Check Global is Meedan's flagship program. It has been running since 2011 with support from the Swedish International Development Agency (Sida) and in collaboration with researchers based at the Birmingham Centre for Media and Cultural Research at Birmingham City University.

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Our team has gone through many discussions about the different ways we can talk about the people we work with and the regions where we are based. What we call things matters, so we have started using 'Larger World' in 2023 - a term coined by the Numun Fund (numun.fund) founding team. We use it here with their consent.

Meedan is a technology not-for-profit working towards building a more equitable internet where all people, regardless of their language, location or income, can access the most relevant information, evaluate the quality of that information, and make the decisions they want, and where public voice is enhanced through open-source tools for journalism and data projects, and through media literacy training and skills development, ultimately strengthening fundamental freedoms and human rights.

Our program is over a decade young!

Check Global started in 2011 as the Arab uprisings swept through Tunisia, Egypt, Syria, Libya and Yemen. Twelve years later our friends and partners continue to work tirelessly to counter disinformation and government-led propaganda, challenge dominant narratives, and defend civil rights and liberties.

Launched in North-Africa and Western-Asia (NAWA), we grew from five to 22 countries, and from eight to 26 partners based across NAWA, Sub-Saharan Africa (SSA), Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC), and Asia-Pacific (APAC).

We are now a proud network of over 130 community-led organizations focusing our work on gender, journalism and community-building efforts. This booklet celebrates the last three years of our 10+ year-old program; we felt there was a lot to be grateful for since we published our first zine 'Viral Politics: Tales from the Pandemia' back in 2020.

Artists from throughout the Global South illustrated the ways the pandemic has affected digital surveillance, freedom of speech and gender-based violence in their home countries, and how they resist.



Our work with the amazing organizations whose stories you will discover here is very diverse. For some, we focus on skills and capacity building efforts, through co-designing training sessions and workshops on issues such as digital literacy and security, fact-checking, open source intelligence (OSINT) and investigative reporting. With others, we have co-designed and delivered election monitoring initiatives, including coalition-building efforts, programmatic activities, tech support, training on annotation, content moderation, and dataset design and distribution.

We have also co-created Massive Online Open Courses (MOOCs), online toolkits and resources which the organizations (and their communities) needed in crisis response settings, during electoral periods, or in their day-to-day practice. We have launched a number of microgrant awards to respond to timely needs in a variety of contexts, and sometimes with a “hands-off” approach, offering partners core funding to support the growth and sustainability of their grassroots organizations.

In each of these situations, we tried to listen to what they told us. We hope we have succeeded in co-designing and delivering, with their valuable help, context-led responses to some of the greatest challenges our world faces today.

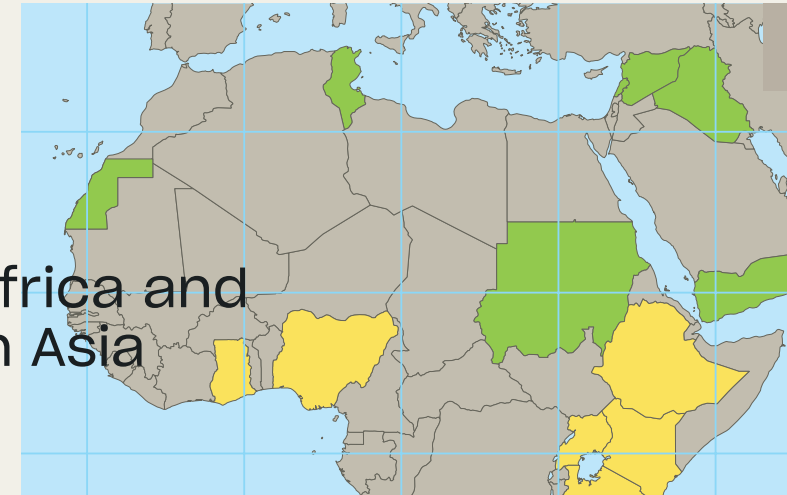

We continue to work with and support our partners, Nawaat in Tunisia and Watching Western Sahara in the occupied Western Sahara, in their multi-disciplinary efforts to document and report human rights violations and attacks against journalists, civil society organizations and communities.

Syria, Yemen and Sudan

We continue to work with our long-time partners Mnemonic and VFrame, building on the Syrian Archive, Yemeni Archive and Sudanese Archive projects, which have been instrumental in documenting war crimes.

Journalism Students Develop a Media Credibility Index

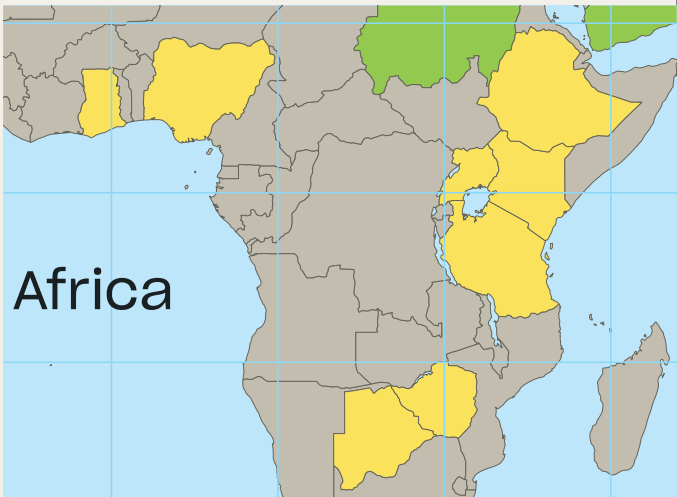
Lebanon, Syria, Palestine, Yemen, Egypt and Sudan

For two consecutive years, the Media Credibility Index has shown how limited journalistic standards and political motives can further exacerbate the rise of misinformation online. The Index was developed in collaboration with Check Global's NAWA student newsroom which has been active since 2018.

