1- PERSONNEL:

The Insular Police Personnel for the year 1950-1951 consisted of 2729 members including 78 civilian employees. This shows an increase of 263 members over previous year. This increase, about an 11%, is not enough, yet, to attend all problems confronted with the service. The legislation establishing the eight-hour maximum working period for members of the Force, continues its enforcement as previous year, but still, it is necessary an increase in the Force for the best purpose of this legislation. 2- CRIMES:

During this year, the Department recorded 145,270 offenses of which 767 were unfounded, remaining a total of 144,503 true offenses. This represents a decrease of 10% as compared with last year. Out of these figures, the Police cleared up 139,500 offenses, giving a 97 % of clearance. As a result of this 97 % clearance, a total of 163,659 persons, 151,486 males and 12,173 females, were charged by the Police as compared with 188,291 for the previous year, showing a decrease of 13%. Crimes against persons and crimes against property increased 10% and 15% respectively over the figures for last year. Manslaughter by Negligence increased 6%; Aggravated Assaults went down .6%; Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter increased 4%; Burglary increased 25% and Robbery decreased 14%, while Larceny increased 8%. Of the 144,503 true offenses, 77% were committed in the Urban Zone and 23% in the Rural Zone. Of the 163,679 persons charged, 62% were whites, 28% mulattoes, and 10% negroes. (See Exhibit "T").

3- LIQUOR LAWS:

The Police seized a total of 16,393 quarts of illicit liquor, destroyed 567 illicit stills and seized 405 stills for evidence in the courts. These figures show a decrease of 42%, 54%, and 40% respectively, compared with the evidence obtained last year. The Insular Police Department in closed cooperation with the Department of Finance, has established different squads to prosecute and enforce the Liquor Law. These squads are rendering a valuable task. (See chart "4")

4- FIREARMS:

A total of 2941 firearms were registered during the year, as indicated below:

5- TRAFFIC:

A total of 208 persons lost their lives and 7470 were injured on the highways and streets in Puerto Rico during the year 1950-1951. These figures represent a decrease of 13% and 3%, respectively as

compared with the figures for previous year. Automobile accidents went down from 14,058 last year to 12,798 this year, showing a decrease of 9% . Although the total of accidents was reduced in 1260, the traffic situation continues to be a very serious problem in the Island. The Traffic Division created by the Police Department enforces the Vehicle and Traffic Law, the Traffic Regulations and Ordinances relating to vehicular and pedestrian traffic. This Traffic Division operates especially, in the Metropolitan Zone but the experience in being applied to all the Island, just as previous year. Extensive surveys and investigations for the relief of traffic congestion and traffic obstacles are being made in conjunction with the Department of Interior. A total of 38,102 persons were charged by the Police for traffic violations during the year, showing a decrease of 15%, due in part to the different campaigns carried on in relation to the traffic problems.

6- JUVENILE DELINQUENCY:-

During the year, 1203 juveniles were arrested by the Police. Most of these juvenile cases are being treated by the Police Athletic League.

The League is supported primarily by private funds consisting of associate membership dues of five or more dollars a year as well as personal contributions, and other activities carried on by the Local Board of Directors in each municipality.

Nearly 20,000 children are enrolled in the League, in the local chapters throughout the Island, and most of them participate in athletic activities that are held periodically among youngsters in championships of baseball, as well as basket-ball and other similar games.

Also, there are juvenile clubs that maintain recreational centers in which their members spend part of their spare time reading books, magazines and other publications donated by sponsors of the League.

7- ACADEMY:-

It is through the Police Academy that this Department can prepare a better police to our community. The demand for adequate police protection, the tendency to place more responsibility on the police officer and the need on the part of the police officer for keeping up to date on all matters related with crimes, is receiving special consideration.

The Academy develops an intensive training program for policemen, giving special attention to the new coming members (recruits).

During the year, the following activities were carried out by this Academy:-

(a) Various conferences were held about different confidential matters, by members of the local office of the F. B. I. :

(b) Refreshing courses about Police Methods, Rules and Regulations, and different laws to be properly enforced, were conducted. 25 Detectives attended these courses.

(c) Members of the local office of the F. B. I. and officers of the American Red Cross, with the cooperation of the Academy, conducted various courses of First Aid to their members.

(d) From October to December, 1950, Shooting Courses were held at Isla de Cabras camp under the direct supervision of the Academy. In these activities 246 members of the Force received instruction about different types of firearms and gas bombs to be used in case of riots and other disorders.

(e) From January to March, 1951, a group of 280 new recruits were instructed in all police matters completing the basic course required for policemen.

(f) 41 guards of the penitentiary received full instruction in firearms, shooting, judo and different subjects pertaining to their job. This, in closed cooperation to the Department of Justice.

(g) Actually, a group of 56 new recruits is receiving training about the basic course in police affairs.

In all these activities the Police Academy has received the cooperation of the local office of the F. B. I., the Department of Justice, the American Red Cross and other agencies. The Academy has rendered a valuable and efficient work during the whole year.

These members were specialized in Police Administration, Organization and Investigation.

Captain Gerardo Delgado, Dean of the Insular Police Academy, attended the Northwestern University Traffic School at Evanston, Ill. He was specialized in traffic problems and general police administration.

8- DETECTIVE BUREAU:-

The Bureau of Detectives in cooperation with the Uniformed Force and Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation, performs all kinds of criminal investigations brought to the Police.

The Bureau consists of 235 members of which 173 are assigned to the Metropolitan Zone, composed of San Juan, Rio Piedras, Bayamón and other adjacent districts. The other members are assigned to the Police Districts in the rest of the Island under the supervision of the Commanders of the different Police Zones.

10- RADIO COMMUNICATION SYSTEM:-

The Department operates and maintains a radio system with fixed point transmitters at San Juan, Bayamón, Arecibo, Aguadilla, Mayaguez, Ponce, Guayama, Humacao and Caguas. Besides that, we have 68 mobile units, including a Maritime Mobile unit at the sea shore and 12 portable

stations. Three repeaters and three relay transmitters operate automatically at El Yunque (Luquillo), Tres Diaz (Jayuya) and Santana (Maricao) which permit instant and dependable communication with all the Zones and the mobile units, including the station in the boat at Vieques.

The whole system has a net of emergency power generators to be used in case of line failure and specially in case of disasters. Instructions and emergency antennas are being distributed through all Zones for this purpose. Trained men will be located at Tres Diaz, El Yunque and Santana, in case of hurricanes or other emergency, to repair and keep the repeaters and relay transmitters on the air.

During the week of October 30, 1951, in which took place the Nationalist revolt in the Island, our radio net proved, once more, to be of great assistance to the Department. It maintained a continuous communication with all police districts and cars equipped with radio, all throughout the Island, transmitting orders and instructions in general.

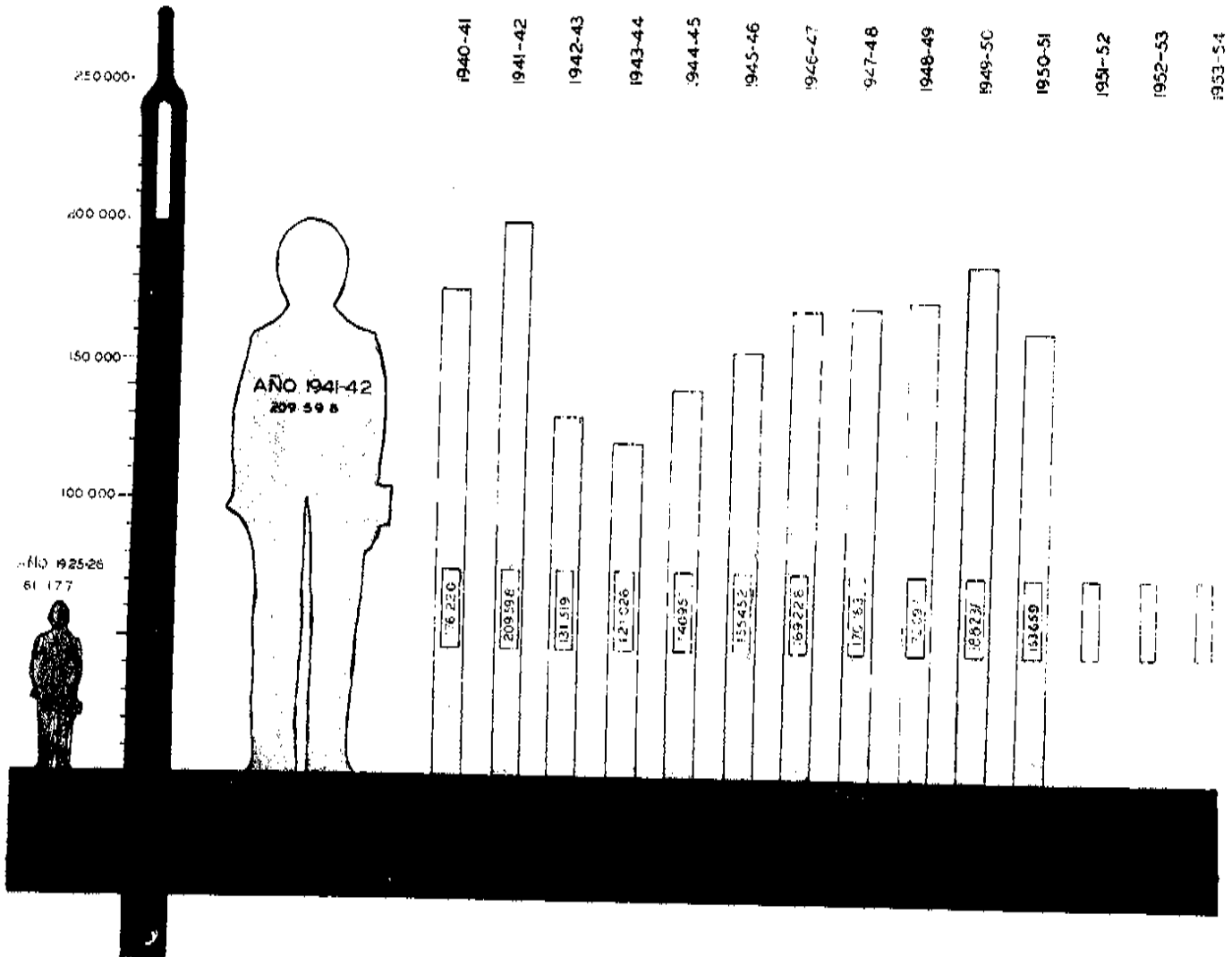

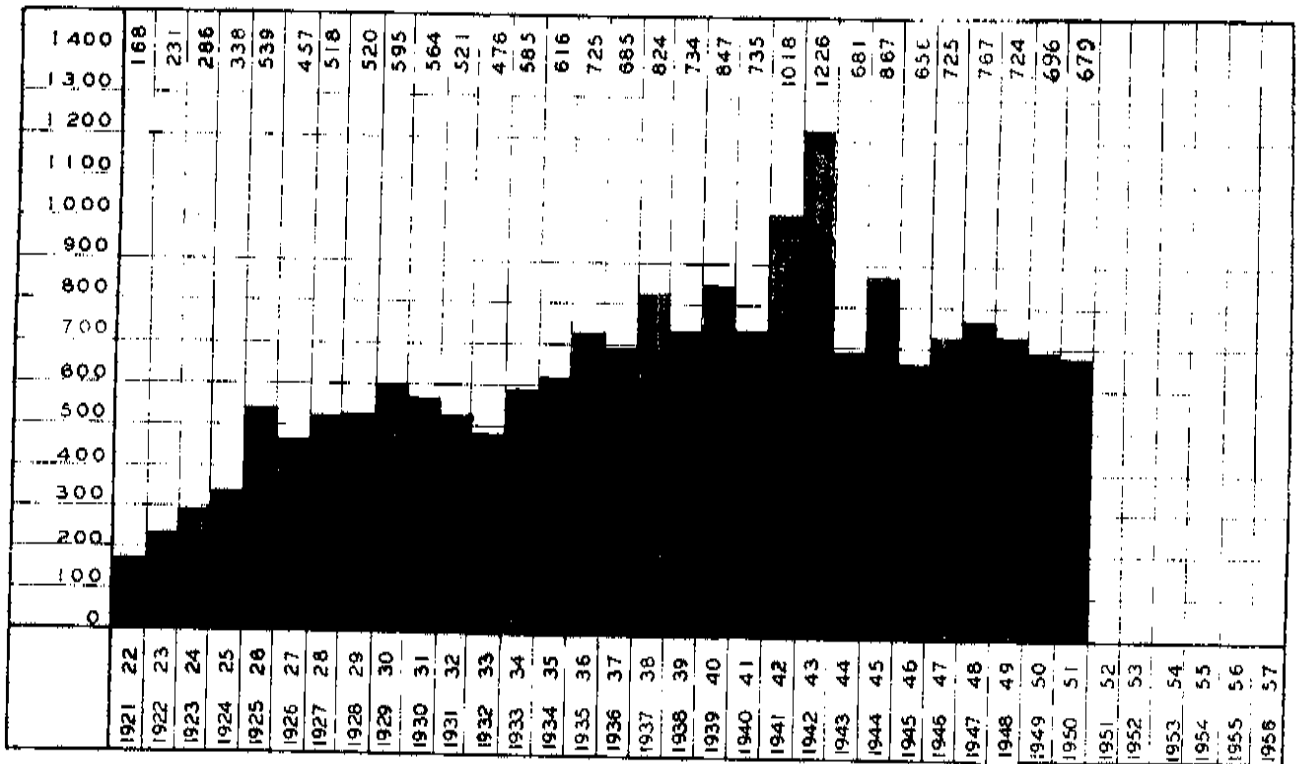

PERSONAS ACUSADAS POR LA POLICIA DESDE 1940-41 HASTA LA FECHA

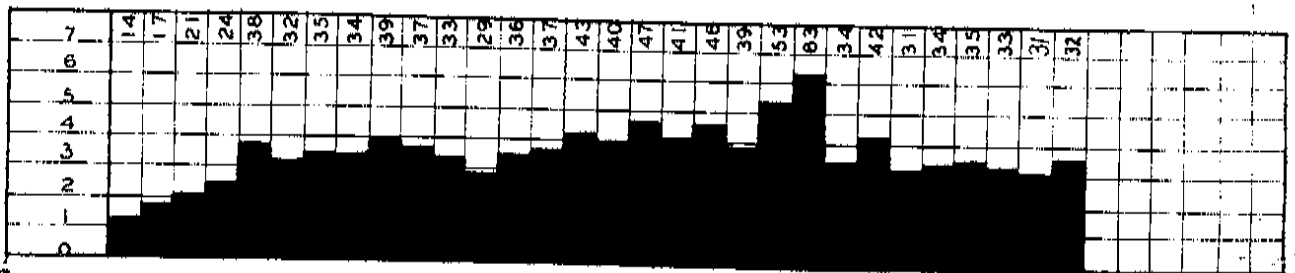


This chart represents total persons charged by the Police in the Island since 1940-1941 to 1950-1951.

PERSONAS ACUSADAS DE AGRESION GRAVE DESDE 1921-22 HASTA LA FECHA

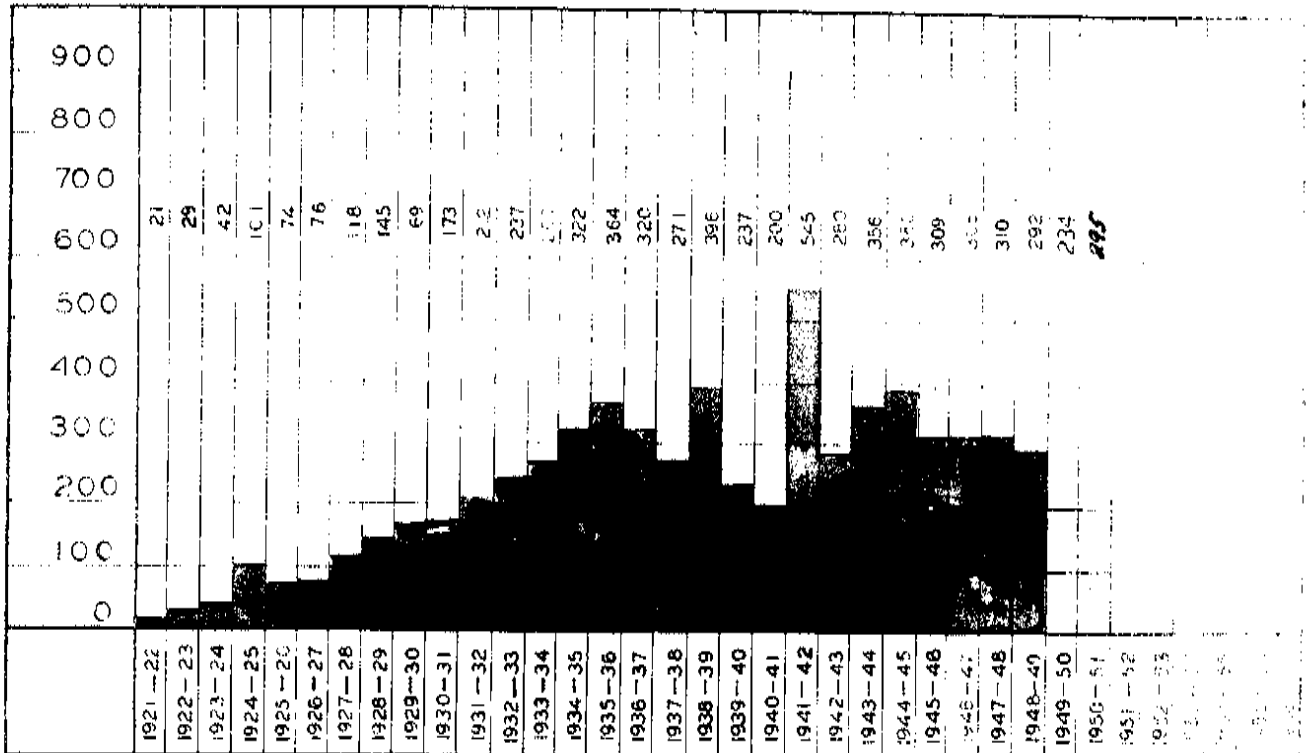


PROMEDIO POR CADA 10,000 HABITANTES

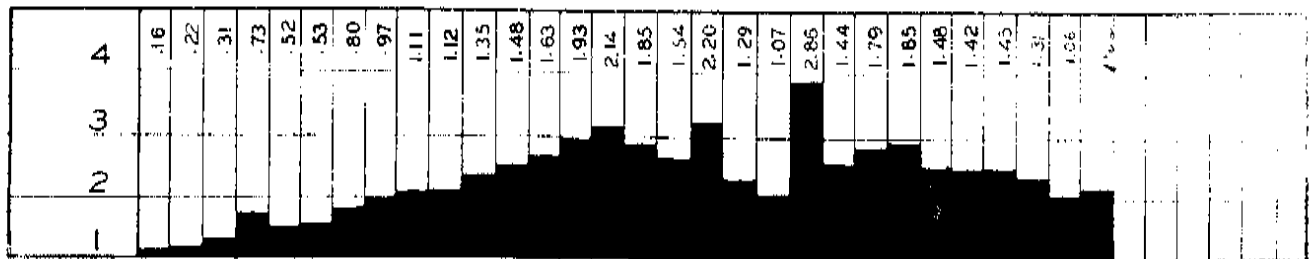


This chart shows total number of persons charged by the Police in the Island of Aggravated Assault & Battery, since 1921-22 to 1950-1951.

ASESINATOS Y HOMICIDIOS VOLUNTARIOS DESDE 1921-22 HASTA LA FECHA

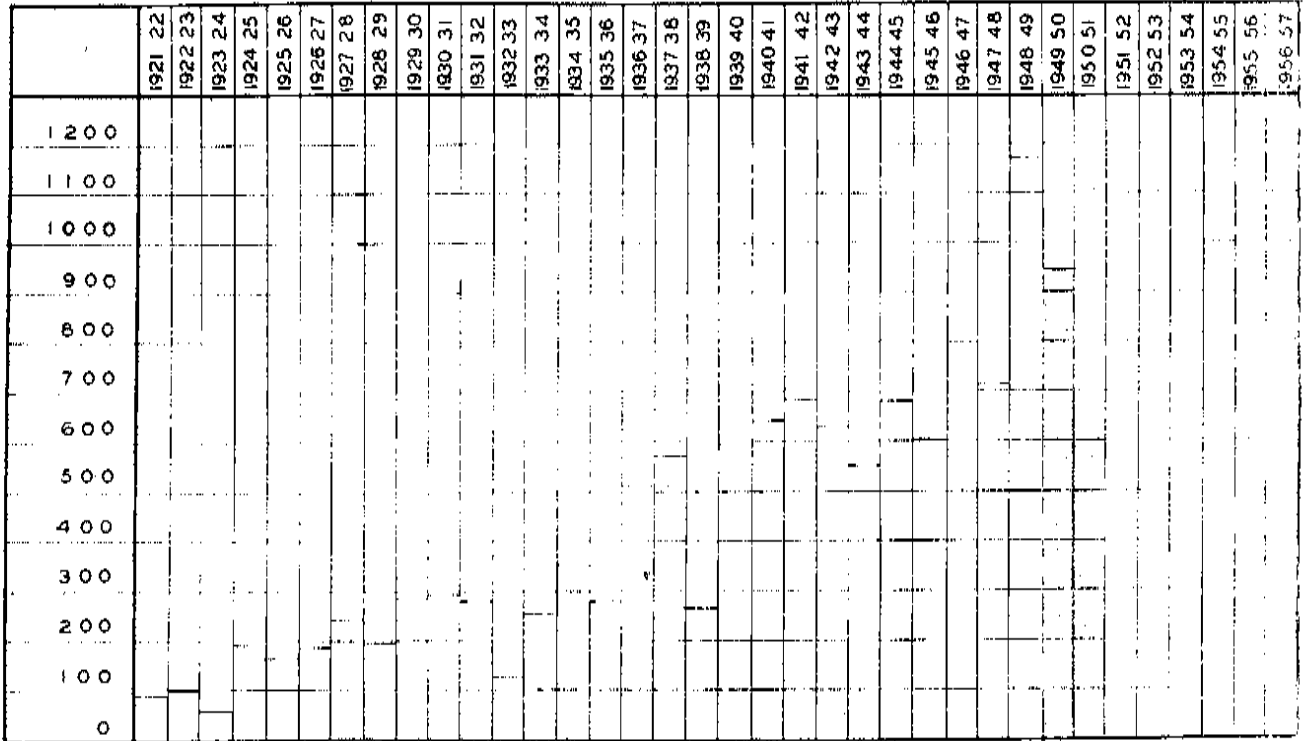


PROMEDIO POR CADA 10,000 HABITANTES

PROMEDIO POR CADA 10,000 HABITANTES

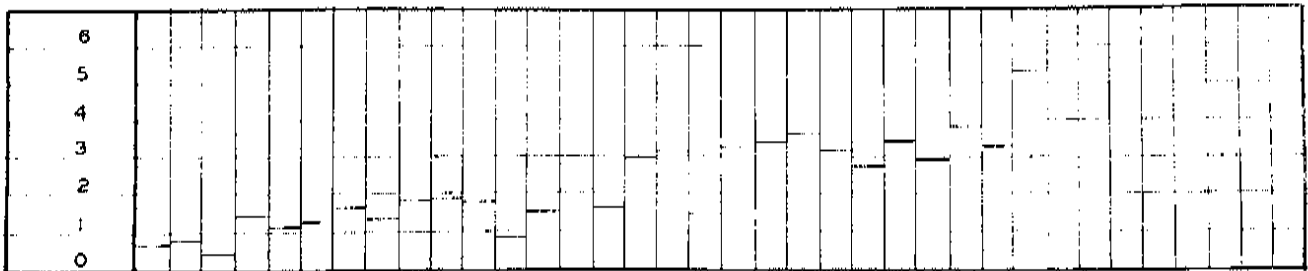
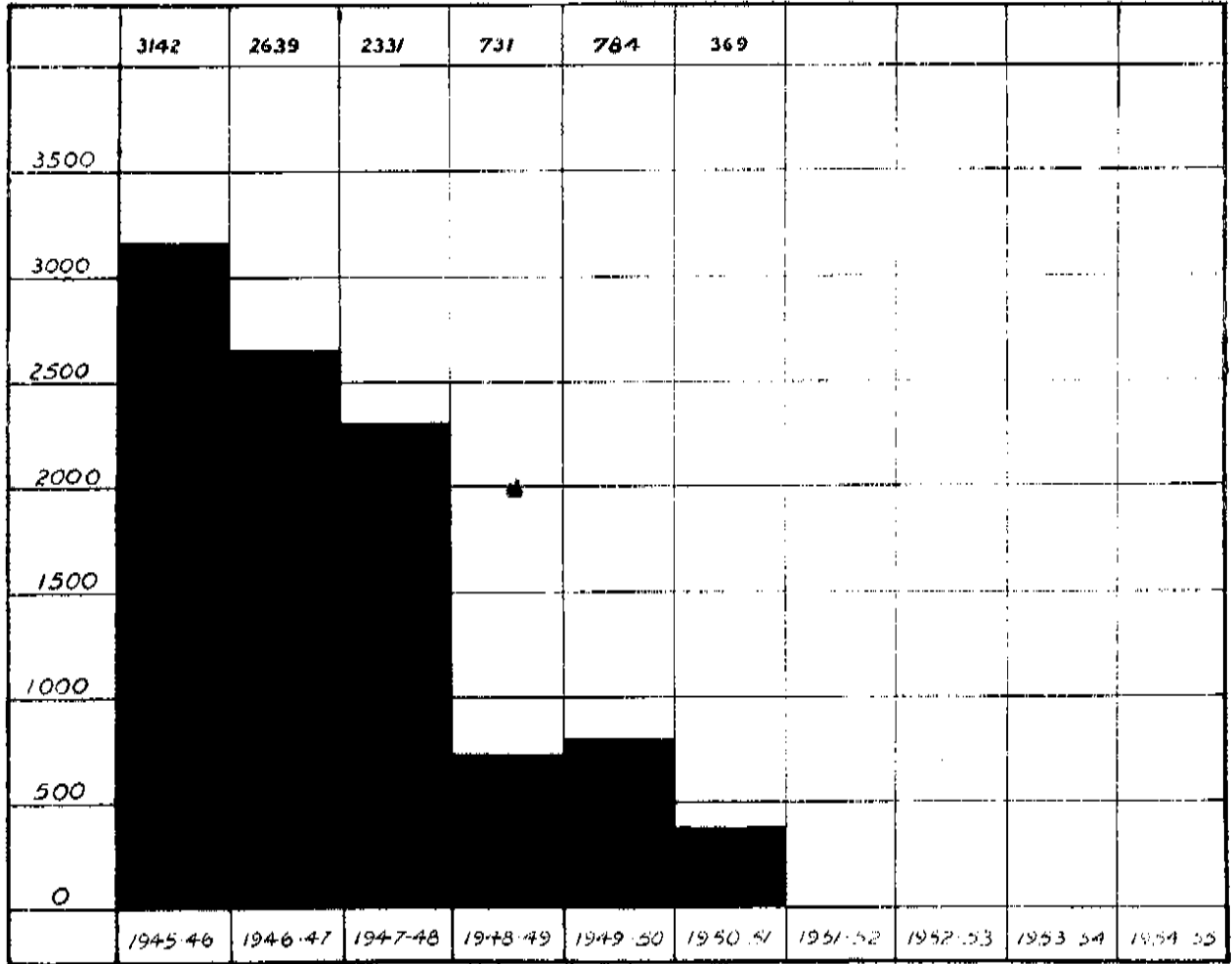


Chart showing Sex Offenses reported to the Police, since the year 1921-22 to 1950-51 and average of Offenses per each 10,000 inhabitants.

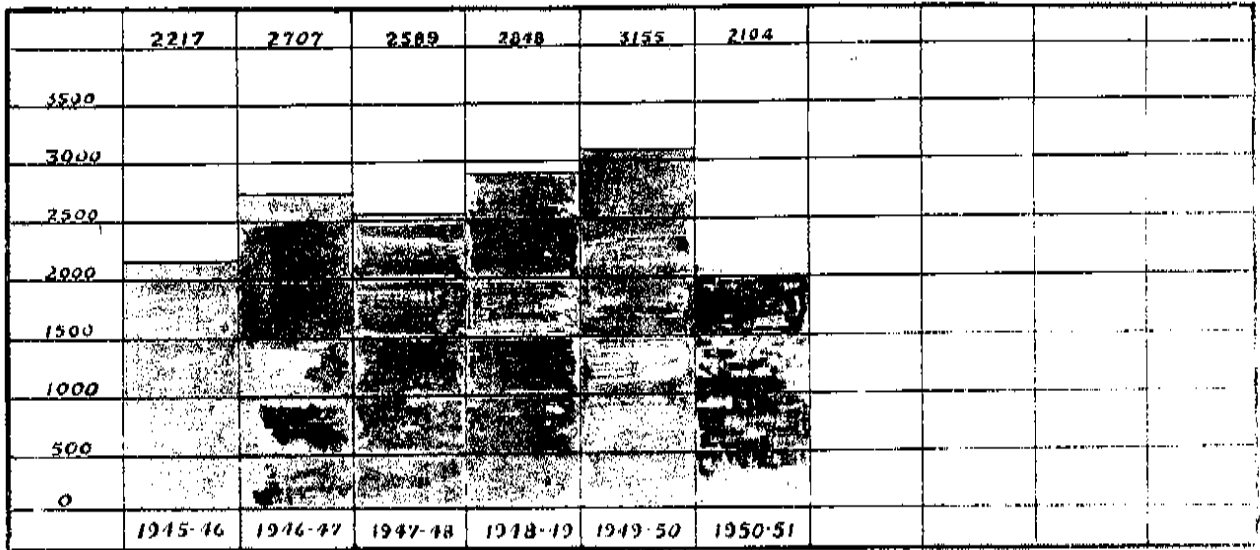

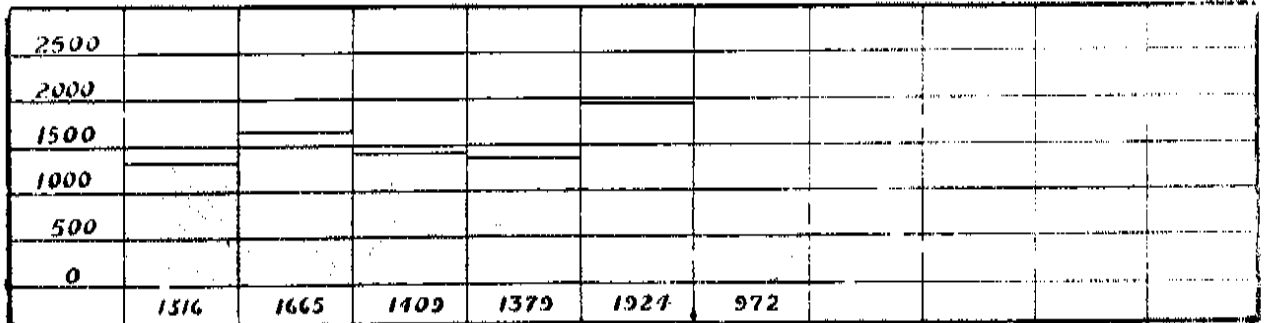
This chart shows the number of fatalities in Murders, Assaults, Accidents and suicides.

