce, this causing a little explosion and injuring one laborer, who slept at one of the cars. In two or three instances, pieces of iron have been placed across the rails, with the object of causing a derailment or overturning, but no misfortune resulted, as the danger was noticed on time and the obstacles were removed. At Miramar, Santurce, a machinist and strike-breaker, assaulted a non-striker working at the shops of the Company, stabbing him with a knife. Medical assistance was given to the wounded and the aggressor was arrested and placed at the disposition of the district fiscal. These acts were all properly investigated by the police and several arrests were made for assault and battery, two; for attempt to kill, one; and for violation of article 506 of the Penal Code, one.

By the end of the fiscal year, many of the strikers had suffered much from lack of resources, and some ten of them, including station agents, two machinists, mechanics and firemen, had abandoned the strike and returned to work with the company. The running of trains was, by then, more or less normal, all trips being made on schedule, with exception of the Ponce-San Juan night train.



DETECTIVE BUREAU.

The personnel of this Bureau consists of the following officers:-

The salary of the Inspector and Chief of the Bureau is paid by the Office of the Governor. The other members collect their salaries from the regular budget of the Insular Police.

During the past fiscal year, the detective force continued performing its duties as a secret service body, cooperated in a very successful manner with the uniformed police in the investigation and prevention of crimes, and rendered excellent services in the gathering of information regarding foreigners, seditious characters, prostitutes, introduction and sale of lottery tickets, gambling-cards and other restricted implements and weapons; also executed the capture of several fugitives and boys escaped from reformatory and penal institutions.

They made during the year 851 arrests for various crimes, resulting 577 sentenced, 73 acquitted, and the rest, 201 cases, were pending court decision by the close of the fiscal year. Fine sentences represented \$3,645.00 and jail sentences amounted to 152 years, 4 months and 30 days. Money and other property recovered by the members of the Bureau amounted to \$14,651.42. They seized 61 illicit stills and 3,438 quarts of liquor, arresting 136 persons engaged in the traffic.

GENERAL REMARKS AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

PROSTITUTION.

I urgently recommend to the Hon. Governor of Porto Rico enactment by the Legislature of Porto Rico of adequate laws, whereby prostitution existing in the island could be restricted, through the purchase of a "farm and home", appropriating sufficient money for the equipment of such a place with proper hospital and providing for the employment of competent educational management, so that the many syphilitic diseased prostitutes, who are at present scattered throughout the island and are a constant menace of danger to the health of the communities and the public in general, could be secluded and isolated.

Such laws should provide for the establishment and operation of school and shops, as dress-making, cooking, washing, ironing clothes, straw-hat weaving, farming, cigar-making, tobacco-stripping, and other trades and arts pertaining to their sex.

Laws should be framed in a manner that would authorize the Insular Police to detain and bring before doctors of local sanitary and public health departments, all syphilitic prostitutes, men included, for physical examination, and if the examination confirms the existence of the contagious disease, this would be held as sufficient cause for arrest and confinement. It is a well known fact that these persons are constantly spreading germs of diseases and creating a bad reputation to our largest cities, and this condition has, undoubtedly, in the past and in the future, injure the development of the commerce in our ports, if we consider that high officials of the United States Navy and of the navies of foreign countries, aware of the situation, will restrict the entry of their ships and sailors into the ports of the island.

If such plans are placed in force, by laws, civic organizations and public spirited citizens, and organizations from the United States, would willingly cooperate and are eager to work in an endeavor to assist in cleaning what is considered in Porto Rico, to-day,



a very grave danger, unsanitary condition, a germ-carrying and contagious element and a very disgraceful condition, openly carried on before the public, women and children, and violating all laws of Society and decency, throughout the different districts and communities.

Sanitary laws, if enforced, may be sufficient, but, up to date, have not been adequate to contest this evil.

#### PROHIBITION.

Prohibition is being enforced by the Insular Police of Porto Rico, equally if not better, than likewise States of the Union. The large number of stills and quantity of liquor captured is a demonstration of the efficiency of this department.

I urgently recommend the Hon. Governor that proper legislation be enacted, which would empower the Insular Government and its courts full and complete authority to carry out and fulfil the Volstead Act as regards prohibition. And, in so doing, I am positive that we would increase the number of arrests for violation of this law, and in this manner, quickly reduce the present large number of illegal distilleries operating throughout the island.

Additional punishment should be authorized and heavier sentences imposed on those found guilty of violations and upon those found guilty of employing the poor and ignorant to carry out their trade. The poor and ignorant are, in many instances, the tool of men higher up. It is a well known fact that the Federal Court of the District of Porto Rico is of the opinion, that the Insular Government should assume authority over the Volstead Act in Porto Rico, because of the topographical situation of the island and the splendid system, at present existing, of district and municipal courts, thus reducing the present heavy expense to government's present delay in bringing cases to court and handle all such cases.

Additional funds for the enforcement of the Volstead Act should be authorized by legislation for the Insular Police, as the present inadequate sum is not sufficient to properly assist in the enforcement of the law throughout the island and ports of entry.



✓  
DESTITUTE CHILDREN.

I consider one of the most serious problems in Porto Rico that question which involves destitute children. Homeless and without supervision, wandered from town to town, and who live under conditions deplorable in both moral, sanitary and educational, whose associates are criminals and evil and, in many instances, these children, both boys and girls, are practically enslaved and controlled by bad influences.

In my last year's report to the Governor of Porto Rico, I reported 10,000 homeless children in Porto Rico, and I don't believe that I, in any way, exaggerated the number.

I am positive that, assisted by proper legislation, the Hon. Governor of Porto Rico could induce charitable and educational societies of the United States, to become interested in the question to the end that agricultural farms, schools, in which trades of wagon-making, shoes, clothes, hats, basket-work and tobacco, could be taught, and in a very short time, under able management and proper scientific direction, become self-supportive, and in this manner thousands of children now utterly abandoned to every influence toward evil, would soon be advanced toward civilized living and education. This is a most serious matter and one which I bring to your attention most earnestly.

BLIND, INSANE, CROPELED,  
DEFORMED AND HELPLESS.

It is recommended that the Government of Porto Rico enact such laws as will control, safeguard and protect all who come under the above title of which there are thousands in Porto Rico. Every town has its quota and the disagreeable appearance of these people begging and seeking a living, in addition to being a detriment and in many instances an imposition upon the people of Porto Rico, creates a bad impression on visiting tourists who are coming to this island in increasing numbers yearly, and their appearance on the streets of our cities soliciting, coupled with the disagreeable sights of deformed and crippled, are certainly to say the least, objectionable, and in my opinion, should be collected, placed in Institutions and farms, under proper instruction and education, would soon become partly if not completely, self-supporting.



I also urgently recommend the removal from San Juan of the present "Manicomio" or insane-ward, at present located at Morro Grounds Military Reservation. This is, I understand, to be done as soon as possible.

INSULAR GOVERNMENT FORESTRY BUREAU,  
INTERNAL REVENUE DEPARTMENT AND WEIGHTS &  
MEASURES AS INSULAR POLICE.

I beg to bring to the attention of Your Honor the fact that to-day the Administrative Government of Washington is co-ordinating and bringing together many of its Departments, reducing over-head expenses, and creating Departments so that they would function with each other. For instance: the Head Forester of that Bureau called upon me to furnish five Insular Policemen to enforce the laws and support the employees of that Bureau in the work of preserving the Forest of Porto Rico. Due to the fact that we have more work and duty to perform by the Insular Police, it is impossible to detail five policemen as requested. My recommendation is, however, that not only this Bureau but others who need police protection, that the following procedure be inaugurated: that by authority of the Governor of Porto Rico, to increase the Insular Police when emergency exists that each Bureau obtain said authority and for instance, five forestry police men; necessary orders be issued as follows, that the Chief of Insular Police shall enlist five extra policemen, who shall comply with all requirements, rules and regulations of the Insular Police Department and be supervised by the District Chiefs in whose districts they serve and shall receive compensation of Police Officers and all other benefits of the Insular Police Department and shall be sworn in as such with full authority and detailed to Forest Reserves. And the Auditor of Porto Rico shall pay said Forest police from the appropriations allotted to the Forest Bureau. It is the uniform that is necessary in this branch of the service as well as in others, and in inaugurating such a system, additional strength will be given to the Insular Police, and additional protection to lives and property throughout the island.



This system has been recently placed in operation with the Insular Police and Insular Docks of Porto Rico, in which a special detail of police was authorized by the Governor. Police detailed to the Insular Docks as watchmen, and said police paid by the Auditor from appropriations to the Insular Docks, and Dock Policemen remaining under supervision of the Insular Police. It has had excellent results.

#### POLICE AND PRISONS.

I recommend to Your Honor that the Insular Penitentiary and District Jails be placed in and under the supervision of the Insular Police.

I most sincerely believe that this is the most feasible and working plan, conducive to economy, adequate supervision and efficiency in all branches of prisons, including safeguarding, education and work, and that the results will be completely satisfactory for the following reasons:

All criminals in Porto Rico after sentence could be under close supervision of the Insular Police, thus obtaining all possible information of past crimes, associations, habits, and obtain much valuable information along those lines.

Again, guarded by Insular Police Officers, who would be under strict supervision of District Chiefs, they would be compelled to strictly observe and comply with rules and regulations governing prisons and, furthermore, they would be compelled to strictly comply with the terms of their sentences. This would reduce to the lowest possible figure the present large number of escapes.

Although many escapes at the present time are not due to the present penitentiary management, but to the detail of prisoners to other departments who do not provide sufficient guards, my recommendations are that camps be situated in the central parts of the Island and prisoners placed on road and quarry work and such other government work - dams building and general improvements. Furthermore, the prisons should be situated not in the cities, but in the



interior, away from the general public.

I am positive that the Hon. Attorney General, at present head of this branch of the government, would quite agree with me in that the present detail of prisoners to the various Departments of the government in San Juan, - such as nine prisoners for cleaning the Governor's Palace, twelve prisoners for Police Headquarters, and various other prisoners for other Departments, - is detrimental to the prisoners and, furthermore, the intent of the law is not being carried out as to punishment.

I recommend that this be abolished and that all prisoners be placed on road work or such work as would make them more or less self-supporting.

Should all of the above recommendations meet with Your Honor's approval and Police and Prisons placed under the same head, I am positive that these important branches of the Government could be operated with more economy and an improvement in the criminal class could be expected.

#### AUTOMOBILES.

For the safeguarding of the lives of the people of Porto Rico; for the proper examination of motor vehicles on the public roads of Porto Rico; for the issuing of license to owners of automobiles and the proper record of each automobile in all its changes, accidents and sales; for the proper control and supervision of all drivers, I recommend that the supervision of automobiles in Porto Rico and all pertaining thereto be added to and placed under the Insular Police Department.

This, I personally believe, is the most proper and clearly reliable supervision. This has been proven beyond doubt in the United States, where after exhaustive trials, police supervision of automobile handling has been found entirely satisfactory in all its phases. Therefore my recommendation.

#### POLICE HEADQUARTERS.

I recommend to Your Honor that most serious consideration be given at the earliest possible moment to the construction of an adequate building for Headquarters of Insular Police in San Juan.



The present police quarters are inadequate, unsanitary and overcrowded. It is earnestly recommended that a building much larger be obtained or built, - said building + contain sanitary sleeping quarters, bath-rooms, library, gymnasium, store-room, headquarters' office, detective's office and District Chief's office, all of which are tremendously overcrowded and very unsatisfactory.

This would be highly appreciated by every chief and police officer in the Department, will add much to the pleasure, peace and tranquility of the officers, for I assure you that there is in the Police Department too much work and too little play. There should be gymnasiums, reading-rooms and billiard-rooms for officers while off duty. This is conducive to content, which after all means efficiency. I thank you for your consideration.

I wish to thank the Honorable Insular Police Commission for its cooperation and assistance in upholding the standard of the Insular Police Department, and I congratulate them most sincerely on the non-political intent of the principles. In fact, the non-political attitude at present held by the Police Department and the Insular Police Commission is well known and every applicant is thoroughly apprised of the fact that politics will not be taken into consideration.

I also take the pleasure to assure you that the chiefs and Insular Police officers of all branches of this service in the past year have demonstrated their loyalty, willingness and their honesty with efficient work to the Government of Porto Rico. Their high standard of military neatness and appearance is exceedingly well maintained. I am indeed proud of them.

I have found complete cooperation with the Honorable Attorney General and his staff, with all courts and its officials, and have met with much assistance and good-will on the part of the inhabitants of Porto Rico in assisting the Insular Police Department in enforcing the laws.

I have found also complete harmony and loyalty, also efficiency, on the civilian employees of the Insular Police Department; they



have responded at all times for extra work on extra hours when needed, and have demonstrated ability.

