FATHER MARK WRITES: RETURN AND BE HEALED - THREE BEAUTIFUL AND SURPRISING TRUTHS

Lent begins this week, and I want to invite you into a journey that is gentle but will require courage: a path to healing.

For years, I quietly parked the idea of praying for healing in a safe corner of my faith. I was wary of disappointment, of "fake healers," of being thought soft, and shaped by that old Catholic instinct to "offer it up" and just carry on. But in recent years, the Gospels and Church teaching have been slowly but surely converting me. If we look honestly, we discover that healing sits at the very heart of Jesus's life and mission. If you remove healing from the Gospels, then you tear out a huge chunk of Jesus's ministry. I've begun to see healing in a richer, more holistic way, as a beautiful way of us cooperating with the saving mission of Jesus.

At the fall of mankind, we experienced five broken communions:

- Between us and God (spiritual)
- Between us and others (social)
- Within us . . . mind and heart (psychological)
- Within us . . . body and soul (physical)
- Between us and nature (ecological)

Jesus wants to reintegrate us fully. Pope Benedict XVI puts it this way:

"Healing is an essential dimension of the apostolic mission and of Christianity. When understood at a sufficiently deep level, this expresses the entire content of redemption."

I'd like to share with you over these next few weeks something of the journey I've been on and I'd like to begin today with three beautiful but perhaps surprising truths about healing.

1 Healing was a core part of Jesus' ministry. Consider, for example, the paralysed man lowered through the roof to Jesus. Seeing the faith of his friends, Jesus forgives him and then heals him physically, making it clear that he acts with God's own authority (cf. Mk 2:1-12; parallels in Mt 9 and Lk 5). The crowd marvels, "We never saw anything like this!" God alone can forgive sins!

2 Healing requires toughness as well as kindness. We think of healing as a kindness. And it is. But when we seek to bring healing into the world it will be opposed. Healing is necessary because we live in a broken and fallen world and healing is opposed because we live in a broken and fallen world.

We would think that everyone would want healing to take place – for bodies to be healed, relationships to be healed, hearts to be healed, minds to be healed, countries to get along. But the truth is there are forces working against healing. Healing will be opposed because there is a spirit in this world that does not want healing.

In that packed Capernaum house, the spirit of opposition to Jesus from the scribes and Pharisees was thick. Jesus could have kept the peace but, instead, he brings the opposition into the light: “Why do you question in your hearts? Which is easier to say, ‘Your sins are forgiven,’ or ‘Rise and walk?’” (cf. Mk 2). Elsewhere, when accused of healing on the Sabbath, Jesus refuses to let rules prevent the healing of a suffering person. Healing will be opposed, for example by fear, cynicism, shame, hardness of heart but Jesus is no wimp; he is courageously compassionate and acts with freedom to free others. To cooperate with his healing, we may need the courage to face pain, to risk disappointment, to lay aside pride, and to let God move.

3 There is a mystery to healing. Why this person and not that one? Why now and not yet? I don’t know.

I do believe God uses the miraculous and the mundane to heal people.

He uses prayer and medical care.

Sometimes healing is instantaneous; sometimes it unfolds through prayer, sacrament, counsel, medicine, community, etc. Our call is faithfulness, not control. As Isaiah promises, “*By his wounds we are healed*” (Is 53:5).

This Lent, I want you to know that healing is core to the Gospel; Jesus truly restores the whole person. I want you to feel not shamed nor scrutinised, but seen, safe, and hopeful. Jesus looks on your wounds with compassion, not condemnation. Return to Him this Lent and be healed.

We have three goals for these Lenten messages:

- **to become more awake to the importance that Jesus placed on healing.**
- **to receive the healing that Jesus wants to bring into our lives.**
- **to participate with Jesus in bringing healing to this broken world.**



Building Works Update – Exciting Progress! We are delighted to share some wonderful news about the progress of the building works in our church. The cleaning of the Ambo and the Baptism Font in St Peter's has now been completed, and the transformation has been truly stunning. If you are around St Peter's do please have a look. What has been revealed already gives us a real glimpse of just how beautiful everything will look when the work is finished.

Behind the scaffold curtain, the Conservators have now begun carefully cleaning the reredos in the same way. If the results so far are anything to go by, the reredos is going to look absolutely breath-taking when it is finally revealed — and we genuinely cannot wait to see it in all its glory.

For health and safety reasons, the scaffolding and curtain area is strictly out of bounds, and we kindly ask for everyone's co-operation in staying well clear. The rear of the sanctuary has been loosely fenced off using the Altar Servers' benches, and this will remain in place until the works are fully completed.

For the next few weeks, up until the end of March, all weekday services will take place in the Lady Chapel, while weekend services will continue at the Main Altar. The Conservators will be working behind the curtain and are fully aware of service times, ensuring minimal disruption.

Thank you once again for your patience and understanding. We are now moving closer to completion as we prepare for our main liturgical celebrations in July 2026, and the results promise to be truly special. If you have any questions, please contact Gerard via the office in the first instance.

Important Notice About Parking at Winton House: We would like to reiterate our message regarding parking at Winton House, as this has become an important issue.

Parishioners who choose to park in the Winton House car park do so entirely at their own risk. We have been informed that several parishioners have already received parking fines for using this car park without permission.

As a parish, we have made every effort to seek approval. We initially contacted the landlord, and more recently spoke directly with two of the tenants to ask whether weekend parking might be allowed. Unfortunately, both tenants have politely declined our request, explaining that the parking spaces are needed for their employees, who may require access at any time. They also advised us that they have received similar requests from other tenants based at the rear of the building. Because permission has not been granted, parking at Winton House is not authorised, and continuing to park there could result in a Parking Penalty Notice of £70.

We therefore strongly ask parishioners to make alternative parking arrangements and to avoid using the Winton House car park altogether. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation in helping us maintain good relationships with our neighbours. Alternative parking is available please [click here](#) for more information.