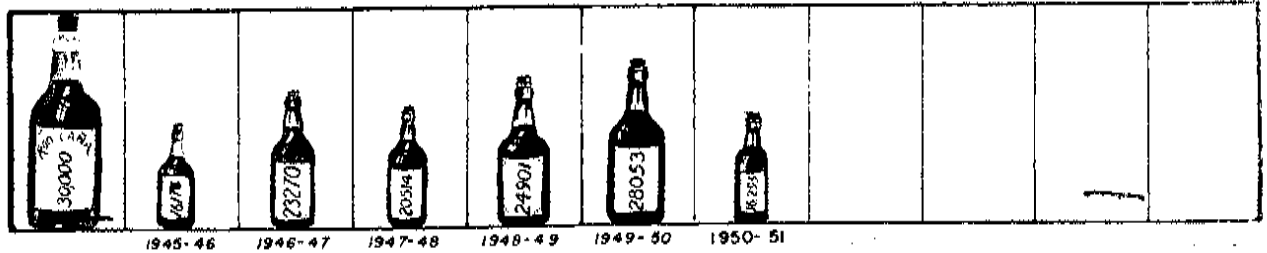
**PERSONAS ACUSADAS POR INFRACCIONES

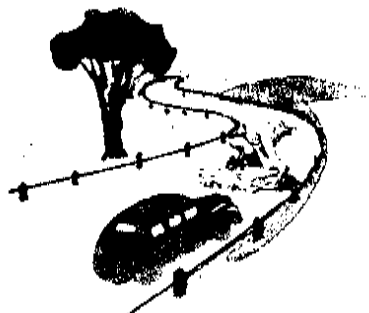

This chart shows number of persons charged for Liquor Laws, Still and Liquor seized by Police, since 1945-46 to 1950-51.

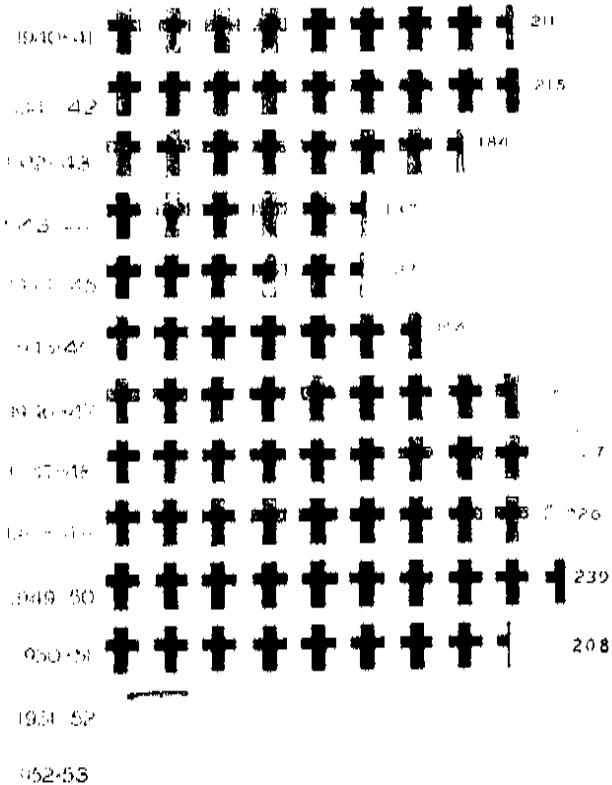

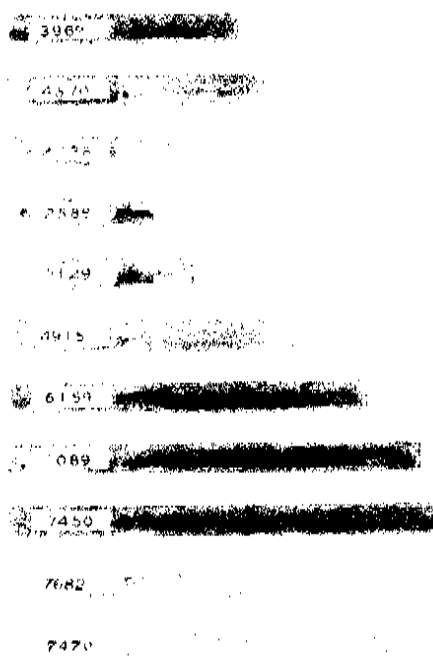

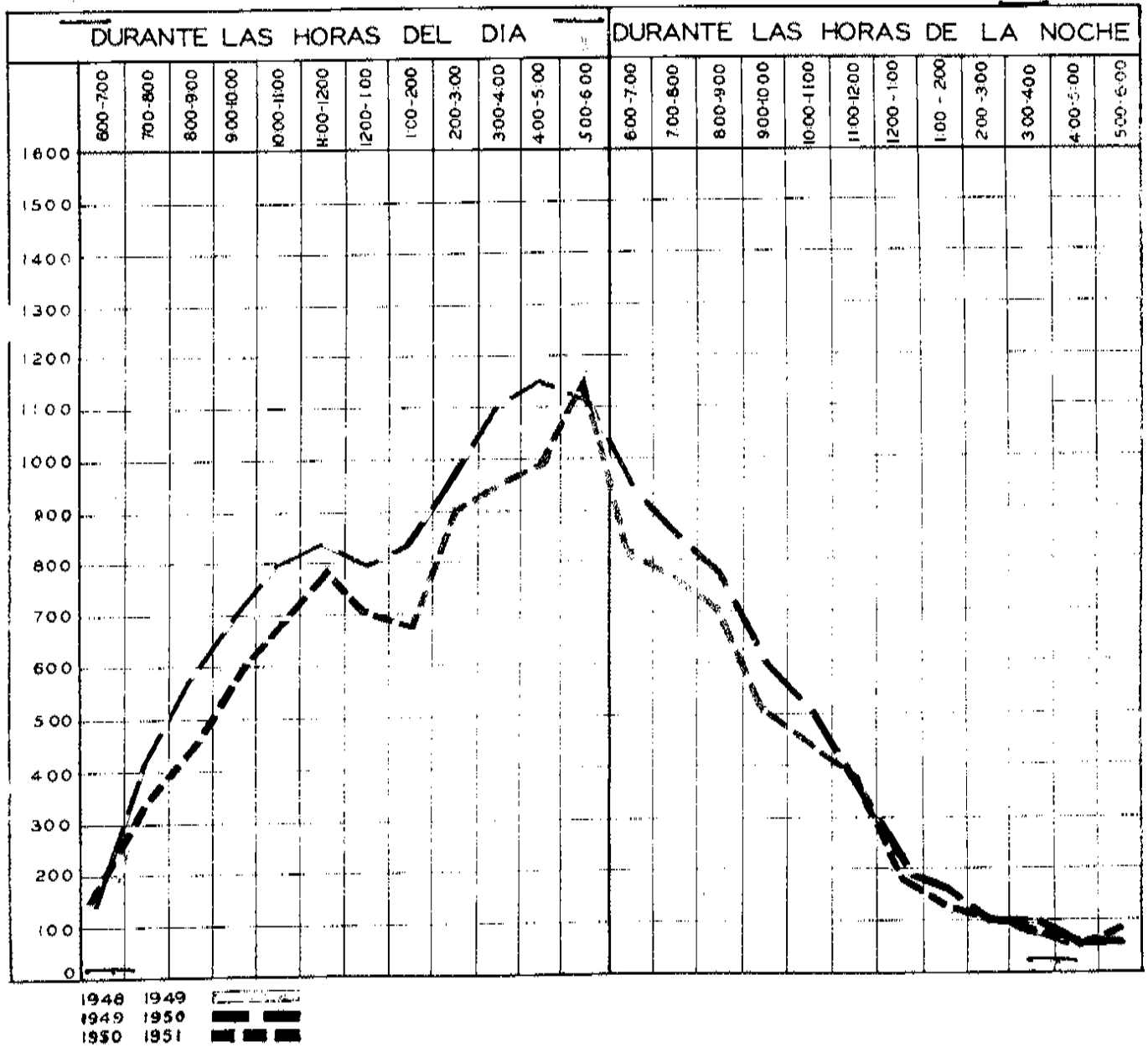

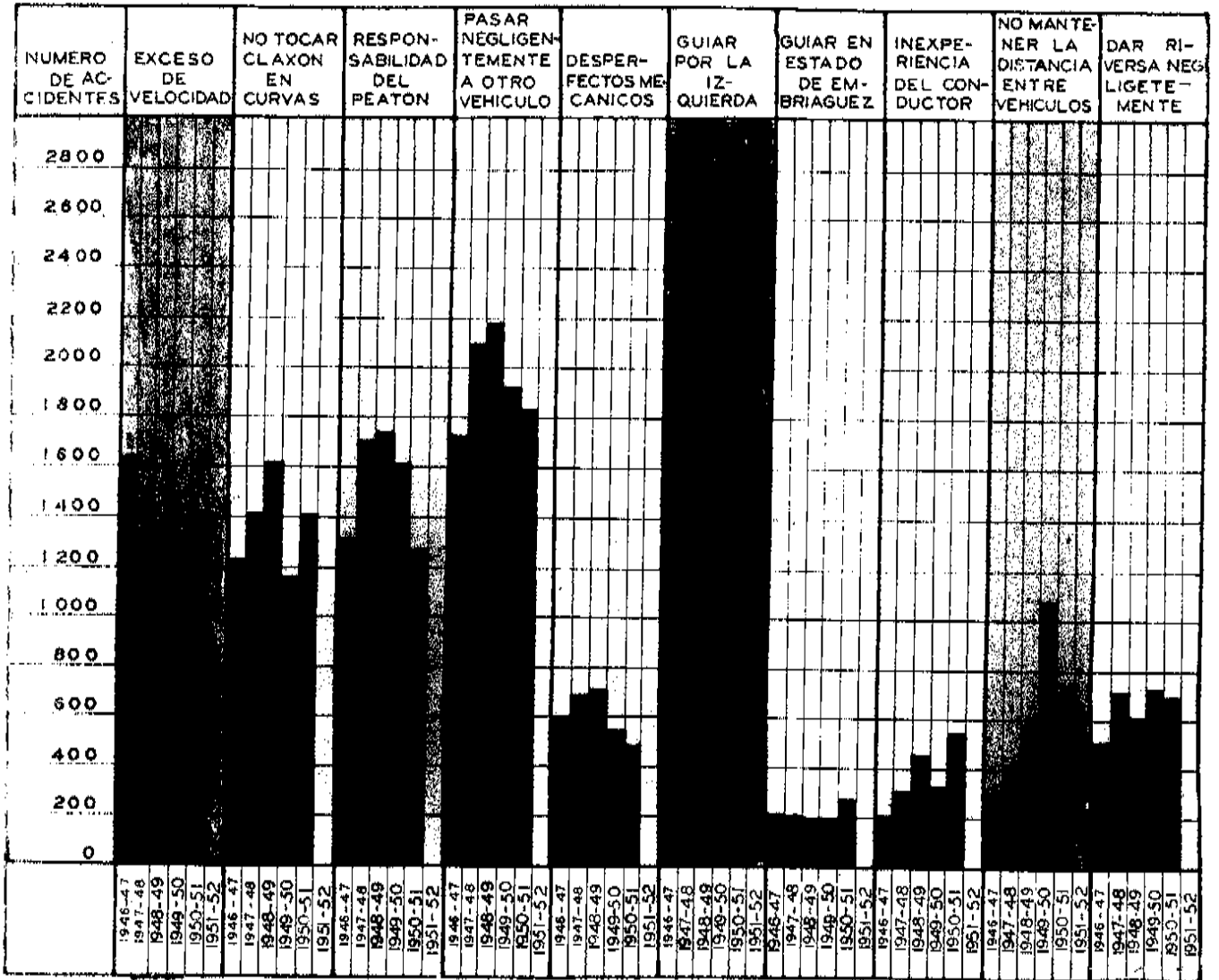
This chart shows the number of persons killed and injured in Automobile accidents, since 1940-41 to 1950-51

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S U M M A R Y

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FUNCTIONS OF THE POLICE

In judging the activities of the Police Force due recognition must always be given to the fact that the magnitude and complexity of directing its affairs have been consistently in the increase and requires added administrative competence, intense and continuous study of the changing problems involved, particularly as they are focused by the demands of an intelligent growing society and the extent of the change imposed.

The changes in the composition of the Island population, due in part to the new impetus obtained by industrialization, must also bear weight in the general consideration. In 1940 the ratio of the rural to the urban population was 1.94. This ratio had been reduced to 1.37 in 1950. Increased transportation facilities, more industrial employment opportunities, better housing conditions have marvellously contributed to an increased exodus from the rural to the urban areas. The population tendency is clearly toward numerical equalization.

The enormous changes in the concentration of people within limited areas accentuate the problems of general delinquency and the need for the searching of satisfactory solutions in relation to other causes. New means must be explored for the adequate selection, training and preparation of police personnel with the corresponding formulation of plans, policies and procedures for the improvement of the Force as a professionalized group.

POLICE PERSONNEL

The authorized police strength for the fiscal year of 1951-52 was 2739. By April 30, 1952 the force vacancies amounted to 168. About 166 civilian employees fulfill clerical and stenographic functions at the General Headquarters. The employment of civilian in clerical work, previously performed by members of the Force, has helped to place these men in field duties.

Considering the population uptrend, the relation of crime to population, and the assumption of increased police tasks, the Police Force is below the minimum standards as set forth by National investigations. On April 30, 1951 the National population ratio for police members was 1.70. At that time the Insular ratio was 1.23. On June 30, 1952 our ratio was below 1.18. Our ratio includes the total police personnel with the exception of positions still uncovered.

Within the sphere of the authority conferred upon the Police by law, the Chief of the Police administers and directs the Police organization with the firm and confident determination that it responds as effectively as possible to the increasing demands of the public well-being. On April 30, 1952 there were 2113 policemen for field work and 32 technicians assigned to scientific investigations, such as finger printing photography, ballistic, etc., see Table 2 and Chart B.

For operating purposes the Island is divided into 76 police districts, most of them under the command of a Lieutenant. For supervisory purposes these 76 districts are regrouped into 10 Police Zones each one under the command of a Captain, Table 3.

POLICE COMMISSION

The Police Commission is a body composed of three members appointed by the Governor of Puerto Rico on an honorary basis, with power established by law as follows:

To recruit the members of the Force,
To act as a judicial Board or Tribunal and
To enact rules and regulations for the government of the Force.

In 1951-52 the Commission celebrated 49 sessions, heard formal accusations against 96 policemen, resolved 28 cases of appeal, and approved 17 pensions to police members or their widows. The Commission reported that the police aid fund was \$530.01 over the figures for 1950-51. The commission's examination, trial and disposal of complaints against members of the Force points unmistakably to an established attitude of safeguarding the public and the police force from conduct unbecoming some of its members. The commission held 5 sessions more this year than during 1950-51.

Ultimate or supreme authority of the Police Force resides in the person of the Governor of Puerto Rico. The Chief of the Police is appointed by the Governor as the immediate head of the Police Force, with power to distribute it according to needs and to administer its affairs in accordance with law and the Rules and Regulations of the Force.

BUDGET EXPENDITURES

While the expenditures for 1951-52 were about 15 % higher than on the previous year, a large part of the increase was used in emergency or professional services rendered.

During the year, the Río Piedras new Police Headquarters, was

about to be completed. The Bayamón Police Headquarters was completed and occupied and plans were begun for the construction of the new Police Headquarters at Canuy. The plans, specifications and designs for the improvement and expansion of the General Headquarters at San Juan have been finished.

The distribution of the annual expenditures were as follows: 83.6% regular salaries, 1.9% emergency salaries and wages, 2.1% professional services, 4.5% maintenance, 5.7% equipment and materials and 2.1% for miscellaneous expenses. An unencumbered balance of \$22148.28 was obtained this year as against \$ 59,177.62 the year before, Table 5.

OFFICE OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL

The Office of the Inspector General of the Puerto Rico Police is composed besides the Inspector, of an auxiliary, two Division Captains to perform investigations and inspections, a lieutenant in charge of Juvenile Aid, a lieutenant in charge of the Traffic Division, an auxiliary at large and five civilian stenographers.

During the year this Office conducted 102 district inspections, 14 zonal inspections and examined 59 posts or details other than Police districts. The Office emitted 55 opinions in reference to municipal ordinances dealing with "Fiestas Patronales".

The Complaint Section of the Inspector's Office received 1596 : complaints against police members. The investigation of 1349 of them revealed that in 571 there existed sufficient ground for further study. Further investigation resulted in the application of administrative punishment in 20 cases as follows: 1 for overzealous authority, 3 for negligence while on duty, 4 for unbecoming conduct, 3 for

illegal arrests, 1 for family affairs, 5 for improper conduct, 1 for traffic violations, 1 for improper procedures, and 1 for emotional instability.

The Chiefs of the Police Districts presented 489 charges against policemen under their supervision. Of these number 300 were resolved administratively and 189 were referred to the Commission.

OFFICE OF THE PHYSICIAN

The strain of police work might be generally evaluated by the number of agents who receives medical attention. During the year, 2782 received medical examinations in regards to natural or accidental sicknesses. The loss of work days due to sickness amounted to 21321, thus reducing the numerical strength of the Force by 68 members. Physical incapacity led to the retirement of 39 more members. Six deaths were registered during the year. General medical examinations were given to 3007 men for purposes of recruitment, promotion, reappointment, etc. On the basis of 1896 plain policemen, it is worthy to consider that sickness reduced the active police strength by more than 3 %.

The Chemical Section carried out 30 experimental tests involving blood stains, poisons, explosives and paints. The Questioned Document Section examined 114 documents consisting of letters and fraudulent papers of miscellaneous kinds.

POLICE ACADEMY

The Academy is the training center for the Police Force, the heart of many police activities, and in service training school for many other government agencies with quasi-police responsibilities. District and Zonal Commanders carry independent institutes to meet specific problems in their own localities or to obviate requirements not fully covered during the short training course.

The public demand for the extension of police services and protection are reflected in the instructional areas covered by the Academy. The training areas are: Citizen rights including rights common to all men, arrest making, searching, crime investigation, identification, fingerprinting, scientific photography, analysis of questioned documents, collecting evidence, police regulations, public relations, making reports, testifying in court, code of ethics, statistics, use

of firearms, general defensive tactics, public behavior, courtesy, traffic conduct, first aid, the keeping of records, the filling and safeguarding of records, supervision of personnel, participation in legislation preparation, etc. It is evident that the degree to which these basic police knowledges might be effectively assimilated depends on the learning abilities of the police candidate as well as his level of educational preparation. The recruitment of new policemen is forcefully influenced by these two factors and the salary scale offered by the Department. These conditions must be understood well by the public, as they are understood by us.

In 1951-52 the Academy carried out the following activities:

- 1- Two hundred recruits passed the regular training course and were promptly assigned to the field Districts to obtain practical experience and additional training under the supervision of the District Commanders.
- 2- Fifty-two regular policemen received specialized training and were assigned to duty at the General Constitutional Assembly.
- 3- An advanced course on first aid was given to 42 regular police members.
- 4- Training in latent fingerprint lifting was taken by 14 policemen who were assigned to the police zones with the exception of the Metropolitan Area. These fingerprint experts perform their work in their respective territories without extra aid from Headquarters.
- 5- A general refresher course in gun firing, judo and first aid was given to the entire police membership of the Huncaeo Zone.

6- The use of tear gas bombs, chemicals, and firing practices of small firearms was finished by 151 penal guards of the Bureau of Prisons, Puerto Rico Department of Justice.

7- Defensive tactics were taught to a group of 123 Auxiliary Guards of the Civil Defense Organization at Isla de Cabra.

8- A nine week training program was completed by 153 agents and 25 regular policemen conducted by members of the Bureau of Internal Revenue and the Division of Alcoholic Beverages, Department of Finance, under the auspices of the Police Academy.

9- An advanced course in First Aid was given by members of the Academy to 50 public school teachers of the Mayaguez Area.

10- Firing practices were given to 395 regular policemen from the General Headquarters, La Fortaleza, the Metropolitan Area and the Arecibo Zone.

11- In addition to conducting general conferences offered by F. B. I. agents and other local government officers, the Academy completed and published the first edition of a Manual for Police Instruction and is now revising and enlarging a second edition.

12- The Academy recommended the lengthening of the training course and the inclusion of supervisory courses for officers.

RECORDS DIVISION

There are 82 employees in the Division of Records. Of this number 46 civilian employees and the remaining 36 are supervisory assistants and fingerprint experts. The keeping of records safely and in such a manner that they may be used with promptness, is

one of the most important phases of this Division.

The Fingerprint Section had 276,432 fingerprints completely classified and on file at the beginning of the year and filed 29,463 during the current year for a total of 305,900. There are 20,331 additional fingerprints still to be filed. This is an excellent, perhaps marvellous collection of fingerprints. On the other hand, it is an indication of the criminal history of our society. These fingerprints are about 15 % of the present Island population. A total of 16,389 fingerprint cards were received during the year from different government agencies. Members of this Section gave 9 conferences on subjects related with the work of the Section. See Records Division Report, page 25.

The Firearm Registration Section received 34,225 applications for firearm licenses during the year. Of this number 11,049 were fully investigated and approved and the remainder are in the process of investigation. A total of 3357 pieces of firearms were registered.

The Certification Section prepared 11,768 certified declarations of good conduct for firearm licenses, travelling visas, and accident statements which required the payment of \$17,652 in revenue stamps. An understanding reached between the Department of Labor and the Police Department, led to the preparation of clearance statements on good conduct for 6,285 labor employees free of charge. An additional 1,158 certifications for recruits to the National Guard and 335 firearm practice licenses for the Commission of Parks and Recreation were issued. Requests for summary reports on 5,937 persons were

prepared and remitted to various Federal and Insular agencies during the year.

TRAFFIC

Of 46,108 traffic violations reported during 1951-52, 33,775 of them were committed during the hours of the day and 12,333 during the night. A total of 30,130 violations occurred in the urban area and 15,978 in the rural zone. The Police cleared 46,023 of those offenses and extended formal accusation to 43,455 male and 483 female violators. Obviously some of the violators were accused for more than one traffic violation during the year.

The courts solved 31,121 cases of traffic violators, of which 284 were for female violators. The courts acquitted or fined 17.5% of the male violators and 25% of the female violators. In 1950-51 the courts dismissed or fined 24.1% of the number of traffic violators.

AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS

Vehicle accidents totaled 13,727 and involved 21,636 of the registered vehicles. These accidents caused the death of 209 individuals and injuries to another 7364 persons. The number of accidents went up 7.2% with respect to 1950-51; the number of vehicles involved in accidents increased 7.7%; deaths went up 0.5 % and injured persons increased 5.3% over the figures for the previous fiscal year, Tables 6 and 7, Charts C and D.

The vehicle accidents against pedestrians caused the largest number of fatalities and injuries. During the year 54 men, 12 women and 39 children lost their lives in 2945 accidents caused by as many vehicles. An additional 2864 men, women and children were injured.

This class of accidents constituted 21.5 % of all the vehicle accidents registered during the year and produced 55 % of the total deaths and 36.4 % of the total injuries.

Accidents produced by the collision of motorvehicles with other motor vehicles totaled 7623, killed 38 persons and injured 2223 more. A total of 15,525 motor vehicles participated. Thus 55.5 % of the total number of accidents were produced by 71.6 % of the vehicles involved in accidents. This type of accident contributed with 8.2 % of the deaths and 28.3 % of the injured persons.

In 648 motor vehicle accidents against bicycles, 446 persons were injured and 5 children were killed. Of the injured, 150 were children, 294 were men and 5 were women. Bicycling in the Metropolitan Area is evidently dangerous, aside from the fact that the use of any two wheel vehicle is highly risky.

In 34 collisions, of motor vehicles with trains 38 persons were injured and 2 were killed. There were 1022 accidents against fixed objects which resulted in 17 deaths and 879 injured persons. In 211 accidents with road animals, 47 were injured. As many as 340 cars overturned, killing 12 persons and injuring 630 more. The remaining 904 accidents of the annual volume were of various natures, and caused 20 deaths, and injuries to 732 individuals. The enumeration of these accident facts for the year 1951-52 points to give responsibilities at the police and court enforcement levels.

Over 18.2 % of the annual motor vehicle accidents were against fixed objects, trains, animals, including overturned and other accidents of a similar nature, Table 6. These accidents which clearly indicate

excessive velocity, gross negligence and wantonness, caused 24.4 % of the total deaths and 29.5 % of the annual injured figures, Table 8.

(a) Rates by Types of Vehicles:-

The highest number of deaths for every 100 motor vehicles involved in accidents in 1951-52 was produced by the vehicles of the Federal Government with 3.77. Other rates were as follows: motorcycles 2.73; trucks 1.20; busses 1.00; passenger cars 0.94; taxis 0.70; commercial vehicles 0.60; and Insular Government 0.25. The total death rate per 100 vehicles involved was 0.96.

Inasmuch as the statistics for injured adults reached a very high level with 5862 of which 4603 were men and probably family supporters, the rates for injured persons were also calculated. Motorcycles registered the highest number of persons injured for every 100 vehicles involved with 55.2. The injured rates for the other vehicles were: taxis 45.0; Federal Government vehicles 37.9; busses 41.1; commercial vehicles 34.6; Insular Government vehicles 34.4; passenger cars 33.4; and trucks 36.3. The total annual injured rate for all vehicles was 36.2. Clearly the injured rates were above average for motorcycles, taxis, busses and Federal Government vehicles and below average for commercial, Insular Government and passenger cars. The rate for trucks was equal to the average. These rates point to the fact that in 1951-52 Federal Government vehicles, motorcycles and busses inflicted the highest number of deaths and injuries per every 100 vehicles involved in accidents. The other types had high rates in either deaths or injuries but not in both. See Table 5, page 33.

About 29.1 % of all motor vehicles registered until June, 1952, were involved in accidents. Private passenger cars produced 41.6 % of the 209 annual deaths and 39.2 % of the total injured figures.

Taxis had 15.3 % of the deaths and 26.4 % of the injured persons. The highest frequency of accidents occurred between 5:00 and 6:00 P. M. during the year with 1223, resulting in 15 deaths and 717 persons injured, Table 9 and Chart I.

(b) Automobilo Accidents Monthly Variation:-

May, 1952 registered the highest number of accidents with 1,309, yet, it also reported the lowest number of deaths, (9). June, 1952 had the highest frequency of deaths with 27 and was followed by April with 23 and March with 21, Chart F.

About 2 1/2 times as many men as children were killed during the year in motor vehicle accidents and about 2 1/2 times as many children as women.

February had the lowest number of accidents with 734 but the deaths were 15 and another 547 individuals were injured. A monthly average of 1146 accidents, involving 1607 vehicles, killed 17 persons and injured 655 individuals in 1951-52.

OTHER KINDS OF ACCIDENTS

Accidents produced by drowning, labor, burns, falls, firearms, bicycles, electricity and others accounted for 131 deaths and 845 injured individuals during 1951-52. Aviation accidents are not included in the 907 non-vehicular accidents reported, Table 10.

MOTORCYCLE SQUAD

A monthly average of 75 motorcyclists presented charges against 24,981 traffic violators of which number 11,257 paid \$ 47,574 in fines, 164 received jail sentences, 975 were acquitted, the cases of 454 were filed and the remainder were left pending. Police personnel salaries

involved and gasoline expenditures amounted to about \$ 20,000.00,
Table 27.

CRIMES

Crimes during the year amounted to 148,747 or a 2.9 % (4244) more than previous year (144,503). Also the population rate increased from 653 last year to 671 this year, for every 10,000 inhabitants. The Urban areas accumulated 107,572 offenses for a reduction of 2.9 % from the figures for 1950-51, while the Rural areas registered an increase of 22.3 %, Tables 12, 14 and 15.

(a) Major Crimes Trends:-

There was a general increase of 4.7 % in major crimes throughout the Island in 1951-52 over 1950-51. The Urban areas registered a rise of 9.6 % while Rural areas had a decrease of 6.8 % in these types of offenses. Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny, Auto Theft increased 12.0%, 27.3 %, 11.7 %, 4.5 %, 71.0 % respectively, Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter, Manslaughter by Negligence and Aggravated Assaults reflected downward trends of 37.7 %, 11.2 %; 3.2 %, respectively, Table 11 and Chart, G.

(b) Crimes Against Property:-

Crimes against property constituted 8.3 % of the total number of offenses committed during the year. For 1951-52 property crimes were distributed as follows: 92 Robberies, 6598 Larcenies, 1411 Malicious Mischiefs, 724 Embezzlements, 2507 Burglaries, 123 Forgeries, 742 False Impersonations and 106 Auto Thefts, for a total of 12308. Though there were slight increases in Robberies, Burglaries and Auto Theft, property crimes were 2.0 % less this year than last year, when the total re-

gistered was 12563.

The estimated value of missing and stolen property passed the million dollars mark with \$ 1,059,558. This is an increase of \$ 240,430 over 1950-51. The Police was able to locate and recover 48.6 % of this amount. The property value of automobiles stolen and recovered was reduced to 97.2 % of its original value, mostly due to damage produced on them. The estimated percentages of other articles recovered were as follows: 44.8 % of the cattle, 42.4 % of bicycles, 28.3 % for jewelry and money, 17.7 % of the clothing and 16.3 % of all other property, Table 24.

(c) Crimes Against the Person:-

Against the human person, crimes totaled 1023 in 1951-52 while in 1950-51 this total was 1174 for Criminal Homicides, Rapes and Aggravated Assaults. For the purpose of this comparison all the serious crimes against the human lives or the conservation of them were considered. The distribution of the crimes was as follows: Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter 149; Manslaughter by Negligence, 127; Rape, 112; Attempt to kill, 210; Attack to Murder, 102; Attempts to Commit Homicide, 32; Mayhem, 291.

(d) Crimes Against Morals:-

The year ending June 30, 1952, closed with 279 offenses of Indecent Exposures, 112 Rapes, 108 Prostitutions, 56 Sodomics and 8 Incests for a total of 563 or 2 offenses less than in 1950-51. Prostitutions and Rapes increased and the other types of offenses decreased to equalize numerically the annual totals. Rape offenses constituted 20 % of the totals. Approximately 1 offense in every 250 committed during the year

was a Rape, or and Incest or a Sodomy, or an Indecent Exposure or an act of Prostitution. It is very important to remember that Police Statistics represent only a part of the offenses actually committed, in other words, the legal acts in which the Police Force intervenes. As such, police statistics serve as mere indicators of prevalent social conditions. They do not reveal the whole story, Table 14.

(e) Crimes Against Public Order and Security:

All those crimes which are similar, either by their nature, or influence on public safety, order or security were grouped in this category. Common aggressions, even though somewhat related with crimes against the human person, were likewise listed under public order, except when the conditions described indicated mutilation or the infliction of wounds of a serious nature. In this latter case the offenses were classified under Aggravated Assaults.