S i r :-

I have the honor to submit the report of the police department of Porto Rico for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1922:-

Prohibition Law Enforcement:

The cooperation that this department must and does lend to the federal government officials, in order that a substantial enforcement of the prohibition law may be possible, has greatly increased its work and added to its difficulties in properly policing the island. There are a large number of towns that easily could be handled by one officer but for the frequent necessity of going into the country and mountains to break up stills and in search of violators of that law. But in order effectively to meet present requirements three officers in such towns are necessary, the presence of at least one guardsman being regarded as necessary at all times in each town and at least two guardsmen being regarded as necessary to any satisfactory rounding up of prohibition law violators. The Federal Court holds sessions only in the cities of San Juan, Ponce and Mayaguez, and when prohibition cases are tried, the large number of police officers who have made arrests under that law are compelled to appear as witnesses at the place of that Court's sessions, which means that many officers from the interior of the island are frequently away from their posts for a considerable period of time.

If the Federal Court and insular courts had concurrent jurisdiction under the "Volstead Act," its enforcement would be much facilitated.



### Salaries:

The salaries provided for the members of the Force, from the highest to the lowest, are not at all commensurate to the responsibilities laid upon and the duties required of them. In fact, they have been able to provide themselves and their families with the bare necessities of life with difficulty, and if the provision of law under which reductions in their salaries became effective on July 1, of the current year, is not repealed, they shall have to undergo hardships painful to contemplate. It is enough, it seems to me, to state that under that provision the salary of a guardsman will be but \$54 per month. The necessity for adequate compensation to officers of the law is too obvious and well understood to be discussed, and relief to the present distressing situation should be, and I have no doubt, will be provided.

### Number of Guardsmen:

Another matter of imperative necessity is an increase in the number of guardsmen. Fourteen years ago when the population of the island was less by hundreds of thousands than it is today; and when the wealth of the island was smaller by one third than it is today, the number of police officers was greater by 26% than it is today. There are many urgent requests to these headquarters, by district chiefs and by citizens, for additional guardsmen that cannot possibly be complied with on account of a lack of guardsmen. In point of fact, citizens in certain sections of the city of San Juan have resorted to the practice that obtained prior to American occupation of employing private night watchmen.

### HEADQUARTERS BUILDING.

The building in which these Headquarters are located is entirely inadequate. The clerical force are compelled to work in rooms which are not properly ventilated and the space is not sufficient. Relief to this unhealthful and crowded situation is imperative.



The total appropriation of the department for the past year was \$753,304.55. The total expenditures were \$748,077.76. See exhibit "I".

The horses of the Department were ridden 64,752 miles on official business. Most of these horses have seen considerable services and purchases of additional ones are necessary.

The Department has nine automobiles and 64 bicycles. It is much in need of five more automobiles and two motorcycles. Bicycles render good service and are very economical.

#### UNIFORMS, ETC.

It is the practice of this Department to purchase for the members of the Force uniforms, shoes, leggins, etc., which are resold to them without profit. Such purchases during the year amounted to \$7,944.61 and the value of stock on hand at the end of the year was \$6,558.19.

#### RELIEF FUND.

This fund was created from fines imposed on members of the Force for violations of the Rules of the Department, and by 20% of all donations to members of the Force.

The sum of \$4,146.05 was disbursed from it during the year, leaving a balance on hand of \$480.45.

Also for the relief of members of the Force and their families in financial distress, monthly collections were made from each officer. The sum of \$1166 was disbursed from the moneys so collected. But an act of the Legislature creating a Retirement-Pension Fund, hereinafter referred to, became effective October 14, 1921, and the Relief Fund and monthly collections were discontinued.

#### RETIREMENT-PENSION FUND.

The law providing for the retirement of members of the Insular Police became effective October 14, 1921, and under it thirteen members were retired.

#### ARRESTS.

There were 8458 more arrests made during the fiscal year 1921-22 than during the previous fiscal year.

Fines imposed and collected from parties arrested by the Police amounted to \$137,031.86.

The total value of property recovered by members of the Force was \$41,967.02.

#### FUGITIVES.

Three hundred, forty three prisoners escaped from the various institutions in which they were confined. Two hundred, fourteen were captured and returned by the Police.

#### PROSTITUTES & DELINQUENT CHILDREN.

The number of prostitutes and delinquent children is increasing, due largely to divorces and desertions by husbands of their wives. More institutions of charity and reform are urgently needed.

The number of prostitutes arrested was 1872, an increase of 272 over the previous year. See Exhibit "F" as to prostitutes and "H" as to children.

#### CARRYING OF CONCEALED WEAPONS.

The police shall continue to find it impossible to check the growing habit among the people of carrying concealed weapons until a severe penalty is provided by law for the offense. The present penalty is no deterrent. In this connection the following comparative statement is of interest.

So long as the penalty for the carrying of revolvers is but a fine of from five to twenty dollars, our shops will continue to display them in their show-windows and advertise them in our



newspapers and the people will continue to buy and carry them.

✓ Two thousand, two hundred and five deadly weapons were seized by the Police during the year, which represents an increase of 124 over the previous year.

#### ACCIDENTS.

#### STRIKES.

Cigarmakers numbering 3000 of the Porto Rico American Tobacco Company and employees numbering 500 of the American Railroad Company were on a strike at the beginning of the fiscal year. The strikers of both companies began returning to work in July and the strike ended in August. The police safeguarded the property of these companies and afforded protection to all employees desiring to work.

There was a second strike of certain employees of the former company in October, but the movement ended in that same month.

Employees numbering 320, of the foundries of Messrs. Aberca and Co. and of Messrs. Portilla and Co., of San Juan, were on a strike from September 17 to November 20, 1921, during which time the property of these firms was protected by the Police.

In January, 1922, 2,000 laborers on sugar plantations in various parts of the Island went on a strike, which lasted until the first of March, 1922, during which one man was killed.

And during the months of March and April, 1922, 1640 agricultural laborers were on a strike, during which a riot occurred in the District of Rio Grande and the non-striking workmen and the police were attacked by the strikers with clubs, cudgels, machetes and revolvers. The left hand of one policeman was completely cut off; one striker was killed, another seriously wounded and number of laborers slightly injured.



DETECTIVE BUREAU.

Of the 960 arrests made by the Detective Bureau, 913 convictions were secured. The Bureau recovered property valued at \$15,987.75.

I have the honor to submit herewith the Annual Report covering operations within the Insular Police Department for the Fiscal Year 1922-1923.

While I have made due effort and inquiry to confirm the correctness of all statements and of the mass of detail incorporated in this important report, I have not, unfortunately, had the time since taking over the Department, under the pressure of many equally important matters, to recompile this lengthy work and cast it, as I should have liked to do, in a somewhat more interesting and attracting form, interspersing laconic statements of fact with interesting comparisons of the present with the past and perhaps what the police may have to expect during the present fiscal year.

The report as it stands, however, is not an uninteresting human document and, in my opinion, greatly redounds to the credit of the members of the Department in respect to their mission of safeguarding life and property, and the recorded facts appear to advance a strong argument that every man has done his duty.

S i r :-

Pursuant to the instructions contained in your letter of July 12th, I have the honor to submit the following report covering the work of this Department for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1923.

#### ORGANIZATION.

The force consisted of 1 chief, 1 adjutant, 1 inspector, 1 chief of detectives, 68 district chiefs, 14 sergeants, 34 corporals, 577 guardsmen, 23 detectives and 8 civilian employees, or 728 men in all, distributed over 75 municipalities or police districts. On July last the Legislative Assembly increased the number of guardsmen to 650. In my opinion, the force is still inadequate. The rapid increase in population and the general progress of commerce, roads, harbors, the constant increase of automobile traffic, together with the importance of the island as a naval-military, agricultural and commercial center, requires a still larger police department. The salary of the men also should be increased.

The total appropriation for the Department for the past year was \$655,227.61. The total expenditures were \$640,750.84. See exhibit "I".

## PROPERTY.

The value of unexpended property on hand on June 30, 1923, was \$71,677.05. Property valued at \$1194.83 was condemned following the instructions of the Auditor, during the past fiscal year.

### Horses:

The horses of the Department were ridden 65,151 miles on official business.

### Automobiles:

On July 1st, 1922, the Department had nine automobiles, plus one which was presented by the U. S. Department of Customs, completed ten automobiles for the fiscal year. They traveled 54,082 miles and the cost of up-keep was \$6,500.26, at an average cost of \$0.12 per mile. More automobiles are required.

These vehicles were ridden 39,151 miles during the year.

The Department also has three motorcycles; one at San Juan, one at Ponce and one at Mayaguez. Two more have been ordered. Bicycles and motorcycles are very economical and easy to handle.

## UNIFORMS.

\$11,775.87 worth of uniform material was purchased during the year and on June 30, 1923, the stock on hand was valued at \$3,132.08.



#### RELIEF FUND.

This fund is raised from donations made by the public and is used to financially assist the officers and their families in cases of illness, losses from accidents, and to pay medical, hospital and burial expenses of policemen who die in the service.

#### RETIREMENT-PENSION FUND.

This fund was created by an Act of the Legislative Assembly, approved July 16, 1921, and has been in force since October 14, 1921. The first year, 13 members of the Police were retired while those retired during the past year numbered 23. A goodly number of officers will reach the retirement age within the next two years and the number of those who will complete the twenty-five year period within the next five years is considerable.

#### ARRESTS.

The total number of arrests made during the year was 51,182, which, if compared with that of the previous year, 52,925, show a decrease of 1,743. Arrests for felonies numbered 496 and comprised 29 for murder, 29 for attempt to murder, 40 for homicide, 231 for burglary, 28 for grand larceny, 18 for rape and 13 for seduction, 9 for adultery, 5 for arson, 1 for bigamy, 2 for incest, 4 for embezzlement of public funds, 1 for counterfeiting currency, 2 for



robbery, 27 for cattle stealing and 57 arrests for libel, Riot and other serious crimes.

The number of felonies also show a decrease if compared with those during the previous year. See exhibit "B".

Fines imposed and collected from parties arrested by the Police amounted to \$117,698.86.

The total value of property recovered by the members of the Force was \$38,637.90.

Two thousand, seven hundred, fifty-two deadly weapons were seized. Below is a statement of the various kinds of weapons seized during the year.

The number of deadly weapons seized during the previous year was 2,205. No arms were sold by this Department during the past year.

#### FUGITIVES.

Two hundred ninety-six persons escaped from the various institutions in which they were confined. One hundred and five of these fugitives were captured and returned by the Police.

#### PROSTITUTES and DELINQUENT CHILDREN.

The total number of arrests made in connection with prostitutes was 2,186, an increase of 314 over the previous year. See exhibit "E".

The number of delinquent children arrested and brought before the courts was 183 and the number of homeless children was 225. More and adequate institutions for these kinds of people are urgently necessary. See exhibit "F" as to children.



## PROHIBITION.

The Police has had a continuous and huge task in the persecution of liquor smugglers and through its efforts and constant cooperation with the federal prohibition officers, a large amount of contraband was seized.

Seizures made during the year represented 38,140 quarts of liquor and 1,416 stills, and the number of arrests made in connection therewith was 3,062. See exhibit "D".

## FIRES.

Three hundred, sixty-nine (369) fires were reported during the year. One hundred, sixty-one were cane fires and destroyed 2,767 "cuerdas", damages being estimated at \$333,478. Other cases, numbering 208, destroyed many houses, huts, sheds, commercial establishments, tobacco-barns, various kinds of utensils and merchandise, all these being valued at \$1,043,485, and carrying insurance for \$923,450. Investigations showed that about 50% of these fires, especially those in the cane-fields, were of an incendiary nature. See exhibits "G" and "H".

## ACCIDENTS.

There were one thousand, four hundred and sixteen accidents, as compared with 1,131 registered during the previous year.

There was an increase of 201 automobile accidents over those of the previous year. In each case the Police furnished aid to the



wounded, investigated all facts, reported their findings to the proper authority, and arrested the guilty.

#### SERVICES RENDERED TO OTHER DEPARTMENTS OF THE INSULAR and FEDERAL GOVERNMENTS.

The services rendered by the Insular Police to other government departments and offices took no little part of its time. During this year, as in previous years, the insular internal revenue department, public work and school bureaus, the U. S. Marshal, Immigration and Labor and Prohibition offices, as well as Army, Navy and National Guard officers, called on this Department for aid. Cooperation with said bureaus has increased and the results have been satisfactory to all concerned. The following table shows the equivalent number of policemen and days engaged in this work:

#### STRIKES.

Two strikes were registered during the year. Cigarmakers, numbering 1,377, of the Porto Rican American Tobacco Company, went on strike at Aguadilla, Aguas Buenas, Arecibo, Caguas, Cayey, Ciales, Cidra, Gurabo, Las Piedras, Utuado and Yauco, for the period from July 10 to August 2, 1922, and more than 10,000 "peones" of the



sugar centrales and cane plantations went on strike from January 15 to March 26, 1923. Reduced wages was the reason given by the strikers. This latter movement involved the districts of Guayama, Salinas, Patillas, Arroyo, Santa Isabel, Yabucoa, Naguabo, Manabo, Ceiba, Luquillo, Fajardo, Rio Grande, Rio Piedras, Bayamón, Toa Baja, Dorado, Vega Baja, Barceloneta, Arecibo, Aguadilla, Aguada, Moca, Guánica, Yauco, Ponce, Juana Diaz and Humacao.

