A LETTER FROM THE FOUNDER



Dear Colleague,

Many people have asked what led me to found Integrative Mental Health University.

The answer begins long before IMHU existed.

In 1971, my mother took her own life after several years of dedicated meditation practice. She had begun accessing profound inner experiences but, unlike me, she did not have an experienced teacher nearby, nor a supportive spiritual community, nor knowledgeable professionals with whom she could gain insight. Her life companion explained, “She had become deluded.” Her death left me with questions that neither psychology nor spirituality, as I then knew them, could fully answer.

Over the decades that followed, those questions became the organizing thread of my professional life.

I sought out teachers, engaged in my own psychotherapy and contemplative practice, became a licensed psychotherapist, conducted research, worked alongside colleagues around the world, and devoted my career to understanding how mental healthcare might better recognize and support spiritually-transformative experiences.

IMHU grew from those decades of learning.

It was never created to promote a particular religion or spiritual group.

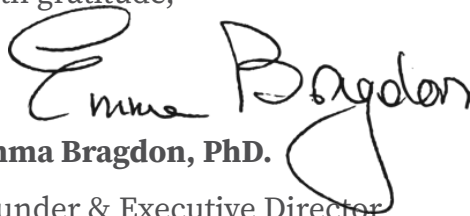
It was created because I came to believe that practitioners deserve thoughtful education that enables them to accompany individuals through transformative experiences with competence, humility, discernment, and compassion.

That conviction remains at the heart of everything we do.
Today I find myself in a different season of life.
The greatest act of leadership is no longer creating something new.
It is entrusting what has been created to others.
Healthy institutions eventually become larger than the people who founded them.
That is my hope for IMHU.

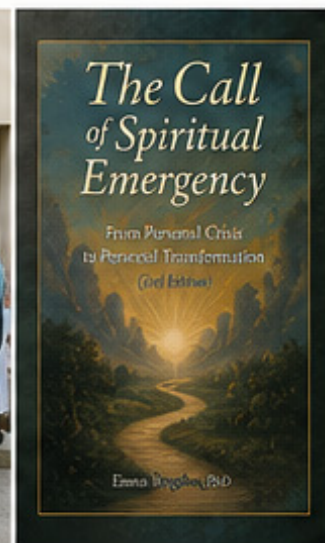

PREPARING FOR THIS MOMENT

IMHU did not appear overnight.

Its educational philosophy has been shaped through decades of clinical work, international collaboration, contemplative practice, research, teaching, and listening.

It has grown through conversations with psychiatrists, psychologists, educators, contemplative teachers, researchers, coaches, and people whose lives have been transformed by spiritual emergence.

The university has developed a comprehensive curriculum, competency-based certification, experienced faculty, and a growing international community of practitioners.

These accomplishments are not the destination.

They are the foundation upon which the next Executive Director can build.