In 1951-52 the crimes against public order or safety numbered 113,443 and constituted 76.2 % of all the offenses committed during the year. Offenses against traffic laws amounted to 46,108 and were more than 40 % of the group. The total number of violations against the regulations of the Public Service Commission was 4921 and against road laws 524, elevating transit violations to 51,553. Transit offenses were followed by Drunkenness with 22,617; Disorderly Conduct with 20,037; Common Aggressions with 12,274; Weapons Carrying 4,691; Unnecessary Noises 1,384; Non-registration of firearms 221, Health Laws 161; Public Health and Safety 155; Narcotics 81 and Arson 69, Table, 14.

Traffic violations increased 14.5 % over last year's figures. For

the other offenses the increases were: Regulations of Public Service Commission 37.5%; Road Laws 57.8 %; Unnecessary Noises 14.9%; Narcotics 406.3 %. While only 16 cases of violations against the Narcotic Laws were reported in 1950-51, the number in 1951-52 was 81. The investigation on organized crime and criminals conducted by the Federal Grand Jury in Puerto Rico emphasized the dangers consequent to the expansion of the narcotic market.

Decreases were registered in some of the offenses related to public order such as Drunkenness 4.3 %, Public Disturbances 3.8 %, Common Aggressions 4.3 %, Non registration of firearms 46.2 %, Weapons Carrying 3.1 %, Health Laws 32.3 % and Arson 48.5 %.

UNFOUNDED OFFENSES

During the year, 979 offenses reported to the Police were considered without ground to initiate a formal accusation. Such offenses are classified as unfounded. There were 274 unfounded cases of minor Larceny, 197 of Traffic Laws, 89 of Aggression and Battery, 84 Breaches of the Peace, 63 Burglary, 61 Minor Aggression, 36 Malicious Mischief, 34 Embezzlements, 33 Grand Larceny, 19 False Impersonation, and the remainder comprised Weapons Carrying, Policy Slips, Joy Riding, Liquor Laws, Robbery, Arson, Attempt to Kill, Rape and Narcotic violations, see Table 14.

OFFENSES CLEARED AND PERSONS CHARGED

During the fiscal year 1951-52 a total of 1023 serious crimes were committed against the person. From this total 1019 or 99.6 % were cleared and 1032 persons charged. Among these types of crimes the

100.0 % cleared for Aggravated Assaults was highest, followed by Negligent Manslaughter with 99.2 %; Rape 99.1 % and Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter with 98.6 %, Table 15, Chart II.

Serious crimes against property amounted to 9303. Of the total 4558 or 49.0 % were cleared and 4421 persons charged. It can be observed from Table 15 and Chart I that Robberies obtained the highest percent of clearance (68.5 %), followed by Larceny 50.7 %, Burglary 45.0 % and Auto Theft 21.7 %.

(a) Female Offenders:-

About 35 women were charged daily during the fiscal year 1951-52 as against 33 on 1950-51. The charges were for offenses equally common among male offenders, though in a lesser degree. Of the 12,869 women charged, 47 % were below the age of 25 years and 21 % below 20 years of age. There were 263 women charged for violations against property laws; 1,061 for violations against the human person; 60 against morals and the remainder against public order. Tables 16-19 and Chart J.

(b) Male Offenders:-

A total of 155,342 men were charged during the year. A maximum of 14,862 men were charged in the Month of May, 1952. The lowest number of men charged occurred in February, 1952 with 10,886. The highest frequency of male charged was for ages 25 to 29 years with 28,558 or 18.4 % of the total number.

About 48 % of the male violators were less than 30 years of age and 29.1% were under 25 years of age. For the first five age groups of women charged the percentages were as follows: 0.3 %, 20.9%, 25.5%, 16.8% and 12.6 %. The percentages of men charged in the same order were 0.7 %, 10.1 %, 18.3 %, 18.4 % and 16.5 %. The percentage of

female violators in the age group 15 to 19 years was more than twice the percentage for the same group of men. About 55.4 % of the women charged were less than 25 years of age, Tables 16, 19 and Chart J.

PERSONS FOUND GUILTY

The total percentage of persons found guilty for serious crimes was 37.4 % and for less serious crimes, 61.1 %, Table 20.

The data related with persons found guilty is shown in Table 20 and Charts K and L. The highest percentages of persons found guilty of serious crimes are as follows: Auto Theft, 51.9 %; Larceny, 44.6 %; Burglary, 31.3 %; Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter, 27.3 % and Rape, 23.1 %. For less serious crimes: Drunkenness, 87.5 %; Gambling, 81.9 %; Disorderly Conduct, 74.2 %; Forgery, 73.4 %, Embezzlement, 69.8 % and Prostitution, 65.2 %.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

The Police reported 1581 cases of juvenile delinquency during the fiscal year. Of the 921 cases acted upon by the courts, 375 were acquitted and 546 sentenced. Since 1948-49 the number of juvenile cases reported annually, has been increasing. For the years 1948-49, 1949-50, 1950-51 the reported number of juvenile delinquents were 549, 626, and 1229 respectively. The courts are presently acting in no more than 60% of the cases, if the Police figures are correct, Table 21 and Chart M-N.

Statistics indicate that generally 2.5 % of the children attending school become delinquent. For the school year of 1951, there were 454,866 children between the ages of 6 and 18 matriculated in the schools of the Island and 251,423 children of school age were not attending any school. Allowing a 5 % delinquent rate for non-school children, there were

approximately 24,000 potential delinquent children in the Island in 1951. The number which is being officially reported by the Police is obviously very small. On the other hand the increase in educational opportunities at all levels would clearly decrease juvenile delinquency. But public interest must be focused to that group which would become delinquent regardless of extended educational facilities. Education, of course, diminishes but does not eliminate delinquency.

(a) Police Athletic League:-

The Police Athletic League has helped to increase the children's right to healthful recreational opportunities by exploring the community availability of resources and engaging its enthusiastic cooperation. The League does not always wait for children to come to it but often goes ^{after} ~~to~~ them. The League holds some of their programs in schools, hospitals and other places. But the League, because of its juvenile delinquency objectives, concentrates its efforts in the potentially delinquent group, without altogether ignoring the others.

Unfortunately many more programs can not be effected through lack of community apathy or adequate personnel facilities. The League's activities are carried out mostly in the Urban areas, where chapters are generally organized. Yet it is prepared to extent its programs to the Rural areas just as well. In fact several sub-chapters have been already established. Government agencies are often lending movie projectors and other equipments to give educational pictures. Plans are underway to establish recreational centers where children may assemble in larger numbers to engage freely in writing, studying, reading, playing music and hearing lectures from prominent community leaders.

Communal centers have been established in Ponce, Humacao, Caguas, Ciales, and as many as three in San Juan. Mayaguez will soon construct a house for the League at a construction value of \$ 10,000. The project is mothered by a group of prominent ladies from that city under Mrs. Matilde Nadal de Vidal and Mrs. Helen Font de Delgado auspices.

What has been done has not been obtained easily. Some Police Districts are unwilling to divert any part of its police personnel to these activities due to insufficient manpower. Some municipalities with high juveniledelinquency are not given enough attention to its preventive phase. In spite of these and many other difficulties, the League increased its children's membership by 6800. In 1951-52 about 12404 different activities in which 160,024 children throughout the Island participated were effected. The League spent \$ 6,971.15 in equipment, transportation, office and meals, during the year. For next year the League is hopeful of obtaining \$ 10,000 in donations and other contributions. The League's principal internal problem is the need of personnel freed from other police duties and trained in preventive work.

The Police Athletic League was organized in 1943.

WEAPONS SEIZED

The Police seized 2,523 illegal pieces of different arms during the year as follows: 254 revolvers, 61 pistols, 23 rifles, 629 machetes, 624 knives, 197 razors blades, 123 stabbing knives, and 612 of other kinds of instruments. Only 172 of the revolvers and pistols seized were legally registered. In every 100 illegal arms seized by

the police there were 25 machetes, 25 knives, 13 firearms, 3 razors blades, 5 stabbing knives and the remainder were of other types of arms, Table 25.

NARCOTIC VIOLATIONS

In 1946-47 one person was arrested for a narcotic violation. By 1949-50 the number of violations had reached to 76, decreased to 16 in 1950-51 and rose again to 81 in the current fiscal year. Though numerically small, violations of this nature are highly dangerous in view of the relation which they bear to numerous other offenses. In the sessions held by the Federal Grand Jury investigating organized crime and criminals in Puerto Rico, the reporting agencies indicated with overwhelming testimony the menacing conditions surrounding the narcotic traffic. Criminals as a rule, change their fields of activities when conditions become too difficult. So, if "Bolita" violations are decreasing, violators must explore some other activities.

POLICY SLIPS

Offenses against the laws of Policy Slips, "Bolita" have been reduced to the point of apparent elimination. These violators have probably shifted their fields of illegal activities. In 1951-52 the number of offenses committed in Policy Slips was 161. The population rate for this type of offense have been reduced from 11.45 per 10,000 inhabitants in 1946-47 to 0.73 for this fiscal year. For the intervening fiscal years commencing with 1947-48 the rates were, 10.14; 2.91; 3.07 and 1.47.

LIQUOR LAWS

Illicit liquor seized by the Police during the fiscal year, totaled

12,565 quarts. The Police destroyed 451 illicit stills and seized 300 more for evidence in the Courts. Comparing these figures with the figures for the previous year, it will be noted that a decrease of 22.9% in the illicit quarts seized, a 20.5 % in the stills destroyed and 25.9% in the stills seized for evidence was obtained.

OTHER POLICE ACTIVITIES

On January 1952, the Chief of the Police delivered a radio address through the program Insular Events, setting forth the major guiding policies in the development of the Police Force. He summarized briefly the police activities during the last 25 years, emphasizing the growing enthusiasm to raise the professional level of the Police Force.

Most encouraging and stimulating letters and comments were received indicating a certain degree of understanding desire to participate in the solution of some of the problems set forth.

Another address was delivered before the Automobile Club of Puerto Rico, an affiliate of the American Automobile Association, during the week dedicated by the Club to the Prevention of Automobile Accidents. The address analyzed the growth of the automobile in Puerto Rico since 1906, indicated the parallel increase in the construction of roads, and the development of traffic legislation to regulate the use of the public highways. The increase in motor vehicle accidents, infliction of deaths and injuries and concurrent economic losses involved, were statistically presented covering a period of years.

Officers of the Police Force represented the Department at the meeting held by the Federal Grand Jury in relation with the investigation of organized crimes and criminals in Puerto Rico. Very

valuable information was presented by the Police to the Grand Jury in the form of statistics, graphs, policies and field work. The Police received commendatory statements from the Office of the Federal Attorney General in Puerto Rico for the materials presented.

A comprehensive study of the Traffic Problem was made by the Statistical Section in which solutions and other considerations were analyzed.

There are some service fields in which the Police are intensely interested, even though at present they are prevented from extending its facilities. Among these are Juvenile Aid, The Police Athletic League, and Juvenile Delinquency. The traffic problem with its various technical, legislative and administrative aspects is one of grave concern to the Police. There are of course, many other equally important problems demanding attention, such as personnel needs, re-organization improvement, plant facilities. The Police is moving forward with hopeful purposes consonant with public demands for more adequate protection and vigilance of the social order.

RECORDS DIVISION REPORT

The Records Division of the Police is one of the Divisions of the Bureau of Administration and consists of the following sections:-
 Finger prints, Statistics, Firearm Registration, Certifications, Single prints, and General File Section. The personnel and activities performed during the year by these Sections are as follows:

Fingerprints Section:-

Statistics Section:

The principal function of this Section is the preparation of monthly and annual reports covering the activities of the Police Department. They are presented in tables and charts and are submitted to the Governor of Puerto Rico. In addition to these reports, the Section prepares surveys related to Police Matters, such as Traffic, Juvenile

Delinquency, etc.

All this work is performed manually and the Section consists of one Statistical Officer and 5 civilian employees.

COMMUNICATION DIVISION REPORT

Communication System:

The Department operates and maintains a radio system with fixed points transmitters at San Juan, Bayamón, Arecibo, Aguadilla, Mayaguez, Ponce, Guayama, Humacao and Caguas. Besides those, there are 100 automobiles with radio units and 2 maritime mobile units with radio communication equipment. About 75 % of the automobiles equipped with radio units are assigned to the Metropolitan Area.

New Equipment:

During the year, 11 radio stations and 10 radio units for automobiles were purchased. The 11 radio units were installed in various Police quarters in the Metropolitan Area and are controlled by a special station.

Special Activities:

Recently an individual radio communication service was inaugurated in the Metropolitan Area. This communication service operates at a frequency of 154.89 megacycles and it is controlled directly from the Office of the Superintendent of the Metropolitan Area.

New radio equipment has been ordered for some posts and districts of the Metropolitan Area that have no radio service.