This strike of agricultural laborers caused great confusion and delay in the normal development of the cane harvest and manufacture of sugar and, notwithstanding the efforts of the Insular Police to maintain peace and order and protect life and property, one hundred forty-six cane fires were registered throughout the strike areas and represented 2,652 "cuerdas" of plantations with an average loss of about \$300,000, and three railroad bridges were seriously damaged by fire. About eighty per-cent of these fires were incendiary and malicious and in seven cases the proper arrests were made and complaints filed with the district fiscales, or attorneys.

In February the strikers became very aggressive in the Guayama-Arroyo and Salinas zones and three murders, three attempts to kill, two riots, twelve assaults and a considerable number of disturbances of the peace and violations of the labor laws were reported; and in March two more workers were killed in a riot and several criminal attempts were registered in the Fajardo and Luquillo zones. Arrests for carrying deadly weapons numbered thirty-six. During the various riots, one guardsman was shot, one was badly bruised and cut and the district chief of Luquillo was so badly mutilated with a machete in the hands of a striker that he lost both hands and had to be retired with a pension.

During the latter part of February, 1922, conditions became so serious that one hundred additional policemen had to be concentrated in the districts of Santa Isabel, Salinas, Guayama, Arroyo,



Magumbo, Luquillo, Fajardo and Juana Díaz, in order to prevent further destruction of property and the criminal attempts upon the lives of unoffending citizens endeavoring to work in the cane fields. This caused the enlistment on March 13th of eighty-eight (88) special guardmen with an extra expense of about \$3,300 for their salary and per-diem allowance. The last special policemen were discharged on April 18. Total arrests made in connection with this strike numbered 132.

Sir: -

Pursuant to law and in accordance with your letter of July 16th, I have the honor to submit the following report describing the operations of the Insular Police during the fiscal year 1923-24.

Although this year the Police Department encountered similar difficulties as in previous years, especially due to its scarce number of force to extend its activities to every point of the island, which during the past ten years has become so densely populated; with its general industrial-agricultural development; and an extraordinary amount of traffic, numerous steamers which continually entered and left our ports and the demand for officers to patrol over distant places along the coasts and explore into the forests and mountains in order to prevent the introduction and manufacture of intoxicating liquors, the members of the Insular Police and, particularly, the head of this Department, are highly indebted to the Honorable Governor of the island and the members of the legislative assembly, also to the chairman and other gentlemen forming the Insular Police Commission, for their acknowledgment of the importance and requirements of the service and their willingness to cooperate in its behalf, thus facilitating the important task of protecting life and property and preserving law and order which has been entrusted to the scarce and only body of officers of the peace existing in the whole island.

ORGANIZATION.

The personnel of the organization was as follows:

One Chief of Police, one Assistant Chief and Adjutant, 3 first-class, 4 second, 4 third, 4 fourth, 4 fifth, 4 sixth, 20 seventh, and 25 eighth class district chiefs; 14 sergeants, 34 corporals,



and 650 guardsmen; 1 inspector and chief of bureau of information, 1 chief of detectives, 6 first-class, 5 second and 13 third-class detectives, a total of 794 to look after a population of about 1,218,000, and the total property of the island estimated at \$300,000,000.

The office force consisted of 7 clerks, civilian employees. The Police Department also pays the permanent services of one chauffeur and mechanic.

During the fiscal year the Department was equipped with ten automobiles, namely; 1 Marmon, 2 Dodges, 2 Franklins and 5 Fords; five motorcycles, 55 horses, 58 bicycles; 808 Colt revolvers and 284 shotguns. The purchase of more automobiles has been judged necessary and the proper steps are being taken to obtain them. Many of the police revolvers are unfit for further service and should be replaced with new arms. Similar changes will have to be made in the supply of horses and bicycles.

Thirty-nine denouncements were presented in various courts accusing policemen of assault and battery, disturbance of the peace, illegal search, attempt to kill, alleged larceny and other minor offenses. In but one case the policeman was sentenced and



immediately dismissed from the institution; twelve were acquitted, six charges were filed and twenty were still pending trial by the courts at the end of the fiscal year. In the majority of these cases the complaint was vicious and groundless. In every case the Department practised the corresponding investigation and submitted a report to the Hon. Attorney General.

One district chief was awarded a gold medal for valor. Other officers and men were commended for their skillful and assiduous work.

#### EXPENSES.

The total appropriation for the Department for the past year was \$845,414.50 and \$232.21 was collected from the sale of cartridges to officers. The cost of policing the island during the fiscal year was \$827,767.03, or \$0.74 per capita.

#### PROPERTY.

The value of unexpendable property on hand on July 1st, 1923, was \$70,716.55. Property valued at \$1,709.87 was condemned in accordance with instructions of the Auditor of Porto Rico. All the property of the government and at the service of the Insular Police on June 30, 1924, was valued at \$73,448.66.

#### Horses:

These vehicles were ridden 28,461 miles during the year.

The cost of operating and repairing the five motorcycles was \$1,443.07. They ran a total distance of 21,531 miles. Motorcycles are very useful and facilitate the inspection of the traffic in the large cities. All our motor-vehicles are operated by duly licensed chauffeurs who have secured enlistment in the force.

UNIFORMS.

The uniforms used were the same as in previous years; white and cadet blue, cap and leggins. The money for the purchase of uniforms is provided in the manner of a loan by transfer from another appropriation for the Insular Police and collections for sales are turned over to the Treasurer of Porto Rico as reimbursement.

\$34,339.00 worth of uniform material was purchased during the fiscal year. Collections from officers to whom uniforms and articles were sold, represented \$21,141.64.

#### ARRESTS.

The total number of arrests during the year was 57,983, of which 773 were for felonies. This represents an increase of 6,801 over the previous year. An increase of 277 felonies is also noted. Arrests for felonies comprised 9 for adultery, 12 for arson, 333 for burglary, 106 for homicide, 2 for incest, 34 for grand larceny, 38 for mayhem, 55 for murder, 99 for attempt to kill, 42 for rape, 11 for riot, 19 for seduction and 13 for various other crimes. See Exhibits "B" and "C". \$43,719.51 worth of property was recovered by the Insular Police and fines aggregating \$137,546.97 were imposed by the courts in connection with denouncements made by the officers.

From the 47,378 cases tried during the year, 39,455 resulted in convictions and 7,923 in acquittals. Cases pending trial numbered 3,282 on June 30, 1924. The remaining 7,323 arrests correspond to arrests made by warrants, of escaped prisoners and of persons requisitioned.

Deadly weapons seized during the previous year were but 2,753. No confiscated weapons were sold during the fiscal year 1923-24.

#### FUGITIVES.

Seventy-four prisoners escaped from the various penal institutions and reform-school. Forty-three were captured and returned



by the Police.

#### PROSTITUTION and CHILD DELINQUENCY.

The total number of arrests made in connection with prostitutes and disorderly houses, 2,126, shows a decrease of 60 if compared with similar arrests for the previous year. See exhibit "E".

Arrests of delinquent children were also less than in the previous year. These arrests were but 109 this year. The increase of public schools with both industrial and agricultural trainings has favored conditions among the poor children. A still better improvement is noticed as to homeless children. Figures to be compared are 146 this year against 225 for the previous year. This change is in harmony with the increase in the number of charity-schools for children and the beneficial influences and effects of various civic associations organized and supported by churches and most of the people. Many of the municipal councils of the island have also adopted salutary ordinances prohibiting the wandering of children during night hours. Others have been placed in force to prevent public mendicity. See exhibit "F" as to children.

#### PROHIBITION.

The police and detectives continued their vigorous campaign against the illicit liquor traffic and kept constant watch on suspicious schooners and steamers. This work resulted in the seizure of 1,313 stills and 44,030 quarts of intoxicating liquor. The number of arrests made in connection therewith was 3,884, an increase of 822 over the arrests made during the previous year, when the quantity of liquor seized was but 38,140 quarts. 3,256 of the persons arrested were convicted, 435 were acquitted and 193 cases were pending trial by the end of the fiscal year. See exhibit "H".

During the fiscal year 171 suicides and 156 attempts were recorded. Sickness, love affairs and financial distress were the causes. All suicides were thoroughly investigated and proper records were filed with the judicial authorities.

## ACCIDENTS.

There were 2,389 accidents, of which, 1,838 only were automobile accidents. The number of accidents recorded during the previous fiscal year was 1,416.

There was an increase of 875 automobile accidents over those of the previous year. In each case the Police furnished aid to the wounded and arrested the guilty, if any, reporting all facts to the municipal judges or the district attorneys. About one half of the automobile accidents occurred in San Juan and along the military road between this city and Ponce. Gross negligence on the part of motor drivers was the principal cause of such accidents, although in many cases the casualties were due to the congested traffic.

SERVICES RENDERED TO OTHER DEPARTMENTS  
OF THE INSULAR and FEDERAL GOVERNMENTS.

As in previous years, the Department assisted all branches of the government in the completion of certain tasks for which the services of the Insular Police were necessary. The offices of the commissioners of agriculture and labor, education, interior, the bureaus of the United States Veterans, prisons, weights and measures, the workers' relief commission, United States Health Services, the United States Marshal and the marshals of the various insular courts and the Federal



Prohibition Director have shown their satisfaction for the cooperation extended by the Department. During the year, the Insular Police practiced many important investigations upon the request of the Treasurer of the United States, the New York City Police and the Department of Charity and Welfare of the said city.

#### FIRES.

Two hundred, fifty-seven fires were reported during the year. This number includes fifty-nine cane fires, which were 102 less than the previous year. The total loss caused by fires was \$1,346,994. All cane burned, 346 "cuerdas", resulted in an estimated loss of \$21,935. This figure, apparently low, does not cover burned cane which was saved and utilized by the "hacendados" and sugar manufacturers. Damages from cane fires during the previous year were estimated at \$333,478 and the number of "cuerdas" burned was 2,757. Other property destroyed by fire during this year was valued at \$1,325,059, much of which was protected by insurance policies aggregating to \$1,153,883. One man and seven children perished in fires. See exhibits "G" and "H".



## STRIKES.

Ordinarily, all strikes attract the attention of the Police as they are the officers looked upon by the proprietors and tax-payers for the prevention of damage to their property and, in many instances, the absence of the Police lends opportunity for breaking public order and employing all kinds of threats and coercion to intimidate the elements opposing the laborers' demands and thus permitting conditions which are against all principles of law and the preservation of the welfare of the community. Consequently, labor troubles constitute a serious burden to the force. This fact should still bear more importance if we have in mind the enormous progress accomplished by the Porto Rican industries, especially that which represents more than half of the total business of the island, cane growing and sugar manufacture. No matter how quiet relations between the planters and their laborers or wage-earners may appear to be, some trouble is always contemplated, due, especially, not only to local living conditions, but to the unbalanced returns obtained when their product is sold in the continental markets. This year, during its first half, from July to December, 1923, the fact that many workers were unemployed due to the dead times in the rural sections, permitted a period of peace to the neighbors and peasants of the cane zones.

With the beginning of the cane-harvest in December and the low price obtained for sugar, a period of disgust also started between the cane-growers and the laborers employed at the fields and "centrales". Wages fixed were from 60 to 90 cents per day and the men refused to accept such ratings and demanded \$1.50 and \$2.00 for the eight hours period. Very soon laborers were organized and propaganda began to show its effects when on December 31st, more than 400 laborers went ~~on~~ strike at Guánica, Yauco and Ponce, which group was followed by 1,500 more in the municipalities of Añasco, Mayaguez and Hormigueros, who struck on January 14th, and other 1,600 on January 24th at Vega Baja, Vega Alta, Dorado and Aguada. Agitation was so active and intense that a number of malicious fires occurred throughout the districts affected with the movement and 22 strikers



were arrested on January 28th for violating the labor law. On the 31st work was resumed at Dorado, Vega Alta and Vega Baja, and on February 5th the strikers returned to the plantations at Añasco and Mayaguez.

During February other groups of cane laborers went on strike as follows: At Humacao, 400 struck on the 4th but resumed work on the 9th; and at Maunabo, 125 struck on the 27th and resumed work on the 28th. At the end of that month all differences had been settled and no more delay was experienced.