We worked with women-led media organizations to identify and report on gender, women's health and development issues, using civic education, inclusive participation, and access to digital tools.

The Public Source

In-depth and uncompromising independent journalism in the public interest

“We are building a model for local and independent in-depth journalism — in practice and structure — that disrupts partisan coverage of contentious matters that impact the lived realities of people across the country.” (The Public Source)

In April 2023, the editor-in-chief of The Public Source, Lara Bitar, was summoned by Lebanon’s Anti-Cybercrime Bureau following a complaint by a Lebanese party about an article on environmental crimes committed by the then-militia during the Lebanon civil war. The investigative feature, “The ‘Ecological Time Bombs’ Unloaded at the Beirut Port Decades Ago”, was listed as one of the Global Investigative Journalism Network’s 2022’s Best Investigative Stories from the region. This summoning by a security apparatus testifies to the impact of The Public Source’s investigative work.

In 2022, The Public Source also published their most-read investigation, which was also accepted into the Global Investigative Journalism Network, a first for Lebanese journalism. They won first place in the Katherine Schneider Journalism Award for Excellence in Reporting on Disability, in the Small Media category, for their story “‘And What Would You Like Me to Do About It’: How the Lebanese Government Disabled Hundreds of People – And Left Them to Pay for Its Crime.” This investigative feature about survivors of the Beirut Port explosion who were disabled by the blast was shortlisted by the Fetisov Journalism Awards in the “Contribution to Civil Rights” category.

Lebanon was ranked 130th out of 180 countries in the 2022 Reporters Without Borders’ Press Freedom Index.

INK Foundation

Creating opportunities for journalists working in the public interest

"We strive to be fair and we aggressively edit every story we plan to publish, to assure its accuracy and fairness." (INK Foundation)

Botswanaans are increasingly getting their information from unregulated online sources and social media, leaving them vulnerable to misinformation and disinformation. Additionally, many young journalists lack basic training and access to an effective network of news media organizations and stakeholders.

In response to this, INK Foundation provides basic investigative reporting skills training to young reporters in newsrooms that have significant budget constraints and are struggling to maintain investigative journalism desks. INK also creates opportunities for journalists through internships and training sessions on practical and impactful journalism practices. INK has six publishing partners who collaborate to ensure that the content reaches a greater audience.

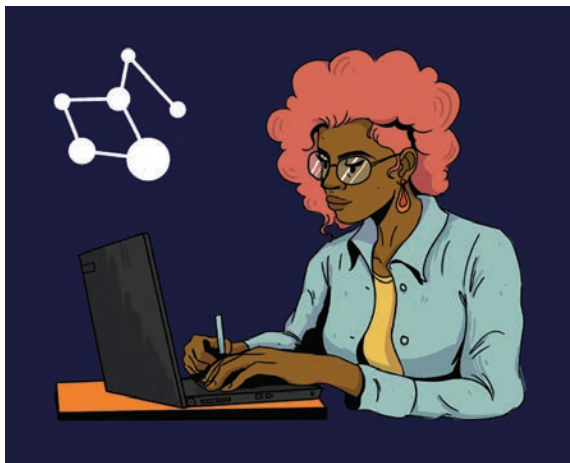
Agência Mural

Serving underrepresented communities in Brazil's metropolitan areas

"Our target audience are the younger inhabitants of low income, underserved and underprivileged communities because we believe they can become multipliers and amplifiers of the news and stories we publish." (Agência Mural)

Agência Mural is a Brazilian non-profit organization which serves communities on the outskirts of urban metropolitan areas. The metropolitan area of Grande Sao Paulo is made up of 39 cities; the urban outskirts are all news deserts.

Throughout 2022, Agência Mural has been delivering, through their online platform Clube Mural, journalism and media literacy training for hyperlocal correspondents and media activists covering the urban/rural peripheries in Brazil as well as students and graduates.

Journalism network in Iraq investigates 'war by other means'

War casualties often extend beyond military occupation and, as communities are devastated, cities are destroyed and social order is compromised. In this unstable and unsafe environment, Nirij continued its missions since 2011 to uncover the 'war by other means' whether it is large-scale corruption, discrimination, or forced migration of minority groups.

Their latest series of reports highlighted the plight of minorities in Iraq devastated by violence, discrimination and continuous migration exacerbated by war and political instability since 2003.

In one of their recent investigative reports, NIRIJ also uncovered how militias, political parties and high-profile individuals seized more than 20,000 public and private properties in Mosul, northern Iraq, by forging records or forcefully taking hold of them. This large-scale land grab happened in the aftermath of Mosul's liberation from ISIS militants.

Nawaat

Leading by example in Tunisia's nascent democracy

"Our media is known for its audacity, its independence, its innovation and its differential treatment of current affairs. It established itself as a trusted provider of coverage specialized in topical news, with a focus on democracy, transparency, accountability, justice, civil liberties and rights." (Nawaat)

Created in 2004, Nawaat has grown into a multi-awarded independent media platform and print magazine and a pioneer of alternative journalism in Tunisia.