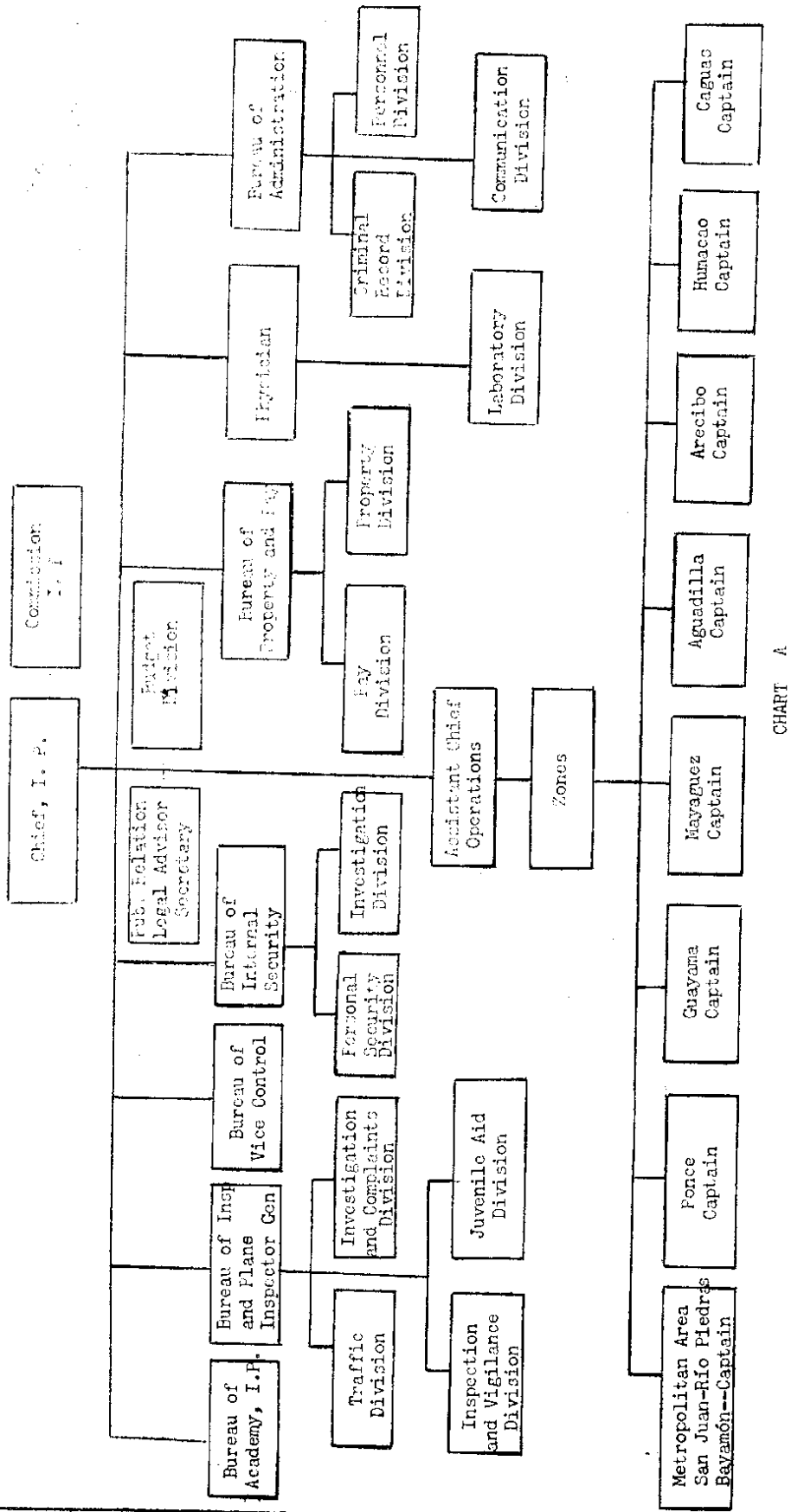

By Zonal Groups April 30, 1952**

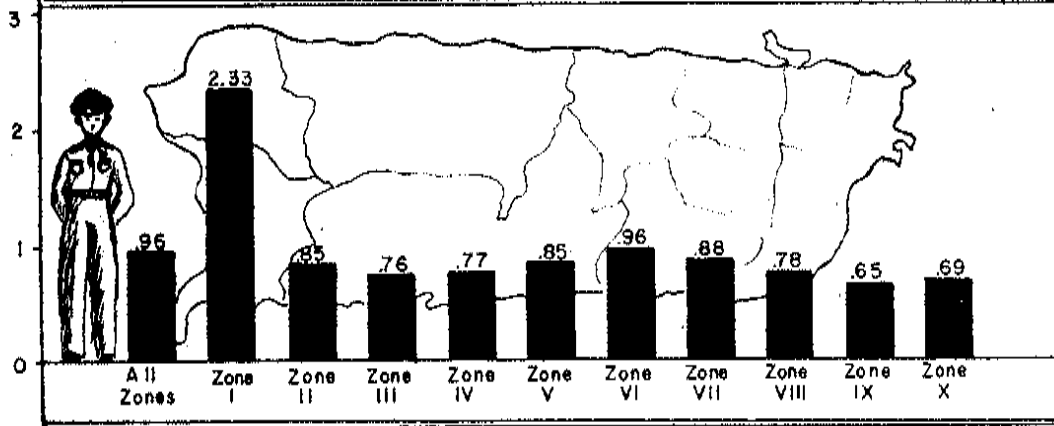

 1942- 43 TO 1951-52

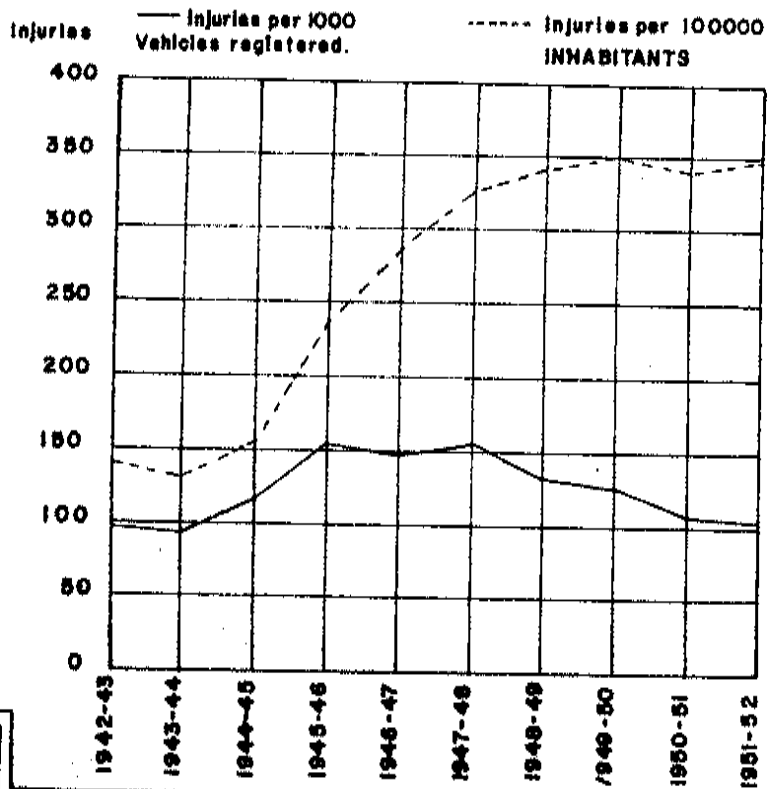

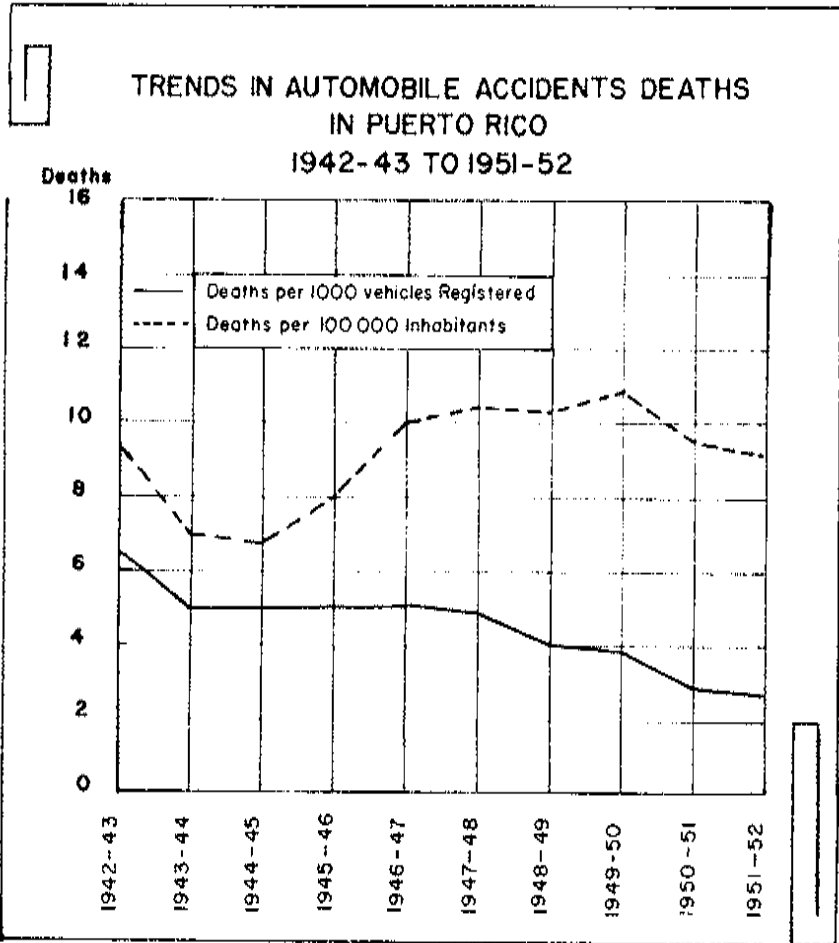

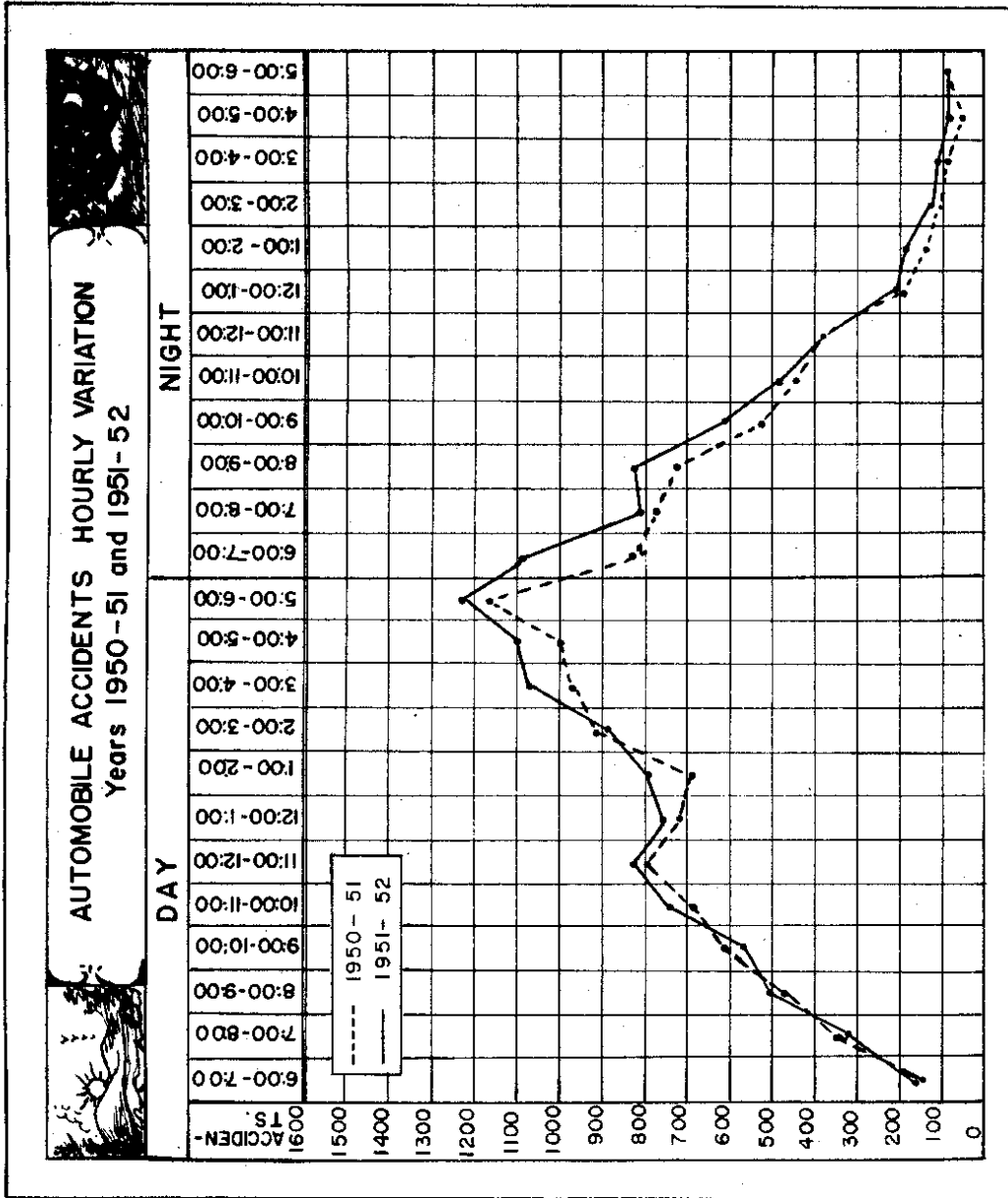

Years 1950- 51 and 1951- 52

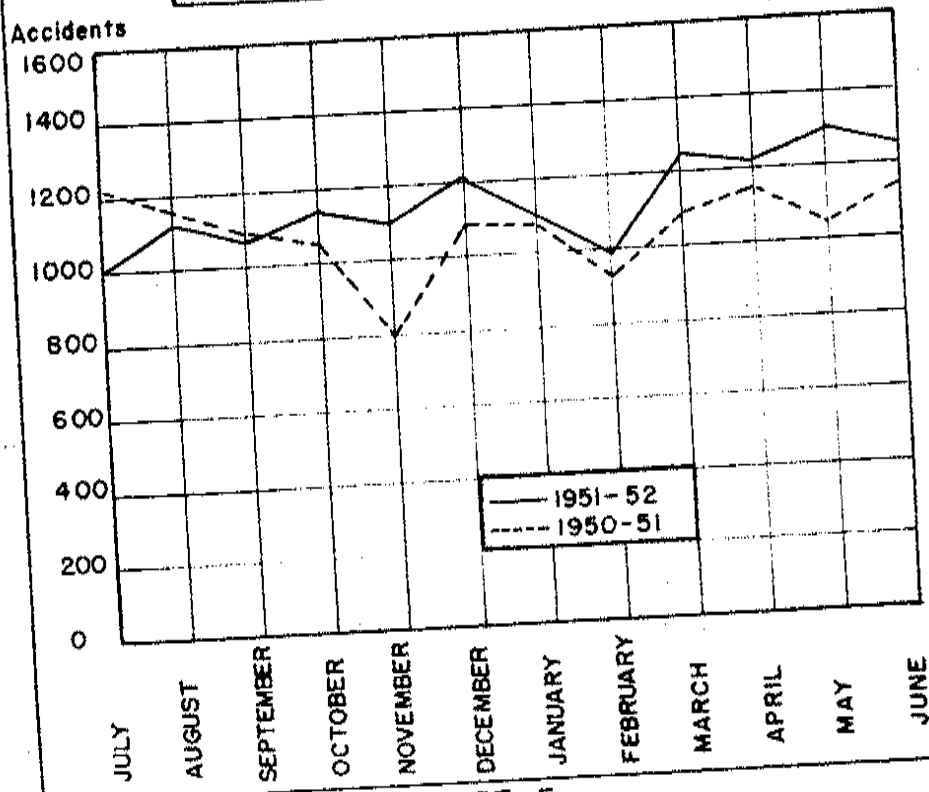

1951-52 PERCENT CHANGE

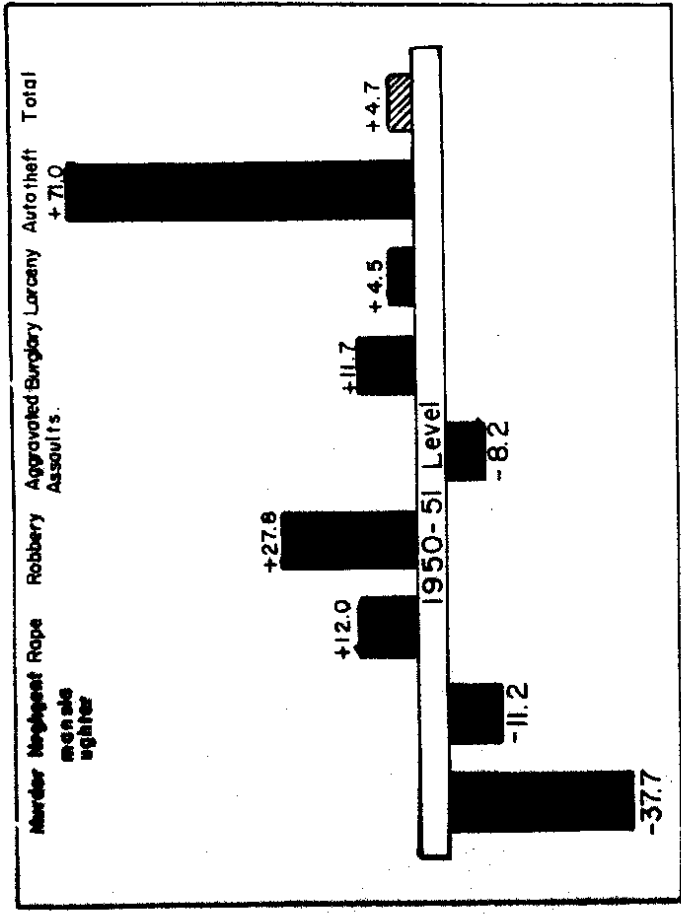

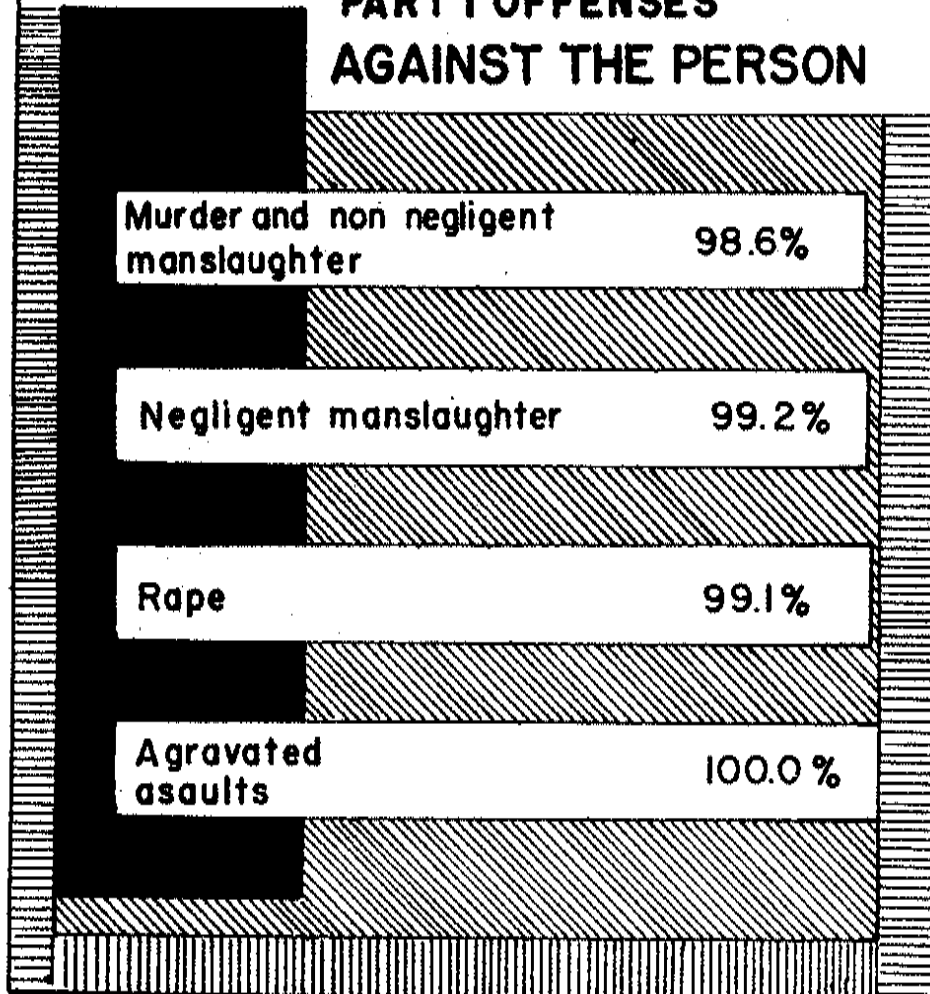

Year 1951-52

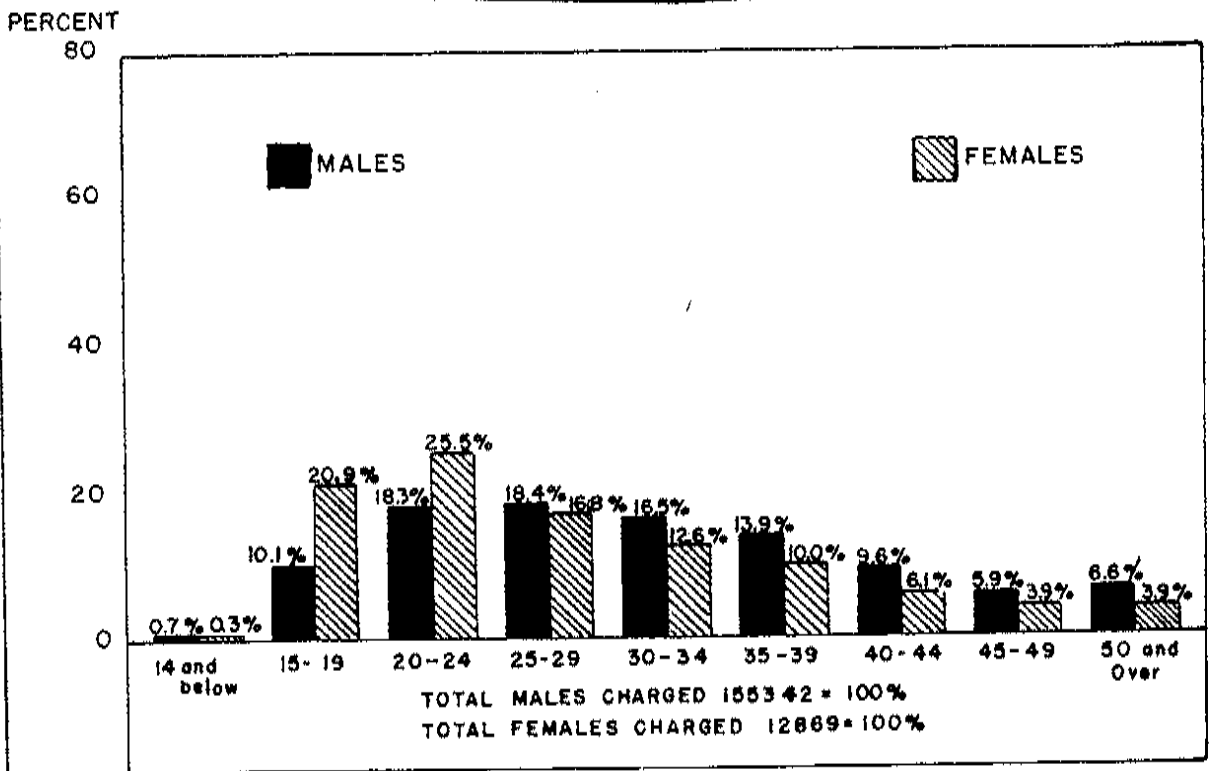

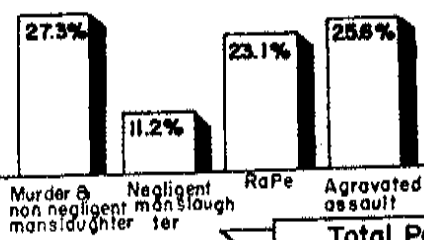

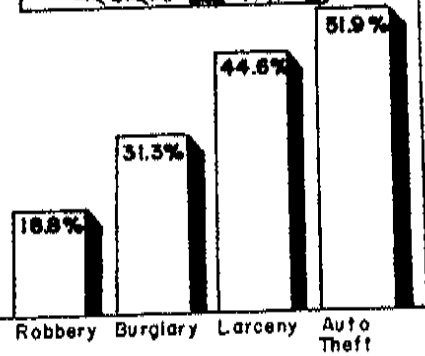

PERSONS FOUND GUILTY PERCENT OF PERSONS CHARGED PART II OFFENSES Year 1951-52

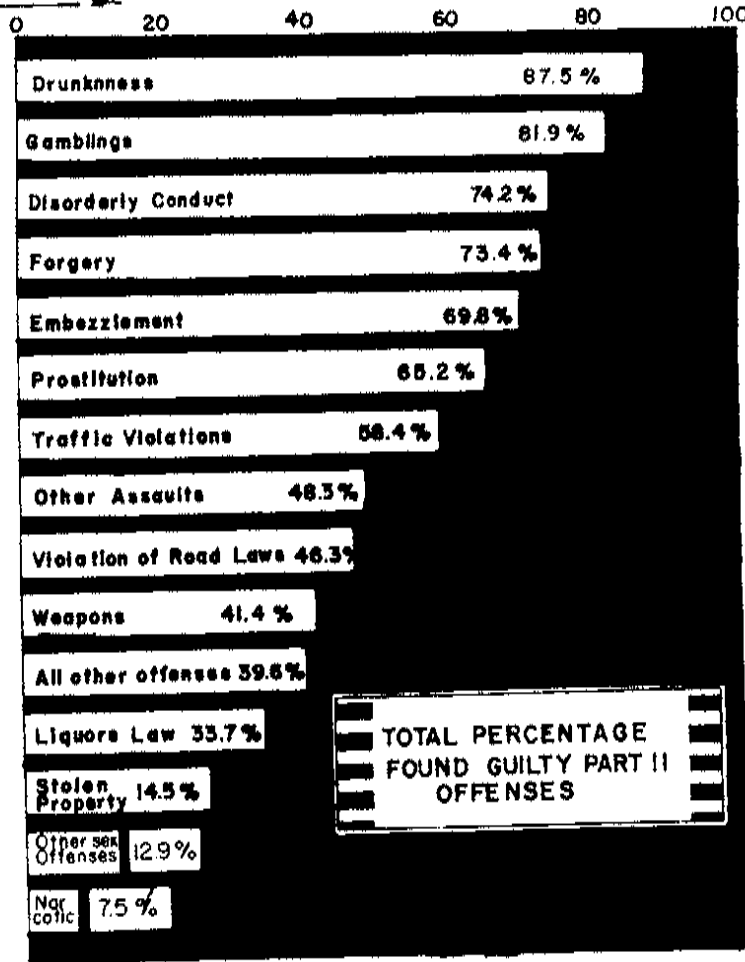
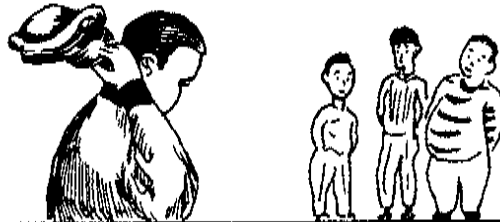


CHART - L

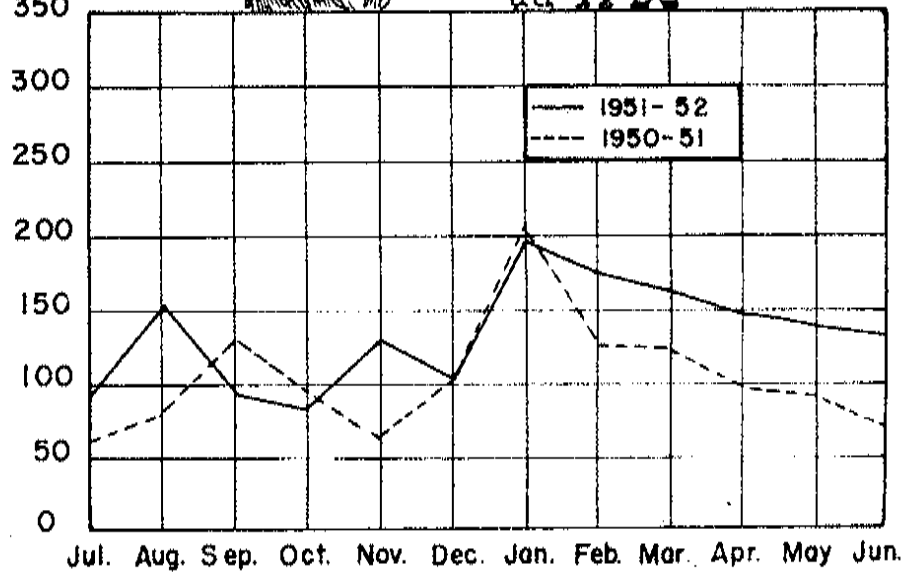

1938-39 TO 1951-52**

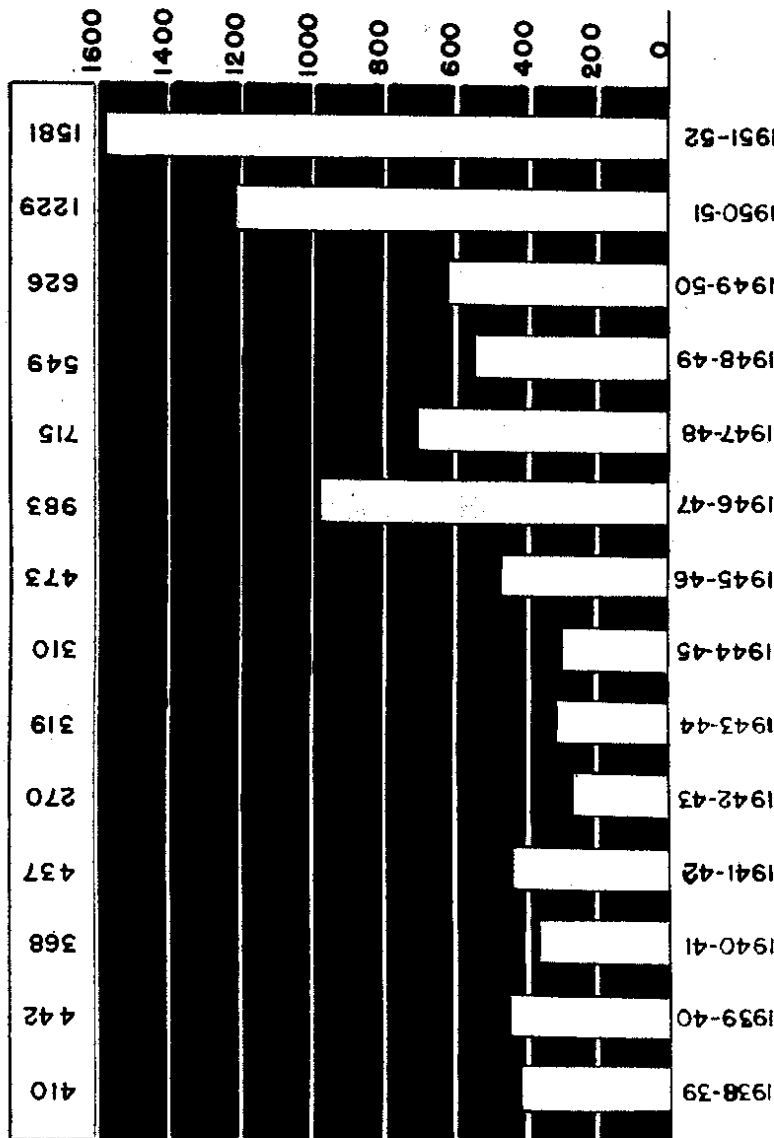

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S U M M A R Y

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POLICE PERSONNEL

The authorized police strength for the fiscal year 1952-53 was 2739 members; the same as previous fiscal year. By June 30, 1953, the Force vacancies amounted to 100. About ¹⁸⁹ civilian employees fulfill clerical and stenographic functions at the General Headquarters and in the Police Zones, one civilian for each zone, Table 2.

POLICE COMMISSION

The Police Commission is a body composed of three members appointed by the Governor of Puerto Rico on an honorary basis and with powers established by law.

During the year 1952-53 the Commission held ⁴⁸ 44 sessions, heard formal accusations against ⁵⁷ 69 police members, resolved ¹⁶ 28 cases of appeal, and approved ¹⁷ 17 pensions to police members or their widows. In addition, the Commission examined ⁸¹⁵ 990 applicants of persons interested to enter in the Force; examined 57 applicants of reinstatement and considered ¹⁰⁸ 108 resignations.

The Commission reported the balance of the Police Aid Fund as on June 30, 1953 totaled \$28,219.21. The Fund Balance has a net increase of \$276.96 with respect to the balance at the beginning of the fiscal year.

BUREAU OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL

The Bureau of the Inspector General of the Puerto Rico Police

is composed, besides the Inspector, by the following personnel:-

(a) The Assistant for the Inspector General (Captain).

(b) Three Captains assigned to the Inspections and Complaints Division, Vigilance and Investigation Division and Plans and Training Division.

(c) Three First Lieutenants; one in charge of the Juvenile Aid Division, another to the Traffic Division and the other at large.

(d) Three Second Lieutenants assigned to Plans and Training Division (Isla de Cabras) and

(e) Five civilians stenographers to perform office and clerical work.

The Complaint and Inspection Division received during the year 1784 complaints against police members. The investigation of 1349 of them revealed that in 1022 existed sufficient ground for further study. Further investigation resulted in the application of administrative charges against 410 members.

OFFICE OF THE PHYSICIAN

The strain of the Police work might be generally evaluated by the number of agents who receives medical attention. During the year 3195 members received medical examination in regard to natural or accidental sicknesses, General medical examinations were given to 2008 men for purposes of recruitment, reinstatement, reappointment, promotion, etc. Physical unfitness led to the retirement of 23 members. Eleven deaths were registered during the year.

POLICE ACADEMY

The Academy is the training center for the Police Force, the heart of many Police activities, and a service training school for many other government agencies with quasi-police responsibilities. District and Zonal Commanders carry independent institutes to meet specific problems in their localities or to obviate requirements not

fully covered during the short training courses.

The public demand for the extension of police services and protection are reflected in the instructional fields covered by the Academy. The training fields are: citizen rights, arrest making, searching, crime investigation, identification, fingerprinting, scientific photography, analysis of questioned documents, collecting evidence, police regulations, public relations, making reports, testifying in courts, code of ethics, statistics, use of firearms, general defensive tactics, public behavior, courtesy, traffic, first aid, the keeping of records, etc. It is evident that the degree to which these basic police knowledges might be effectively assimilated depends on the aptitudes and learning abilities of the candidates as well as his educational background. The recruitment of new policemen is forcefully influenced by these three factors and the salary scale of the Police. These conditions must be understood well by the public, as they are understood by us.

During the year 1952-53 the Police Academy carried out the following activities:-

- 1- Two hundred-five recruits passed the regular training and were promptly assigned to field work, to obtain practical experience and additional training under the supervision of the district commanders.

- 2- A standard course on First Aid was given to the recruits. 203 were graduated and received a certificate of the Red Cross.

- 3- A course of Patron-Labor relations was given to 90 police

officers under the guidance of the Labor Secretary Office of Puerto Rico.

4- Conferences regarding to Traffic Laws and Unnecessary Noises were given to the police personnel and other persons interested in these problems.

Besides the activities above listed, the Academy carried out many other activities related to police matters and in connection with the Police Force.

In addition, the Academy trained members of the Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation (local chapter), Insurance State Fund, Department of Finance and Civil Defense in some particular areas, such as: Firing, Judo, First Aid, etc.

RECORD DIVISION

The Record Division of the Police is one of the divisions of the Bureau of Administration. One of the most important phases of the Division is the keeping of records and in such a manner that they may be used with promptness. The Division is composed by the following sections: Fingerprints, Firearms Registration, Good Conduct Certificates, Single Fingerprints, Statistics, and the General Section.

Besides the work shown above, the section performed many other activities of various kind.

Firearms Registration Section:-

In this Section all documents related to firearms registration are prepared and filed according to Laws No. 14 of 1936 and No. 17 of 1951.

As on June 30, 1953 the Section had received 35208 firearms applications. During the year, the Section issued 21874 licenses, canceled 247 licenses and confiscated 766 more. At the end of the year, the total number of licenses applications considered by the Office amounted to 34,394. Of all the license applications received, there are only about 814 applications pending to be considered. These ap-

plications are in process of investigation. Firearms, of various types, registered during the year totaled 1038. About 50 certifications papers for Judicial and Police authorities were prepared and issued.

Good Conduct Certificates Section:-

During the year 1952-53 the Section prepared and issued 4722 certificates of good conduct for travelling purposes and others. An additional 16256 certificates free of charge (revenue stamps), were prepared for recruits of the National Guard and for laborers that were going to work to the United States auspiced by the Department of Labor. Also, 2588 accident reports certificates, 647 licenses for hunting, and 1418 licenses for carrying a firearm, were prepared. Firearm practice licenses renewed amounted to 411.

Revenue stamps amounting to \$14,062.50 were cancelled as a requisite for the issuance of the certificates.

Statistics Section:-

The principal function of the Office is the compilation of statistical data to be used in the preparation of monthly and annual reports outlining the activities of the Puerto Rico Police. The data is presented in statistical tables and charts, including analysis. The Section also prepares additional reports and surveys dealing with specific police matters. Among the surveys and reports prepared by the Section during the year, we have:-

- (a) Juvenile Delinquency in Puerto Rico according to the Police.
- (b) Cases of Prostitution in Puerto Rico during the last ten years.
- (c) Automobilo Accidents caused by parking of vehicles in the high-

ways without reglamentary lights.

(d) Automobile accidents caused by drunken drivers and unauthorized drivers.

(e) Number of persons denounced or arrested for driving without authorization and drunkenness, including the final disposition of the cases in the courts.

(f) Traffic violations.

(g) Juveniles reported by the Police during a seven month period.

Twenty statistical colored charts of police matters and organization were prepared for the Office of the Chief of the Police.

The Office is composed by one Statistical Officer and 5 civilian employees.

All the work is perform manually but there are plans to install a machine system to compile the datas using statistical master cards. Obviously, the statistics will be prepared easily and with less human efforts.

CRIMES

Crimes during the year 1952-53 totaled 136,418. The urban areas registered 98259 (72.0%) offenses for a reduction of 8.7% as compared with previous year. Rural areas accumulated 38159 (28.0%) offenses or 7.3% less than 1951-52. Of the total number of offenses, 79925 (58.6%) were committed during day hours and 56493 (41.4%) at night hours. In the year, crimes decreased 8.3% and 5.6% in respect to 1951-52 and to 1950-51, respectively. Crimes for 1951-52 amounted to 148,747 and for 1950-51, 144,503, Table 7-10 and Chart D.

April was the month of the year that registered the largest percentage of offenses committed (10.0%), followed by March with 9.2%. January obtained the lowest percentage with 6.9%, Table 6.

Major Crime Trends:-

There was a general increase of 1.2% and 5.9% in the major crimes in comparison with 1951-52 and 1950-51, respectively. This type of crimes went up 0.1% in the urban areas and 4.1% in the rural areas in respect to 1951-52. Robbery and Burglary increased 41.3% and 8.3%, respectively. There was a decrease in the following crimes: Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter, 2.0%; Negligent Manslaughter, 3.9%; Rape, 7.1%; Aggravated Assaults, 2.0%; Larceny, 1.4% and Auto Theft, 3.8%; Table 5 and Chart B.

Crimes Against Property:-

Crimes against property constituted 9.4% (12828) of the total number of offenses committed during the year. Property crimes for 1952-53 was distributed as follows: 130 Robberies; 2716 Burglaries;

6506 Larcenies; 102 Auto Theft; 142 Forgeries; 855 Embezzlements; 77 Stolen Property; 127 Arsons; 768 False Impersonations and 1405 Malicious Mischiefs. Property crimes were 2.4% more this year than last year, Table 9-~~10~~.

Crimes Against the Person:-

Serious crimes against the human person totaled 994 in 1952-53; or 2.8% less than last year. The distribution of these crimes was as follows: Murder 119, Nonnegligent Manslaughter, 27; Negligent Manslaughter, 122; Rape, 104; Attack to Murder, 98; Attempts to Commit Homicide, 33; Attempts to Kill, 161; and Mayhem, 330, Table 9-~~10~~.

Crimes in the Police Zones:-

The Zone of San Juan registered the highest percentage of crimes during 1952-53, with 24.6% of the total number of offenses. In descending order, the percentage of crime occurrence per zone was as follows: Ponce, 14.6%; Arecibo, 9.7%; Bayamón, 9.3%; Mayaguez, 8.5%; Río Piedras, 8.2%; Caguas, 7.0%; Aguadilla, 6.5%; Guayama, 6.4% and Humacao, 5.2%. The zones of San Juan, Ponce and Arecibo reported (together) about 50% of the total crimes registered in the whole Island during the year, Tables 7-8.

All the Police Zones, except Guayama and Aguadilla, registered a decrease in the number of crimes in comparison with the last year. San Juan was the zone where the percentage of decrease in crimes was highest (16.4%). The percentage of decrease for the zones in descending order was: Mayaguez, 12.9%, Bayamón, 12.6%; Río Piedras, 11.0%; Humacao, 5.4%; Ponce, 3.5%; Arecibo, 2.7% and Caguas, 0.4%. In the zones

of Aguadilla and Guayama the number of crimes increased 5.2% and 3.5%, respectively, Tables 7-8 and Chart C.

UNFOUNDED OFFENSES

In the total number of offenses known to the Police during the year, 1431 resulted without ground to initiate formal accusation. Unfounded offenses for this year are 452 or 46% more than in 1951-52. Of the unfounded offenses for the year, 395 were of serious nature. Minor Larcenies, 273, was the type of serious offenses that had more cases of this nature. The distribution of the unfounded offenses is presented in Tables 7 and 9.

OFFENSES CLEARED AND PERSONS CHARGED

During the year 1952-53, of the serious offenses committed against the person, 987 (99.3%) were cleared. Aggravated Assaults obtained the highest percentage of clearance with 99.8%, followed by Murder and Non-nogligent Manslaughter with 99.3%, Negligent Manslaughter, 98.4% and Rape, 97.1%.

Serious crimes against property amounted to 9454. The 45.2% (4273) of this total was cleared. The percentage of clearance for Robbery was the highest (67.7%), followed by Larceny 46.8%; Burglary, 41.1% and Auto Theft, 20.6%, Tables 9-10 and Chart E.

The general percentage of offenses cleared for 1952-53 was 95.4% or 0.9% less than 1951-52.

Female Offenders:-

About 11211 (7.2%) of the total number of persons arrested or denounced during the year by the Police, were female offenders. The number

of women arrested or denounced this year is 12.9% less than last year. Of the females charged, (11211), a total of 2265 (20.2%) were under 20 years old; and 4942 (44.1%) under 25 years of age. The daily average of female offenders for 1952-53 is 31 as against 36 for 1951-52 and 33 for 1950-51. The charges were for offenses equally common among male offenders, Table 11-13 and Chart R.

Male Offenders:-

Of the total persons arrested or denounced during the year, (92.8%) 155,122 were male offenders. The highest percentage (18.2%) of the males arrested or denounced during the year have ages between 20 to 24 years. About 48% of the male violators were under 30 years of age, Tables 11-13 and Charts F-G.

PERSONS FOUND GUILTY

The 43.6% of the total persons charged for serious crimes during the year 1952-53 was found guilty. For less serious crimes, the percentage found guilty was 61.7%. The percentage of persons found guilty for serious crimes, in descending order, are as follows:- Larceny, 54.6%; Burglary, 42.9%; Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter, 28.8%, Robbery, 23.7%, Auto Theft, 20.0%, Negligent Manslaughter, 6.8%; and Rape, 2.7%, Table 14 and Chart H. Of the persons charged for Drunkenness, 84.7% were found guilty and 81.1% for illicit gambling. The 62.5% of the traffic violator resulted guilty, Chart H.

TRAFFIC

Traffic violations in 1952-53 amounted to 45,699 or 2.0% less

than previous year. The 71.9% (32866) of them were committed during the hours of the day and 28.1% (12833) during the night. The urban areas registered 66.5% of the violations and rural areas 33.5%. The Police cleared 99.8% (45586) of them and extended formal accusations against 43658 violators. Obviously, some of the violators were responsible for more than one traffic violation. The 33.5% of all the offenses committed in 1952-53 were traffic violations. Of the traffic violators accused, 510 (1.2%) were females and 43148 (98.8%) males. The 6.3% were under 20 years old and 24.2% under 25 years old. About 62.6% of the persons accused for traffic offenses were found guilty; 14.0% were acquitted or their cases filed, Table 9-14.

AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS

During the fiscal year 1952-53, a total of 14607 automobile accidents were reported in which 221 persons resulted killed and 8133 injured. These figures as compared with last year represent an increase of 6.4% in the accidents, 3.4% in the injuries and 5.7% in the deaths. Urban zone registered 58.1% of the annual accidents and rural zone 41.9%, Table 15.

Trends in Automobile Accidents:-

Deaths and injuries per 1000 vehicles registered and 100,000 inhabitants in the last eleven years are shown in Table 20 and Charts J, K and L.

Accidents Monthly Variation:-

Monthly distribution of accidents, deaths and persons injured are shown in Table 19. The month of May obtained the highest percentage of

accidents with 10.0%, followed by June with 9.3%. The highest percentages of persons injured corresponded to December and May with 9.7% and 9.5%, respectively. March and December were the months in which more persons resulted killed with 15.8% and 10.9%, respectively, Table 19, and Chart I.

Distribution of the Accidents:-

Collision of motor vehicles with other motor vehicles was the type of accident that occurred most frequently. In this year, 8231 (56.3%) of the accidents were of this kind and represent an increase of 8.0% in respect to last year.

Accidents against pedestrian amounted to 2940 or 20.1% of the total and decreased 0.2% as compared with 1951-52.

The rest of the accidents and the percentages they represent, in a descending order, were: automobile against fixed objects, 8.5% (1236); other accidents, 6.6% (961); with bicycles, 4.4% (644); overturned, 2.4% (357); with animals, 1.5% (214); with Trains, 0.2% (24), Table 18.

Persons Killed and Injured by Age Groups:-

In the accidents of the year, 8133 persons were injured, 3.4% more than previous year. The distribution of the persons injured by age groups is as follows: Under 5 years old, 201 or 2.5%; 5 to 15 years, 1626 or 20.0%; 16 to 24 years, 2123 or 26.1%; 25 to 64 years, 3917 or 48.1% and 65 years and over, 266 or 3.3% of the total. Collision of automobile against pedestrian was the type of accident in which more persons resulted injured (2968) 36.5%, Table 16.

Deaths caused by automobile accidents for the year amounted to 221, 5.7% more than 1951-52. Of the persons who lost their lives in accidents, 9 or 4.1% were under 5 years of age; 46 or 20.8% between

5 to 15 years; 48 or 21.7% between 16 to 24 years; 101 or 45.7%, 25 to 64 years; and 17 or 7.7% were 65 years and over. Accidents of vehicles against pedestrian caused 43.9% of the total number of persons killed during the year, Table 17.

Accidents in the Police Zone:-

The Zones of San Juan (19.8%), Rio Piedras (15.2%) and Mayaguez (12.0%) reported, together, 47% of the total number of accidents registered in the whole Island. The percentages of accidents occurred in the rest of the zones were, in descendent order, as follows:-

Ponce, 11.7%; Bayamón, 10.9%; Arecibo, 9.2%; Aguadilla, 6.8%; Caguas 5.8%; Guayama, 5.0% and Humacao, 3.6%, Tables 21-22 and Chart M.

All the Police Zones registered an increase in accidents in comparison with previous year. Ponce obtained the largest percentage of increase (13.9). The percentage of increase for the Zones was as follows, in descendent order:- Caguas, 12.7%; Guayama, 10.2%; Aguadilla, 8.9%; Humacao, 3.7%; Arecibo, 6.7%; Bayamón, 5.9%; San Juan, 3.4%; Rio Piedras, 3.1% and Mayaguez, 2.9%.

In the Zone of San Juan the number of persons injured went up 0.3% and deaths decreased 12.5% when compared with 1951-52. The changes in the number of persons injured and killed registered in the zones were: Rio Piedras, injuries went down 1.4% and deaths increased 15.4%; Bayamón, injuries and deaths reduced 3.9% and 4.5%, respectively; Arecibo, injuries went up 0.8% and deaths decreased 35.3%; Ponce, injuries increased 8.3% and deaths 53.3%; Mayaguez, injuries went up 9.3% and deaths 54.5%; Humacao, injuries and deaths decreased 14.5% and 7.7%, respectively; Guayama, injuries increased 31.1% and deaths 13.3%; Aguadilla,

injuries dropped 1.3% and deaths 6.7%; and Caguas, injuries went up 22.6% and deaths 91.7%, Table 22.

Accident Motives:-

The causes that produce automobile accidents are many but those that occurred most frequently during the year are shown in Tables, 24-27. Table 26 shows the distribution of the motives by types of vehicles involved in accidents and Table 27, the motives distributed by age groups of the drivers.

Passing other vehicles negligently and speeding were the two specific causes that more contributed to produce the accidents of the year, with 13.1% and 9.3%, respectively. 17.8% of the persons injured and 40.3% of the deaths were due to accidents caused by speeding.