#### BUREAU OF INFORMATION.

This bureau consists of one inspector and chief of the bureau of information, one chief of detectives, six first-class, five second and thirteen third-class detectives, a total of twenty-six officers, whose duties is to assist the chiefs of police in the investigation of crimes and to gather valuable information respecting aliens, fugitives, contrabands and other important matters connected with the service of the Department and the Government in general.

Cattle, jewelry, money and miscellaneous articles aggregating in value \$14,546 have been recovered by the members of the Bureau during the past year. Of the 57,983 arrests made, 1,038 were made by the operatives of this bureau, obtaining 962 convictions and but 45 acquittals, 31 cases being still pending trial at the end of the fiscal year. Fines collected in connection with these arrests were \$7,561 and time sentences imposed represented 284 years, 10 months and 6 days. They seized 172 stills and 2,406 quarts of liquor.

#### REMARKS and RECOMMENDATIONS.

It is absolutely necessary an increase of seven (7) eight-class district chiefs and one-hundred, fifty (150) guardsmen to the Insular Police. This would bring the number of district chiefs to seventy-five which is equal to the number of municipalities in the island, and complete eight-hundred (800) guardsmen which is the limit prescribed in the law of 1908 reorganizing the Insular Police of Porto



Pico. At present, several police districts are being commanded by sergeants, corporals and guardsmen and which are necessary in other districts.

The increase in force herein recommended is perfectly justified if we take into consideration the actual development of the island in agriculture, commerce, industries and population. The continued cooperation of the Insular Police in the preservation of public works and roads, the enforcement of the prohibition law and the general supervision over the increased automobile traffic, all tends to demonstrate that there always exists a general demand for police service and, consequently, the force should be expanded and increased in harmony with prevailing conditions.

Another strong argument for an increase of the present police force is clearly manifested in a comparison of the number of crimes and arrests recorded during the past two years. The total number of arrests last year, 57,983, surpassed that of the previous year, 51,182, by 6,801. Arrests for felonies were 773, of which 333 were for burglary, 106 for homicide, 55 for murder, 99 for attempt to kill, 42 for rape, 19 for seduction, 38 for mayhem, 34 for grand larceny, and the remainder were for incest, riot, arson and other causes. Arrests for felonies during the previous year were but 496. Note the difference as per statement contained below:

A substantial increase is also noticed when comparing the arrests made for carrying deadly weapons. During the fiscal year 1922-23 there were 2,752 weapons seized while in 1923-24 the number of weapons seized was 3,149. Revolvers alone represented an increase of 159 over the previous year's seizures.

Subject: Annual Report.

1. I have the honor to submit herewith an indexed report covering the operations of the Insular Police for the Fiscal Year 1934-35.

2. As will be noted from the facts set out in the body of the report, the force during no like period probably ever had more trying demands made upon it in a general way than during the past Fiscal Year.

3. Traffic all but doubled in volume, and as the force could of course be increased to meet such an emergency only to the extent of its authorized strength (802), the need of numbers commensurate with traffic exigencies was sorely felt.

4. The General Elections in November were marked by a prolonged period of increased activity perhaps without precedent as regards the exacting and delicate nature of the work confronting the police and the high efficiency with which the ends of justice were in each case administered by the men of the Department and the law enforced throughout the Island.

5. 1,305 special policemen were added to the regular force, and a considerable percent of those so added acquitted themselves creditably before the public and the "regulars" beside whom the special men performed their duties; but it was clearly demonstrated that the regular degree of efficiency cannot be attained where an untrained supplement



police element is brought thus precipitately in contact with the public under the trying circumstances incidental to gatherings wherein large numbers and opposing factions are brought in contact, as in the case of a general election.

6. Following close upon the election, came the largest cane-harvest ever recorded, bringing with it sporadic cane-fires of both incendiary and accidental origin; and in some instances minor strikes among cane-workers added to the increased bulk of police work, the sum total of the problem becoming even and suddenly greater in December, when a serious dock strike in San Juan necessitated the transfer of a large number of policemen from interior points to cope with the wharf strike situation.

7. In the face of the foregoing important events which involved serious crimes, lesser offenses, and numerous attempted disorders, the whole police personnel carried out its vital functions both collectively and individually in so able and admirable a manner as to deserve the highest commendation.

8. Brief comment under the several headings will direct attention to the more outstanding features of the police achievement for the period, and the statistical records supporting the main subjects have been so conveniently arranged as to follow in enlightening sequence and yet in as concrete a manner as it has been possible to crowd the essential facts into a desirably compact report.

With the exception of the normal changes caused by resignations, retirements, appointments and promotions, the organization continued as during the preceding fiscal year. The Force comprised the following officers and men:

One (1) Chief of Insular Police; one (1) Assistant Chief and Adjutant; one (1) Inspector and Chief of Bureau of Information; one (1) Chief of Detectives; one (1) Secretary; six (6) office-clerks; three (3) first-class district chiefs; four (4) second-class district chiefs; four (4) third-class district chiefs; four (4) fourth-class district chiefs; four (4) fifth-class district chiefs; four (4) sixth-class district chiefs; twenty (20) seventh-class district chiefs; twenty-five (25) eighth-class district chiefs; fourteen (14) sergeants; thirty-four (34) corporals; six hundred fifty (650) guardsmen; six (6) first-class detectives; five (5) second-class detectives; thirteen (13) third-class detectives and one (1) chauffeur and mechanic, a total of 802.

There were seven hundred sixty-nine (769) officers and men in uniform. The remainder were detectives and policemen acting as clerks at Headquarters.

At the end of the fiscal year there were nineteen (19) vacancies in the force as follows; 18, guardsmen, 1 third-class detective. (See exhibit "A".)

ADMINISTRATION.

The wisdom of an insular, in contradistinction to a decentralized or municipal form of police control on the Island was again made manifest in the splendid results obtained as a result of changing officers and men from one municipality or district to another in careful accord with the exigencies of good, impartial policemanish p and the demands of justice. The health of the Department as well as its efficiency is greatly favored by the easy mobility of its personnel. For example, physicians not infrequently recommend the transfer of unwell policemen from the low to the high altitudes, or vice versa, depending upon the nature of the ailment from which the officer to be transferred is suffering. Whenever the needs of the general service are not impaired by such a transfer, the change is promptly effected as an aid toward keeping the health of the Force up to the highest possible standard. Other transfers wherein two members of the Force desire to change districts



for personal reasons not prejudicial to the service, are made at the expense of the officers themselves. Appropriations for transportation, in emergencies, have never been adequate, and every economy is used in keeping expenses of this class down.

#### DISCIPLINE AND MORALE.

An excellent esprit de corps was maintained in the organization throughout the year, daily academic instruction and painstaking observation of the military features of the Rules and Regulations contributing greatly to this end. The annual police training camp was also an important aid in bolstering up and giving new buoyancy to police morale, which, among policemen as among soldiers, is the soul of the collective body. During the coming year, notwithstanding that appropriations have been reduced, it is the purpose to inaugurate new, semi-military methods by which it is hoped that the morale and resulting discipline and efficiency in the Force will be increased in a high degree.

During the previous year disciplinary punishments numbered 394. This year shows an important reduction. Of forty-eight complaints presented in various courts accusing officers



of homicide and assault and battery, none resulted in conviction. Thirty-five cases were still pending trial at the end of the fiscal year. In every case the Department made the corresponding investigation and submitted a report to the Hon. Attorney General.

#### TRANSPORTATION.

The Department had on June 30, 1925, twelve (12) automobiles, five (5) motorcycles, forty-nine (49) horses and fifty-six (56) bicycles. In addition to the government-owned horses, the Police hired seventeen (17) private horses, paying from six to ten dollars monthly for each.

#### PROPERTY.

All government property on hand on July 1st, 1924, was valued at \$73,456.18. Unexpendable property valued at \$11,954.08 was purchased, \$8,887.26 worth of government property at the service of the Insular Police was condemned by the Auditor during the fiscal year, and on June 30, 1925, unexpendable property aggregated a value of \$76,352.94.

##### Horses:

Department horses were ridden 42,021 miles during the year. The following table shows horses owned by the department at the beginning of the fiscal year, number purchased during said period, number which died or had to be killed and the number on hand at the end of the period.

No horses were purchased during the year, the appropriation therefor being used to buy motor vehicles, indispensable to service.

##### Automobiles:

The only rapid means by which the present day policeman in Porto Rico can arrive at any scene of disorder is the automobile. During the fiscal year there were twelve automobiles in service in the Department. Considering the territory to be covered,



this number would be inadequate even though the said cars were new and all of them constantly in service. As it is, however, many of these cars, through wear and tear in service, require frequent repairs and the number actually in use is thus considerably reduced. Automobiles traveled 33,787 miles, at a cost of \$4,988.70, including supplies and repairs, an average of  $14\frac{3}{4}$  cents per mile.

It is hoped that such a saving can be effected in other appropriations as will justify the piecing together of a necessary sum for the purchase during the coming fiscal year of a number of low-priced automobiles and motorcycles, since there is no one thing capable of increasing police efficiency in so high a degree as adequate motor transportation.

Motorcycles:

The five motorcycles operated by the department are distributed as follows: two (2) at San Juan, and one at each of the districts of Ponce, Mayaguez and Caguas. A number of policemen has been trained in the driving of these vehicles and are detailed to scrutinize traffic on the main streets of the larger cities. Much congestion and damage has been prevented by these machines. It is planned to establish a similar service in Arecibo, Guayama and Humacao.

In the present traffic emergency, motorcycles are absolutely indispensable. Those on hand are badly worn and need repairs so frequently that it is impossible to keep more than a small per cent of the five in use in constant service. Though no appropriations therefor have been made, new motorcycles will of necessity have to be acquired during the coming fiscal year. Otherwise, the control of traffic may get out of the hands of the police, and a serious, if not a menacing situation would thus



be brought about.

#### Uniforms:

Payments for purchase of uniforms totaled \$14,863.92. Collections from sales to officers aggregated \$20,479.43.

The relief fund is raised from donations made by the public and is used to assist members of the force in cases of the illness of themselves or their families.

#### POLICE RETIREMENT FUND.

On July 1, 1924, there were seventy pensioners enjoying the benefits of the Retirement Law. The pension roll was increased by fourteen cases during the fiscal year 1924-25. The following table shows the number and ranks of officers granted retirement during the year and causes for retirement:

#### AGGREGATE COST OF OPERATION.

The total cost of operating the Department for the fiscal year 1924-25 was \$859,803.43. Appropriations for maintenance of service during the year represented an aggregate of \$859,803.43. Thus the cost of policing the island was but \$0.71 per person.



## ARRESTS

During the fiscal year 1923-24, were arrested 57,983 persons; last period, 64,158, or an increase of 6,175. Figures for this year include 915 felonies, as follows; adultery, 9; arson, 13; burglary, 338; homicide, 121; incest, 1; grand larceny, 104; horse and cattle stealing, 34; mayhem, 53; murder, 101; attempted murder, 60; crime against nature, 6; perjury, 6; rape, 32 and seduction, 27. An increase of 142 felonies is noted over last year. See Exhibits "B" and "C" as to crimes and arrests.

Attention is invited to the fact that eighty-three per cent of convictions were obtained in the courts of the Island, as against seventeen per cent acquitted, a fact which bespeaks the good judgment used by officers in appraising the facts necessary to warrant an arrest.

Exhibit "D" shows quantity and value of property stolen and recovered by the police and detective forces during the year. Property stolen, which included 424 head of live stock and 67 automobiles, was estimated at \$164,602.48, among that recovered were 318 head of live stock and 64 automobiles, all cars stolen being recovered except three. The total representing a value of \$125,058.36, or 76% of the value stolen. One of the wholly new problems dealt with this year was the theft of automobiles.

Of 51,388 cases tried in the various courts on complaints presented by the police, 42,667, or 83% resulted in convictions and 8,721, -- 17% --, were acquitted. Cases pending trial at the end of the fiscal year numbered 4,955. Fines imposed amounted \$254,480.90 and imprisonment sentences represent 1,641 years, 9 months and 6 days.

During the first half of November, 1934, the island was visited by heavy rains in the districts of Arecibo, Arroyo, Gurabo, Juncos and Manabo. Fourteen persons were drowned during a flood of the Yaurel River at Arroyo. Patillas Lake became a cause for alarm among the inhabitants of that region, all but overflowing. The floods from rivers caused damage to crops and cattle. The police rendered assistance to the sufferers and did everything possible to save life and property.