Nawaat also organizes a yearly media and cultural festival where debates are held around independent media, its evolution and prospects in Tunisia, and its positioning within the Arab region.

Nawaat's team aims to transform Tunisia into a more pluralistic and democratic society to allow the media landscape to better act as a watchdog of power within Tunisia's nascent democracy.

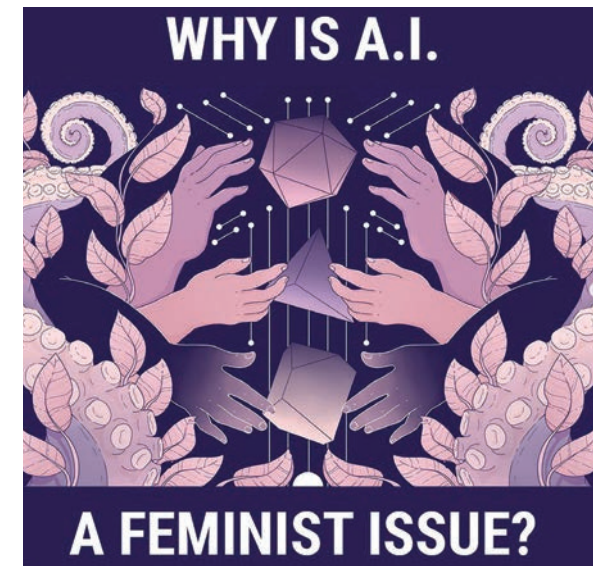

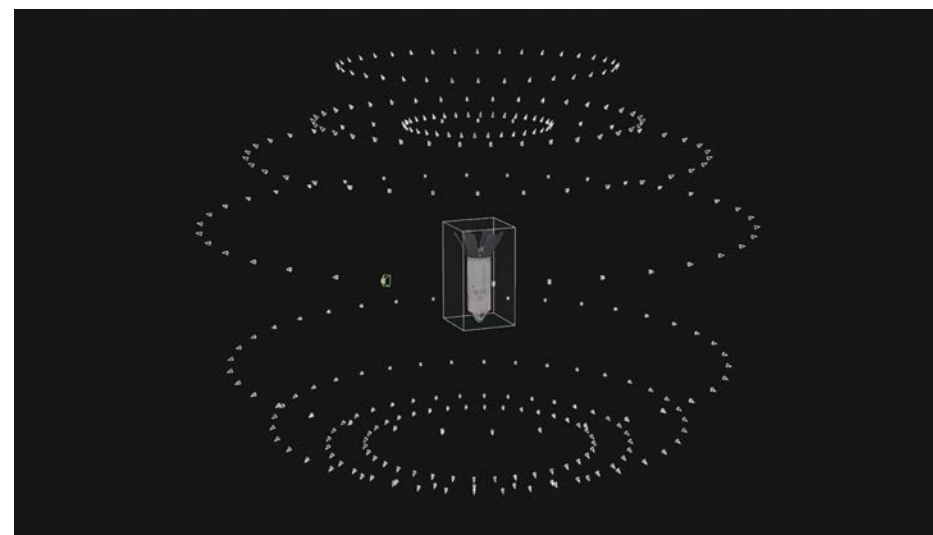
Coding Rights is a Brazilian women-led think tank aligned with intersectional feminist values. Their work is focused on the development of artificial intelligence systems, taking into account the ways in which gender, power, race and other social inequalities are reinforced or replicated by technology.

Coding Rights contributed to the feminist technology ecosystem, through FOIA requests about AI projects being deployed by the federal public sector in Brazil. They improved their critical framework of analysis of AI systems, considering possible harms caused by its implementation in public policy, such as: surveillance of low income people; reinforcement of structural racism, sexism and gender and non-binary discrimination; as well as digital colonialism and neoliberal policies of automatization.

Innovative AI techniques empowering human rights researchers and journalists

“VFRAME aims to function as a toolkit designed for the human rights researchers analyzing large visual media archives, redacting faces and sensitive visual data, and detecting and classifying objects in images and videos coming from areas of conflict.” (VFRAME)

Many journalists and human rights researchers struggle with adapting and making use of recent advancements in artificial intelligence; VFRAME developed a model for NAWA-wide collaborations between archivists, journalists, and technologists, to collect and annotate large-scale data and make sense of it. VFRAME is leveraging recent developments in artificial intelligence and computer vision towards improving the capabilities of small, specialized research groups such as the Yemeni Archive and the Sudanese Archive, allowing them to seamlessly analyze large quantities of media collected from conflict zones.

One of the main areas of development over the past year has been to work with organizations with access to actual objects found in conflict zones. This has the ultimate impact of creating more accurate object detection algorithms for analyzing large archives of visual media.

Mnemonic

Working with archives: Now is the time to preserve the future

“The verification, documentation, analysis and categorisation of records of human rights violations committed by all parties as part of the Syrian war is a prerequisite to achieve any form of transitional justice and to ensure proper engagement with the history of this uprising in the years to come.” (Mnemonic)

NAWA’s last decade has been marked by a long series of popular upheavals and armed conflicts. These violent events were largely documented by citizens using smartphones to record incidents and uploading them to social media platforms. Millions of media items now have the potential to incriminate state and non-state actors. But what if these were lost?