Sex, Age, and Type of Licenses of the Drivers:-

In the accidents of the year, 23105 drivers were involved. Of this total, 98.0% (22647) were male drivers and 2.0% (458) female drivers. Female drivers injured 117 (1.4%) persons and caused 4 (1.3%) fatalities during the year 1952-53, Table 28.

Drivers under 21 years old involved in accidents amounted to 1182 (5.1%). They injured 473 (5.9%) persons and killed 20 (9.0%). Drivers between 21 to 24 years caused injuries to 1073 (13.2%) persons and killed 18 (8.2%). Drivers with those ages amounted to 2865 (12.4%). Between 25 and 49 years old totaled 17163 (74.3%), injured 6073 (74.7%) persons and killed 171 (77.4%). Drivers with ages of 50 years and over totaled 1890 (8.2%), injured 509 (6.2%) persons and killed 12 (5.4%), Table 29.

79.5% (18359) of the drivers involved in accidents hold licenses

type "chauffeur". Drivers under this classification injured 75.0% (6099) persons and caused the death of 147 (66.5%). "Apprentice drivers" involved in accidents totaled 286 (1.2%). They injured 148 (1.8%) persons and caused 8 (3.6%) deaths. The "unauthorized" drivers amounted to 1481 (6.4%); injured 882 (10.9%) persons and killed 34 (15.4%). Drivers holding licenses of "drivers" totaled 2979 (12.9%). They were responsible for 1004 (12.3%) persons injured and 32 (14.5%) deaths, Table 30.

Types of Vehicles:-

Private (45.3%) and Public (20.7%) tourings were the two types of vehicles that more frequently participated in the accidents. Private tourings contributed with 43.6% (3550) of the persons injured and 41.2% (91) of the deaths. 24.4% (1984) of the persons injured and 19.0% (42) of the deaths were caused by public tourings. The distribution of the persons injured and killed are shown in table 31.

OTHER KINDS OF ACCIDENTS

Accidents produced by drowning, electrocution, burns, labor, falls, bicycles (without motor) and others, resulted in 141 deaths and 578 injured persons. The highest number of deaths (68) were caused by drowning. In bicycle accidents 1 person resulted killed and 241 injured, Table 33, ~~Chart 0~~. The Table excludes aviation accidents.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

The Police reported 1698 cases of Juveniles during the year

1952-53. Since 1948-49 the number of Juvenile cases reported annually has been increasing. The number of cases reported in the year represents an increase of 209%; 171%; 38% and 7% with respect to the years 1948-49, 1949-50, 1950-51, 1951-52, respectively, Table 34, Charts B and C.

Juvenile cases against the property amounted to 1452. Of all the cases of Juveniles reported, 73% (1238) were cases of minor larcenies and burglaries, Table 34.

In Tables 35, 36 and 37, additional data in regard to Juveniles is shown for the last 6 months of the fiscal year (January-June, 1953). According to this six month period, it can be noted that 54.5% (367) of the juveniles reported (673) were juveniles between 13 to 15 years of age. In addition, 33% (222) of the juveniles reported were repeaters. 49.1% (109) of the repeaters were between 13 to 15 years old and 26.1% (58) were between 10 to 12 years of age. At the time of commitment, 63% (426) of the juveniles were not attending any school.

The offenses committed during the six months period by the 673 juveniles reported totaled 811. Out of this total, 38 offenses were committed by juveniles under 10 years old; 230 by juveniles between 10 to 12 years; 458 by juveniles between 13 to 15 year and 85 offenses by juveniles of 16 years old and over, who are under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Courts. Of the offenses committed 33.4% were burglaries and 38.7% minor larcenies, Table 36.

POLICE ATHLETIC LEAGUE

The Police Athletic League has helped to increase the Children's right to healthful recreational opportunities by exploring the community availability of resources and engaging its enthusiastic cooperation. The League does not always wait for Children to come to it but often goes after them. The League holds some of their programs in schools, hospitals and other places. But the League, because of its juvenile delinquency objectives, concentrates its efforts in the potentially delinquent group, without altogether ignoring the others.

Unfortunately many more programs can not be effected through lack of community apathy or adequate personnel facilities. The League's activities are carried out mostly in the urban areas, where chapters are generally organized. Yet, it is prepared to extent its programs to the rural areas just as well. In fact several sub-chapters have been already established. Government agencies are often lending movie projectors and other equipments to give educational pictures. Plans are underway to establish recreational centers where children may assemble in larger numbers to engage freely in writing, studying, reading, playing music and hearing lectures from prominent community leaders.

Three additional communal centers have been established in Corozal, Arecibo, and Aibonito during the year 1952-53 making a total of 13 communal centers in the whole Island.

What has been done has not been obtained easily. Some Police

Districts are unwilling to divert any part of its police personnel to these activities due to insufficient manpower. Some municipalities with high juvenile delinquency are not given enough attention to its preventive phase. In spite of these and many other difficulties, the League increased its children's membership considerable in comparison with previous years. In 1952-53 about 14,287 different activities in which 166,556 children throughout the Island participated were effected. The League's principal internal problem is the need of personnel freed from other police duties and trained in preventive work. The number of days dedicated by Police members to the Police Athletic League amounted to 11,026 days, 2455 more than last year.

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<u>POLICE COMMISSION REPORT</u>	1
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POLICE PERSONNEL

The authorized police strength for the fiscal year 1953-54 was 2739 members; the same as previous fiscal year. About 189 civilian employees fulfill clerical and stenographic functions at the General Headquarters and in the Police Zones, one civilian for each zone, Table 2.

POLICE COMMISSION

The Police Commission is a body composed of three members appointed by the Governor of Puerto Rico on an honorary basis and with powers established by law.

During the year 1953-54 the Commission held 48 sessions, heard formal accusations against 34 police members, resolved 16 cases of appeal and approved 12 pensions to police members or their widows. In addition, the Commission examined 815 applicants of persons interested to enter in the Force; examined 66 applicants of reinstatement and considered 107 resignations.

BUREAU OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL

The Bureau of the Inspector General of the Puerto Rico Police is composed, besides the Inspector, by the following personnel:

- (a) The Assistant for the Inspector General (Captain).

(b) Three Captains assigned to the Inspections and Complaints Division, Vigilance and Investigation Division and Plans and Training Division.

(c) Three First Lieutenants; one in charge of the Juvenile Aid Division, another to the Traffic Division and the other at large.

(d) Three Second Lieutenants assigned to Plans and Training Division (Isla de Cabras) and

(e) Five civilians stenographers to perform office and clerical work.

The Complaint and Inspection Division received during the year 988 complaints against police members. The investigation of them revealed that in 480 existed sufficient ground for further study. Further investigation resulted in the application of administrative charges against 181 members.

OFFICE OF THE PHYSICIAN

The strain of the Police work might be generally evaluated by the number of agents who receives medical attention. During the year 4473 members received medical examination in regard to natural or accidental sicknesses, general medical examinations were given to 1564 men for purposes of recruitment, reinstatement, reappointment, promotion, etc. Physical unfitness led to the retirement of 45 members. Six deaths were registered during the year.

The Chemical Section performed 70 experimental tests involving blood stains, poisons, paints, etc.

POLICE ACADEMY

The Academy is the training center for the Police Force, the heart of many Police activities, and a service training school for many other government agencies with quasi-police responsibilities. District and Zonal Commanders carry independent institutes to meet

specific problems in their localities or to obviate requirements not fully covered during the short training courses.

The public demand for the extension of police services and protection are reflected in the instructional fields covered by the Academy. The training fields are: citizen rights, arrest making, searching, crime investigation, identification, fingerprinting, scientific photography, analysis of questioned documents, collecting evidence, police regulations, public relations, making reports, testifying in courts, code of ethics, statistics, use of firearms, general defensive tactics, public behavior, courtesy, traffic, first aid, the keeping of records, etc. It is evident that the degree to which these basic police knowledges might be effectively assimilated depends on the aptitudes and learning abilities of the candidates as well as his educational background. The recruitment of new policemen is forcefully influenced by these three factors and the salary scale of the Police. These conditions must be understood well by the public, as they are understood by us.

During the year 1953-54 the Police Academy carried out the following activities:-

1- Two hundred-fifty-two recruits passed the regular training and were promptly assigned to field work, to obtain practical experience and additional training under the supervision of the district commanders.

The Academy trained members of the Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation (local chapter), Insurance State Fund, Department of Finance and Civil Defense in some particular areas, such as: Firing, Judo, First Aid, etc.

RECORD DIVISION

The Record Division of the Police is one of the divisions of the Bureau of Administration. One of the most important phases of the Division is the keeping of records and in such a manner that they may be used with promptness. The Division is composed by the following sections: Fingerprints, Firearms Registration, Good Conduct Certificates, Single Fingerprints, Statistics and the General Section.

Besides the work shown above, the section performed many other activities of various kind.

Firearms Registration Section:-

In this Section all documents related to firearms registration are prepared and filed according to Laws No. 14 of 1936 and No. 17 of 1951.

As on June 30, 1954 the Section had received 36257 firearms applications. During the year, the Section issued 1057 licenses, canceled 78 licenses and confiscated 245 more. At the end of the year, the total number of licenses applications considered by the Office amounted to 35,725. Of all the license applications received, there are only about 532 applications pending to be considered. These applications are in process of investigation. Firearms, of various types, registered during the year totaled 1246. About 63 certification papers for Judicial and Police authorities were prepared and issued.

Good Conduct Certificates Section:-

During the year 1953-54 the Section prepared and issued 1299 certificates of good conduct for travelling purposes and others. An additional 14386 certificates free of charge (revenue stamps), were prepared for recruits of the National Guard and for laborers that

were going to work to the United States auspiced by the Department of Labor. Also, 3303 accident reports certificates, 503 licenses for hunting, and 1540 licenses for carrying a firearm, were prepared.

Revenue stamps amounting to \$ 10,756.50 were cancelled as a requisite for the issuance of the certificates.

Statistics Section:

The principal function of the Office is the compilation of statistical data to be used in the preparation of monthly and annual reports outlining the activities of the Puerto Rico Police. The data is presented in statistical tables and charts, including analysis. The Section also prepares additional reports and surveys dealing with specific police matters.

The Office is composed by one Statistical Officer and 5 civilian employees.

All the work was performed manually but on January 1954 a machine system was established to compile the datas using statistical master cards.

CRIMES

ESTADISTICAS

Crimes during the year 1953-54 totaled 125,382. The urban areas registered 89809 (71.6%) offenses for a reduction of 8.5% as compared with previous year. Rural areas accumulated 35573 (28.4%) offenses or 6.8% less than 1952-53. Of the total number of offenses, 60152 (48.0%) were committed during day hours and 65230 (52.0%) at night hours. In the year, crimes decreased 8.1% and 15.7% in respect to 1952-53 and to 1951-52, respectively. Crimes for 1952-53 amounted to 136,418 and for 1951-52, 148747, Table 7-9, Chart F.

August was the month of the year that registered the largest percentage of offenses committed (9.7%), followed by July with 9.3%. February obtained the lowest percentage with 7.2%, Table 6.

Major Crime Trends:-

There was a general increase of 19.2% and 20.6% in the major crimes in comparison with 1952-53 and 1951-52, respectively. This type of crimes went up 22.0% in the urban areas and 11.6% in the rural areas in respect to 1952-53. Aggravated Assaults decreased 12.5%. There was an increase in the following crimes: Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter, 8.9%, Negligent Manslaughter 6.6%; Rape 13.5%; Robbery 8.5%; Larceny 14.9%; Auto Theft 38.2% and Burglary 37.8%, Table 5, Chart B.

Crimes Against the Property:-

Crimes against property constituted 11.9% (14965) of the total number of offenses committed during the year. Property crimes for 1953-54 was distributed as follows: 141 Robberies; 3744 Burglaries; 7477 Larcenies; 141 Auto Theft; 187 Forgeries; 652 Embezzlements;

96 Stolen Property; 128 Arsons; 686 False Impersonations and 1713 Malicious Mischiefs. Property crimes were 16.6% more this year than last year. Table 9.

Crimes Against the Person:-

Serious crimes against the human person totaled 951 in 1953-54 or 4.4% less than last year. The distribution of these crimes was as follows: Murder 133, Nonnegligent Manslaughter 26; Negligent Manslaughter 130; Rape 118; Attack to Murder 129; Attempts to Commit Homicide 34; Attempts to Kill 133; and Mayhem 248, Table 9.

Crimes in the Police Zones:-

The Zone of San Juan registered the highest percentage of crimes during the year 1953-54 with 21.3%, followed by Ponce 14.7%, Arecibo 10.4%, Bayamón 9.9%, Río Piedras 9.2%, Mayaguez 8.5%, Aguadilla 7.3%, Caguas 7.0%, Guayama 6.7% and Humacao 5.0%. The Zones of San Juan, Ponce and Arecibo reported (together) about 50% of the total crimes registered in the whole Island during the year, Tables 7-8.

All the Police Zones, except Río Piedras and Aguadilla, registered a decrease in the number of crimes in comparison with the last year. San Juan was the zone where the percentage of decrease in crimes was highest (20.2). The percentage of decrease for the zones in descending order was: Humacao 11.8%, Caguas 8.6%, Mayaguez 8.4%, Ponce 7.4%, Guayama 2.7%, Bayamón 2.1% and Arecibo 1.3%. In the zones of Río Piedras and Aguadilla the number of crimes increased 2.6% and 2.6%, respectively. Tables 7-8.

UNFOUNDED OFFENSES

In the total number of offenses known to the Police during the year, 872 resulted without ground to initiate formal accusation. Unfounded offenses for this year are 559 or 39% less than in 1952-53. Minor Larcenies, 193, was the type of serious offenses that had more cases of this nature. The distribution of the unfounded offenses is presented in Tables 7-9.

OFFENSES CLEARED AND PERSONS CHARGED

During the year 1953-54, of the serious offenses committed against the person, 940 (98.8%) were cleared. Manslaughter by Negligence obtained the highest percentage of clearance with 100.0%, followed by Murder and Nonnegligent Manslaughter with 99.4%, Aggravated Assaults, 99.3% and Rape 94.9%.

Serious crimes against property amounted to 11503. The 33.9% (3899) of this total was cleared. The percentage of clearance for Robbery was the highest (46.8%), followed by Larceny 35.1%, Burglary 31.4% and Auto Theft 24.8%, Table 9, Chart F.

The general percentage of offenses cleared for 1953-54 was 92.4% or 3.0% less than 1952-53.

Female Offenders:-

About 9876 (7.3%) of the total number of persons arrested or denounced during the year by the Police, were female offenders. The number of women arrested or denounced this year is 11.9% less than last year. Of the females charged, (9876), a total of 1935 (20.1%) were under 20 years old; and 4223 (42.8%) under 25 years of age. The daily average

of female offenders for 1953-54 is 27 as against 31 for 1952-53 and 36 for 1951-52. The charges were for offenses equally common among male offenders, Table 10, Charts C-H.

Male Offenders:-

Of the total persons arrested or denounced during the year, (92.3%) 125,896 were male offenders. The highest percentage (17.4%) of the males arrested or denounced during the year have ages between 20 to 24 years. About 44% of the male violators were under 30 years of age, Table 10, Charts C-H.

PERSONS FOUND GUILTY

During the year 1953-54 a total of 91347 persons were found guilty of the offenses charged, 906 of lesser offenses and 20555 were acquitted or the cases filed, Table 12 c.

TRAFFIC

Traffic violations in 1953-54 amounted to 41,152 or 9.9% less than previous year. The 59.4% (24425) of them were committed during the hours of the day and 40.6% (16727) during the night. The urban areas registered 67.9% of the violations and rural areas 32.1%. The Police cleared 98.9% (40728) of them and extended formal accusations against 32283 violators. Obviously, some of the violators were responsible for more than one traffic violation. The 32.9% of all the offenses committed in 1953-54 were traffic violations. Of the traffic violators accused, 505 (1.3%) were females and 37718 (98.7%) males. The 6.9% were under 20 years old and 26.7% under 25 years old.

AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS

During the fiscal year 1953-54, a total of 17176 automobile accidents were reported in which 232 persons resulted killed and 9347 injured. These figures as compared with last year represent an increase of 17.6% in the accidents, 14.9% in the injuries and 4.9% in the deaths. Urban zone registered 57.6% of the annual accidents and rural zone 42.4%, Table 13, Chart I.

Trends in Automobile Accidents:-

Deaths and injuries per 1000 vehicles registered and 100,000 inhabitants in the last eleven years are shown in Table 18.

Accidents Monthly Variation:-

Monthly distribution of accidents, deaths and persons injured are shown in Table 17. The month of May obtained the highest percentage of accidents with 9.5%, followed by December 9.3%. The highest percentages of persons injured corresponded to May and April with 9.7% and 8.9%, respectively. January and December were the months in which more persons resulted killed with 13.8% and 12.5%, respectively, Table 17, Chart J.

Distribution of the Accidents:-

Collision of motor vehicles with other motor vehicles was the type of accident that occurred most frequently. In this year, 9977 (96.1%) of the accidents were of this kind and represent an increase of 21.2% in respect to last year.

Accidents against pedestrian amounted to 3083 or 17.9% of the total and increased 4.9% as compared with 1952-53.

The rest of the accidents and the percentages they represent, in a descending order, were: automobiles against fixed objects, 8.8% (1507);

other accidents, 6.3% (1081); with bicycles, 4.8% (829); overturned, 2.5% (435), with animals, 1.3% (222); with trains, 0.3% (42), Table 16.

Persons Killed and Injured by Age Groups:-

In the accidents of the year, 9347 persons were injured, 14.9% more than previous year. The distribution of the persons injured by age groups is as follows: Under 5 years old, 390 or 4.2%; 5 to 15 years, 1752 or 18.7%; 16 to 24 years, 2547 or 27.2%; 25 to 64 years, 4325 or 46.3% and 65 years and over, 333 or 3.6% of the total. Collision of automobile against pedestrian was the type of accident in which more persons resulted injured (2966) 31.7%, Table 14.

Deaths caused by automobile accidents for the year amounted to 232, 4.9% more than 1952-53. Of the persons who lost their lives in accidents, 9 or 3.9% were under 5 years of age; 57 or 24.6% between 5 to 15 years; 40 or 17.2% between 16 to 24 years; 107 or 46.1%, 25 to 64 years; and 19 or 8.2% were 65 years and over. Accidents of vehicles against pedestrian caused 54.7% of the total number of persons killed during the year, Table 15.

Accidents in the Police Zones:-

The Zones of San Juan (18.1%), Rio Piedras (16.8%) and Bayamón (12.1%) reported, together, 47% of the total number of the accidents registered in the whole Island. The percentages of accidents occurred in the rest of the zones were, in descendent order, as follows:- Ponce 11.9%, Mayaguez 10.7%, Arceibo 9.0%, Aguadilla 6.4%, Caguas 6.1%, Guayama 4.8% and Humacao 4.1%. Table 20, Chart L.

All the Police Zones registered an increase in accidents in comparison with previous year. Humacao obtained the largest percentage

of increase 35.7%, followed by Bayamón 31.0%, Río Piedras 29.5%, Cayma 23.4%, Ponce 19.8%, Arecibo 14.3%, Guayama 12.1%, Aguadilla 10.9%, San Juan 7.4% and Mayagüez 5.0%.

In the Zone of San Juan the number of persons injured went up 6.0% and deaths increased 57.1% when compared with 1952-53. The changes in the number of persons injured and killed registered in the zones are: Río Piedras, injuries went up 47.4% and deaths remained the same, Bayamón, injuries went up 3.7% and deaths reduced 9.5%, Arecibo, injuries went up 9.3% and deaths 16.6%, Ponce, injuries increased 22.2% and deaths decreased 13.0%, Mayagüez, injuries went up 4.1% and deaths decreased 35.3%, Humacao, injuries and deaths increased 46.2% and 15.7%, respectively; Guayama decreased 9.3% in injuries and deaths remain equal, Aguadilla, injuries increased 7.1% and deaths 57.1% and Caymas, injuries went up 11.1% and deaths dropped 6.7%, Table 25.

accidents Motives:-

The causes that produce automobile accidents are many but those that occurred most frequently during the year are shown in Table 23.

Running other vehicles negligently and speeding were the two specific causes that more contributed to produce the accidents of the year, with 12.0% and 11.3%, respectively. 16.0% of the persons injured and 43.2% of the deaths were due to accidents caused by speeding.

Sex, Age and Type of Licenses of the Drivers:-

In the accidents of the year, 27517 drivers were involved. Of this total, 97.5% (26873) were male drivers and 2.5% (644) female drivers.

Female drivers injured 168 (1.3%) persons and caused 2 (0.9%) fatalities during the year 1953-54, Table 24.

78.7% (21683) of the drivers involved in accidents hold licenses type "chauffeur". Drivers under this classification injured 74.0% (6918) persons and caused the death of 168 (72.4%). "Apprentice drivers" involved in accidents totaled 672 (2.4%). They injured 219 (2.3%) persons and caused 2 (0.9%) deaths. The "unauthorized" drivers amounted to 1870 (6.8%), injured 1089 (11.7%) persons and killed 34 (14.6%). Drivers holding licenses of "drivers" totaled 3322 (12.1%). They were responsible for 1121 (12.0%) persons injured and 26 (12.1%) deaths, Table 26.

Types of Vehicles:-

Private (46.6%) and Public (20.0%) tourings were the two types of vehicles that more frequently participated in the accidents. Private tourings contributed with 44.6% (4170) of the persons injured and 39.2% (91) of the deaths. 25.3% (2369) of the persons injured and 19.9% (46) of the deaths were caused by public tourings. The distribution of the persons injured and killed are shown in table 27.

OTHER KINDS OF ACCIDENTS

Accidents produced by drowning, electrocution, burns, labor, falls, bicycles (without motor) and others, resulted in 202 deaths and 761 injured persons. The highest number of deaths (99) were caused by drowning. In bicycle accidents 1 person resulted killed and 229 injured, Table 28. The Table excludes aviation accidents.

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

The Police reported 1644 cases of Juveniles during the year 1953-54. The number of cases reported in the year represents a decrease of 3.2% with respect to the year 1952-53, Table 29, Chart M.

Juvenile cases against the property amounted to 1258. Of all the cases of Juveniles reported, 66% (1080) were cases of minor larcenies and burglaries, Table 29.

Tables 30 and 31 show, by age groups, the total number of juveniles (1407) who committed the 1644 cases reported. It can be noted that 56.1% (818) of the juveniles reported were juveniles between 13 to 15 years of age. 37% (525) of the juveniles reported were repeaters. 54.9% (288) of the repeaters were between 13 to 15 years old and 22.6% (119) were between 10 to 12 years of age. At the time of commitment, 61% (857) of the juveniles were not attending any school.

POLICE ATHLETIC LEAGUE

The Police Athletic League has helped to increase the Children's right to healthful recreational opportunities by exploring the community availability of resources and engaging its enthusiastic cooperation. The League does not always wait for Children to come to it but often goes after them. The League holds some of their programs in schools, hospitals and other places. But the League, because of its juvenile delinquency objectives, concentrates its efforts in the potentially delinquent group, without altogether ignoring the others.

Unfortunately many more programs can not be effected through

lack of community apathy or adequate personnel facilities. The League's activities are carried out mostly in the urban areas, where chapters are generally organized. Yet, it is prepared to extend its programs to the rural areas just as well. In fact several sub-chapters have been already established. Government agencies are often lending movie projectors and other equipments to give educational pictures. Plans are underway to establish recreational centers where children may assemble in larger numbers to engage freely in writing, studying, reading, playing music and hearing lectures from prominent community leaders.

Three additional communal centers have been established in Aguirre, Isabela and Yauco during the year 1953-54 making a total of 16 communal centers in the whole Island.

What has been done has not been obtained easily. Some Police Districts are unwilling to divert any part of its police personnel to these activities due to insufficient manpower. Some municipalities with high juvenile delinquency are not given enough attention to its preventive phase. In spite of these and many other difficulties, the League increased its children's membership considerable in comparison with previous years. In 1953-54 about 13,783 different activities in which 228,607 children throughout the Island participated were effected. The League's principal internal problem is the need of personnel freed from other police duties and trained in preventive work. The number of days dedicated by Police members to the Police Athletic League amounted to 11,113 days, 87 more than last year.

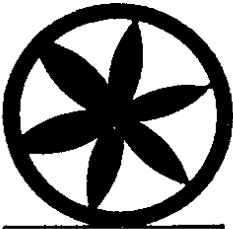

1953-54 PERCENT CHANGE

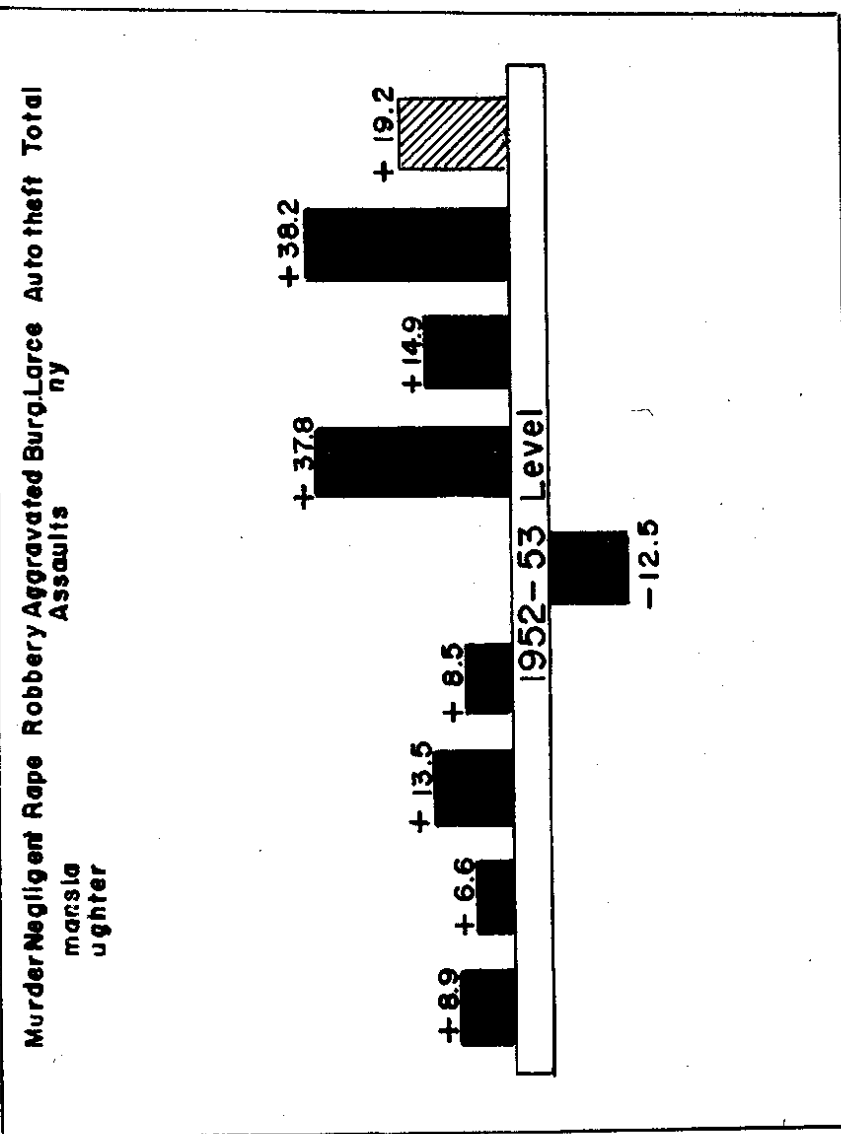
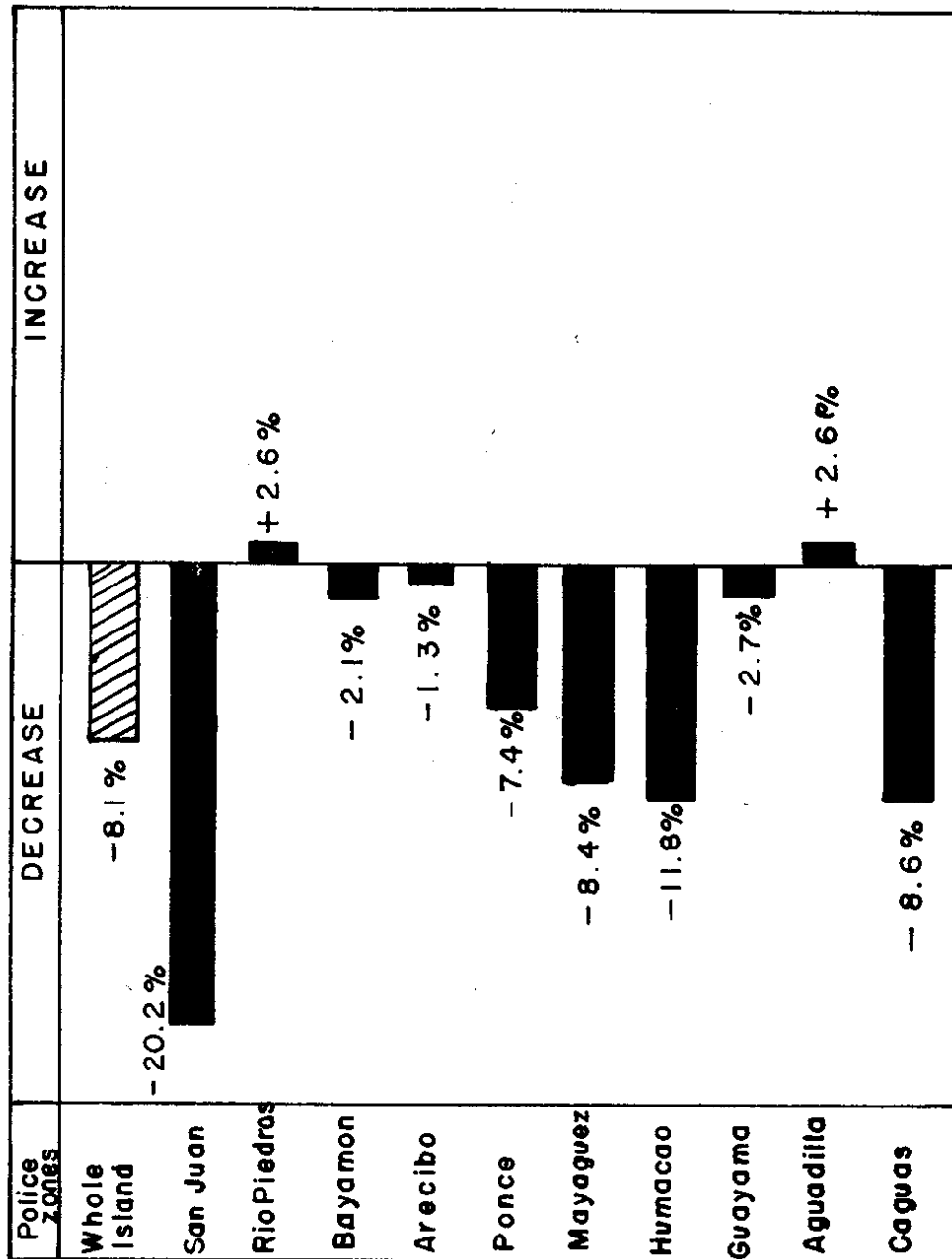