#### FIRES.

Three hundred sixty-five fires were recorded; 144 on cane-plantations and 221 involving other kinds of property, such as residences, warehouses, grocery and hardware stores, coffee and sugar factories, tobacco barns, shops, automobiles and garages, etc. Cane fires damaged 2,737 "cuerdas" in an approximate amount of \$93,778.00. Other fires represented a total loss of \$1,494,218.00, and insurance of \$888,639.00. One man and three children perished in these fires. See exhibits "G" and "H".

#### SERVICES RENDERED TO OTHER GOVERNMENTAL DEPARTMENTS AND BRANCHES.

The Insular Police closely co-operated with all governmental departments and public offices in the enforcement of the rules and regulations established for the protection of the interests of the Government, namely; roads, bridges, dams, aqueducts, lighthouses, docks, public buildings, etc. The officers were frequently called upon to serve citations for appearance before the insular and federal courts, Public Service Commission, Insular Racing Commission, Boards of Medical Examiners, Workers' Relief Commission and other important bodies. Valuable assistance was rendered to the investigating officers of the United States Treasury Department, Veterans Bureau, Military Recruiting Boards and the Custom-house Service.

#### DETECTIVE BUREAU

The personnel of this bureau was as follows:



is due to the law severely penalizing the carrying of deadly weapons. During previous years, the offender paid a fine, but now a minimum jail sentence of 30 days is imposed.

One hundred and four (104) persons escaped from the insular and municipal jails, reformed school, charity school, and sanatoriums for tuberculous and the insane, were captured and brought back to their respective institutions. One hundred and nineteen (119) wanted by the courts for sundry violations of law were captured and brought back to justice.

#### PROSTITUTION.

Arrests of prostitutes made throughout the island during the year numbered 2,245, as against 2,126 for the previous year. Thirty persons were arrested for operating disorderly houses. (See Exhibit "F".)

#### CHILD DELINQUENCY.

Arrests of delinquent children numbered 73, or 36 less than during the previous year. A similar decrease was noted between 1922-23 and 1923-24. Conditions have been greatly improved, due to the additional schools being established every year. Arrests for minor offenses committed by the juveniles in which the police filed no complaints in court, are excluded from the above figures. In such cases, the officer took the child to its parents or nearest relative and warned them against future misconduct.

#### PROHIBITION.

Exhibit "E" contains a statement of the seizures and arrests made by the Insular Police in compliance with the prohibition law. Last year Congress amended the law giving jurisdiction to the courts of Porto Rico to deal with prohibition cases. In previous years, complaints for the manufacture, transportation and sale of liquor were presented in the Federal Court (U.S. District Court, District of Porto Rico), and seizures of stills were denounced as violations of the insular excise tax law, in the insular courts.



During the fiscal year 1924-25, the officers of this department seized 1,605 stills and 36,859 quarts of liquor. Seizures for the previous year were 1,313 stills and 44,030 quarts of liquor. The arrests made this year were 4,361, of which number 3,722 resulted in convictions, 394 in acquittals and 235 cases held pending trial at the end of the year. Last year's arrests were 3,834.

#### SUICIDES and ATTEMPTS.

One hundred fifty-six persons committed, and one hundred and forty attempted suicide during the year, as follows:

Every such case was thoroughly investigated and the facts reported to the nearest magistrate. The principal causes of suicides and attempts were sickness, love affairs and financial distress. Many of the sick were mentally deranged.

#### ACCIDENTS.

There were 3,006 accidents, as against 2,389 reported during the previous year. Of this number, 2368 were automobile accidents and 618 were due to other causes. Automobile accidents recorded during the fiscal year 1923-24 numbered 1,638, or 550 fewer than for this year.

Recommendation was made to the legislature sitting in 1925 for an increase in the personnel of the Detective Bureau, the new operatives, from three to five in number, to be known as Special Agents, to handle only the highest class investigations, and to have authority to administer oaths and, with the consent of the proper officials, to carry on inquiries in any department or other branch of the government. This recommendation was based upon the proved usefulness of this Bureau since its organization in 1908. The men of the Bureau are carefully selected from among the best investigators in the Uniformed Force, and the per cent of stolen property recovered by its members has some times reached as high an average for a given period as eighty-odd per cent.

The writer of this report was the director of the Bureau for many years and therefore feels that he cannot speak in too forceful terms of the continued need for an investigating group of experienced men such as it originally was and still is the aim that the Bureau shall be composed of.

The salary of the Chief of the Bureau, \$3,500 per year, is paid by the office of the governor. The other members are paid from the regular police budget. Salaries paid, including that of the Inspector and Chief of Bureau, amounted to \$35,000.00. Other expenses totaled \$7,000.00. This last figure includes transportation and per-diem expenses, amounts paid for secret and confidential services, office stationary, telegraph and other contingencies, and represents an average outlay of \$1,312.50 per man.

The members of this Bureau arrested 3,191 persons, as against 1,038 for the past fiscal year. 2,250 arrested were convicted, 475 were acquitted and 466 cases were pending trial at the end of the



fiscal year. Seizures of distilleries and intoxicating drinks numbered 373 apparatus and 5,986 quarts. 183 persons were arrested for keeping and operating illicit stills and 431 for dealing in contraband liquors. The detectives also recovered 12 stolen automobiles, 5 head of live stock and \$12,148.00 worth of jewelry and other property. Total property recovered was valued at \$27,098.00. See exhibit "D". Fines imposed on offenders amounted \$8,767.00 and imprisonment totaled 241 years and 9 months.

#### INSULAR POLICE COMMISSION.

The administrative work of the Insular Police Commission, which during the period was composed of Messrs. Nathaniel A. Walcott, President, and Manuel M. Ginorio and Julian W. Blanco, Members, was, in the opinion of the writer, of the highest order, and contributed in a great degree toward the maintenance of obedience, discipline and efficiency in the Department. Not only did the Commission handle its normal work of examinations, appointments, punishments, vising of accounts, etc., but the gentlemen composing it generously took upon themselves many difficult inquiries and investigations in accordance with Section 27 of the Police Law. No previous Police Commission had ever similarly interpreted this vital feature of the responsibilities allotted by law to said important body, and the writer cannot speak in too high terms of the work which the Commission in every instance carried out to so successful a conclusion.

Complying with your letter of June 5th, 1926, I have the honor to submit a brief report of the operations of the Insular Police during the fiscal year 1925-26.

THE FORCE.

The only change made in the personnel of the Department was the reduction of the detective force in seven men. The total strength of the Department was 795 men. Of this number, seven hundred sixty-five (765) were in uniform, the remainder being detectives and office clerks. See exhibit "A".

Three complaints were presented in various courts accusing one guardsman of murder and two of assault and battery. The policeman charged with having killed eighth-class district chief Manuel Ferrer at Rio Grande on the morning of February 23, 1926, was sentenced to life imprisonment. One officer charged with assault and battery was acquitted. There was still one case pending trial by the court at the end of the year. All charges and denouncements against officers of the Department were carefully investigated. Amounts collected in fines were transferred to the Retirement-Pension Fund.



## TRANSPORTATION.

The Department had on June 30, 1926, 11 automobiles, 9 motorcycles 39 horses and 56 bicycles. Fourteen (14) private horses were also used by the Police, paying from \$4.00 to \$8.00 monthly for each.

## PROPERTY.

All government property on hand on July 1st., 1925, was valued at \$76,252.94. Unexpendable property valued at \$1,985.17 was purchased, \$2,370.28 worth of government property at the service of the Insular Police was condemned by the Auditor during the fiscal year and on June 30, 1926, unexpendable property aggregated a value of \$75,867.83.

### Horses:

Department horses were ridden <sup>102,347</sup> 26,926 miles during the year.

During the months of January and February, 1926, the Department organized several public acts in an effort to obtain money for the Relief Fund which was almost exhausted. Total collections made during this campaign aggregated \$34,016.81. \$16,979.74 of this money was transferred to the Police Pension-Retirement Fund.

AGGREGATE COST OF OPERATION.

Total expenses of the Department for the fiscal year 1925-26 represented \$824,458.00. \$832,295.00 was the sum authorized by the Legislature for the maintenance of the service during the period. See exhibit "J" as to amounts appropriated and expended under the various subheads and balance on hand at the end of the fiscal year.



## ARRESTS.

The members of the department made 70,850 arrests, an increase of 6,632 over last year's figures. Of 56,469 cases tried by the courts, 47,127 (83.46%) resulted in convictions and 9,342 persons were dismissed. At the end of the fiscal year there were 4,708 cases pending trial.

Felonies recorded during the year, 1,106, comprised 214 murders and homicides, 108 attempts to commit murder or homicide, 539 burglaries, 57 grand larcenies, 49 rapes and seductions, 9 arsons, and the remainder were cases of adultery, crime against nature, corruption of minors, mayhem, perjury and other serious offenses. Felonies for the previous year were 915. See Exhibits "B", "C" and "D".

The total valuation of lost and stolen property was \$217,637.21. This includes 436 heads of cattle and other livestock, 67 automobiles and \$118,251.21 worth of other kinds of property. The department recovered 270 animals, 63 automobiles and other property aggregating \$149,248.00, an average of 69%. Exhibit "E" shows amounts of property missing and of that recovered by the police, and value thereof.

During the period covered by this report, the police and detective seized 1,595 deadly weapons against 2,677 in the previous year. We also seized 1,550 illicit stills and 26,986 quarts of intoxicating liquor. Total number of arrests for engaging in the liquor traffic, viz., 3,903, resulted in 3,422 convictions, 390 acquittals, and 91 cases which were still pending trial in the courts at the end of the fiscal year. See Exhibit "F" as to stills and liquor seized.

Sentences imposed in connection with arrests and denouncements made by the force during the fiscal year 1925-26, represented as follows:

One hundred twenty-eight fugitives from the various J. M. and municipal institutions were captured and brought back to their respective guardians. One hundred and six persons who had left their homes and were being searched by their relatives were located by the police.

#### PROSTITUTION and CHILD DELINQUENCY.

Arrests made in connection with prostitution numbered 2,144. Nineteen (19) denunciations for keeping disorderly houses were presented in the courts. Figures for the previous year were 2,245 arrests and thirty (30) disorderly houses.

One hundred seventeen (117) minors were indicted for larceny, embezzlement, assault and battery, murder, rape and other crimes, respectively. Arrests of minors included two (2) cases of homicide, 1 attempt to kill, 1 mayhem, 1 rape and 1 case of crime against nature, the remainder being cases of larceny and other less serious offenses. On June 30-1926, there were one hundred and one (101) homeless children throughout the island.

#### SUICIDES and ATTEMPTS.

There were two hundred twenty-eight (228) suicides and one hundred forty-two (142) attempts recorded during the year.

The police made a thorough investigation of each case and reported facts to either the local judge or district attorney. Sickness and mental derangement was the most common cause of suicide.

#### ACCIDENTS.

There were 2,673 automobile accidents and 564 accidents due to other causes reported during the period. Automobile accidents show an increase of 285 over last year's cases.

## FIRES.

Three hundred fifty-seven fires (357) fires occurred throughout the island causing losses estimated at \$771,885.00. These figures include 148 cane fires with 1892 cuerdas damaged to the value of \$81,236.00. Nine (9) children lost their lives during these accidents. Every fire was carefully investigated and the police extended all protection possible to endangered life and property. Exhibits "H" and "I" show number of fires occurred at each district, description and amount of property destroyed or damaged, approximate losses and amounts of insurance carried.

## SERVICES RENDERED TO OTHER GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

As in previous years, the Insular Police carried on important investigations upon inquiries made by national and state institutions and in many occasions the Department was requested to assign part of its personnel to assist to carry out urgent business pertaining to other governmental organizations. In this connection, numerous reports were despatched. Out services to the American Red Cross, War Veterans Bureau, Pension Bureau and many charity associations are also worth mentioning.



### DETECTIVE BUREAU.

As stated at the beginning of this report, on September 1st, 1925, the personnel of this Bureau was reduced, the actual force being as follows:

One (1) Inspector and Chief of Bureau;  
One (1) Chief of Detectives;  
Five(5) First-Class Detectives;  
Four(4) Second-Class " "  
Eight(8) Third-Class " " and  
Seven(7) Guardsmen. --- Total , 26 men.

There are also two secret service officers, named First Special Agent and Second Special Agent, respectively, who were appointed to serve under the direction of this Department on October 1st, 1925. These officers have added efficiency to the service. Their duties are similar to those of the ordinary detective and special care was taken in the selection of the men who were appointed to fill these special positions.

During the fiscal year, the members of the Bureau arrested 2,377 persons, obtaining 1,606 convictions and 345 acquittals. Cases pending trial at the end of the period were 279, the remainder being arrests by warrants and of escaped prisoners and persons wanted.

Losses and thefts reported to the Detective Bureau represented 19 automobiles, 9 heads of livestock and \$62,021.00 worth of other kinds of articles, a total of \$94,173.00. The detectives recovered property valued at \$60,034.00. They also seized 4,102 quarts of intoxicating liquor and 115 illicit stills. Arrests of persons found operating illicit distilleries and dealing with alcohol numbered 157.