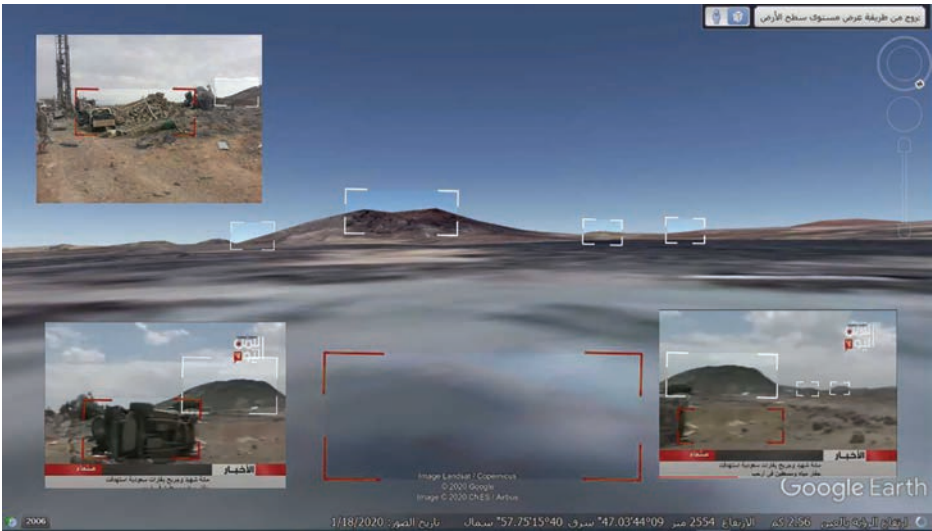
Mnemonic brings together human rights defenders, archivists, technologists, and open-source investigators devoted to maintaining, memorializing, and valorizing publicly accessible material on human rights abuses. For this purpose, Mnemonic engages in activities on multiple fronts. First, it archives digital information to ensure that potential evidence is not lost and remains accessible and usable for future accountability mechanisms. Second, the organization trains human rights defenders to maximize the impact of digital information and empower those working with it.

In two of their recent flagship collaborations, the Yemeni and Sudanese Archives, Mnemonic’s team aimed to transfer the knowledge and skills acquired through their successful Syrian Archive model, to document violence committed by the military junta against protestors in Sudan, and human rights violations committed by the different parties of the war in Yemen.

Digital Rights Foundation

Cross-country collaborations by Pakistan's leading civil rights defenders

"Under the Check Global program, Digital Rights Foundation has been able to conduct digital security training workshops with human rights defenders in Pakistan and India to enhance resources for digital safety in the South Asian context, thus expanding advocacy and programming at a regional level."

In Pakistan, Digital Rights Foundation supports activists and independent journalists, peacefully exercising their right to freedom of expression. They advocate for safe practices online and work to equip activists and journalists with digital security measures, through training and toolkits.

The Digital Rights Foundation's cross-country digital safety training for journalists and activists in South Asia is a perfect example of a collaborative initiative among organizations working to tackle similar issues, thus showing the potential and high impact of cross-border collaborations.

Chambal Media

India's first rural media network

"Through Check Global's mentorship, access to digital safety training and support to create our first toolkit for rural women and girls, Chambal Academy has been able to strategically move one step further in achieving its mission." (Chambal Media)

Chambal Media's mission is to bring the perspectives and involvement of women on the margins into the digital revolution in India.

Research and experiences of journalists show disturbing trends of online violence against journalists, particularly aimed at undermining public trust in fact-based and public interest journalism. Because of their race, caste, sexual orientation and religion, some women journalists face even more frequent and vitriolic attacks; Chambal Media seeks to strengthen their understanding of digital security, and they've achieved this through the creation of a digital safety toolkit for rural women and girls.

Rappler

Driven by uncompromising journalism

"The long-term impact of our fact-check mentorship program is the knowledge and skills that the mentees gained and will continue to use in verifying news and campaigning for what is true." (Rappler)

"The battle for facts needs the collective strength of groups and individuals promoting truth in the public space and exacting accountability from those who harm it with lies." (Rappler)

Headed by Nobel laureate Maria Ressa, Rappler is a leading independent media organization in the Philippines known for its hard-hitting and investigative journalism.

In the months leading to the Philippines national elections in May 2022, and with Meedan's support under the Check Global program, Rappler started several programs, including webinars, online mentorship training, a fellowship program, and a media information literacy series, aimed at building a culture of fact-checking and a community around fighting disinformation.

In 2022, over 120 media organizations, civil society groups, business organizations, and research and legal groups banded together to form #FactsFirstPH, a first-of-a-kind initiative that aimed to debunk dubious claims online, make facts spread faster and farther than hate and lies, flag disinformation narratives and actors, and hold online perpetrators accountable.

Fundación Karisma

Ensuring digital technologies protect human rights and promote social justice

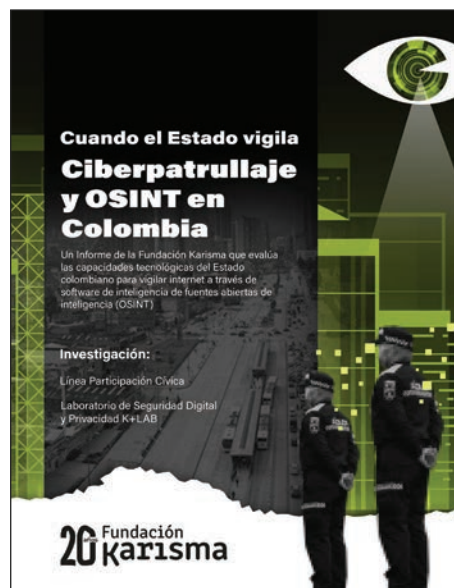
“During 2022, with the support of Meedan, we were able to strengthen the capabilities in digital security with a focus on protection in the context of protests and demonstrations. These training sessions paid special attention to the issue of cyber patrolling carried out by the government in the context of the 2021 strike, in order to generate correct recommendations for the participating people who are effectively part of the population that the K+Lab intends to impact.” (Fundación Karisma)

Fundación Karisma is a Colombian civil society organization that aims to protect and promote human rights and social justice in relation to the design and use of digital technologies.

