THE SEASONS OF Creation



As spring begins in Australia, we watch nature slowly transform the world around us and even our very selves. Though many of us are still constrained by much needed restrictions to curtail the spread of COVID-19, nature continues to move purposefully to a new season in harmony with an ancient rhythm: the trees sprout new leaves; the birds build nests; the jasmine flowers promise new scent; the wattle bursts forth. In the lengthening days and increasing sunshine we might even feel our own spirits lighten with the promise and hope that nature's cycle and wisdom offers. Ilia Delio reminds us that "the universe is physically impregnated to the very core of its matter by the influence of divine nature." FEAST DAYS AND EVENTS

Rosh Hashanah: Jewish New Year marked by the sounding of the Shofar (ram's
horn), prayer and ten days of repentance.
Yom Kippur: Day of Atonement the holiest day of the Jewish calendar consists of a 25 hour fast while praying for atonement and repentance.
Sukkot: celebrated 5 days after Yom Kippur: also known as the Feast of Tabernacles / Booths, is an 8 day Jewish festival of giving thanks for the fall harvest and commemorating the booths (sukkot) used by Israelites during the 40 years of wandering in the desert after the giving of the Torah atop Mt Sinai.
Simchat Torah is a joyous festival in which the annual cycle of reading the Torah is over, and the cycle begins again for the year. The celebration typically includes singing, dancing, and marching with Torah scrolls.
Navaratri, which literally means 'nine nights', is a Hindu festival honouring the Goddess/Divine Mother and her energy/power (Shakti). The festival includes worshipping and dancing as people celebrate various aspects of the feminine.
Conferment of Guruship to Guru Granth Sahib, (Sikh) celebrates Guru Gobind Singh Ji's (10th Guru) passing on guruship to the holy scriptures, henceforth known as the Guru Granth Sahib which comprises 1430 pages of hymns, presides the most prominent place and shines the light of Truth to all Sikhs or devotees who seek it.
Dussehra: a Hindu festival of special prayer meetings and food offerings to the gods at home or in temples that celebrates the victory of good over evil.
Catholics - All Saints' Day honours women and men who have achieved sainthood and the place for all the faithful departed in the Communion of Saints. For many Christian denominations, all Saints Day is a remembrance of departed Christian people of any time and place.
All Souls' Day is a holy day set aside for honouring the dead. The day is primarily celebrated in the Catholic Church, but it is also celebrated in the Eastern Orthodox Church and a few other denominations of Christianity.