Sentences imposed in connection with arrests made by the members of the Detective Bureau aggregated \$5,423 in fines and 329 years, 10 months and 21 days of imprisonment.

Sir: —

I have the honor to submit herewith a report covering the operations of the Insular Police for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1927.

While it is often the better part of wisdom to hold optimism at arm's length, still it must be recorded from a no less dependable source than the cold compilation of numbers, that the police have made notable headway in suppressing crimes of violence and discouraging property theft and destruction during the fiscal period just closed.

69,638 arrests were made, against 70,850 the preceding year, 83 per cent of the first number resulting in convictions.

Though the natural activity resulting from the ordinary stress and strain of life was enormously greater than during any like period heretofore, nevertheless beside 214 homicides last year, but 172 are recorded for the period just ended, and of this number 57 were involuntary, or of such a non-intentional character as fatalities growing out of automobile accidents. Of this class of crime there were 134 cases as far back as the comparatively quiet year of 1921-22.



There were 141 fewer felonies this year than last, and 82 per cent of 731 cases tried yielded convictions.


Automobile Law violations fall more than a thousand under the aggregate for the preceding year, and breaches of the Road Law have been reduced one-third.

An increase of more than 25 per cent is shown in the seizure of illicit stills and their product. This increase bears no relation to numerous seizures of contraband liquors, for the most part at or near their coastal places of entry, in connection with which the police operated independently or jointly with prohibition agents.

Fines for the period approximated \$200,000, and imprisonment, exclusive of life terms, aggregated 2,403 years.

Following is a comprehensive summary extending to the still unincreased personnel of the force and to every important detail of police activity which has been thought might prove of interest as an achievement or for purposes of study and comparison.

16 complaints charging officers with assault and batter and disturbance of the peace, were filed in the courts. Six cases resulted in acquittals. On June 30, 1927, ten of such complaints



were still pending the action of the courts.

#### COST OF OPERATION.

The aggregate cost of police operation was \$827,889.83, or \$8,760.17 less than the total appropriated by the Legislative Assembly. Exhibit "J" shows the amounts appropriated under the various headings, transfers to and from appropriations and the totals expended under each heading. Operating cost the previous year totaled \$824,458.00.

#### TRANSPORTATION.

The department had in use on June 30, 1927, eleven automobiles, five motorcycles, thirty-nine horses and fifty-six bicycles. Last year nine motorcycles were in service. Four of these vehicles were condemned. No purchases were made during the year.

The horses of the department were ridden 102,547 miles, the bicycles 10,890 miles, and the motorcycles 16,680 miles. The eleven automobiles travelled 60,472 miles at a cost of seven cents per mile.

#### PROPERTY.

Government property on hand on July 1, 1926, was valued at \$75,867.83. Unexpended property valued at \$3,347.61 was purchased, and \$6,140.70 worth of property was condemned by the Auditor of Porto Rico. On June 30, 1927, unexpended property on hand aggregated a value of \$73,064.74.

#### Uniforms:

\$21,329.76 worth of uniforms were purchased by the department. Sales of uniforms to officers aggregated \$20,141.13.

## ARRESTS.

69,638 arrests were made during the period. Cases tried numbered 56,999 and resulted in 47,305 convictions and 9,694 acquittals. Last year's figures were 70,850 arrests, 56,469 trials, 47,127 convictions and 9,342 acquittals. Convictions were obtained in 83% of all cases. Arrests of women totaled 4,076 against 4,295 for the previous year.

965 felonies were recorded. This figure drops 141 cases below that of the previous year. Of 721 felonies tried, 690 (82%) ended in convictions. See Exhibits "B" "C" and "D".

Property stolen during the year was valued at \$197,511.53 and recovery was made of a valuation of \$127,754.45, - 65% of the total stolen. The foregoing, 2,767 cases, embraced 385 head of live stock, 93 automobiles and \$111,992.53 worth of other property. Recoveries aggregated 247 head of live stock, 85 automobiles and other property valued at \$54,900.00. Exhibit "A" shows quantity of property stolen and recovered by the police and its value.



Arrests in connection with the enforcement of the Prohibition Law totaled 4,625, against 3,903 during the previous fiscal year. These arrests were accompanied by the seizure of 2,241 stills and of 48,018-1/4 quarts of liquor. Seizures for the previous year were 1,550 stills and 26,986 quarts of liquor. Of the 4,625 cases recorded, 4,028 yielded convictions. 161 complaints were still pending the decisions of courts at the end of the period.

2,181 arrests were made for carrying deadly weapons. The various weapons seized numbered 1,816.

49 prisoners escaped, and these, and 57 other fugitives from different institutions, were captured and delivered to the corresponding authorities. 3 seamen were apprehended and returned to the naval authorities.

#### PROSTITUTION AND CHILD DELINQUENCY.

Arrests for prostitution and for keeping disorderly houses numbered 2,072, as against 2,144 the previous year. 32 such persons were charged with keeping disorderly houses. (See Exhibit "G").



186 minors were indicted on charges of larceny, burglary, assault and battery, carrying weapons, and for other offenses. The following table shows the various crimes committed by minors and the number of arrests made for each such offense:

On June 30, 1927, the records attested there were 113 homeless children on the island.

#### SUICIDES and ATTEMPTS.

226 persons committed suicide and 157 attempted suicide during the year.

In every such instance the police went to the scene of the occurrence and acted in cooperation with the local judge or district attorney. Sickness - mental derangement, business reverses and triangular affairs were the principal causes. Last year there were 228 suicides and 142 attempts.

#### ACCIDENTS.

There were 3,221 automobile accidents, and 595 accidents from other causes recorded during the period. These totals show increases of 548 and 31, respectively, over last year's.

## FIRES.

290 fires caused losses estimated at \$738,951.00. These figures include 88 cane fires in which 1,268-1/2 "cuerdas" burned or ~~was~~ <sup>were</sup> damaged in the amount of \$47,820.00. Other fires destroyed a large number of commercial and residential buildings, merchandise, furniture and implements, the losses aggregating \$691,131.00. Insurance carried totaled \$364,625.00.

Each fire was thoroughly investigated and the findings were reported to the proper judicial authority. The police also extended every possible form of protection to endangered life and property.

Exhibits "H" and "I" show the number of fires per district, description, and the quantity of property destroyed or damaged, approximate losses and the amounts of insurance severally carried.

## SERVICES RENDERED TO OTHER GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

In addition to its regular duties of preserving order and guarding life and property throughout the island, the police rendered many services requested by other government departments, divisions and bureaus. Among the institutions so benefited the Departments of Justice and Health ranked first. The Department of the Interior and the Workmen's Relief Commission also figured prominently. Numerous investigations and reports for New York State and City officials were made. The Departments of State, Treasury and Interior and the Veterans Bureau carried on a large proportion of their inquiries through the police.

Two special agents operate under the direction of the Governor and make investigations in any branch of the government when so specially directed to do. Their confidential investigations during the



past year have been ably performed and the Government provided with useful information upon which to act in many important cases.

During the fiscal year, the members of the Detective Bureau made 2,410 arrests, 1,832 convictions and 235 acquittals resulting. Cases pending trial at the end of the period numbered 216, the remainder being arrests on warrants, and of escaped prisoners and other persons wanted by the courts.

Losses and thefts reported to the Bureau comprised 34 automobiles, 4 head of live stock and other property valued at \$54,631.50, total, \$78,131.50. The members of the Bureau recovered 2 head of live stock, 33 automobiles and other articles valued at \$30,592.15, aggregate, \$53,342.15. They also seized 402 stills, 3,057 quarts of intoxicating liquor and 37 deadly weapons. They arrested 283 persons for operating illicit stills and selling liquor. (See Exhibit "F"). Stolen property recovered by the Bureau was 68% of the total stolen.

Sentences imposed by the courts totaled \$4,657.00 in fines and 325 years, 3 months and 23 days imprisonment.

#### THE INSULAR POLICE COMMISSION.

90 cases were tried before the Commission during the period. 67 applicants, recommended by the Chief of Insular Police, were appointed by the Commission, and 28 resignations were accepted at the request of members. 14 were discharged for cause, 11 for the good of the service, and for physical disability, 5. The Commission made inquiries into numerous difficult cases and performed inspections and reported many important matters to the head of the force for proper action.

The Commission is composed of three residents, who during the past fiscal year, and many before it, were:

President, Mr. Nathaniel A. Walcott, and  
Members, Messrs. Manuel M. Ginorio, and  
Julian W. Blanco.

These gentlemen, laboring without compensation as public-spirited citizens, are deserving of credit for having directly contributed to maintaining in the Department a high standard of efficiency, and for having notably elevated the individual sense of obligation and the morale of the force.

S i r :

I have the honor to submit hereinafter a report covering the operations of the Insular Police for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1928.

Notwithstanding the rapid development in every branch of industry and the corresponding increase in all human and mechanical activity throughout the Island during the year just ended, a force of fewer than 800 men, including chiefs and subordinate directors, by dint of intelligent direction and intensive application, has not only held crime in check, but even made notable gains against it.

Fewer first degree murders were committed during the past year than in any similar period since 1923, when fifty-five such crimes were recorded. In 1924-25 the number of murders leaped up to 101, the highest annual number ever recorded on the Island. 1925-26 followed with 74, and 1926-27 showed 76. Then from 76, a sheer drop is noted to 52, which means a decrease in 1927-28 of approximately one-third of the number recorded during the previous year.

Homicides were slightly greater in number in 1927-28 than in 1926-27, there being a difference of 18 in favor of the penultimate year, but the period here covered nevertheless shows 32 fewer such crimes than the number recorded in 1925-26.

#### A R R E S T S.

68,180 arrests were made during the period, as compared with 69,638 during the previous year. 56,446



i. e., convictions followed arrests in 88.4 per cent of all cases.

There were 1006 felencies. Of these 536, or 52.7 per cent, terminated in convictions. (See tabulated Exhibits "B," "C," "D".)

#### FOR CARRYING PROHIBITED WEAPONS.

2,221 complaints, an increase of 40 over last year, were filed for the unlawful carrying of deadly weapons. 1000 such weapons were seized by the police and confiscated by the trial courts. 1,816 such weapons were so seized during the previous fiscal period.

#### FOR VIOLATION OF THE PROHIBITION LAW

Arrests made in connection with the enforcement of prohibition totaled 4,105. 1,950 stills and 31,690 quarts of cane rum were seized, as against 4,625 arrests, 2,941 stills and 48,018 quarts of cane rum seized in 1926-27. Of the 4,105 arrests last enumerated, 3,598 yielded convictions, and on June 30, 115 cases were still pending trial. One policeman was overwhelmed and killed while attempting the arrest of an illicit still operator. (It should be noted that the foregoing figures deal exclusively with the seizure of stills and their product in the interior of the Island, and should not be understood to include the numerous seizures of contraband liquors made by the police while acting independently or jointly with prohibition officials.

#### FOR LARCENY.

Property valued at \$276,470.01 was stolen during the year. Of this, 66 per cent, valued at \$181,193.32 was recovered by the police. 3,246 cases comprised 370 head of live stock, 129 automobiles and \$148,054.01 worth of other property. 243 head of the live stock were recovered, as were also all the automobiles stolen, and



for more fully tabulated information).

### FINES AND IMPRISONMENT.

Complaints filed by the police during the fiscal period yielded \$192,681.73 in fines, and defendants less fortunate than the fines are serving a total of 2,064 years, 2 months and 14 days in prison sentences. Among such punishments one life term was recorded.

### ESCAPED PRISONERS, ETC.

22 persons escaped from penal institutions, as compared with 49 such escapes during the previous year. Of the 22, 4 were boys from the Reformed School, one a deserter from the Army, and one an escaped member of a merchant ship's crew. All the foregoing were captured by the police and returned to their proper custodians.

87 homeless children were also located and returned to persons responsible for them.

### PROSTITUTION AND CHILD DELINQUENCY.

2,308 arrests were made for prostitution and the keeping of disorderly houses. Complaints were filed directly against the persons responsible for 33 such disorderly houses, 10 of which were found to be conducted by known prostitutes. (For more specific data under this heading, refer to tabulated Exhibit "3".)

143 minors were indicted on charges of burglary, larceny, robbery, homicide, assault and battery, malicious mischief, and for other offenses. The following table will be found enlightening as to the offenses committed by these youths and the number of them identified with each class of crime:

### SUICIDES AND ATTEMPTS.

216 persons committed, and 135 attempted suicide during the year. Police inquiry, investigation and assistance followed in every instance, according to the nature of the case. Sickness, love affairs and business reverses were the motives most often found to exist. There were 10 fewer suicides and 22 fewer attempts during the period under discussion than were recorded during the one preceding it.