Their focus is to increase the capacity of activists and journalists to exercise their rights in an increasingly monitored environment. Through the Check Global program, they created a methodology to explain the risks of cyber patrolling during protest, and shifted to support journalists and grassroots social organizations in territories of environmental importance through workshops, communications and legal advice. Through a digital security awareness workshop, they strengthened the organization's internal process and increased its digital capabilities in personal and day-to-day scenarios.

Closing digital/misinformation literacy gaps on the continent

“Check Global continues to play an instrumental role in our evolution as an organization by directly sustaining our work streams - fact-checking, pursuing investigations and training. We launched our flagship project in Ghana and are now expanding across four countries in West Africa.”

FactSpace West Africa is a research and fact-checking organization working to curb the spread of mis/disinformation and propaganda and to close the digital literacy gap in the region. They produce fact-checks and informative multimedia posts for publication on various platforms, and conduct training on misinformation, fact-checking and verification for key groups such as social media influencers and media regulators in West Africa.

They have taken part in a collaborative project on fact-checking disinformation triggered by the Russian invasion of Ukraine and in the first live fact-checking initiative of a presidential address in Ghana.

Under the Check Global program, the FactSpace West Africa team worked with the European Digital Media Observatory and Africa Check to deliver virtual training programs for participants from a dozen African countries. They partnered with the ECOWAS Network of Electoral Commissions to facilitate a regional training for Electoral Commission officials from The Gambia, Liberia and Sierra Leone. In partnership with the International Fact-Checking network, the team also trained editors and journalists in Liberia and Sierra Leone and launched fact-checking networks in both countries that would work collaboratively to tackle mis/disinformation during elections in 2023.



Watching Western Sahara

Countering news blackholes and military occupation

"Watching Western Sahara continues to equip Sahrawi human rights defenders, journalists and activists with the digital skills and tools to document everyday human rights exactions in their communities." (Watching Western Sahara)

Western Sahara's more than 40-year conflict is also one of the world's most invisible crises. A team of activists are committed to fighting state-sponsored disinformation in this news blackhole.

In addition to its investigative and fact-checking work, Watching Western Sahara held, with support from the Check Global program, the 17th edition of FiSahara, its annual human rights film and cultural festival, in October 2022 in the Sahrawi refugee camps near the Algerian city of Tindouf. The multidisciplinary event combines culture, the arts and journalism to share ideas and insights and run workshops related to human rights and news verification.

Watching Western Sahara has also held several side events and workshops for Sahrawi women, activists and international journalists focusing on how to work collaboratively to cover human rights violations inside the Morocco-occupied part of the Western Sahara, a territory closed to human rights monitors and international journalists that Reporters without Borders calls a "news black hole."

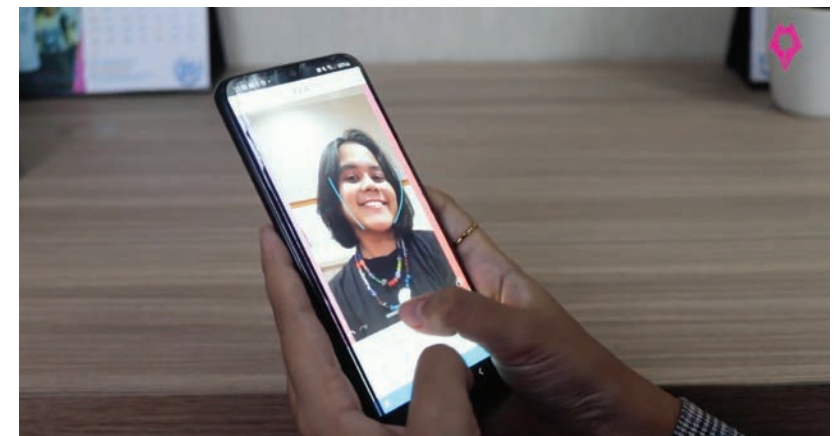
Magdalene

Indonesia's feminist publication

"The media's constant portrayal of 'ideal beauty' and comparisons of body image greatly impact people's perceptions of their appearance." (Magdalene)

In a context where there is a lack of media organizations that cover issues from a feminist perspective, Magdalene's work and stories intend to empower women in a patriarchal society. The publication provides content and perspectives that are inclusive, critical, empowering and entertaining.

Under the Check Global program, Magdalene investigated misinformation related to beauty on social media throughout 2022. Their project, titled "Beauty and Technology", highlighted the intersection of technology and body image. As part of this project Magdalene produced content that looks at the impact of influencers and beauty filters on users' self-esteem. "Beauty and Technology" is the second of two Magdalene projects in partnership with Meedan. Magdalene's first project, Breaking Bias, addressed gender biases that impact women in the workplace, education, medicine, technology, financial sector and public spaces.

Sadbhavana Trust

Developing leadership among marginalized and minority groups

"Existing leadership models are limited in their approach, focusing primarily on skill building, without any perspective-building component. We are developing the leadership skills of young women from marginalized communities so that they can work with their communities beyond a restricted number of stereotyped issues, and challenge dominant narratives."

(Sadbhavana Trust)

A community based non-profit in India, Sadbhavana Trust works with Muslim women and adolescent girls in lower-income areas in the old city of Lucknow. It is a women-led organization focused on building capacities for women in non-traditional skills such as filmmaking.

Sadbhavana Trust's most recent online event on women in politics in India highlighted some of the struggles of women entering this male dominated sphere. Their project aims to conduct interviews with local women leaders to better understand the experiences and challenges they face, with the objective of encouraging more women to take up such leadership roles. A challenge that they encountered during this project was to get women leaders to speak about their experiences on camera. Such was the fear and resistance from the patriarchal society that Sadbhavana Trust members had to recalibrate their strategy to ensure that they could capture voices of women without putting their security at risk.

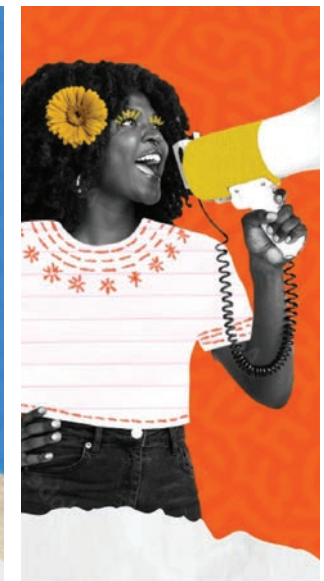
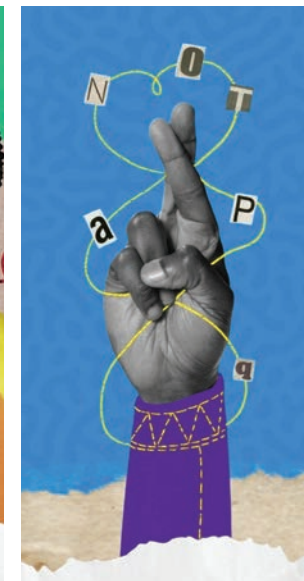
Chicas Poderosas

Promoting equity and inclusion in the media in Latin America and neighboring countries

"We believe that changing the narrative in the media does not only mean highlighting certain voices, but also requires a paradigm shift and the creation and preservation of personal and collective stories to sustain the memories, present and future, of lives and voices that are still invisible." (Chicas Poderosas)

Chicas Poderosas is one of Meedan's longest-standing partners under the Check Global program in the Latin America and Caribbean region. Their mission is to transform the media so it becomes more representative and inclusive. Their MOOCs address a wide range of issues from employment and funding opportunities during the pandemic to journalism and project management. These online courses have been designed for women who work in the media and journalism fields so they can acquire and strengthen their leadership skills and learn from professional practices of other women leaders. Chicas were able to reach over 2,000 women through these MOOCs.

This year, in partnership with Meedan, Chicas Poderosas developed a third MOOC focused on financial sustainability, fundraising, project management, collaborative leadership, and anti-colonial narratives. This course is aimed at Spanish and Portuguese speakers, particularly women, indigenous people, people of African descent, migrants, members of the LGBTQIA+ community, activists, and people with disabilities.

Africa Women Journalism Project (AWJP)

Amplifying the voices of female journalists

"We are working to create interventions that will change newsroom cultures and practices on the continent towards the retention and advancement of women journalists and sustained evidence- and data-based journalism." (Africa Women Journalism Project)

AWJP was set up with support from the International Center for Journalists (ICFJ) by ICFJ Knight Fellow Catherine Gicheru in July 2020 at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. AWJP first focused on highlighting the impacts of the pandemic on women, children and other marginalized and under-represented groups. It also provides support, training and mentorship to women journalists on the continent to push for sustained in-depth and evidence-based reporting on gender and other under-reported issues.

AWJP is conducting workshops on reporting around gender-based violence. They have adopted Meedan's monitoring and evaluation toolkit for their own use, and set up internal impact metrics based on this. Our team has also worked with AWJP on capacity building efforts, including project management and communication tools, which has allowed them to continue working seamlessly as a team.

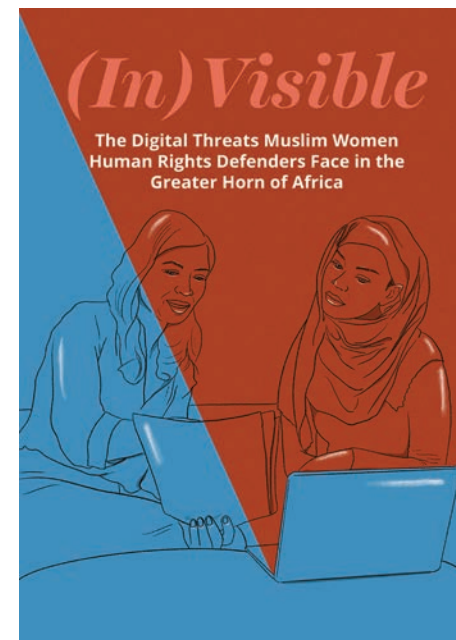
Pollicy

Working at the intersection of data, design and technology

"Pollicy continues to spark debate through researching how the internet will affect the future of work, particularly for African workers. African feminists now have access to crucial spaces for advocacy and movement building, thanks to the rise of the internet and social media as important platforms for social justice activism." Pollicy is an award-winning feminist civic technology collective in East Africa whose work and research spans across the use and implementation of data and technology to engineer social change. For the collaboration under Check Global, Pollicy focused its activities on countering online violence against women working both in mainstream (print, TV, and radio) and alternative media (bloggers, YouTubers, influencers, podcasters).