Dr Koenig is the director of Duke University's Center for Spirituality, Theology and Health. 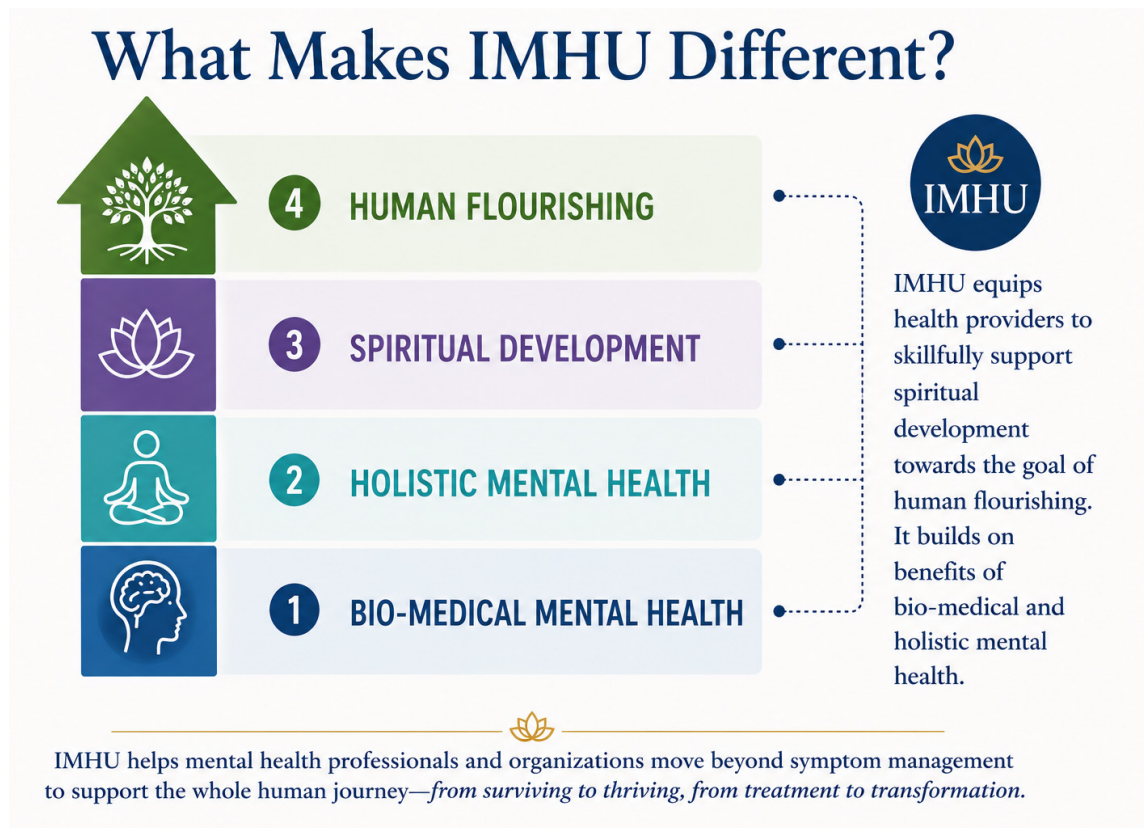

AN EMERGING FIELD

IMHU builds upon the strengths of bio-medical and holistic mental healthcare while preparing practitioners to recognize spiritual development as an important dimension of human flourishing.



Every profession experiences moments when new knowledge begins to reshape its understanding of what is possible.

Psychology experienced such moments with the emergence of trauma research, developmental psychology, attachment theory, and contemplative neuroscience. Psychiatry has continued to evolve through advances in neuroscience, psychopharmacology, and a growing appreciation for the importance of culture and lived experience.

Today another expansion is quietly underway.

Meditation, psychedelic-assisted therapies, research on near-death experiences, spiritually transformative experiences, contemplative practices, and cross-cultural understandings of healing are all inviting mental health professionals to ask new questions. Increasingly, clinicians are encountering experiences that are deeply meaningful to those who live through them yet are not always well addressed by traditional professional training.

This does not diminish the achievements of modern mental healthcare.

It invites its continued evolution.

The next generation of practitioners will need to think with greater nuance, work across disciplines, and remain open to perspectives that enrich rather than replace existing knowledge.

IMHU was created to contribute to that evolution—not by promoting a particular worldview, but by preparing practitioners to recognize, assess, and thoughtfully support experiences that are becoming increasingly visible within contemporary mental healthcare.

WHY THIS MOMENT MATTERS

Mental healthcare has always evolved as our understanding of human beings has expanded.

We believe that evolution is continuing today.

Meditation has entered mainstream healthcare.

Trauma research has transformed clinical practice.

Contemplative neuroscience continues to deepen our understanding of the mind.

Psychedelic-assisted therapies are introducing clinicians to experiences that challenge conventional assumptions.

Research into near-death experiences and spiritually transformative experiences continues to expand.

At the same time, millions of people are seeking greater meaning, purpose, and spiritual connection in their lives.

Increasingly, they bring these experiences into therapy offices, hospitals, coaching practices, and community mental health settings.

The professionals who meet them deserve preparation equal to the complexity of those encounters.

For generations, mental healthcare has developed remarkable knowledge regarding diagnosis, treatment, and recovery.

Those achievements remain indispensable.

Yet each generation of practitioners encounters questions the previous generation rarely faced.

Education must evolve accordingly.

Above all, practitioners will need the humility and openness to recognize that each person is unique and that no single theory can fully explain how human flourishing will unfold in that person's life.

Preparing professionals for that reality is one of the defining educational opportunities of our time.

WHY IMHU?

For more than a decade, IMHU has quietly done work that few institutions have attempted.

It has developed a comprehensive online curriculum and training.

Created competency-based certification programs and offered CEs and CMEs.

Built relationships with respected clinicians, researchers, educators, and organizations throughout the world.

Produced more than forty courses.

Reached professionals from many countries.

Maintained a commitment to scientific integrity while remaining genuinely open to spiritual experience.

Unlike many organizations that focus primarily on advocacy, research, or clinical services, IMHU has focused on one central mission:

Preparing practitioners.

That focus has given the organization both clarity and credibility.

Today the field is beginning to recognize the importance of competencies that IMHU has been developing for years.

The opportunity before the next Executive Director is not to invent this work.

It is to help bring it into its next stage of influence.

of teachers.

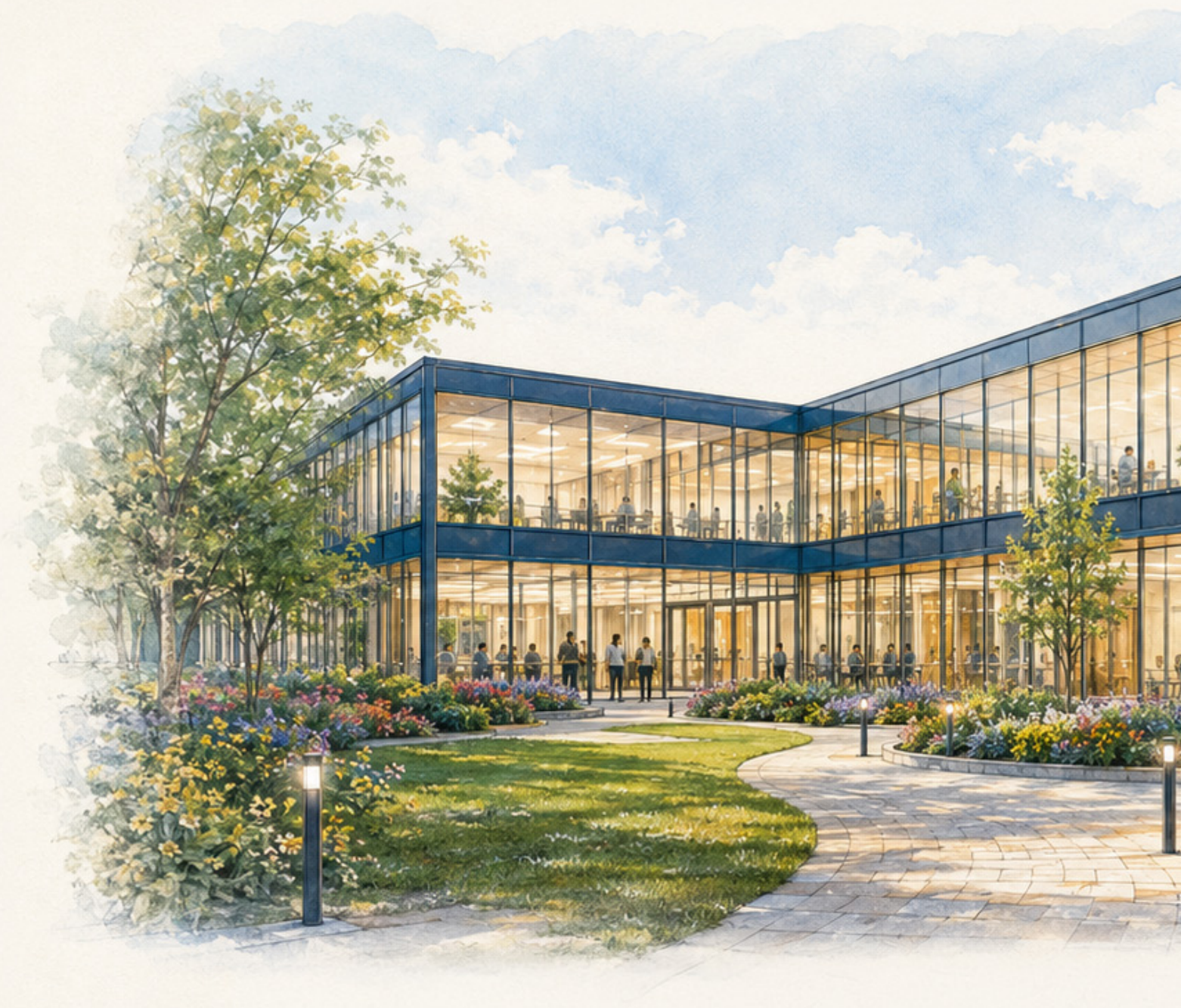

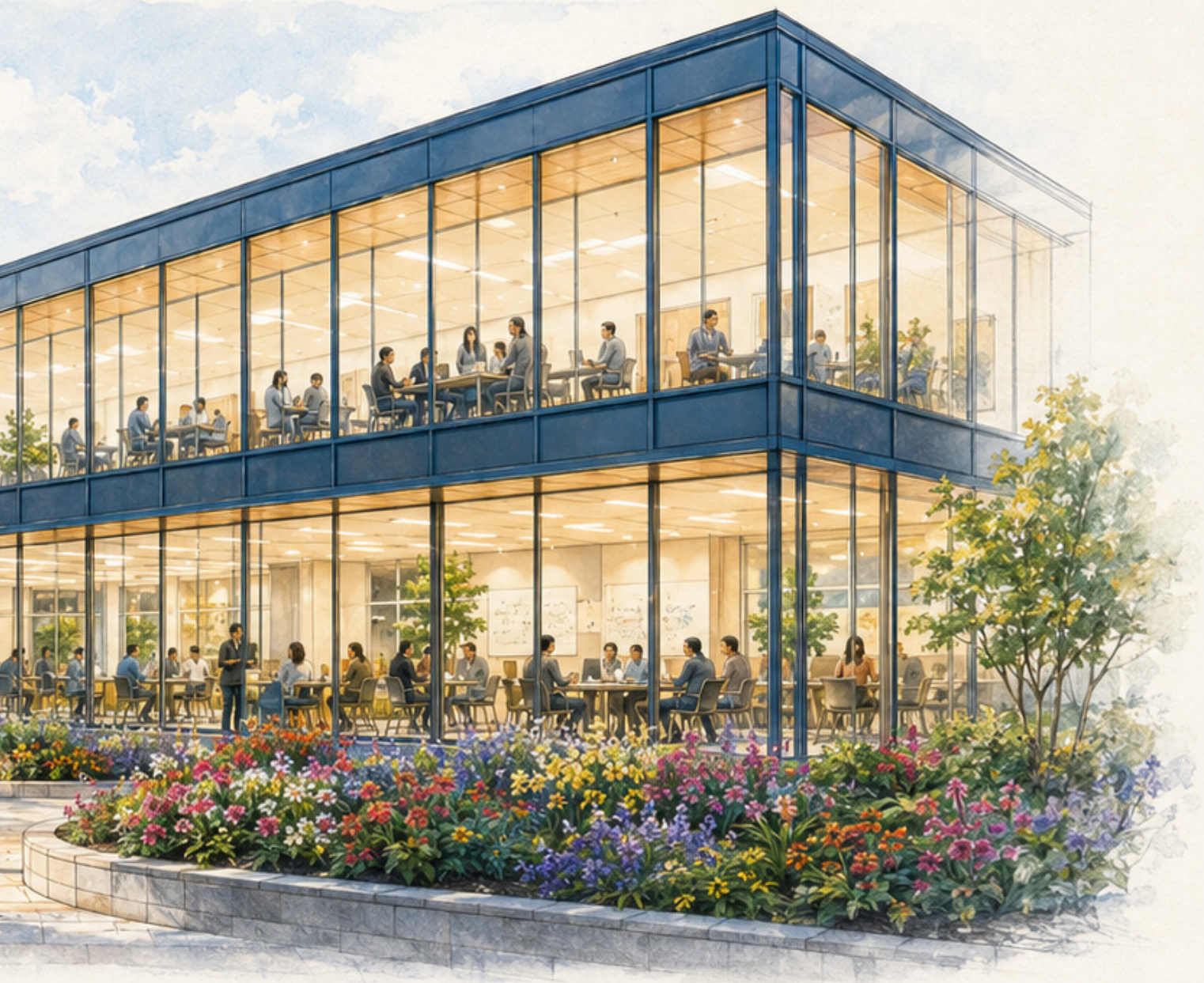