### ACCIDENTS.

There were 3,352 automobile, and 632 other accidents. These figures show an increase of 131 and 37 respectively over the corresponding numbers for the previous period.

### FIRES.

295 fires resulted in losses estimated at \$1,221,079. Cane fires, of which there <sup>were</sup> 112, damaged 1422 acres of growing crops, with an estimated loss of \$26,435.00.

Loss in commercial and residential buildings with their contents totaled \$1,194,644, and the aggregate insurance carried on the same was \$894,550.00. Four persons lost their lives in fires.

#### DETECTIVE BUREAU

Several murder mysteries which from the apparent absence of motive and complication leading up to the commission of the crimes proved extremely baffling, evolved as a serious responsibility upon the Detective Bureau during the past fiscal period. Each such case was finally unravelled by specialized men of the Bureau, however, and complaints filed which resulted in a high per cent of convictions in the courts.



of their having to work without the aid of a modern fingerprinting system, which is of incalculable aid in the detection of crime.

90 circulars carrying the descriptions of stolen property were published from the office of the Chief to the seventy-six police districts during the period.

The men of the Bureau made 2,111 arrests, with 1,616 convictions and 174 acquittals. 199 cases were pending trial on June 30. The remaining cases resulted from arrests on warrants issued for escaped prisoners and other persons wanted by the courts.

The Bureau carried out 2,503 special investigations, transmitting the corresponding reports, and filing in the courts the necessary complaints for prosecution.

Losses and thefts reported to the Bureau aggregated a value of \$122,883.34, 42 automobiles being included in this figure. Property to the value of \$69,361.01, or 57% of the total stolen, was recovered. 100% of all motor vehicles stolen, or a total of 42 units, were recovered as a result of detective pursuit and investigation. In addition to the foregoing, the Department's small group of operatives seized 3,148 quarts of contraband liquors, 322 illicit stills, and 5,875 quarts of cane rum. To this they added the confiscation of 31 deadly weapons and arrested 248 persons for owning and operating the aforesaid stills.



The Insular Police Commission held twenty sessions and considered 82 cases during the fiscal period. Of the cases judged, 15 resulted in dismissals, 49 in other disciplinary findings, and 28 in exonerations.

The Commission has just approved what probably will be one of the most ably worked out and complete sets of Police Rules and Regulations to be found anywhere.

Too much cannot be said in commendation of the work of commissioners who, without compensation, sit through frequent and exhausting all-day sessions in behalf of the policy, discipline and general well-being of the force. There is perhaps no other unsalaried group connected with the Government of which closer application and more profound study is required. The Police Commission models the psychology and shapes the working-plan of the force, and the quality of its judgments is faithfully reflected in every police contact with crime.

#### PERSONNEL OF THE FORCE.

The total authorized personnel of the force, 708 men, including 8 civilian clerks, remained unchanged for the period. This group performs duty in the seventy-six police districts and is made up under the law as follows:

### COMPLAINTS.

Complaints were filed in the courts against 44 members of the force. Of this number 2 were district chiefs, one a corporal, and one a detective, while 40 were policemen. The charges were assault and battery, disturbance of the peace, unlawful arrest, and malicious mischief. One policeman was held for involuntary homicide. 28 cases resulted in acquittals, and 16 were still pending trial at the end of the year. Assaults committed or attempted on the person of members of the force numbered 72.

### COST OF OPERATION.

Of \$341,095 appropriated for the maintenance and operation of the Department, \$339,975.98 was expended. The corresponding expenditure for the previous year was \$327,939.83.

### TRANSPORTATION.

The Department had in service on June 30, 1938, 12 automobiles, 7 motorcycles, 43 bicycles and 38 horses; one automobile and two motorcycles were purchased during the year. The automobiles traveled 85,828 miles at a cost of 4 cents per mile, and the motorcycles 17,736



miles at 15 cents per mile. The bicycles registered 9,878 miles, and the horses of the Department were ridden a total of 108,347 miles.

### PROPERTY.

Government property in service on July 1, 1927 was valued at \$73,064.74. Unexpendable property valued at \$10,354.47 was purchased, and property of the same class valued at \$6,873.75 was condemned by the Auditor. On June 30 the aggregate value of unexpendable property on hand was \$70,545.46.

### UNIFORMS.

All articles of uniform both for officers and enlisted personnel are provided by the Department and purchased individually by members of the force. \$21,352.04 worth of uniforms was bought by the Department during the past year, and collections from sales to members of the force totaled \$22,988.01.

### RELIEF FUND.

S i r :

I have the honor to submit the following report of police operations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1929.

The force probably never experienced a year so replete with extreme and varied demands upon its inadequate numbers and attenuated appropriations as that which ended on June 30, 1929.

#### THE CYCLONE.

A more appalling disaster than that which befell this island on September 13 has seldom put its brand upon any country, and seldom has any police body in history faced a more multiphased or more trying situation than that which followed in the wake of the cyclone.

The rapid broadcasting of warnings by the police, as the storm approached, undoubtedly saved many lives and much property. For many years past, an efficacious working plan has been operative between the office of the government meteorologist in San Juan and police headquarters. On July 10, two months before the hurricane, a circular containing additional instructions from the weather office was circulated to the police, and when at 3:00 o'clock on the morning of September 12 the first storm warning was received from the weather office and at once published to the force, perfect liaison and understanding throughout the island was the almost instant result. Subsequent warnings were received and immediately broadcast to the force, and by the police transmitted to the public through every available artery of communication.



The enormous work of live-saving and property conservation in which the police were so capably reinforced and aided by military and civic groups, while it has become history, is still unforgettable as a record of achievement.

The records show that officers and policemen dedicated 12,200 days to the aid of American Red Cross officials during the activities of the latter on the Island.

The hurricane season recently closed has demonstrated the great value of your organization in the distribution of storm warnings over the Island.

During the past year we have had more than the usual number of storms in our vicinity, making an unusual demand upon your force in the distribution of warnings. This service has been done in a most satisfactory manner. Especially worthy of commendation was the prompt distribution of warnings through-



out the island on the morning preceding San Felipe, one of the greatest storms on record in the West Indies. The small loss of life during the passage of this storm across Porto Rico was in large measure due to the quick action of your organization in getting the warnings to isolated rural districts.

The fine service of your office and of the Insular Telegraph office in cooperating with the Weather Bureau deserves the greatest praise.

THE AMERICAN RED CROSS.

During the long and splendidly successful campaign of the American Red Cross for the relief of the physical and economic distress which attended the work of the hurricane the relations of the force with the officials of that organization were never less than a fine example of mutual understanding and cooperation.

Many letters addressed by executive and field representatives of the Red Cross to the Chief of Insular Police have attested to their appreciation of the support and assistance given them by the officers and men of the force in the seventy-six separate districts. An extract from one such communication, the last received, dated March 28, 1929, reads as follows:

## THE GENERAL ELECTION.

On November 8, <sup>6, 1917</sup> supplemented by the usual reenforcements of special policemen, the Insular Police stood at its numerous posts of duty throughout the island and guaranteed the observance of law and order during one of the most closely contested general elections ever held on the Island since the American occupation.

Notwithstanding isolated minor disturbances requiring prompt and capable police action, no disorder of a nature to obstruct or discourage citizens desiring to cast their ballots was reported from any police district, and no breach of the peace anywhere occurred that was not immediately snuffed out and the corresponding complaint filed against the person committing the offense.

Because of enthusiasm and excitement, it was necessary at some points for the police to meet force with force in the discharge of their duties, but the minimum of force in every such instance was employed, and in but one case, at Bayamón, did defiance of lawful authority take serious form. Upon his resistance to arrest for a serious offense and an exchange of shots with the policeman attempting his detention, the citizen whose custody was sought was wounded and died later of his injury.

The task which confronted the force on November 8 was undoubtedly one of the greatest of its kind ever undertaken by the Insular Police in the thirty years of its existence, but there was in the force no individual, whether a regular or special policeman, but knew on the morning of November 8 the impartial fulfillment of duty that was expected and demanded of him, and it must be said that the twenty-three hundred men on whom so important an event imposed a stern responsibility, discharged their difficult duties with such good will, impartiality and high efficiency as the writer



has not heretofore witnessed in stiller existing circumstances in any other police organization.

Compared with similar events in the past, the general election of 1928 is said to have been the best-conducted and most orderly exercise of suffrage ever observed on the island.

### ARRESTS

Of a total of 68,954 arrests made during the year, 44,715, or 82.69%, yielded convictions, and 3,708 cases were pending trial at the end of the period. 11,111 of the first total were arrests made on warrant, other court orders, and of escaped prisoners.

There were 774 more arrests during the last fiscal year than the one preceding it, and the per cent of convictions resulting was almost identical with the 83.4 of 1927-28.

### FELONIES

1,027 felonies were recorded during the last period, as against 1,006 for the year next before it. In 771 cases tried, 827 of the first total resulted in convictions and 256 were pending trial at the close of the year. In more than one-half the whole number of felonies committed, burglary stands out with a total of 520 cases.

### MURDERS

In 1924-25 the number of murders leaped up to the alarming total of 101, the highest annual number ever recorded on the island. 1925-26 followed with 74, and 1926-27 with 76. 1927-28 was reassuring with a sharp drop to 52, the lowest number of first degree murders recorded for half a decade; and if the economic and psychological effects of the cyclone are taken into account, there would appear to be no cause for despair at this time, for the total number



of premeditated crimes falling in this class during the past fiscal year is but 69, a number still well below the average of totals for the past half-dozen years. It seems safe to comment that behind so well-nigh inconceivable a fact as the foregoing the patient acceptance of affliction and of the dread accompaniments of disaster by a faith-sustained people has acted as a powerful ally of the police in keeping down crime and discouraging at their inception the minor acts of omission or commission leading up to it.

#### FINES AND IMPRISONMENT.

Fines imposed on persons arrested by the police during the period aggregated \$160,814.82, and the total years of imprisonment 2,714, plus 4 months and 28 days.

#### PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED.

\$258,116.80 worth of property was stolen during the year, and 73% of the total, valued at \$188,706.41, was recovered by the police. These larcenies were divided into 2,804 cases, comprised 418 head of live stock, 153 automobiles, and \$72,014.41 worth of miscellaneous property.

#### FINES AND RECOVERED PROPERTY.

It will be seen that the aggregate corresponding to fines imposed and to stolen property recovered totals \$350,000, or 40.8% of \$857,925.82, the total cost of maintenance of the Inular Police force for the period.

#### DEADLY WEAPONS SEIZED.

2,116 arrests for carrying deadly weapons were recorded. Of 1,512 cases tried, 1,369 ended in convictions.

VIOLATIONS OF THE PROHIBITION LAW.

Violations of the National Prohibition Law recorded during the year totaled 2,991. 1,156 stills and 22,418 quarts of intoxicating liquor were confiscated. In 2,858 cases tried, 2,581 convictions were obtained, and at the end of June 133 cases were still pending trial.

For this period, as for the one preceding it, one policeman was killed by an illicit still operator while attempting the latter's arrest.

In addition to the numerous investigations carried out by its members during the year, this group made 1,743 arrests, obtaining 1,332 convictions out of a total of 1,425 cases tried; captured 17 escaped prisoners and 9 other persons wanted by justice; seized 23 deadly weapons, 95 stills and 1,636 quarts of intoxicating liquor, and recovered 43 stolen automobiles and other missing property valued at \$77,753.11.

Sentences imposed by the courts in connection with complaints filed by the personnel of the Detective Bureau totaled \$2,388.50 in fines and 696 years, 4 months and 6 days' imprisonment.

The Bureau completed 2,264 special investigations and issued 59 "requisitionnaires" for lost and stolen property.

#### ESCAPED PRISONERS, ETC.

61 persons ordered arrested by court, 28 escaped from penal institutions, 5 from insular asylums, and 17 minors, were arrested by the police and delivered to their proper custodians.

#### F I R E S .

40 cane, and 141 other fires were recorded during the last fiscal period. Cane destroyed or damaged totaled 362 "cuerdas" with a value of \$8,684.00, and losses from other



fires aggregated \$591,880. The total insurance carried was \$494,539.00. Similar cases in 1927-28 were 112 cases, and 183 other fires. 5 human lives - 2 adults and 3 minors - were lost in fires during the past period.

SUICIDES AND ATTEMPTS.

218 persons committed, and 127 attempted suicide during the year, comparable with 216 suicides and 135 attempts for the previous year. Sickness, financial reverses and love affairs were the causes most frequently assigned.

A C C I D E N T S .

There were 2,788 automobile accidents and 767 accidents from other causes, or 564 fewer automobile accidents when compared with the preceding fiscal year.