Over the past year, Pollicy has worked to explore the application of creative multimedia to address new risks and challenges in the hybrid workplace, including digital safety and security and gender discrimination. Their work on this subject is contributing to media independence, responsible journalism and freedom of expression in Uganda.

Debunk Media

Covering people, politics and pop-culture

Debunk Media is a Nairobi-based independent media house whose work includes data-driven storytelling around major issues in society cutting across the three P's - People, Politics and Pop Culture.

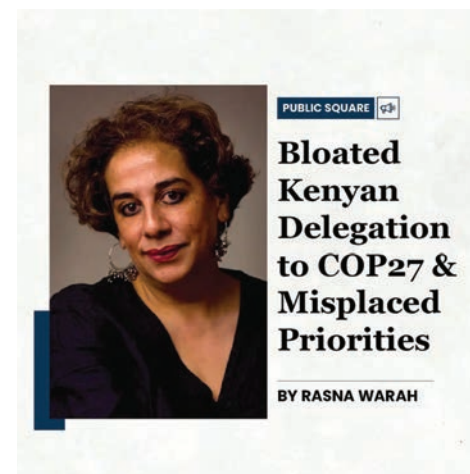
Debunk Media's work covers marginalized sections of the population, including women, intersex persons and young people. Their content encourages the public to think broadly about the place of these groups in Kenyan society, which in turn informs their overall editorial approach.

Through its collaboration under Check Global, Debunk Media designed an election-focused podcast series to capture the personal stories of women who were running for office, joining the campaigns of these candidates and capturing all the nuances of their political life. Through these interviews and observations, the podcast episodes offered valuable insights into the milestones and challenges that women politicians encounter, especially during the super-charged political years such as during general elections.

Debunk Media mobilized their team to report on election day in Kenya, choosing to use on-ground monitoring of election activities to provide intricate details of the election by setting up a roving newsroom.

Animal Político

Championing climate conversations and countering climate misinformation

"An essential contribution of Check Global to the Animal Político editorial team was in the analysis of what is happening with Energy Reform in Mexico in comparison to the processes of other countries and how these discussions take place in the public arena. These external examples are relevant because they illustrate how information is shared and how it contributes to the decision-making process around climate issues."

Animal Político is a leading digital journal focused on fact-checking environmental misinformation in Mexico and Latin America, publishing articles and videos to combat misleading scientific information and state corruption through new multimedia narrative formats.

The climate crisis and its consequences are often overshadowed by other issues and are therefore not on the mainstream public agenda nor a priority for the government. The collaboration with Check Global aimed at drawing more attention and generating interest around climate disinformation, through producing explainers and relatable content. The editorial team delivered high-quality content to the audience on how climate change issues impact everyday lives and how the scarcity of factual information has stronger effects on women and minority groups.

Taiwan FactCheck Center

Addressing misinformation among migrant communities

"There is a large Filipino community in Taiwan with over 159,000 migrant workers here. For Taiwan FactCheck Center, it was difficult to reach the Filipino community on our own because of the language and the cultural gap. However, promoting the VERA tipline on Viber, gave us an opportunity to reach out to this community and work with them." (Taiwan FactCheck Center)

During large events such as elections, misleading claims and conspiracy theories infiltrate immigrant and diaspora communities through messaging apps and social media platforms. With little or no access to factual and verified information, it can be challenging for these communities to find trusted messaging sources.

Taiwan FactCheck Center worked with VERA Files in the Philippines on a collaborative project to address misinformation among Filipino migrant and diaspora communities in Taiwan. The project focused on Taiwan FactCheck Center promoting the VERA Files tipline among migrant communities in Taiwan so that they could access verified news and fact-checked content from their home countries during crises.

The Centre for Innovation and Technology (CITE)

Holding power to account and training future female fact-checkers

“Check Global helped us create Funda, our MOOC where we conduct hybrid training and workshops. The team also challenged us to provide quality health fact-checking content that will engage with CITE’s audiences and at the same time attract new audiences.” (The Centre for Innovation and Technology)

CITE is a digital advocacy and media organization based in Zimbabwe working with media and civil society in the country to disseminate critical information on current affairs, ensure accountability, and enable citizens to fully participate in democratic processes.

Their work focuses on fighting misinformation in Zimbabwe, live streaming council meetings in Bulawayo for the public record, and training journalism students on data journalism, fact-checking and open source investigation tools. They also developed a Promise Tracker that the public can use to debate, critique and hold their elected officials to account. They have also integrated Meedan’s flagship product Check into their newsroom workflow to help them address misinformation and disinformation effectively and efficiently.

Inform Africa

Capacity building of local media to combat disinformation

“Since the Check Global program’s launch, HaqCheck has produced and shared weekly recaps and monthly trend analyses of dis/misinformation on its platforms, as well as a weekly newsletter distributed to various media institutions and professionals throughout Ethiopia.” (Inform Africa)

Inform Africa is a hub for digital rights, media research and development in Ethiopia. They collaborate with local media houses on fact-checking, digital rights advocacy, media literacy training, research, and development.

They run HaqCheck, a multilingual fact-checking initiative, and have established, with support from Check Global, an internship program to train fact-checkers in Ethiopia. Their goal is to develop a variety of media development and capacity building activities to enable journalists and fact-checkers in Ethiopia to counter disinformation.

A Facebook page posted two images claiming that Eritrean troops were destroying forests in Adiyabo, a locality in the northwestern zone of Tigray bordered by Eritrea.

HaqCheck looked into the images and confirmed that the pictures don't support the claim. The images were first posted on different websites on Mar 26, 2019, and Mar 27, 2021, respectively.

Fact-checking tiplines on messaging services

Meedan's Check tiplines are designed to make it easy for fact-checking newsrooms to create conversational bots to meet audiences on messaging services and collect messages, videos and audio files, questions and claims directly from users who experience misinformation.

Fatabyyano

Fatabyyano is a fact-checking initiative that verifies Arabic-language content online and debunks fake news spreading on social media and messaging apps. Meedan's recent collaboration is an important milestone as this is the first Check tipline made for an Arabic speaking audience. With over one million followers on Fatabyyano's social media accounts and millions in audience reach, Check's tipline will help improve Fatabyyano's work, including direct end-to-end encrypted communication with followers requesting trusted information.

Distributing fact-checks and claims to third parties through Shared Feeds

Shared Feeds are designed to aggregate both fact-checks and claims from existing tiplines into a feed of information that can be delivered to a third party organization.

#FactsFirstPH – Philippines General Elections, March 2022

11 teams from media and academia led by Rappler launched tiplines on Facebook Messenger, Twitter, and Viber in February 2022. The teams created a Shared Feed to share data with one another and create a shared layer of knowledge about trending misinformation. If one organization detected any viral misinformation from their own audience, all organizations in the network would instantly be aware of it, helping them create fact-checks for their own audience. The collective published 1,271 fact-checks between February and July 2022 to their respective tipline (visible on the consortium website #FactsFirstPH).

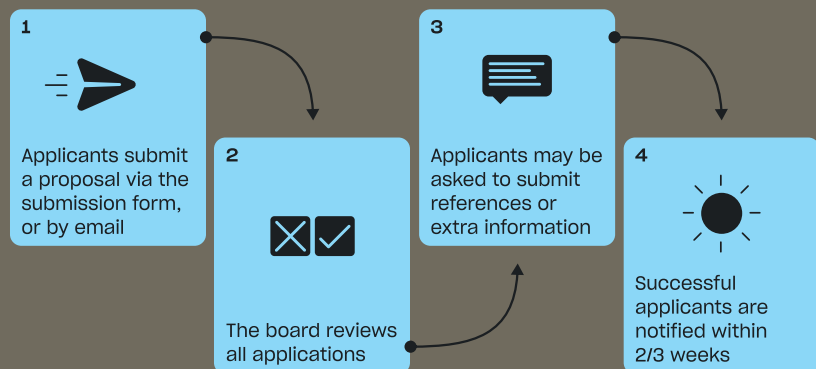

Independent Media Response Fund

The Check Global Independent Media Response Fund is designed to respond to the hyperlocal needs of media practitioners, independent media newsrooms, fact-checking groups, citizen journalism projects, human rights defenders, researchers and technology and digital literacy advocates in North Africa and Western-Asia, Sub-Saharan Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, and the Asia-Pacific region.

The fund makes available micro-grants of up to \$5,000 for individuals, and up to \$15,000 for collectives and organizations.

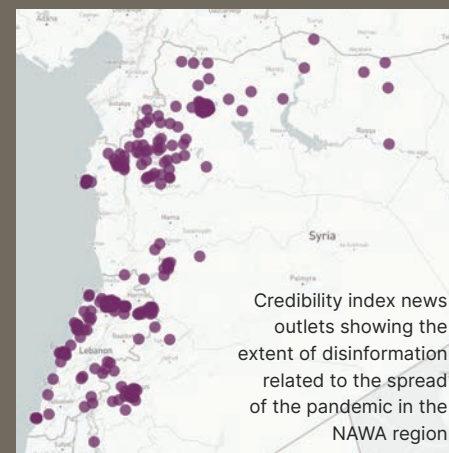

Since 2017 and through the NAWA newsroom, the Check Global program has trained hundreds of journalism students in Lebanon, Syria, Yemen, Palestine, Egypt, Sudan, and Libya on a variety of skills and topics, including investigative journalism, verification tools, and media monitoring. Subsequently, students were offered microgrants, internships and the opportunity to publish their work on regional media outlets.

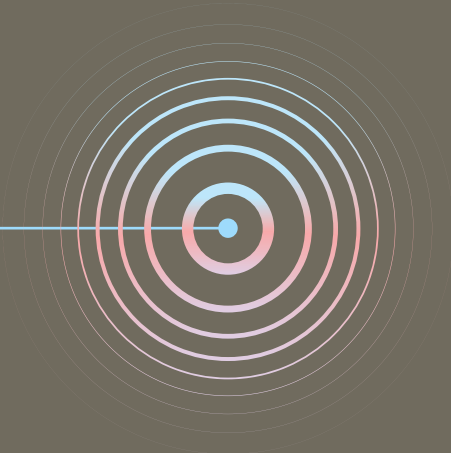