DISTRIBUTED BY POLICE ZONES

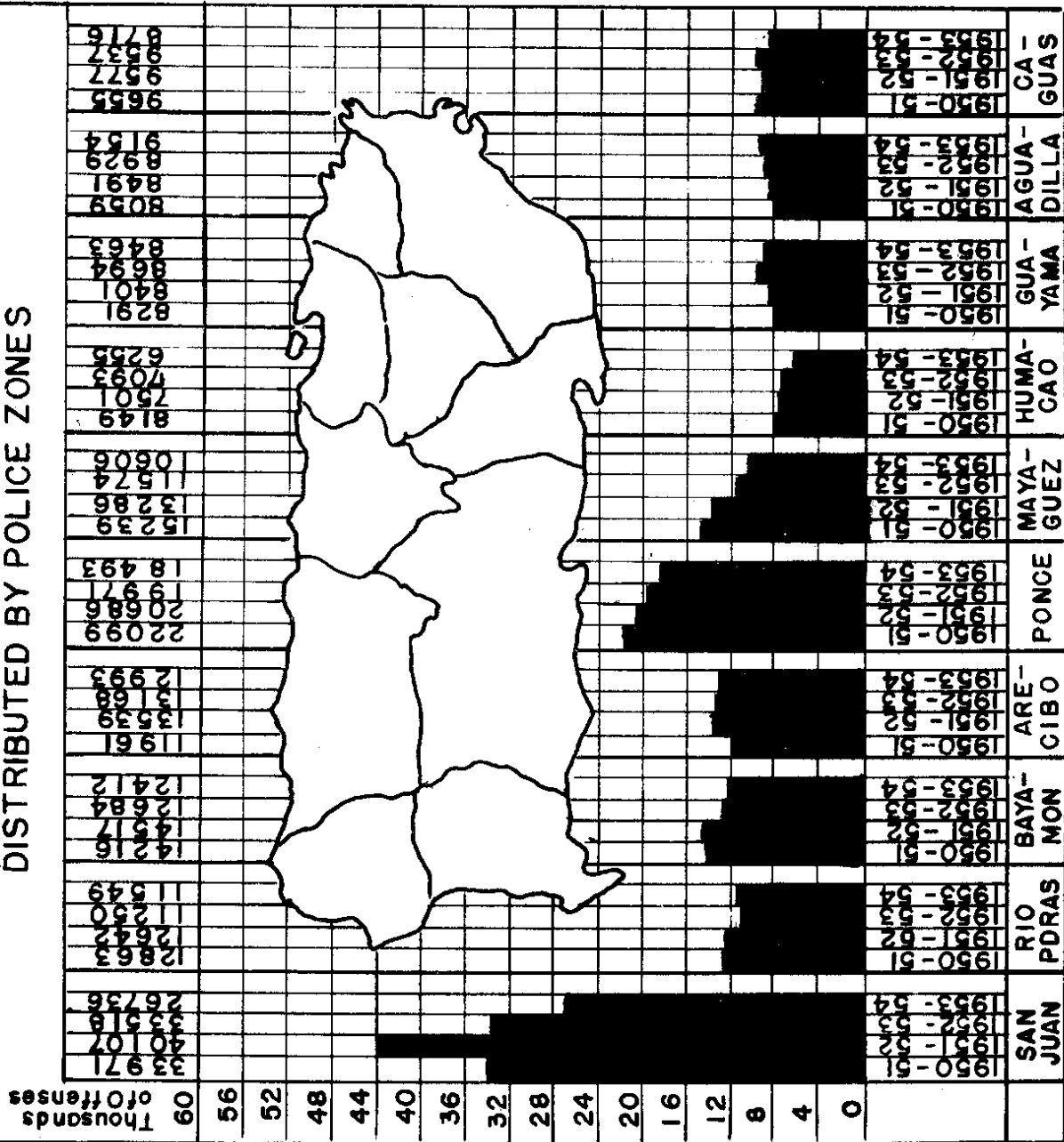
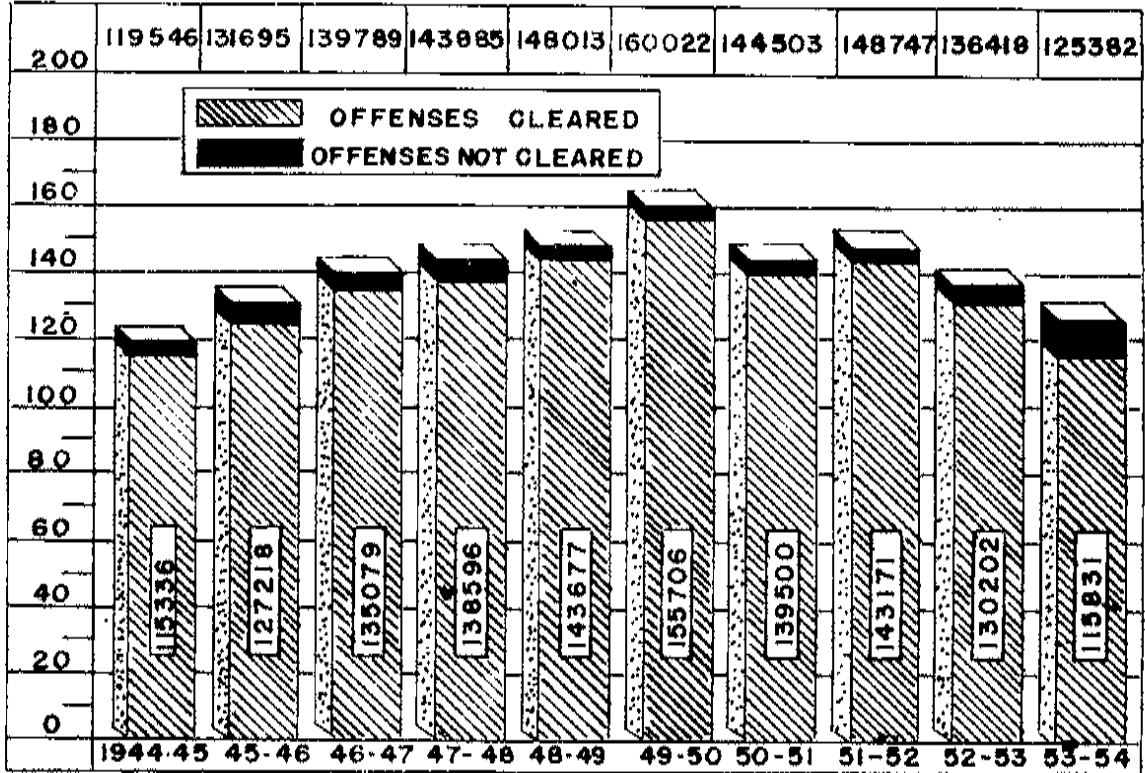

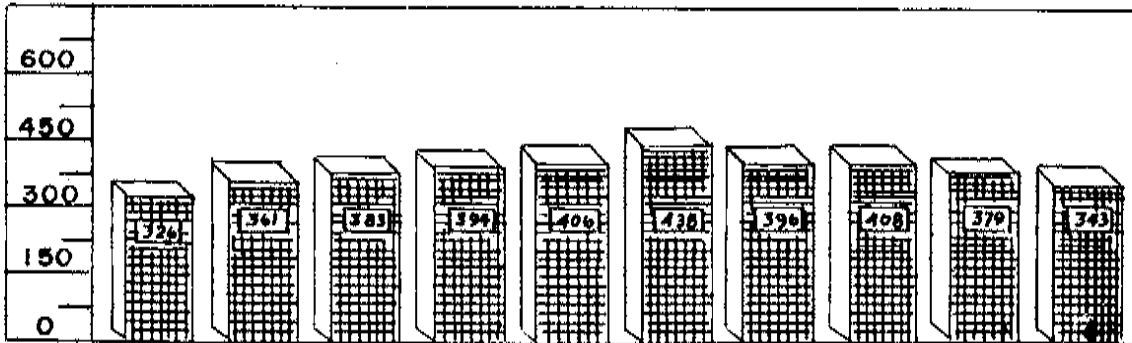
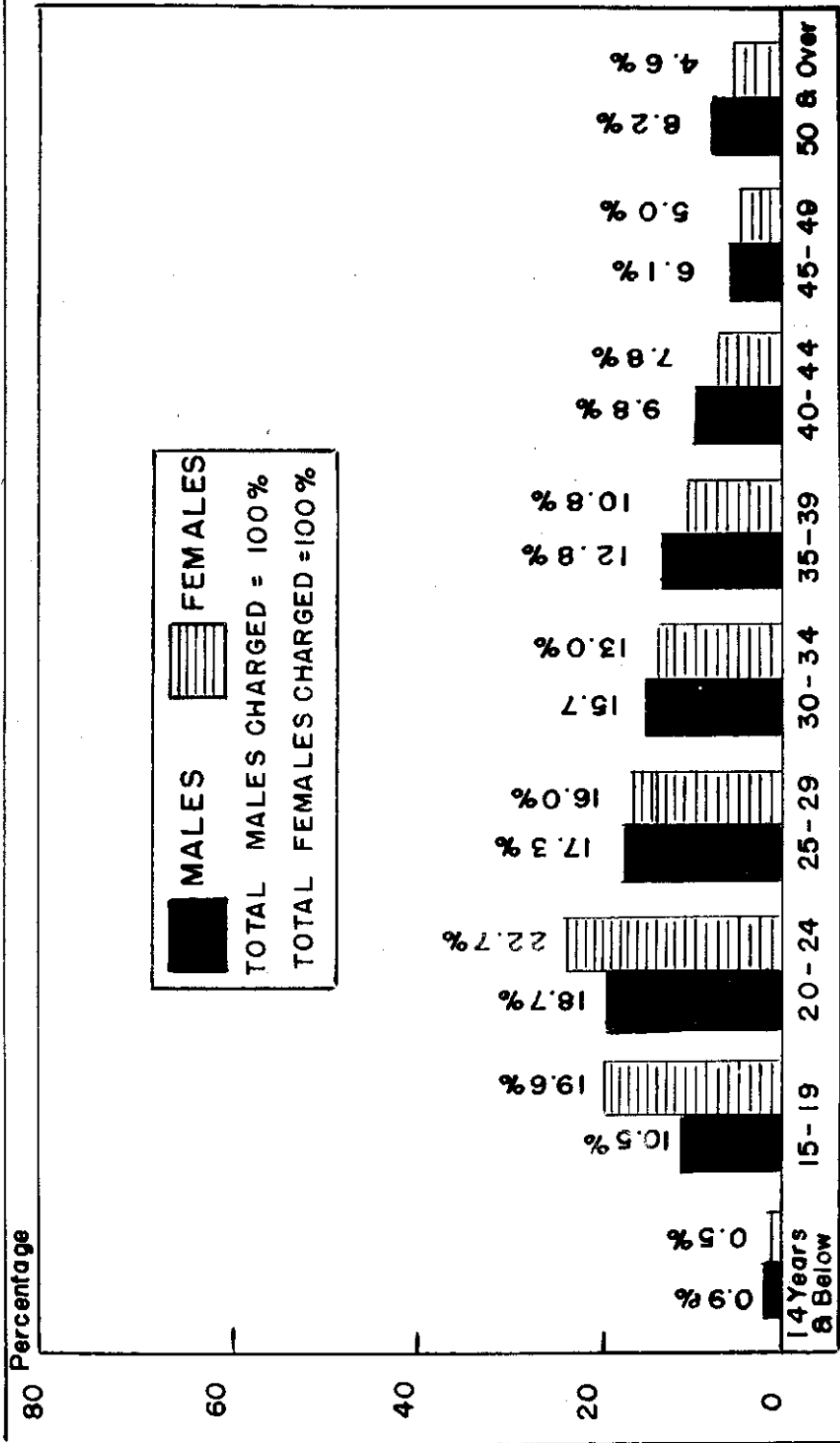

 YEAR - 1953 - 54



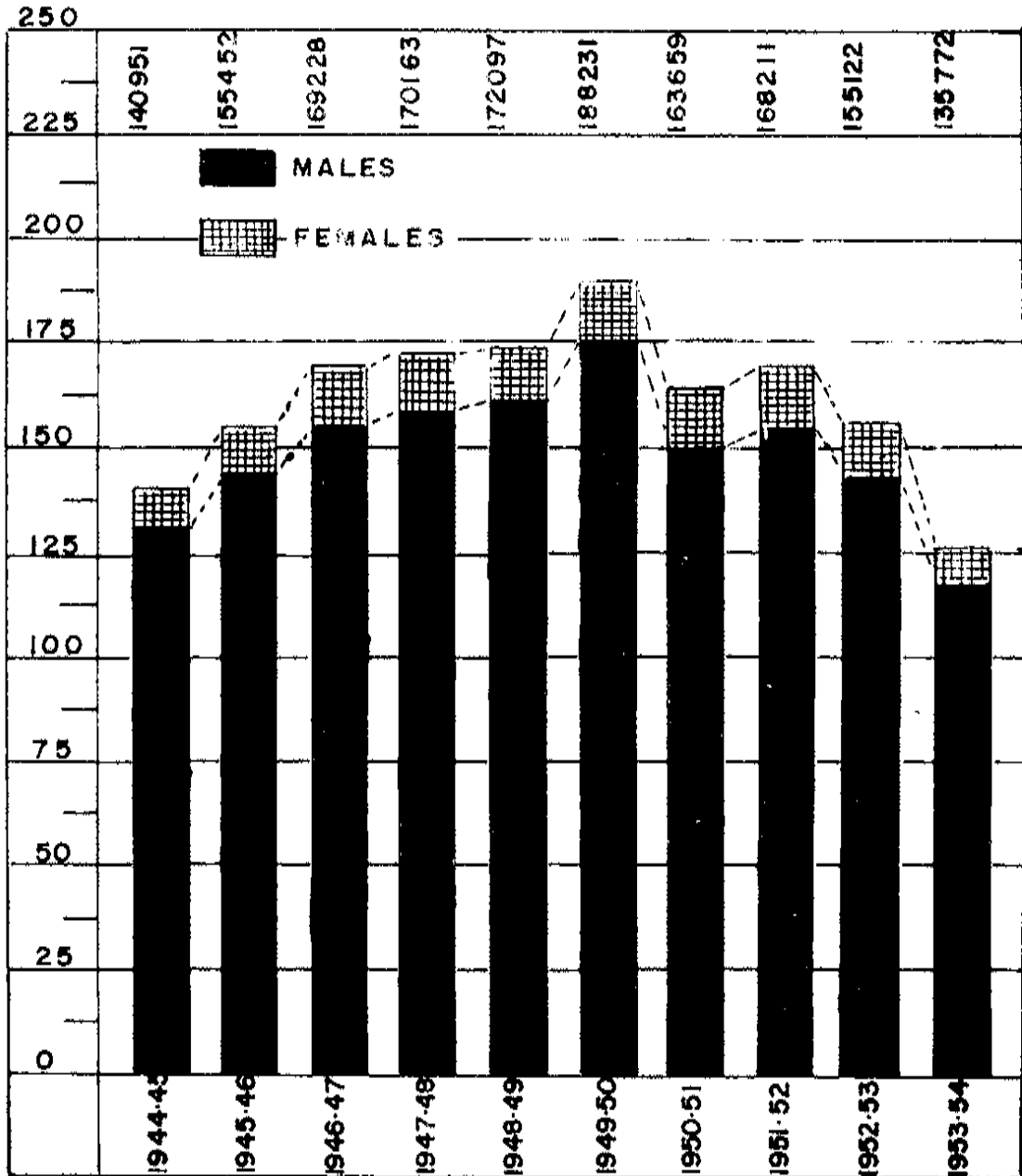

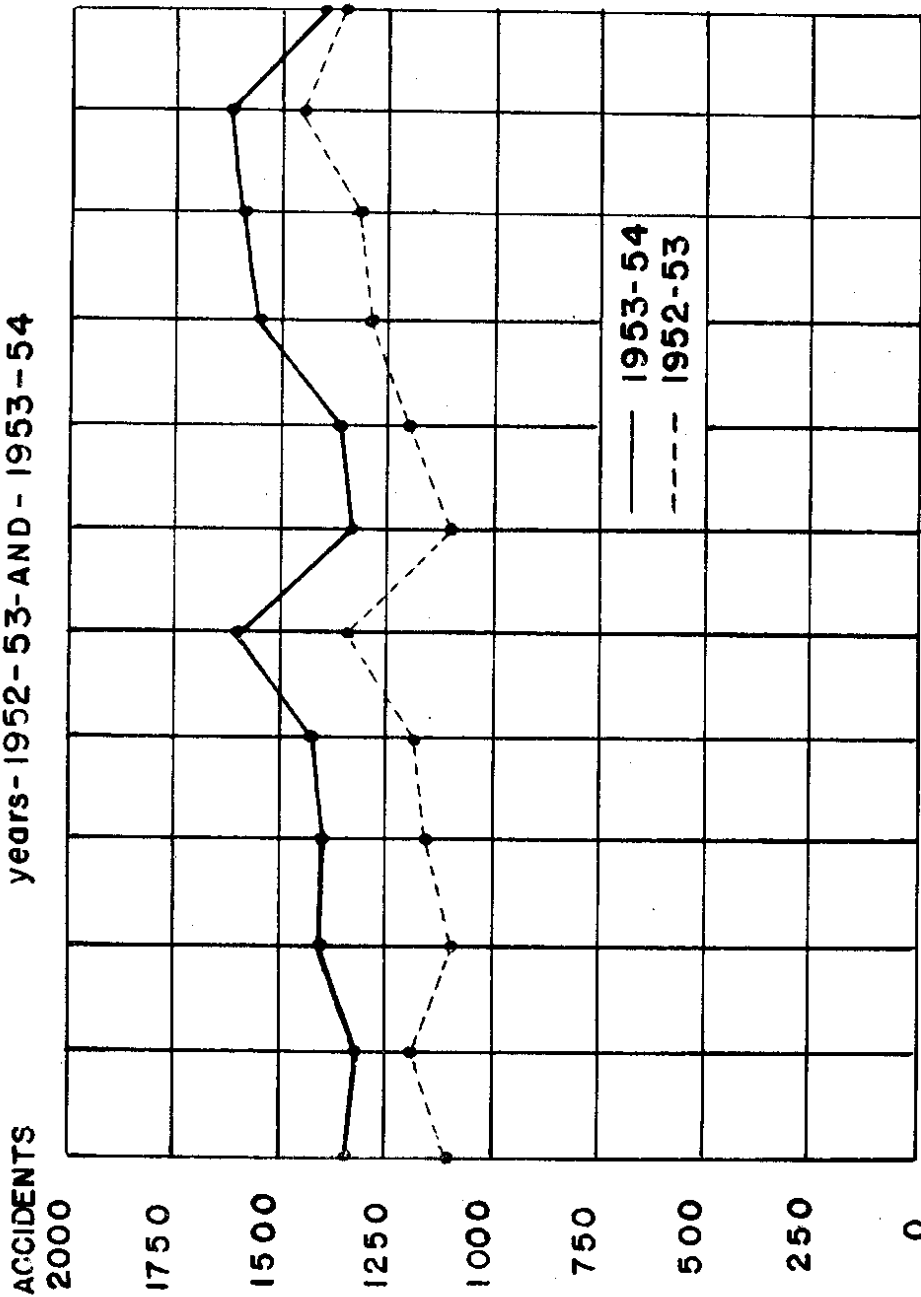

years - 1952 - 53 - AND - 1953 - 54



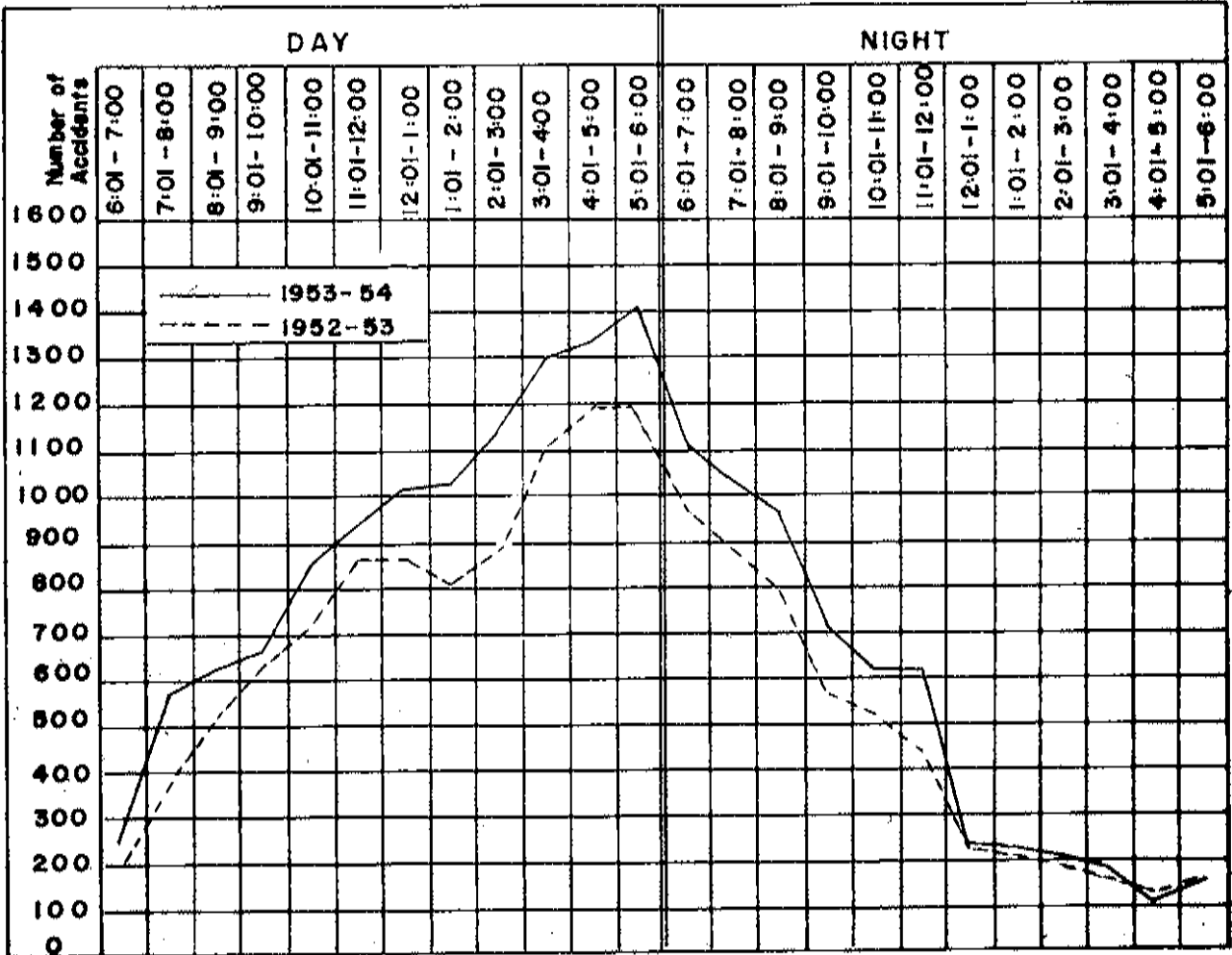

1953 - 54

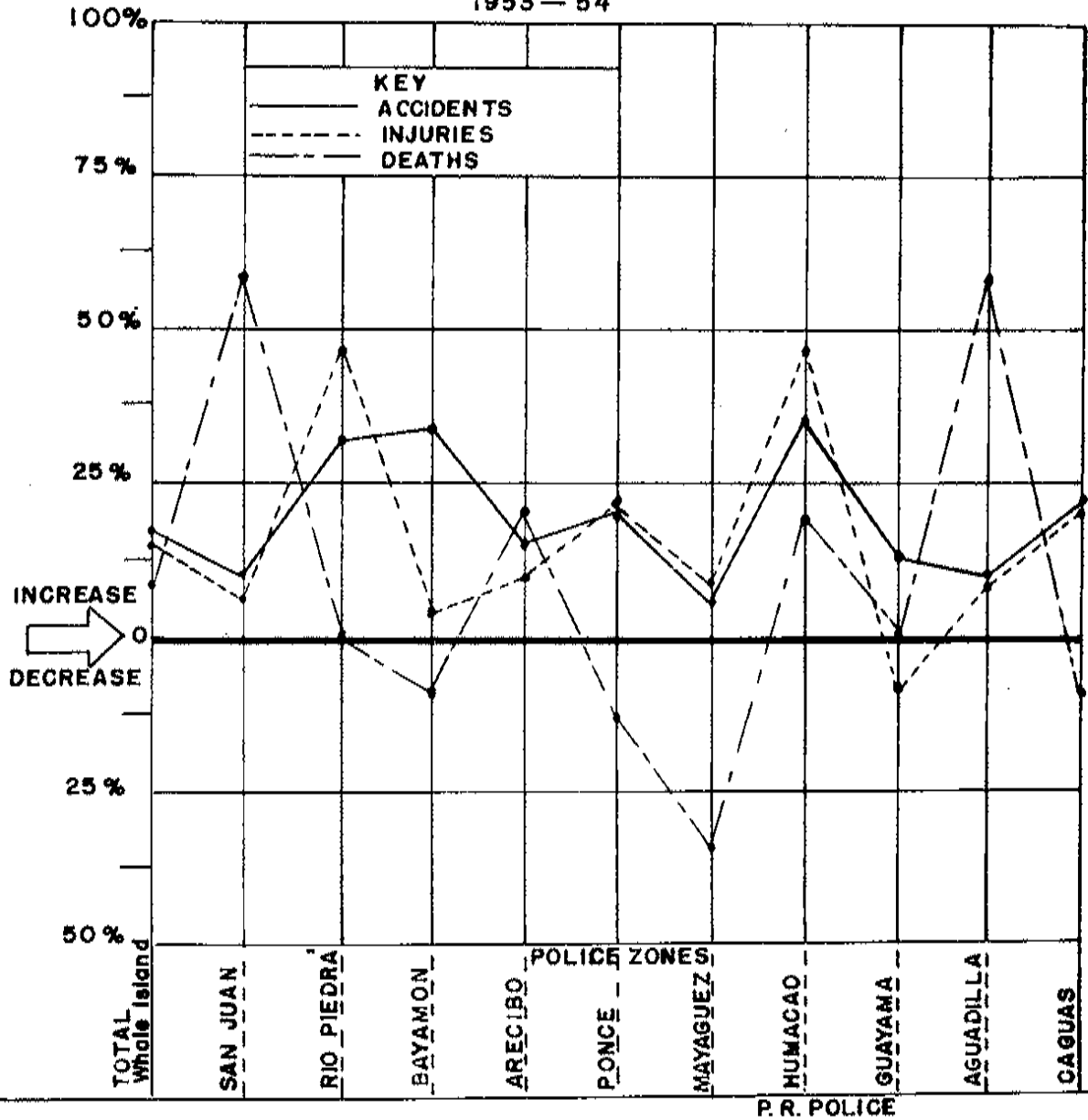

TRENDS IN JUVENILE DELICUENCY

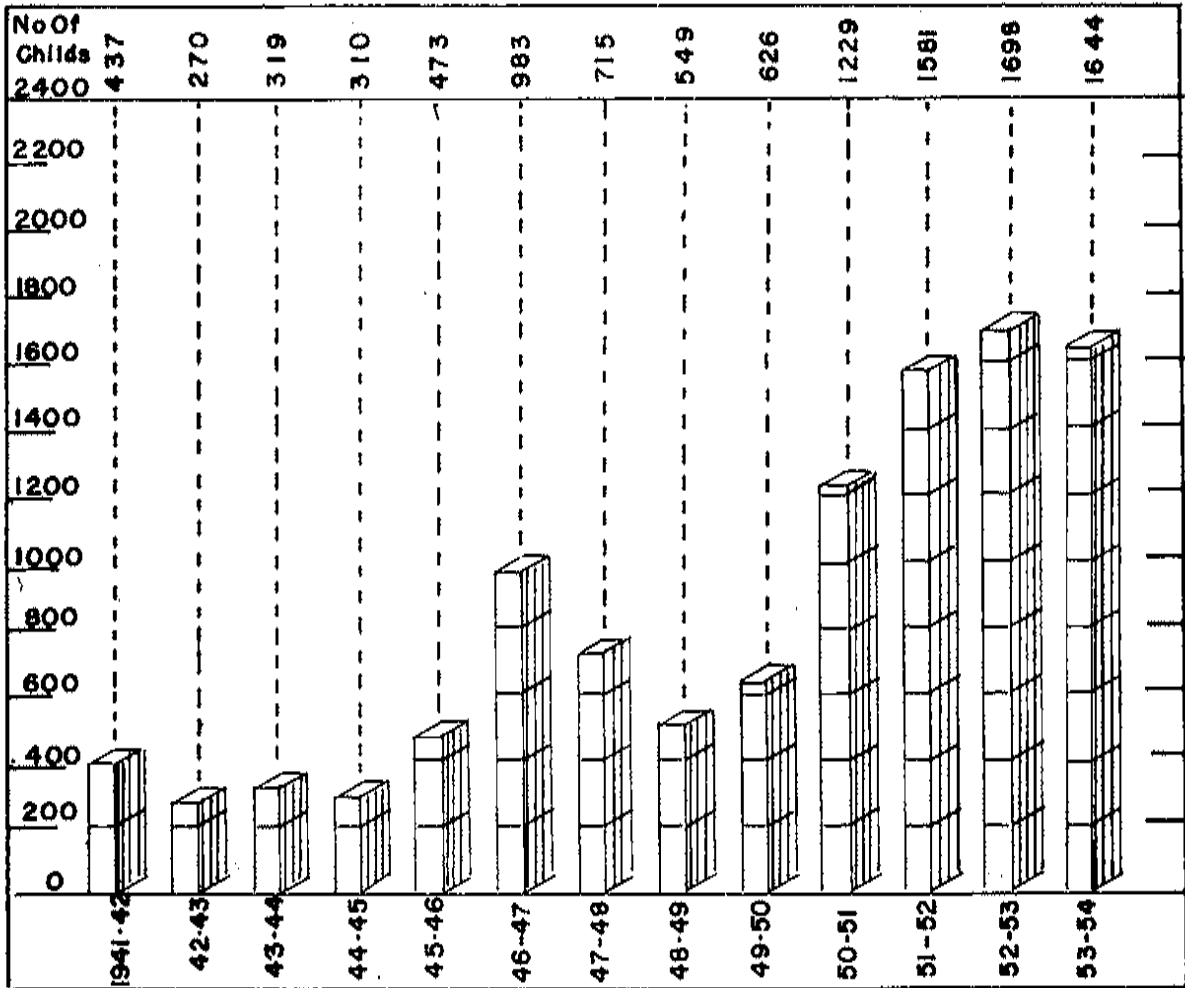

PERSONAL DE LA POLICIA

La Fuerza autorizada de la Policía para el año fiscal 1954-55 era de 2,759 miembros. Alrededor de 195 empleados civiles trabajaban en las oficinas del Cuartel General y en las zonas policíacas, un civil en cada zona.

COMISION DE LA POLICIA

La Comisión de la Policía se compone de tres miembros, nombrados ad honorem por el Gobernador de Puerto Rico, y con poderes estatuidos por Ley.