The Commission is composed of three members, one of whom, so designated, acts as its Chairman. In addition to acting as a police trial board, the Commission appoints and separates members of the force, approves expenditures, acts as a board of inquiry, and makes recommendations to the Governor respecting punishments in the case of district chiefs, or other matters in connection with which inquiries are necessary.

This group, which usually holds its sessions weekly, but may convene oftener if necessary, receives no compensation for the important services which its members willingly contribute to the well-being of the force and of the community.

It is a fortunate fact for the police that among those who have made up the personnel of this Commission in the past there have been some of the best-known and best-grounded professional and representative men of the country.

COMMENTS OF THE CHIEF OF INSULAR POLICE  
ON THE OCCASION OF APPEALING TO THE  
INSULAR LEGISLATURE ON FEBRUARY 12, 1929,  
FOR AN EARLY INCREASE IN PERSONNEL.

The industrial wealth of the Island is menaced by the relative paucity of policemen to protect it. Traffic is constantly demanding added attention. The cyclone has not been without a psychological effect on the collective mind. The pinch of poverty does not conduce to a pleasant frame of mind, and bad humor is sometimes reflected in disorders and serious violations of law. Now again wonderful crops are springing out of the ground all over this fair Island. Wherever there is any form of wealth, that wealth must be protected, and though the fond hope embraced by every person interested in the welfare of our Island — that the police force might this year be numerically increased — though this hope has now vanished, still we should and must remember that we cannot subject the happiness and economic welfare of this country to the menace of a dangerously reduced or disgracefully ill-equipped police force.

While we realize that all the promised improvements in the force must be for the moment deferred, we should nevertheless very carefully inform ourselves, before taking any effective action whatever, as to what would be the consequences of any unwise retrenchment.

The utmost caution must be used in considering the methods by which economies may be made effective, because some kinds of economy are expensive.



### COST OF OPERATION.

The appropriations for the maintenance and operation of the Insular Police during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1929, totaled \$869,795.00. Of this sum, \$857,925.82 was expended, leaving a balance of \$11,869.18. The cost of operation for the preceding year was \$833,375.98.

The increased expenditure for 1928-29 is due to a twenty-five thousand dollar appropriation to cover the expenses of the police incident to the general election.

### TRANSPORTATION.

On June 30, 1929, the Department had 12 automobiles, 8 motorcycles, 36 bicycles and 26 horses. The automobiles traveled 95,024 miles and the motorcycles 27,002. Bicycles were ridden 7,002 miles, and horses 53,623 miles.

### PENSION FUND.

On June 30, 1928, there were 125 police pensioners. To this number were added 1 Eighth-Class District Chief, 1 Sergeant and 13 policemen, retired because of physical disability, 2 Seventh-Class District Chiefs and 3 policemen who completed 25 years of service, and the heirs of 6 deceased policemen.

The Pension Fund continues to be greatly inadequate, and payments to ~~persons~~ <sup>pensioners</sup> are at present many months in arrears. Numerous attempts have been made to provide a means of swelling the sources of this fund's receipts, but its beneficiaries are still looking to our Legislature for some adjustment whereby they may receive the payments due them with regularity and certainty.

### PROPERTY.

Government property in the service of the Department on July 1, 1928 was valued at \$76,545.46. Unexpendable property purchased during the year was valued at \$5,396.92, and \$1,344.32 worth of property was condemned by the Auditor. Value of unexpendable property on June 30, 1929 was \$72,088.06.

### UNIFORMS.

The purchase of uniforms, cloth and furnishings for police uniforms is facilitated through a temporary transfer or loan from the appropriation for salaries, which is periodically reimbursed with sums received from officers and enlisted men, who buy uniforms and materials on the installment plan.

Purchases of uniforms for the period totaled \$24,453.39. Collections from sales amounted to \$20,223.69.

## HEADQUARTERS OF THE INSULAR POLICE

San Juan, P.R., August 4, 1930.

### P R E A M B L E.

Although the work performed by the Insular Police is carefully outlined in the following report, a few introductory lines, of a general character, touching on the most important phases of our police work, are nevertheless given in this preamble.

### ACTIVITIES OF THE INSULAR POLICE.

The activities of the Insular Police during the past fiscal year were in accord with the demands made upon it, there being not one single instance during which the force did not respond with the same degree of enthusiasm. The exhibits shown in the present report, give an idea of such activities.

### EFFICIENCY.

The highest degree of efficiency was shown in all services assigned to the police. Had the means at its disposal been more generous, there is no doubt but that such efficiency might have reached a higher place; however, arrests during the fiscal year 1929-30 show an increase of 8,195 over the past year.

### MORALE AND DISCIPLINE.

This cannot only be observed from the degree of efficiency obtained but also from the respect and consideration accorded to the Police by the Federal, Insular and Municipal Governments, with which entities it cooperated to the fullest extent, receiving from them warmest congratulations. The magnificent work of the Insular Police Commission has no doubt been instrumental in bringing about such a satisfactory result in police morale and discipline.

If the compensation actually allowed to the officers and enlisted men of the Insular Police could be bettered, and if the pension now so irregularly paid due to lack of funds, might be put on a firm basis so as to take care of such members of the force as have outlived, or may hereafter outlive, their usefulness in a police way after giving all their energies to the service of their country, it is to be presumed that the activities, efficiency and morale of the force would reach its highest degree.

A total of 487 such punishments was imposed during the previous fiscal year.

#### COMPLAINTS.

Sixty-four complaints against members of the Insular Police were filed in the courts. Two district chiefs, two corporals and thirty-three policemen were acquitted in thirty-seven cases tried. Twenty-seven complaints were either discontinued or held pending in the courts at the end of the period. The charges alleged were assault and battery, disturbance of the peace, homicide, attempt to commit homicide, mayhem, malicious damages, slander, larceny, conspiracy, and seduction. Assaults committed or attempted on members of the force numbered eighty-nine.

#### COST OF OPERATION.

The cost of operation of the Department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1930, was \$852,239.46. Total authorized appropriations: \$855,386.22. These figures show a saving of \$5,686.36 when compared with expenses during the preceding year. (For fuller data see Exhibit "J".)

#### TRANSPORTATION.

On June 30, 1930, the Department had 11 automobiles, 9 motorcycles, 12 bicycles and 29 horses. The automobiles traveled 92,196 miles and the motorcycles 46,902. Bicycles were ridden 7,735 miles, and horses 39,918 miles.



Number of police horses and vehicles and districts where assigned are indicated in Exhibit "A".

#### PROPERTY

Government property in service on July 1, 1929 was valued at \$78,134.67. Unexpendable property purchased during the year was valued at \$3,304.62, and property of the same class valued at \$13,411.71 was condemned by the Auditor. On June 30, 1930, unexpendable property on hand represented \$68,027.58.

#### UNIFORMS

Purchases of uniforms, cloth and furnishings for police uniforms totaled \$18,436.58. Collections from sales to members of the force amounted to \$19,684.28.

#### RELIEF FUND

The following statement shows the condition of this fund at the beginning of the fiscal year, receipts and disbursements during the year, and the balance on hand at the close of the period:

#### PENSION FUND

On July 1, 1929, there were 151 police pensioners. The list was increased by 1 ex-corporal and 5 policemen, retired because of physical disability, and the heirs of 1 sergeant and 6 policemen.

The Police Retirement Pension fund has never been adequate for the regular monthly payment of pensions, for which reason such payment is some 18 months in arrears, that is, 11 months unpaid in 1927 and 7 months in the F.Y. 1929-30.

#### A R R E S T S

During the last fiscal year, the force made arrests on 65,948 offenses denounced by its members, and 11,201 other cases of escaped prisoners and persons wanted by the courts. Of a total of 62,153 cases tried, 50,878 yielded convictions, an average of 82%. 3,795 offenders were waiting trial at the end of the fiscal year. This year shows an increase of 8,195 arrests over the number of arrests made during the preceding period.

#### F E L O N I E S

1,208 felonies were recorded during the year 1929-30. This number includes 87 arrests for murder and 77 for voluntary homicide, 66 for involuntary homicide, 63 for rape, 1 for seduction, 11 for robbery, 593 for burglary, 64 for grand larceny, 10 for counterfeiting of coins, 21 for crime against nature, 4 for corruption of minors, 11 for adultery, 3 for incest, and the remainder for various serious offenses. The number of felonies recorded in 1928-29 was 1,027, cases of murder having been 69, voluntary homicides, 76, involuntary homicides, 72, rapes, 28, seductions, 4, robberies, 12, burglaries, 520, grand larcenies, 61, crimes against nature, 19, corruptions of minors, 4, adulteries, 6, other cases, 156. Similar arrests for 1927-28 numbered 1,006. Murders for that year were 52, voluntary homicides, 65 and bur-



glaries, 514.

#### CARRYING DEADLY WEAPONS.

The seizure of 1,794 prohibited weapons resulted in 2,243 arrests, 1,495 of which yielded convictions, and 152 complaints were still pending decisions of the courts on June 30.

#### VIOLATIONS OF THE PROHIBITION LAW.

The force made 3,399 arrests in connection with the illegal traffic of intoxicating liquor, and seized 1,527 stills and 24,011 quarts of liquor. Of 3,293 cases tried, 2,820 — 85.6% — resulted in convictions. Similar arrests and seizures for the previous fiscal year were 2,991 arrests, 1,156 stills and 22,416 quarts of liquor. Complaints pending trial numbered 106 at the end of June. (See Exhibit "F")

#### ARRESTS OF PROSTITUTES AND DELINQUENT CHILDREN.

Arrests of prostitutes and juvenile delinquents numbered 3,065 and 197, respectively. 28 persons were charged with keeping houses for prostitution and 27 for operating disorderly houses. See Exhibit "G" as to prostitutes.



#### PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED

\$217,837.43 worth of property was reported missing or stolen during the year. Said sum included the value of 367 head of live stock, 108 automobiles, and \$119,107.43 for other kind of property. 249 head of live stock, 107 automobiles and \$64,573.29 worth of other kind of property were recovered by the police. Exhibit "E" shows value of property stolen and recovered for each district.

#### FINES AND IMPRISONMENT

Fines imposed on offenders denounced or arrested by the police aggregated \$198,654.05, and time sentences, 3,315 years, 5 months and 6 days. These figures show an increase of \$37,839.23 in fines and 601 years and 8 days imprisonment over last year's returns.

#### ESCAPED PRISONERS AND OTHER FUGITIVES

30 escaped prisoners, 90 persons wanted by courts, and 25 others missing from their homes, were returned by the police to their proper custodians.

#### F I R E S

This year 302 fires were recorded, against 181 the year preceding it. 112 cane fires burned 598 "cuerdas" of plantations with an estimated loss of \$23,401.75, and other fires destroyed residences, warehouses, factories, stores, garages, etc., valued at \$1,002,048.50. Insurance carried totaled \$656,495.00. Five persons perished in fires during the year. Exhibits "H" and "I" contain important information as to fires.

#### SUICIDES AND ATTEMPTS

231 persons committed suicide and 175 attempted suicide during the period. Sickness was the outstanding motive in the majority of such cases. Suicides and attempts for the previous year numbered 218 and 127, respectively.



## A C C I D E N T S

There were 3,143 automobile accidents and 521 accidents from other causes during the fiscal year.

In each case, the police made the corresponding investigation in cooperation with the proper judicial official. A good number of arrests for violating the automobile law and traffic ordinances was recorded in connection with accidents. Automobile accidents show an increase over the previous year when 2,788 such accidents were recorded.

Numerous investigations carried out by the members of the bureau during the year, resulted in the arrest of 1,522 persons. Of a total of 1,366 complaints filed by this force, 1,091 yielded convictions and 155 offenders were acquitted. 140 persons were arrested on warrants, 12 escaped prisoners and 4 persons wanted by the courts were also captured. On June 30, 1930, there were 120 cases pending trial.

Property recovered by the Detective Bureau during the year was valued at \$60,235.00. Sentences imposed aggregated



\$3,116.00 in fines and 442 years, 2 months and 25 days imprisonment.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1930, members of the bureau arrested 196 prohibition law violators, and seized 25 deadly weapons, 378 stills and 2,455 quarts of intoxicating liquor. Of 179 prohibition cases tried, 161 ended in convictions.

The bureau completed 2,485 special investigations and issued 34 "requisitorias" for lost and stolen property.

#### INSULAR POLICE COMMISSION.

The three gentlemen forming the Insular Police Commission and who render honorary services to the government, during the past year made several excursions through the Island for the purpose of selecting candidates to fill vacancies in the force and inspecting the personnel and property of the department. In San Juan, they held 36 sessions for the investigation of charges, deciding upon petitions for relief and other matters concerning policemen or their service to the public, etc., and carried on other business as indicated in the following table:
