



2026 Faith & Entertainment Index: ***Faith in Storytelling and Its Influence on Modern Audiences in America***

Introduction

Our guiding question:

Does the inclusion of faith in storytelling engage modern audiences, and if so how and why?

WHAT WE KNEW: *THE WHAT*

Faith in entertainment is having a cultural moment, but U.S. audiences look to the industry to do better:

82% Say the entertainment industry **needs to improve their portrayals of faith**

69% Say TV and movies **perpetuate religious stereotypes**

Audiences want more accurate, complex, diverse, and nuanced depictions of faith.

OUR CORE QUESTIONS: *THE HOW & WHY*

This phase of research set out to move *from the **What** to the **How and Why***:

Our core questions: *How* can creators tell authentic stories about faith in a way that tangibly fosters engagement? *Why* do some stories land better than others?

Through a robust, multi-method approach, we uncovered guidance for creators to create content that generates engagement with audiences.

How we did it: Consumer-led, multi-method research

Who did we reach?

- General population consumers who watch TV or movies at least weekly
- Oversamples of Jewish and Muslim respondents to achieve statistically readable sample among all major faith groups in the U.S.

How we reached them:

Professionally recruited. Survey administered online.

When did we reach them?

In two waves, between September 9-18 & November 13-25, 2025.

Measuring Impact: A first-of-its kind evaluation system for measuring mainstream faith portrayals

Defining “Totems”: The storytelling features that we used to assess what drives engagement

General Totems

- Feels like they’re made for people like me
- Is relatable
- Is easy to understand
- Avoid clichés or overused tropes
- Makes you reflect or think differently
- Has characters who feel layered and complex
- Connects to broader social issues
- Shows realistic characters and situations
- Uses humor respectfully
- Is emotionally moving
- Is entertaining

Consumer-Defined Totems

Themes surfaced in qualitative discussions with viewers informed our scene evaluation criteria

Faith-Specific Totems

- Depicts faith authentically
- Depicts faith accurately
- Shows different perspectives within a faith
- Shows characters exploring their faith
- Places faith in contemporary/modern settings
- Weaves faith naturally into the story / journey
- Teaches you something new about faith
- Challenges common stereotypes about faith
- Appeals to people of a different faith
- Appeals to people with no faith or spirituality
- Avoids offending people of a certain faith
- Avoids preachy or heavily faith-based language

Adding Scale & Depth: Supplementary analysis, grounded in how consumers talk about faith in entertainment

Tonal Video Coding

To identify the **dominant tones in each scene**, we used an AI-assisted coding approach grounded in our research:

Step 1:

Our primary research was used to **inform the model**, which synthesized the survey inputs into a comprehensive taxonomy of 130+ **tones** used to describe the scenes



Step 2:

Each scene was evaluated against this research-derived **tone library**, with the AI identifying the most prominent tones present in each individual scene.

This approach allowed us to **scale consistent coding across all content** while remaining anchored in audiences' language

Social Listening

Separately, we **analyzed organic YouTube comments** for each scene, grouping viewer commentary into thematic buckets and surfacing illustrative quotes. These organic reactions **validate survey and AI findings, while adding further depth and lived context to our research.**

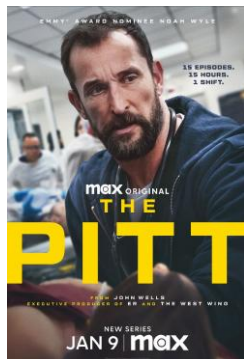

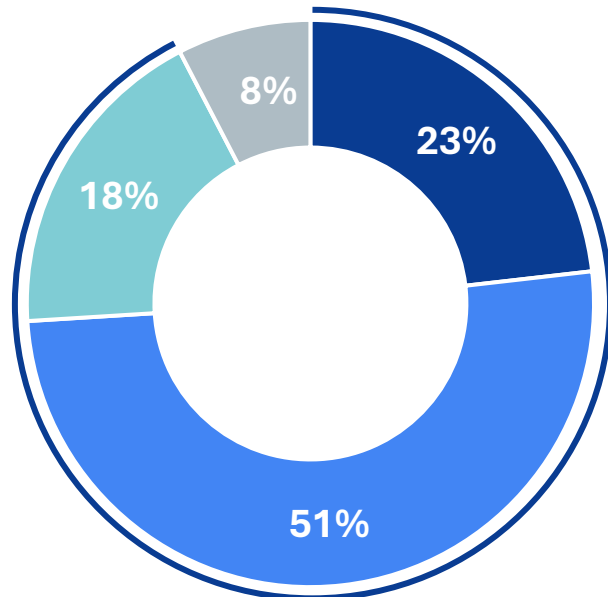

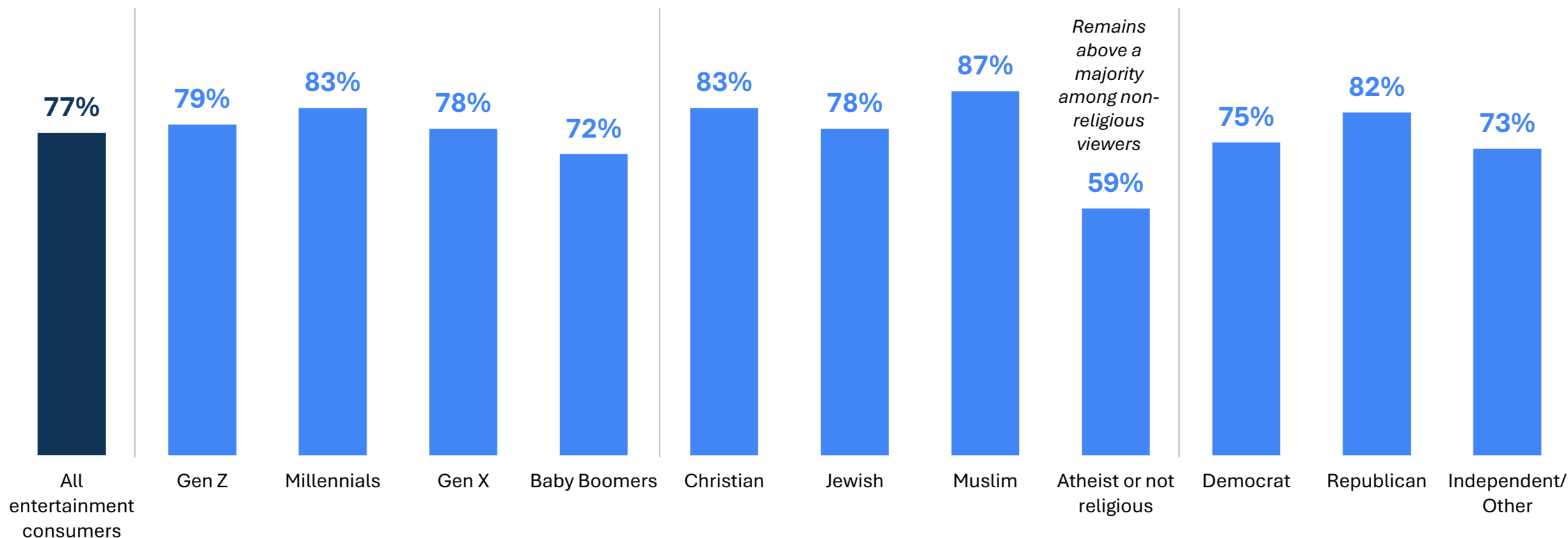

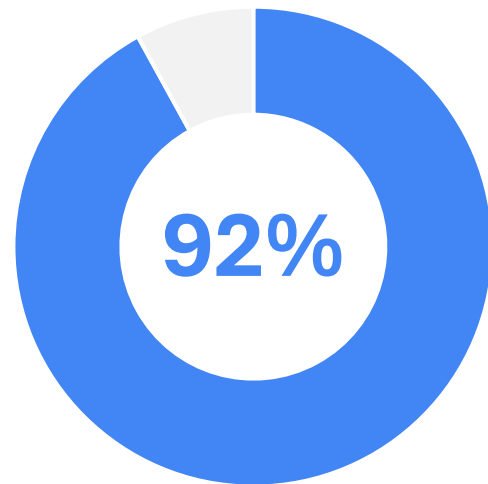

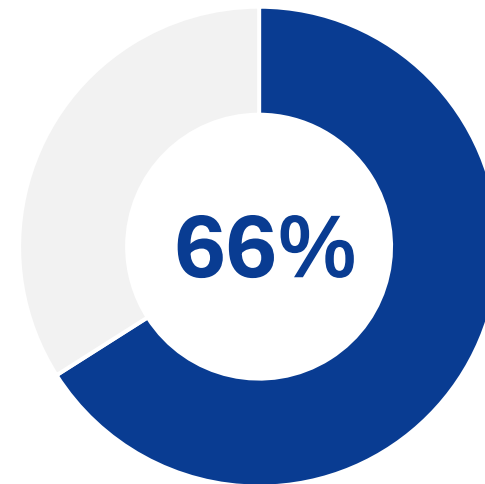


Comedy attracts near-universal appeal in entertainment

What Drives Engagement

Across scenes, we identified the totems that consistently elevate engagement with faith storytelling

Quadrant Analysis: understanding the impact of viewer-defined totems on engagement

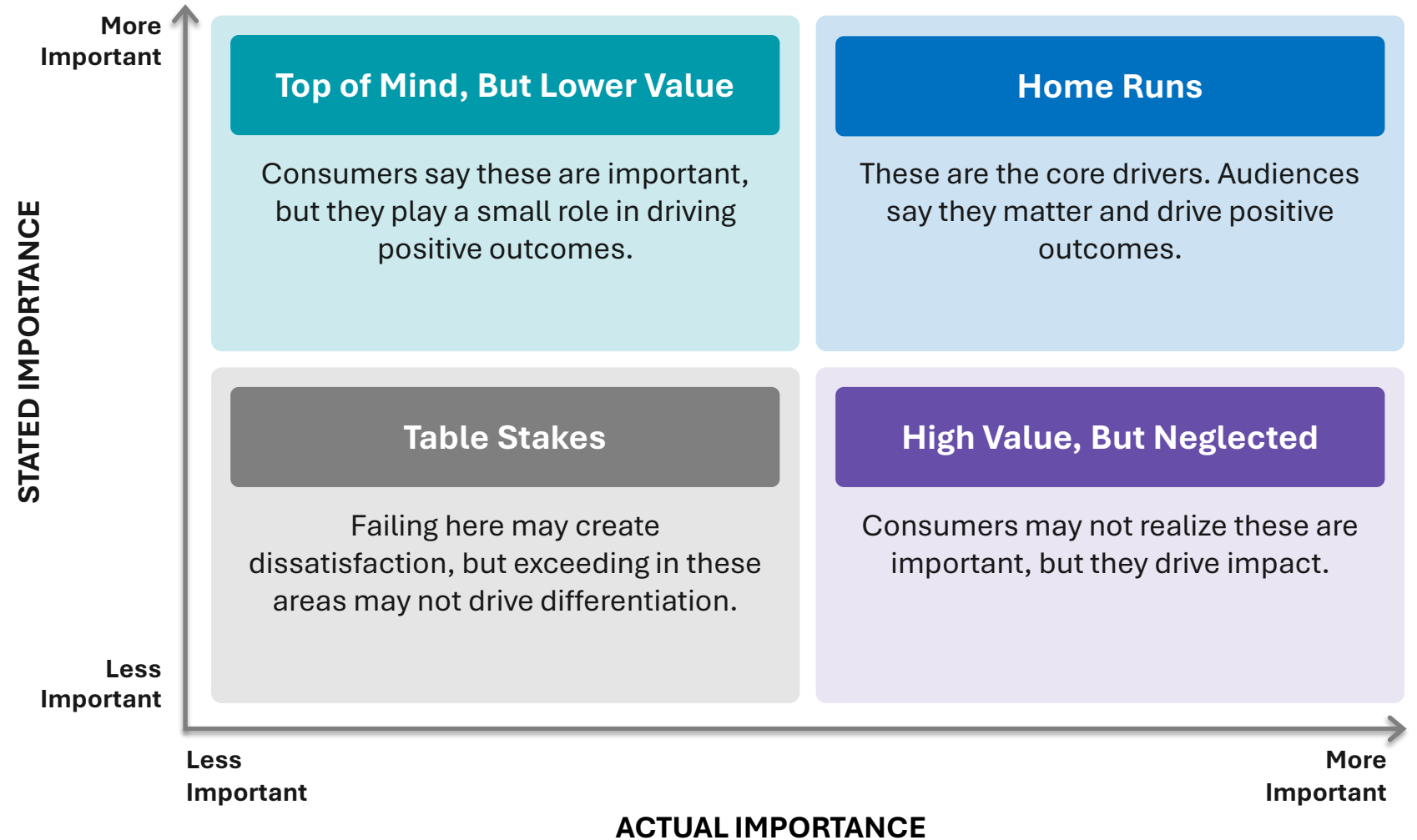
We put these totems, *which emerged in viewers' own words in our qualitative research*, to the test across two dimensions:

1 – Stated Importance

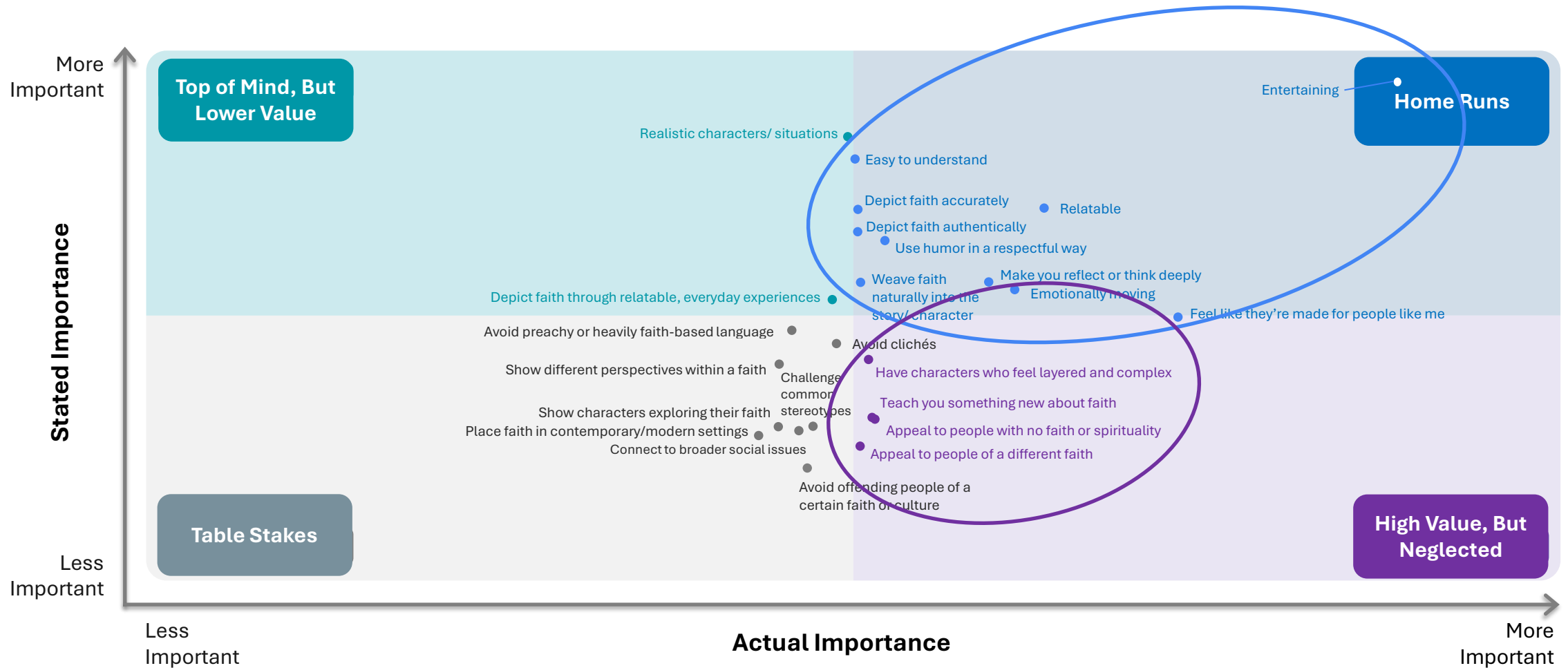
Respondents answered how important each of these totems are for films and TV shows that depict faith.

2 – Actual Importance

Behavioral analysis of the extent to which each of these totems drives positive engagement with different types of content.

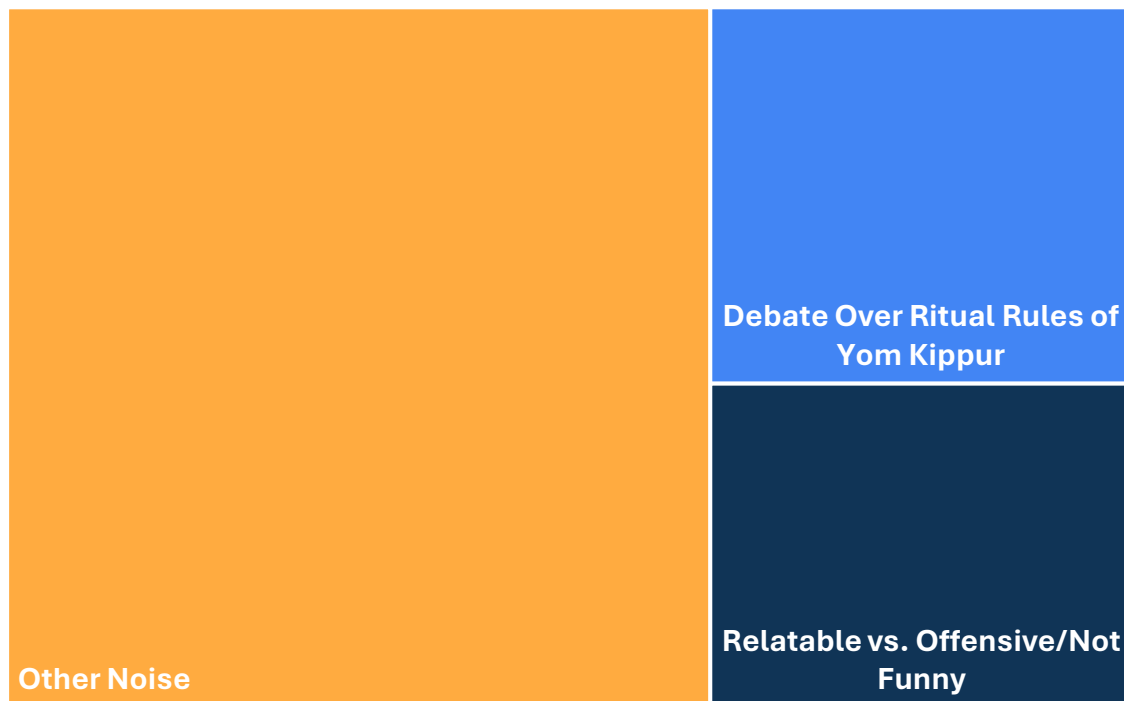

Debate Over Ritual Rules of Yom Kippur: Comments focus on the tension between cultural identity and religious observance

- “Bacon egg and cheese? how are they Jewish enough to honor Yom Kippur but not Jewish enough to abstain from pork?”

Relatable vs. Offensive: Many commenters debate whether the humor lands at all — with some finding the exaggeration relatable, while others see it as disrespectful or simply not funny

- “I thought the purpose of 'comedy' central was to broadcast something [that] has to be at least slightly funny.”
- “lol if you're not Jewish you probably won't find this funny. YOU GET IT, BACON EGG & CHEESE, the least kosher thing you can eat lol.”

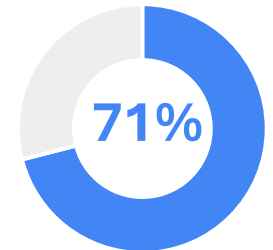

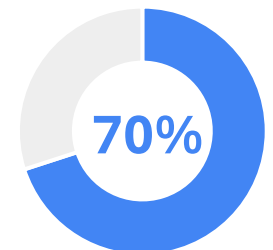