En el año 1954-55 la Comisión celebró 46 sesiones, vió 105 casos de formulación de cargos a policías, resolvió 13 casos en apelación y aprobó 12 pensiones para policías o sus viudas. Además, la Comisión examinó 943 solicitudes de ingreso a la Policía, 83 solicitudes de reposición y consideró 96 renuncias.

NEGOCIADO DE INSPECCION Y PLANES

El Negociado de Inspección y Planes de la Policía de Puerto Rico se compone del siguiente personal:

- 1 Capitán - Inspector General
- 1 Capitán - División de Inspección y Quejas
- 1 Capitán - División de Vigilancia e Investigación
- 1 Director - División de Ayuda Juvenil
- 1 Teniente - División de Tránsito (Vacante)
- 3 Tenientes- At large
- 1 Oficial Administrativo
- 2 Guardias
- 4 Taquígrafos

El Inspector General es el Jefe del Negociado. Está a cargo de la tramitación e investigación de todos los asuntos oficiales y de velar porque se investiguen los cargos y quejas contra miembros de la Policía, tomando la acción administrativa de lugar de acuerdo con la naturaleza de cada caso. Analiza métodos, suministra supervisión técnica y planes programas para cubrir actividades futuras a desarrollarse por la Academia y División de Planes y Entrenamiento de la Policía para el mejor funcionamiento y mayor eficiencia del Negociado. Bajo sus órdenes funcionan las siguientes Divisiones:

(a) Inspección y Quejas:

Esta División lleva a cabo inspecciones periódicas en los distritos de la Policía, así como en las distintas dependencias del Cuartel General y en la División de Detectivos, a los fines de determinar la forma en que se están desempeñando sus funciones, con el propósito de mejorar las condiciones prevalocientes para rendir un servicio adecuado y, además, aconseja y orienta debidamente al personal en el ejercicio de sus labores oficiales y hacia la solución de cualquier problema creado.

(b) Vigilancia e Investigación:

Esta División continúa investigaciones de quejas contra miembros de la Policía y de paisanos y rinde informe sobre las mismas, recomendando la acción administrativa a tomarse por el Inspector General, de acuerdo con la naturaleza de cada caso. Investiga seriamente la conducta moral y eficiencia del personal y el cumplimiento de las reglas y reglamentos que gobiernan la organización.

(c) Ayuda Juvenil:

El propósito primordial de la División de Ayuda Juvenil es combatir y evitar por todos los medios la delincuencia juvenil en Puerto Rico. A tales fines, el Jefe de dicha división está a cargo de la instrumentación de programas completos. La Liga Atlética Policial forma parte de esta división y está bajo la supervisión de oficiales juveniles. Se celebran actividades atléticas y de recreación, abarcando guía, supervisión e investigación en los casos de menores y de adultos conectados con aquellos.

(d) División de Tránsito:

Esta División trata planes de orientación para la clase choferil y conductores de vehículos, respecto de la Ley de Automóviles y Tránsito y señales en las vías públicas, para evitar accidentes. También cursa instrucciones a los Comandantes de Zona y de Distrito, tendientes a reducir los ruidos innecesarios (uso indebido de silabos) en las zonas urbanas. El oficial a cargo de esta División asiste a vistas celebradas por entidades como:

- 1- Departamento de Obras Públicas
- 2- Fuerzas Armadas
- 3- Legislatura Estatal

para tratar sobre el problema del tránsito en la Isla. Dicta conferencias por la radio sobre el particular y participa en la redacción de cartas circulares de este Departamento en relación con la Ley de Automóviles y Tránsito.

(e) Defensa Civil:

Un oficial sirve de contacto entre el Cuartel Central

y el Director de la Defensa Civil de Puerto Rico, y como tal, está a cargo de todos los asuntos relacionados con dicha agencia. La Oficina del Inspector General coopera en las prácticas de oscurecimiento e incursiones aéreas simuladas que periódicamente lleva a efecto la Defensa Civil, e informa al Director sobre el resultado de tales actividades. Por conducto de esta Oficina se transmiten a los Distritos de la Policía las instrucciones recibidas de la Defensa Civil, y cumplimiento del público en general.

Oficiales de la Oficina del Inspector General asisten a todas las conferencias dictadas por el Comité Puertorriqueño de Casa Blanca, en representación del Jefe de la Policía, rindiendo los informes correspondientes.

La División de Inspección y Quejas recibió durante el año, 1952 quejas contra policías. La investigación de las mismas reveló que en 290 de los casos había base suficiente para una investigación ulterior. Esto trajo por resultado la formulación de cargos administrativos a 158 policías.

OFICINA DEL MEDICO

En términos generales, el trabajo agobador de la Policía podría medirse por el número de miembros que recibe atención médica. Durante el año, 4533 policías recibieron atención médica por enfermedad o accidentes; a 2462 se les hizo un examen general para fines de reclutamiento, reposición, reintegro, ascenso, etc. Treinta y nueve miembros fueron licenciados del servicio por incapacidad física. Se registraron 7 muertes en el año.

ACADEMIA DE LA POLICIA

El crecimiento del aspecto tanto técnico como científico de las leyes en vigor, hacen imprescindible que los reclutas reciban un intenso adiestramiento antes de asumir sus deberes como policías regulares.

La Academia cumple su cometido cabalmente para beneficio de toda la Fuerza Policiaca. Sus oficinas principales (administración) radican en el Cuartel General de la Policía, San Juan, pero el adiestramiento de los reclutas se lleva a cabo en la Isla de Cabras, Palo Seco, a la entrada de la bahía de San Juan, frente al Castillo de El Morro.

A la terminación de un intenso curso de adiestramiento en la Ciencia Policiaca, Criminología, Leyes, Procedimiento Policiaco, Relaciones Públicas, Disciplina y Cortesía, Primera Ayuda, Calistenia, Judo, Relaciones Humanas, Modus Operandi de Toda Clase de Criminal, Uso de Armas de Fuego, Reglamentos de Tránsito, los policías y mujeres policías que sirven en la Fuerza por un período probatorio, son asignados a trabajo policiaco regular por un período adicional de prueba de tres meses; y durante dicho período practican todo lo que en la Academia han aprendido técnicamente, antes de recibir su nombramiento definitivo como tal miembro de la Fuerza.

Durante el año 1954-55 fueron nombrados por la Comisión de la Policía 137 policías y 9 mujeres policías para asistir a la Academia. Se le dió énfasis adicional a los aspectos sociológicos que abarcan las distintas leyes, tales como ética, relaciones humanas y otras por el estilo.

Se ha insistido en el adiestramiento del personal policiaco mientras sirve como tal, de manera que pueda estar al corriente de los distintos asuntos relacionados con el Cuerpo de la Policía. Para poder lograr este objetivo la Academia está llevando a efecto el adiestramiento

en cursos más avanzados de instrucción, así como cursos especiales para aquellos que así lo deseen. El adiestramiento parcial se lleva a efecto sin interrupción en todos los distritos policíacos de la Isla. Este adiestramiento se lleva a cabo bajo la supervisión de los comandantes de los distintos distritos policíacos de la Isla. Durante el año 1954-55 la Academia llevó a cabo las siguientes actividades:

(a) Tuvo bajo adiestramiento un total de 2,330 policías.

Esto incluye el adiestramiento de tiro al blanco.

(b) Un total de 64 miembros de distintos rangos tuvieron la oportunidad de tomar un curso en "lectura rápida".

(c) La Academia tiene bajo su dirección la Policía de Reserva. Esta consiste de 75 policías regulares bien seleccionados, quienes han sido sometidos a un intenso y continuo adiestramiento, no solamente en lo que respecta a asuntos relacionados con el Cuerpo, sino también en lo que se relaciona con armas de fuego. La Reserva está en todo momento alerta para prestar sus inmediatos servicios en casos de emergencia.

(d) Un total de 39 hombres están en la actualidad asistiendo a un curso de repaso en la Academia de la Policía, el cual se extenderá por un período de diez semanas.

(e) Veinte policías tomaron un curso para actuar como instructores en primeros auxilios y con la cooperación de estos veinte policías contamos en la actualidad con un total de 251 agentes que han completado satisfactoriamente el curso regular de primera ayuda en varios pueblos de la Isla.

(f) El adiestramiento en armas de fuego ha sido intensificado, llevado sin interrupción a la práctica, en toda la Jela durante el año 1954-55. Un total de 2,271 miembros incluyendo oficiales, clases y policías han recibido los beneficios de este adiestramiento en armas de fuego. Ello ha significado el uso de 337,304 balas Cal. .38. Además de lo anteriormente indicado, tanto estos miembros como los de nuevo ingreso reciben adiestramiento adicional en el uso de otras armas de fuego, tales como sub-ametralladoras Cal. .45, escopetas Cal. .12, bombas lacrimógenas, etc.

La Academia está en proceso de la organización de la banda de la Policía, y ya en la actualidad cuenta con veintidós músicos profesionales quienes sirven bajo nombramientos extendidos por la Comisión de la Policía, como miembros regulares del Cuerpo. Estos miembros han estado y aún están recibiendo adiestramiento en la Academia y se les asignan obligaciones que están en consonancia con su misión especial de músicos.

La cooperación recibida de esta banda de la Policía ha concedido al Cuerpo la oportunidad de llevar a cabo actos sociales como de recreo para los miembros de la Policía y sus familiares.

DIVISION DE ESTADISTICAS Y RECORD CRIMINAL:

La División de Estadísticas y Récord Criminal es una de las divisiones del Negociado de Administración. Uno de los deberes más importantes de la División es el mantener los registros en tal forma que puedan ser usados rápidamente. La División se compone de las siguientes secciones: Huellas Digitales, Registro de Armas, Certifi-

Sección de Estudios Sobre Conducta, Sistema Monodactilar, Estadísticas y Sección de Administración.

Sección Registro Armas de Fuego:

En esta Sección se prepara y archiva toda la documentación relacionada con el registro de armas de fuego, a tenor con las Leyes Núm. 14 de 1936 y Núm. 17 de 1951.

Hasta el 30 de junio de 1955, la Sección había recibido 37,432 solicitudes de licencia para tener y poseer armas de fuego. Durante el año, la Sección expidió 943 licencias, canceló 54 y confiscó 268 armas.

Al finalizar el año, el número total de solicitudes de licencias tratadas en la Oficina ascendió a 36,932. De todas las solicitudes de licencias recibidas, sólo alrededor de 500 están pendientes de resolverse. Estas están ya bajo investigación. Durante el año se inscribieron 1,775 armas de fuego de distintas clases. Alrededor de 45 certificados de armas han sido preparados y expedidos para funcionarios judiciales y de la Policía.

Sección de Certificados de Buena Conducta:

En el año 1954-55 la Sección preparó y expidió 2,628 certificados de buena conducta para viajantes y otros fines. Además, preparó 18,281 certificados, libre de derechos, (sellos de rentas internas) para reclutas de la Guardia Nacional y para obreros que iban a trabajar a los Estados Unidos bajo el ⁵ auspicio de la Secretaría del Trabajo. También se prepararon 3,624 certificados sobre informes de accidentes, 502 licencias de caza y 1,592 licencias para portar armas.

Como requisito para la expedición de certificados, se cancelaron sellos de Rentas Internas ascendentes a \$ 16,296.

Sección de Estadísticas:

La función principal de la Oficina es compilar datos estadísticos para la preparación de los informes mensuales y anuales que esbozan las actividades de la Policía de Puerto Rico. Los datos se presentan en tablas y gráficas estadísticas, incluyendo un análisis de los mismos. La Sección prepara también otros informes y estudios sobre materias específicas de la Policía.

DIVISION LEGAL:

El siguiente es un resumen de las actividades de la División Legal:

La División Legal fué consultada en numerosas ocasiones tanto verbalmente como por escrito. Atendiendo dichas consultas y solicitudes de opiniones, la División Legal rindió un total de sesenta y cinco (65) opiniones escritas, la mayoría de las cuales tenían relación con asuntos de carácter policiaco y otras, las menos, eran consultas u opiniones solicitadas por agencias de gobierno o ciudadanos particulares, interesados en conocer la opinión de la Policía de Puerto Rico en cuanto a determinado asunto de carácter legal.

El Departamento de la Policía de Puerto Rico estuvo representado ante la Honorable Comisión de la Policía de Puerto Rico en los casos en que se formularon cargos contra miembros de la Fuerza. Hubo un total de cuarenta (40) condenaciones, dieciocho (18) no culpables y veintidós (22) casos archivados.

Trabajando de común acuerdo con la División de Estadísticas y Récord Criminal la División Legal entendió en innumerables casos de solicitudes de licencias de tenencia y posesión de armas de fuego, a tenor con las disposiciones de la Ley de Armas vigente.

El trabajo relacionado con este asunto puede desglosarse en la forma siguiente:

- (a) Se aprobaron setenta y una (71) solicitudes de licencia de armas de fuego y se denegaron ochenta y una (81) solicitudes.

A esta oficina le fueron sometidas cincuenta y siete (57) Ordenanzas Municipales para el correspondiente estudio y la determinación

de si se ajustaban a las disposiciones legales pertinentes relacionadas con el establecimiento y operación de pizas durante la celebración de fiestas patronales en los diferentes municipios.

La División Legal intervino en el estudio y opinión de veintiseis (26) proyectos de leyes sometidos a esta División para estudio por el Honorable Gobernador de Puerto Rico. La mayoría de las medidas legislativas propuestas en los proyectos que fueron sometidos fueron recomendadas por esta División Legal después de un estudio agotador de las mismas y el Gobernador aprobó la mayoría de los proyectos recomendados por nosotros.

La División Legal a través de sus dos Asesores dió instrucción en materia de derecho penal, arrestos y ley de evidencia a las dos academias últimas, a saber; la que terminó en diciembre de 1954 y la que terminó en mayo de este año. A la última academia se le dieron cuestiones prácticas y una vista como si fuera en un Tribunal propiamente sobre un caso de bolita.

Se despacharon un total de trescientos ochenta y siete (387) comunicaciones escritas, independientemente de estudios, consultas y opiniones a que hemos hecho referencia anteriormente.

NEGOCIADO DE PROPIEDAD Y CUENTAS:

El presupuesto total aprobado para la Policía de Puerto Rico para el año económico de 1954-55 ascendió a \$7,272,690. De esta cantidad, \$17,500 correspondieron a una asignación especial destinada al pago de armas entregadas de acuerdo con las disposiciones de la Ley Núm. 17 de 1951.

El remanente de \$7,255,190 correspondió a los gastos corrientes de operación de esta organización. De éstos, \$6,068,790 se dedicaron al pago de Servicios Personales y \$1,186,400 para Gastos Generales.

De la cantidad asignada para Servicios Personales, \$5,366,081 se dedicaron para el pago de sueldos a miembros de la fuerza cuyo número asciende a 2,759 hombres y \$553,952 para sueldos a 195 empleados civiles.

Mejoras Administrativas:

Durante el año mencionado se estableció en la Policía una División de Presupuesto para atender la importante fase de análisis y planificación de la cuestión presupuestal.

También se realizó un estudio con el propósito de aumentar los servicios de la Policía en Puerto Rico a base de una aportación paritaria entre los municipios y el Estado.

Este informe fue sometido al Honorable Gobernador de Puerto Rico. También se realizó el estudio de las necesidades policíacas en la Isla de Puerto Rico siguiendo el patrón que estableciera el Servicio de Administración Pública de Chicago en el informe que ellos prepararon en el 1951.

El informe referido fue completado y será sometido al Ejecutivo próximamente.

Personal:

Con relación a la actividad en la parte correspondiente a personal, informamos que durante ese año se concedieron aumento de sueldo dentro del grado a 50 empleados civiles y la cantidad envuelta en estos aumentos

ascendió a \$4,372.

También se preparó el reglamento que establece las normas y procedimientos que regirán para conceder aumentos a la Policía de acuerdo con el sistema de méritos.

La legislación que se preparó para dar curso al referido programa (P. del S. 487) quedó pendiente en las Cámaras Legislativas y se espera que sea aprobado en el transcurso de la próxima sesión.

Aprovechando las facilidades y la cooperación que prestó el Departamento de Hacienda se logró enviar un gran número de agentes a cursos de adiestramiento que estuvo ofreciendo la Oficina de Investigadores Especiales de ese Departamento.

Hemos creído siempre en la necesidad de programas de adiestramiento y becas para los miembros de la fuerza con el propósito de hacer de ellos una clase más profesionalizada.

A este respecto, sugerimos que la Oficina de Personal abra sus puertas a programas de adiestramiento que vaya dirigido a adiestrar los hombres dedicados a la protección de la vida y propiedad de los ciudadanos.

Creemos en la posibilidad de que todos los empleados civiles de esta organización sean puestos bajo el Servicio por Oposición de la Oficina de Personal.

OFICINA DE RELACIONES PÚBLICAS:

La Oficina de Relaciones Públicas, creada en noviembre de 1953, trabaja bajo la supervisión directa del Jefe de la Policía. Consta de tres personas - dos civiles y un policía: Un Redactor de Información I (jefe), un redactor de noticias deportivas (policía) y una secretaria (tequígrafa I).

Esta Oficina tiene a cargo, principalmente, suministrar información sobre la Policía a los periódicos y agencias interesadas y realizar trabajo de traducción.

En el año fiscal 1954-55, la Oficina de Relaciones Públicas tradujo para la Legislatura un folleto sobre las actividades de la Policía, el Informe Anual de la Policía, año 1952-53 y el Informe Anual de la Policía, año 1953-54. Se publicó en los periódicos metropolitanos un directorio telefónico de la Policía. También inició las gestiones para imprimir mapas del Área Metropolitana y otros pueblos mostrando la rotulación de las calles. Asimismo está imprimiendo 11,000 tarjetas con el directorio telefónico de la Policía para repartirse en las casas de familia de la Zona Metropolitana.

La Oficina de Relaciones Públicas emitió 91 comunicados para los periódicos, radioperiódicos y radio sobre diferentes actividades de la Policía: graduaciones de policías, competencias de tiro, actos heroicos de policías, autos (hurtados) recuperados, requisitorias de delinquentes y personas desaparecidas, campañas sobre el tránsito, inauguración de nuevos servicios, etc.

El Oficial de Relaciones Públicas representó al Jefe de la Policía en 18 reuniones. Estas giraron sobre campañas cívicas, v.g. contra el

cáncer, etc.; problemas de tránsito, v. g. exceso de velocidad, etc.; problemas de diversas índoles, v. g. ruidos innecesarios, prostitución, ordenanzas municipales sobre limpieza, ornato público, etc. También dictó conferencias sobre relaciones públicas a los policías de nuevo ingreso. Las clases fueron en la Academia de la Policía.

Otras actividades misceláneas que la Oficina de Relaciones Públicas realizó fueron atender visitantes extranjeros y del país, emitir sugerencias al Jefe de la Policía, visitar cuarteles de la Policía, conseguir películas para otras agencias del gobierno, etc. La correspondencia interdepartamental ascendió a 101 comunicaciones y la general a 329. Total 430 comunicaciones.

LIGA ATLETICA POLICIACA

En el 1954-55 se llevaron a cabo alrededor de 13,524 actividades distintas en las que participaron 234,656 niños de toda la Isla. El principal problema interno de la Liga es la necesidad de personal que esté libre de otros deberes policíacos y adiestrado en el trabajo de prevención. Los miembros de la Policía le dedicaron a la Liga Atlética Policiaca un total de 6,291 días.

CRIMINALIDAD

En el año 1954-55 ocurrieron en la Isla 124,239 delitos. De éstos, el 73.1% (90,812) ocurrió en la zona urbana, o sea una disminución de 1.1% comparado con el año anterior. La zona rural registró el 26.9% (33,427) de los delitos o sea 6.0% menos que en el año 1953-54. El 35.4% (43,962) del total de delitos ocurrió durante las horas del día y el 64.6% (80,277) durante las horas de la noche. En el año, los delitos disminuyeron 0.9% y 8.9% en comparación con los años 1953-54 y 1952-53, respectivamente. En el año 1953-54 los delitos ascendieron a 125,382 y en el año 1952-53 a 136,418. Véase las Tablas 7-9 y la Gráfica F.

El por ciento mayor de delitos ocurrió en junio (10.1%) seguido por marzo con 10.0%. En enero se registró el menor porcentaje (6.4%). Véase Tabla 6.

Tendencias en los delitos Graves:

En los delitos graves se registró un aumento general de 3.6% sobre el año 1953-54. Hubo aumento de 5.0% en la zona urbana y una disminución de 0.5% en la zona rural comparado con las cifras del año 1953-54. Se registró un aumento en los siguientes delitos: Asesinato-Homicidio Voluntario, 5.7%; Violación, 11.0%; Robo, 25.5%; Escalamiento, 9.3% y Hurtos 1.3%. Hubo disminución en los delitos siguientes: Homicidio Involuntario, 14.6%; Agresiones Graves, 0.9% y Hurto de Auto, 19.1%. Véase Tabla 5 y Gráfica B.

Delitos Contra la Propiedad:

Los delitos contra la propiedad constituyeron el 12.4% (15,450) del total de delitos cometidos en el año 1954-55. Se distribuyeron en la

siguiente forma: 177 robos, 4,091 escalamientos, 7,577 hurtos, 114 hurtos de automóviles, 148 falsificaciones, 413 abusos de confianza, 61 hurtos de propiedad, 335 incendios maliciosos, 665 de falsa representación y 1,869 daños maliciosos. Los delitos contra la propiedad fueron 3.2% más que los del año anterior. Véase Tabla 9.

Delitos Contra la Persona:

Los delitos graves contra la persona ascendieron a 949 en el año 1954-55 o sea 0.2% menos que en el año anterior. Se distribuyeron así: 137 asesinatos, 31 homicidios voluntarios, 111 homicidios involuntarios, 131 violaciones, 99 ataques con intención de cometer asesinato, 31 ataques para cometer homicidio, 159 atentados contra la vida y 250 mutilaciones. Véase Tabla 9.

Delitos Ocurridos en las Zonas Policiacas:

En el año 1954-55, la Zona de San Juan fué la que tuvo el por ciento más alto de delitos, 21.0%. Le siguieron, en orden descendente; Ponce con 14.8%; Río Piedras, 11.6%; Arecibo, 10.2%; Bayamón, 8.3%; Mayaguez, 8.2%; Guayama, 7.2%; Caguas, 6.9%; Aguadilla, 6.8% y Humacao 5.0%. Las Zonas de San Juan, Ponce y Río Piedras informaron, conjuntamente, alrededor del 47% del total de delitos ocurridos en toda la Isla durante el año. Véase Tablas 7-8.

En todas las zonas policiacas, excepto en las de Río Piedras, Humacao y Guayama, los delitos disminuyeron comparados con el año anterior. La Zona de Bayamón fué la que registró el mayor descenso en los delitos, 17.3%. Le siguen en orden descendente, Aguadilla, 7.9%; Mayaguez, 4.3%; Arecibo, 2.8%; Caguas, 2.2%; San Juan 2.1% y Ponce, 0.2%. En las zonas

de Río Piedras, Humacao y Guayama los delitos aumentaron, 24.7%, 0.7% y 5.3%, respectivamente. Véase Tablas 7-8.

DELITOS INFUNDADOS

Hubo un total de delitos que después de investigados resultaron ser infundados. Estos ascendieron a 524 durante el año 1954-55, resultando ser un 40% menos que los registrados durante el pasado año 1953-54. De los delitos graves, Hurto Menor fué el delito que registro más casos infundados (168). La relación de estos delitos infundados aparece en las Tablas 7-9.

DELITOS ESCLARECIDOS Y PERSONAS ACUSADAS

En el año 1954-55 se esclarecieron 928 (97.9%) de los delitos graves contra la persona. Las Agresiones Graves obtuvieron el mayor porcentaje de delitos esclarecidos, 99.6%. Le siguieron los asesinatos y homicidios voluntarios con 98.8%; homicidio involuntario 98.2% y violación, 88.5%.

Los delitos graves contra la propiedad ascendieron a 11,959. De éstos el 27.8% (3325) fué esclarecido. El porcentaje más alto de delitos esclarecidos le correspondió a los robos con 43.5%. Le siguieron los hurtos con 31.3%; escalamientos, 20.8% y hurtos de automóviles, 7.9%. Véase Tabla 9, Gráfica F.

El por ciento general de los delitos esclarecidos en el año 1954-55 fué 91.3% o sea 1.1% menos que en el 1953-54.

Mujeres Delinuentes:

Alrededor de 9188 (7.3%) del total de personas arrestadas o denunciadas por la Policía durante el año fueron mujeres. El número de

mujeres arrestadas o denunciadas este año fué 6.9% menos que el año pasado. Se acusaron 9,138 mujeres, de las cuales 1,502 (16.3%) tenían menos de 20 años de edad y 3,569 (38.8) menos de 25 años. En el 1954-55, el promedio diario de mujeres que delinquieron fué de 25, en contraste con 27 en el 1953-54 y 31 en el 1952-53. Las acusaciones fueron por los mismos delitos que cometen los hombres. Véase Tabla 10, Gráficas G-H.

Varones Delincuentes:

Del total de personas arrestadas o denunciadas durante el año, el 92.7% (117,358) fueron hombres. El porcentaje más alto (18.6%), en los hombres arrestados o denunciados durante el año, tenía entre 20 y 24 años de edad. Alrededor de 46% de los transgresores tenía menos de 30 años de edad. Véase Tabla 10 y las Gráficas G-H.

PERSONAS CONVICTAS

En el año 1954-55, un total de 96,556 personas fueron convictas del delito que se les imputaba, 234 por delitos menores y 25,873 salieron absueltas o sus casos fueron archivados. Véase Tabla 12 a.

TRÁNSITO

Las violaciones a las leyes de tránsito ascendieron a 40,374 o sea 1.9% menos que en el año anterior. El 40.3% (16,266) de esos delitos ocurrieron de día y el 59.7% (24,108) de noche. Las zonas urbanas fueron responsables del 72.5% de dichos delitos y las zonas rurales del 27.5%. La Policía esclareció 99.6% (40,215) violaciones de tránsito y denunció a 37,975 personas. Es obvio que contra algunas personas se radicó más de una denuncia. El 32.5% del total de los delitos ocurridos en el 1954-55 fué contra las leyes de tránsito. De las personas denunciadas, 697 (1.8%) fueron mujeres y 37,278 (98.2%) fueron hombres. El 5.4% tenía menos de 20 años de edad y el 24.2% menos de 25.

ACCIDENTES DE AUTOMOVILES

En el año fiscal 1954-55 se registraron 18,253 accidentes de automóviles en los que perecieron 235 personas y 9,377 resultaron heridas. Estas cifras representan un aumento sobre el año anterior de 6.3% en los accidentes, 0.3% en los heridos y 1.3% en las muertes. El 57.8% de los accidentes ocurrió en la zona urbana y el 42.2% en la zona rural. Véase Tabla 20 y la Gráfica I.

Tendencias en los Accidentes de Automóviles:

El número de muertes y lesionados en los últimos once años, por cada 1,000 vehículos registrados y cada 100,000 habitantes, aparece en la Tabla 18.

Variación Mensual de Accidentes:

La distribución mensual de los accidentes, muertes y lesionados aparece en la Tabla 17. El mes de diciembre registró el porcentaje más alto de accidentes, 9.7%, seguido por mayo con 9.3%. El porcentaje más alto de lesionados ocurrió en diciembre y mayo con 9.8% y 9.3% respectivamente. En abril y diciembre se registró el mayor número de muertes, 13.2% y 10.6%, respectivamente. Véase Tabla 17 y la Gráfica J.

Distribución de los Accidentes:

El choque entre automóviles ocasionó el mayor número de accidentes. Este año hubo 10,714 (58.7%) accidentes de este tipo, lo que representa un aumento de 7.4% sobre el año anterior.

Los accidentes con peatones ascendieron a 3,135 ó 17.2% del total y un aumento de 1.7% sobre el año 1953-54.

El resto de los accidentes y el por ciento que representan, en orden descendente, son: choques de autos con objetos fijos, 8.7% (1,586); con bicicleta, 5.7% (1,040); otros accidentes, 5.4% (987); autos volcados, 2.5% (459); choque con animales, 1.7% (308); con trenes, 0.1% (24). Véase Tabla 16.

Muertos y Lesionados por Grupos de Edades:

En los accidentes ocurridos durante el año, 9,377 personas resultaron heridas, 0.3% más que en el año anterior. La distribución de las personas lesionadas, por grupo de edades, es la siguiente: menores de 5 años de edad, 417 ó 4.4%; entre 5 y 14 años de edad, 1,471 ó 15.7%; de 15 a 24 años de edad, 2,517 ó 26.9%; de 25 a 64 años de edad, 4,623 ó 49.3%; y de 65 años de edad en adelante, 349 ó 3.7% del total. Accidentes de automóviles con peatones fué la clase de accidente que ocasionó el mayor número de heridos (3,125), 33.3%. Tabla 14.

Las muertes ocasionadas por accidentes de automóviles durante el año ascendieron a 235, 1.3% más que en el 1953-54. Entre los muertos en accidentes, 14 ó 6.0% tenían menos de 5 años de edad; 33 ó 14.0% tenían de 5 a 14 años de edad; 29 ó 12.3% entre los 15 y 24; 137 ó 58.3% entre los 25 y 64; y 22 ó 9.4% tenían 65 o más años de edad. Accidentes de Automóviles con peatones ocasionaron el 51.0% del total de muertes durante el año. Véase Tabla 15.

Accidentes en las Zonas Policiacas:

Las Zonas de San Juan (18.8%), Río Piedras (19.4%) y Ponce (12.3%) informaron conjuntamente, el 50% de todos los accidentes ocurridos en la Isla. El por ciento de accidentes en las otras zonas, en orden descen-

dente, fué el siguiente: Bayamón 10.8%; Mayaguez, 9.5%; Arecibo, 9.0%; Aguadilla, 6.1%; Caguas, 5.5%; Guayama, 4.9% y Humacao 3.7%. Véase Tabla 20 y la Gráfica L.

En 6 de las Zonas Policiacas aumentaron los accidentes en comparación con el año anterior. Río Piedras registró el mayor por ciento de aumento en los accidentes, con 22.9%; seguido por San Juan con 10.2%; Ponce, 9.4%; Guayama, 8.8%; Arecibo, 7.6% y Aguadilla, 2.7%.

En la Zona de San Juan los lesionados aumentaron 7.2% y las muertes descendieron 66.7% comparados con el año 1953-54. Las variaciones en el número de lesionados y muertes en las distintas zonas son: en Río Piedras los lesionados aumentaron 7.7% y las muertes, 40.0%. En Bayamón los lesionados descendieron 0.2% y las muertes descendieron 5.3%; en Arecibo los lesionados aumentaron 1.9% y las muertes 53.8%; en Ponce los lesionados aumentaron 1.6% y las muertes 40.0%; en Mayaguez descendieron los lesionados 16.6% y las muertes aumentaron un 36.4%; en Humacao los lesionados y las muertes descendieron 9.7% y 42.9%, respectivamente; en Guayama aumentaron los lesionados 3.8% y las muertes 17.6%; en Aguadilla aumentaron los lesionados 13.2% y las muertes descendieron 36.4% y en Caguas los lesionados disminuyeron 16.0% y las muertes no variaron. Véase Tabla 20.

Causas de los Accidentes:

Las causas de los accidentes son múltiples, pero las que aparecieron con más frecuencia durante el año se indican en la Tabla 23.

El pasarle a otro vehículo negligentemente y el exceso de velocidad fueron las dos causas específicas que produjeron el mayor número.

de accidentes en el año, 27.4% y 14.7%, respectivamente. El 18.0% de los lesionados y el 40.0% de las muertes se debieron a accidentes causados por exceso de velocidad.

Sexo, Edad y Clase de Licencia de los Conductores:

En los accidentes del año, 29,514 conductores estuvieron envueltos. De éstos, el 94.8% (27,963) eran varones y el 2.6% (774) mujeres y el 2.6% (777) no fué informado. Estas lesionaron a 214 (2.3%) personas y ocasionaron 2 (0.9%) muertes en el año 1954-55. Véase Tabla 24.

El 77.7% (22,945) de los conductores envueltos en accidentes tenían licencia de chofer. Estos fueron responsables del 76.1% (7,135) de las personas lesionadas y del 66.0% (155) de las muertes. Los conductores con licencia de aprendizaje envueltos en accidentes ascendieron a 549 (1.9%). Estos lesionaron a 211 (2.2%) personas y ocasionaron 9 (3.8%) muertes. Los conductores sin licencia ascendieron a 1,175 (4.0%). Estos lesionaron a 682 (7.3%) personas y ocasionaron 16 (6.8%) muertes. Las personas con licencia de conductor ascendieron a 2,987 (10.1%). Estas lesionaron a 963 (10.3%) personas y ocasionaron 27 (11.5%)^{muer}tes. Véase Tabla 25.

Tipo de Automóviles:

Los autos de turismo privados (48.5%) y de turismo públicos (19.5%) fueron lo que más estuvieron envueltos en accidentes. Los del tipo turismo privado fueron responsables del 47.0% (4,412) de los lesionados y del 41.7% (98) de las muertes. Los del tipo turismo público ocasionaron el 25.2% (2,361) de los lesionados y el 19.1% (45) de las muertes.

La distribución de las personas lesionadas y de las muertes aparece en la Tabla 27.

OTRAS CLASES DE ACCIDENTES

Los accidentes ocasionados por inmersión, electrocución, quemaduras, trabajo, caídas, bicicletas (sin motor) y otros más, ocasionaron 197 muertes y 684 heridos. El mayor número de muertes (110) fué por inmersión. En accidentes de bicicletas tres (3) personas resultaron muertas y 248 lesionadas. Véase Tabla 28. La Tabla no incluye accidentes aéreos.

DELINCUENCIA JUVENIL

La Policía informó 1,629 casos de menores delincuentes durante el año 1954-55. Esto representa una disminución de 0.9% comparado con el año 1953-54. Véase Tabla 29 y la Gráfica M.

Los delitos contra la propiedad cometidos por menores delincuentes ascendieron a 1,192. El 62% (1003) del total de delitos cometidos por menores delincuentes fueron hurtos de menor cuantía y escalamientos, Véase Tabla 29.

Las Tablas 30 y 31 muestran, por grupos de edades, el total de menores delincuentes (1,483) responsables de los 1,629 casos informados. Como podrá verse, el 55.7% (826) de dichos menores delincuentes tenían de 13 a 15 años de edad. El 40% (597) eran reincidentes. El 58.5% (349) de los reincidentes tenían de 13 a 15 años de edad y el 23.3% (139) tenían de 10 a 12 años de edad. Para la fecha que cometieron el delito, el 59% (874) de los menores delincuentes no eran escolares.

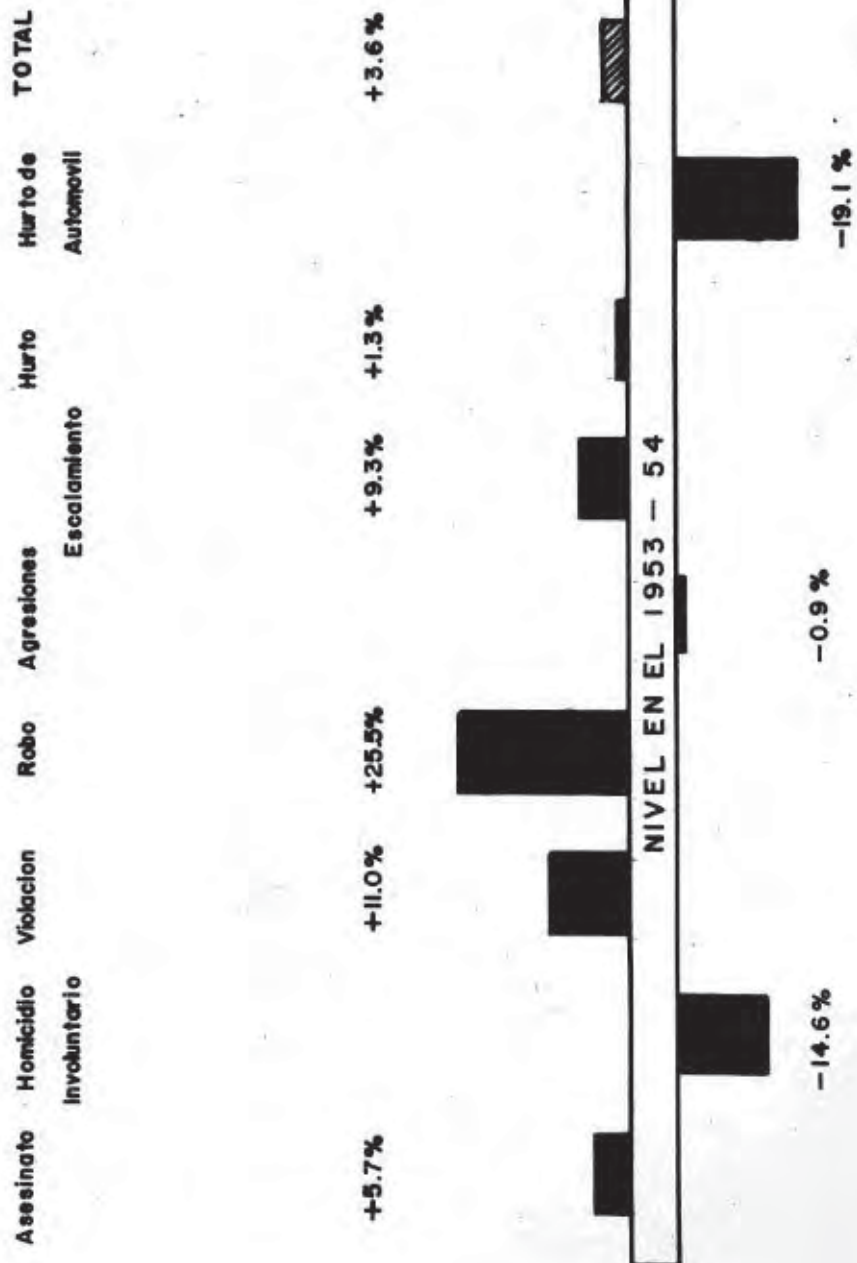

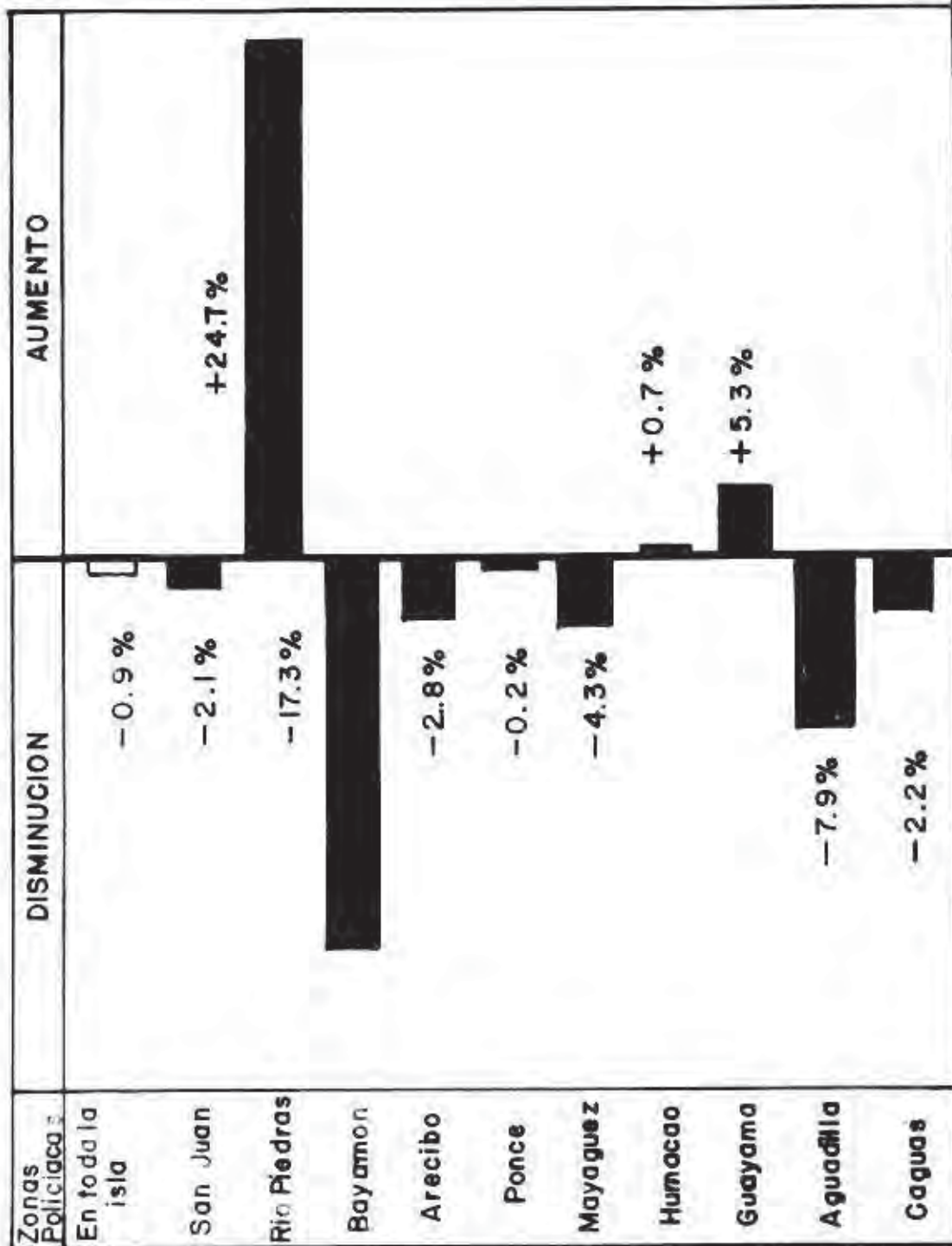

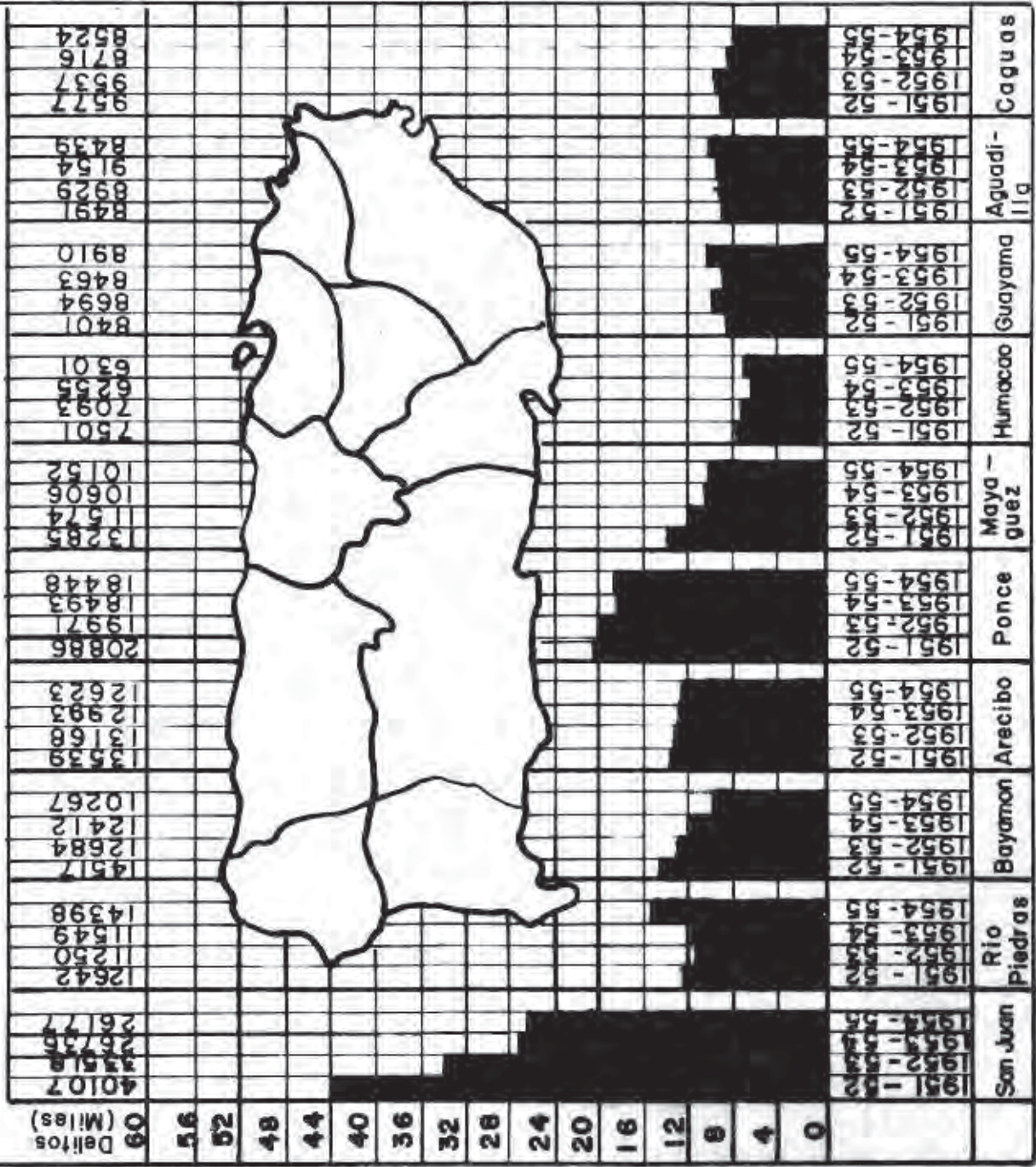

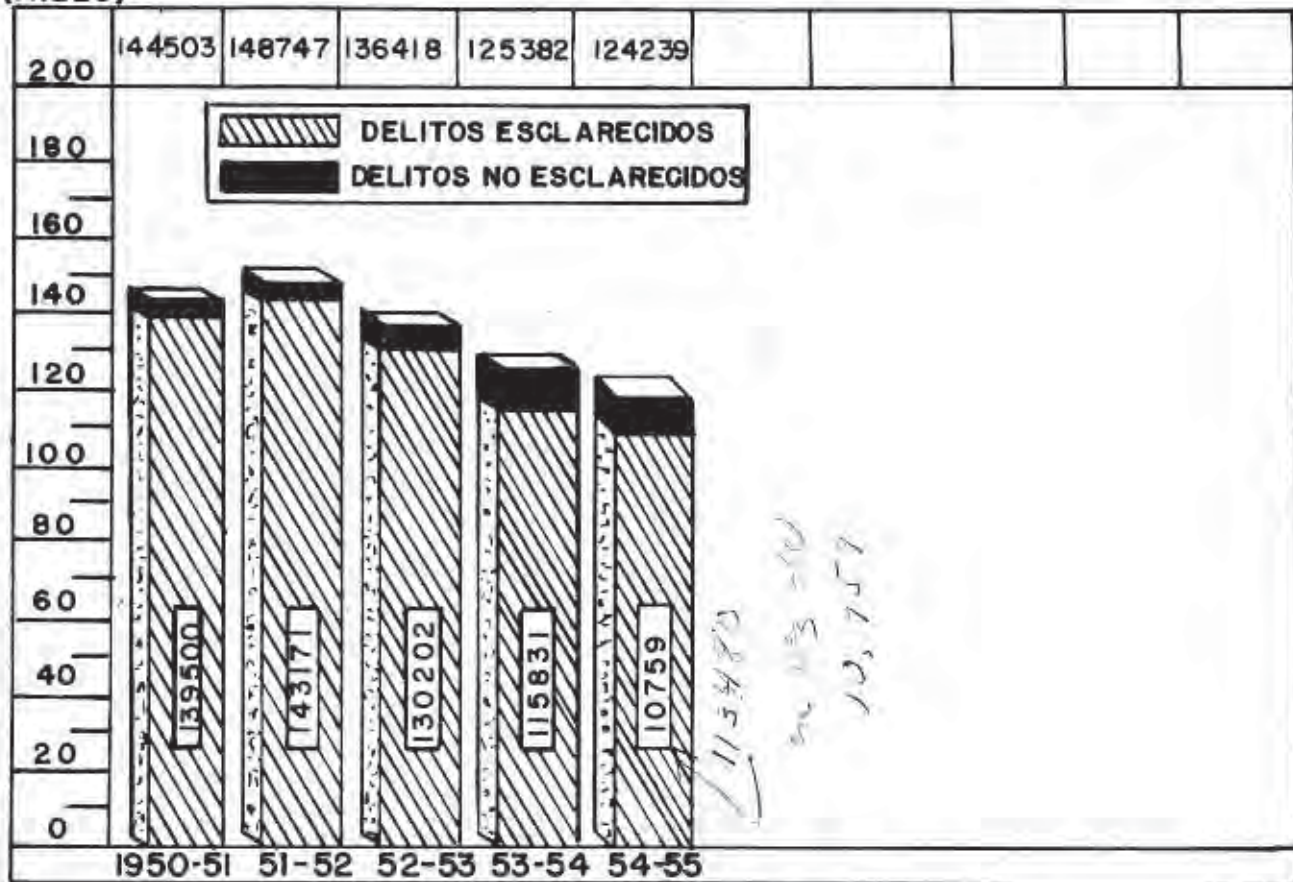

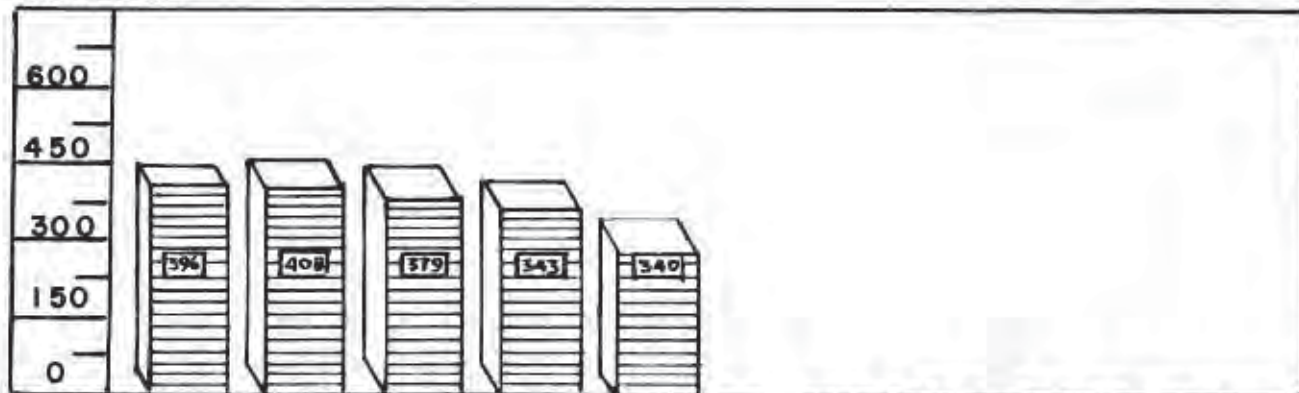

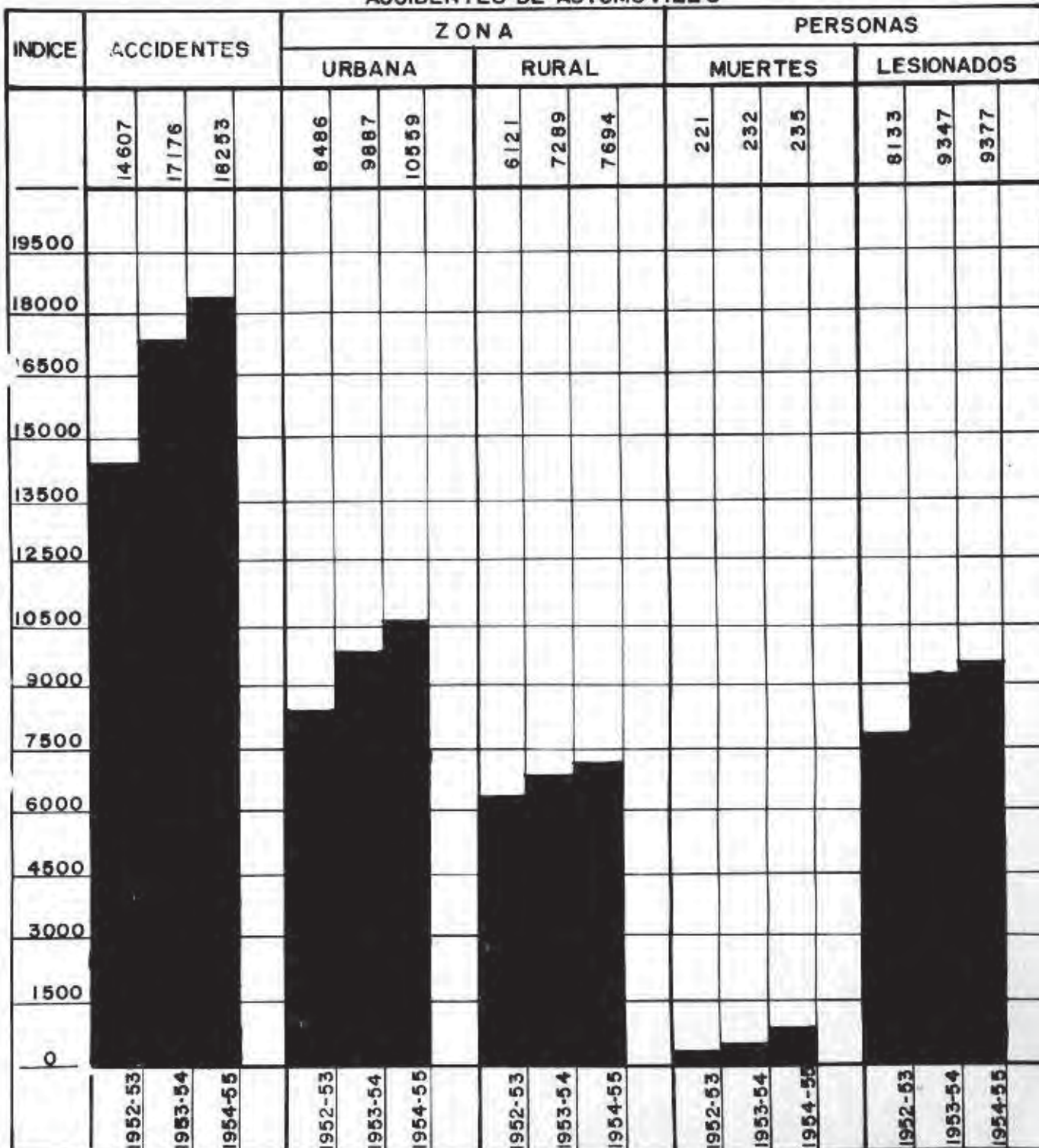

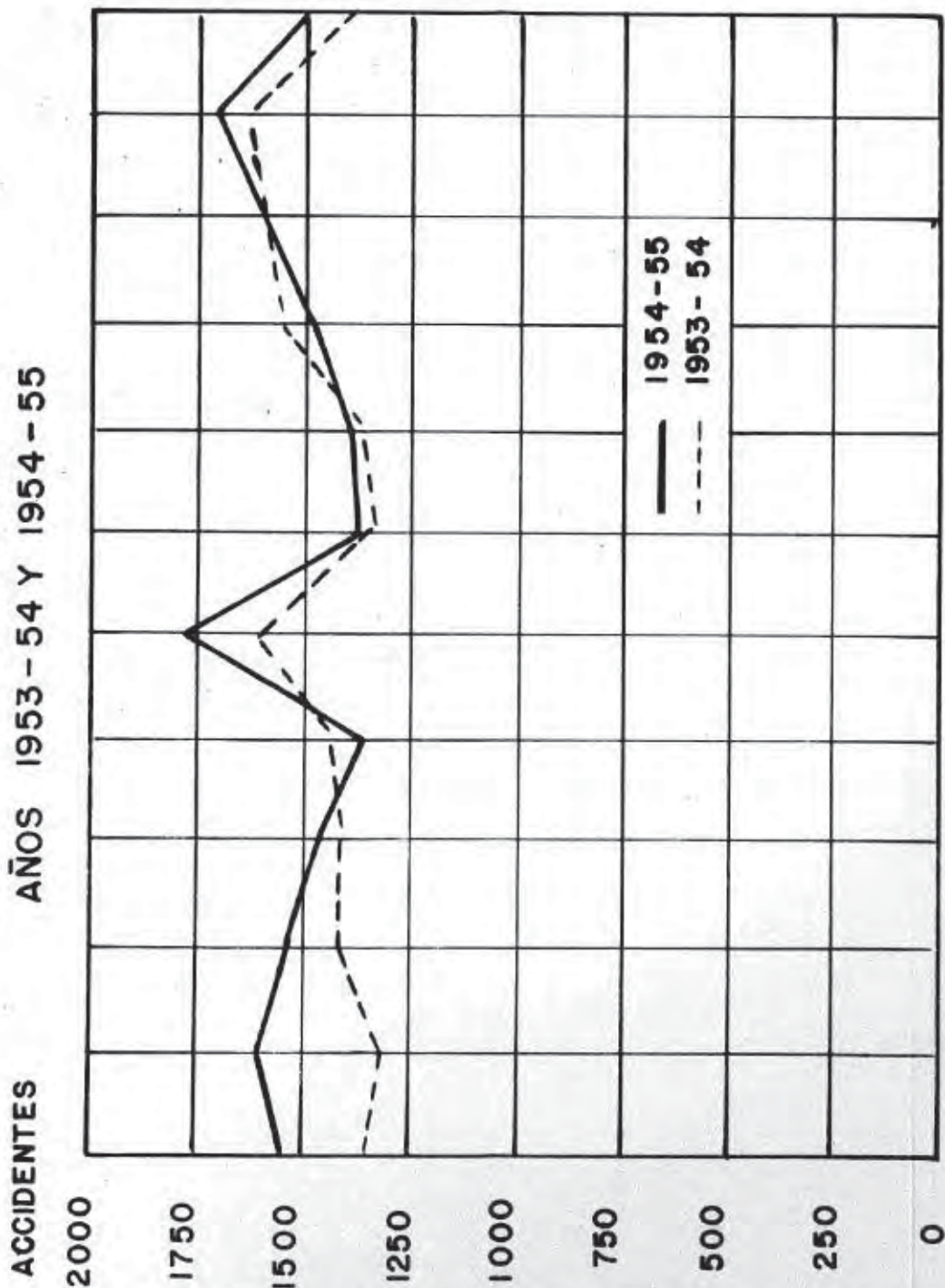

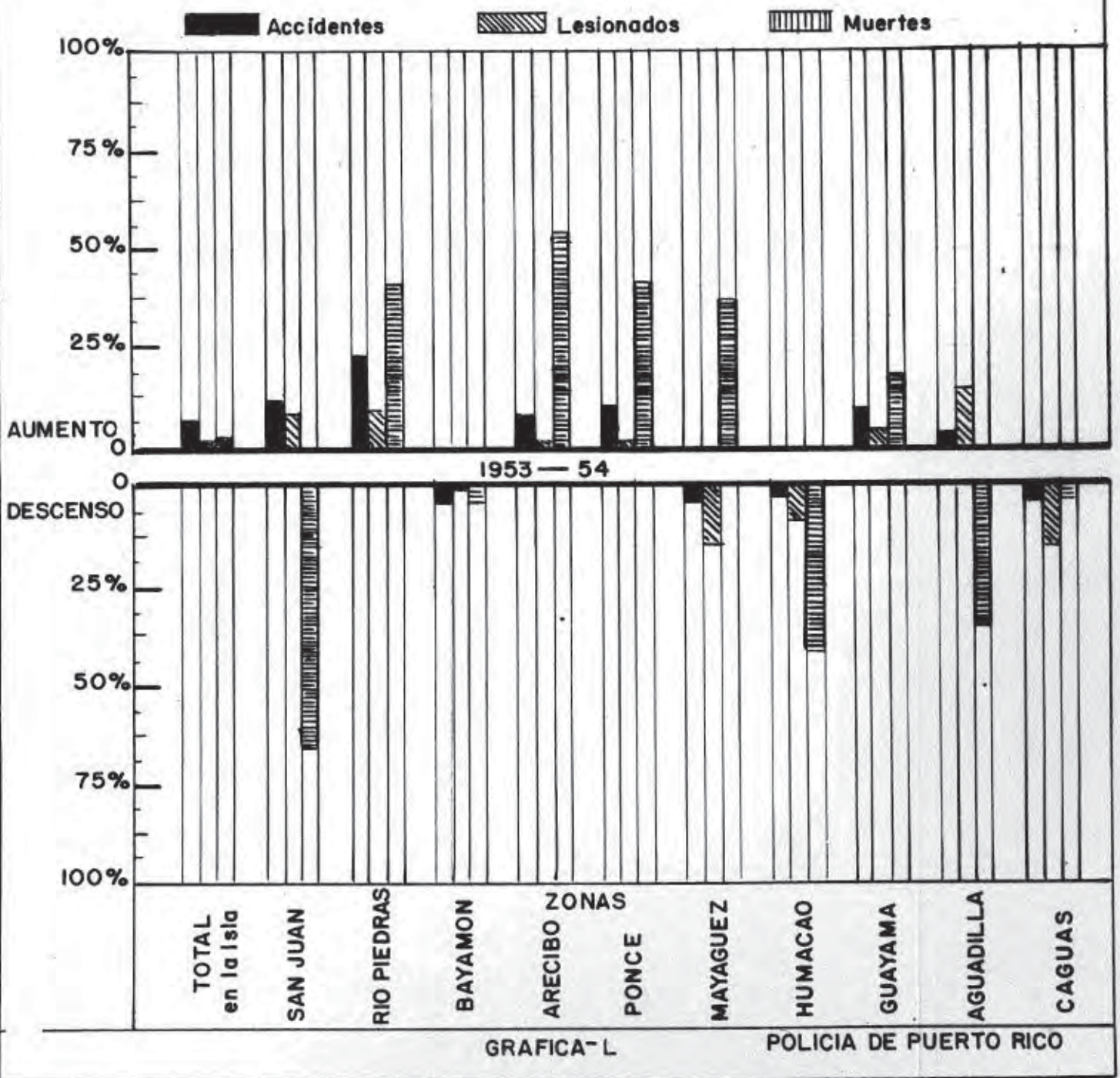
