Foreword





The 2026 Florida Water and Wastewater Rate Survey (2026 Survey) is developed to provide insight into water and wastewater pricing practices currently utilized by publicly owned utilities in the State of Florida. This survey was first conducted in 2012 and was limited to only residential potable water rates. Starting with the 2014 Florida Water and Wastewater Rate Survey, both residential water and wastewater rates are included.

The goal of this survey is focused on typical residential potable water/wastewater bills and rate structures for over 220 Florida public utilities. The respondents include small utilities serving a population less than 5,000 to the largest utilities in Florida which service populations of more than 1 million. The survey results included in the table at the end of this document are sorted alphabetically by county and thereafter listed by the city or utility name.

The rates shown are exclusive of utility taxes or outside-city surcharges where they may be applicable. Following this introduction is a discussion of key reasons why water rates may differ among utilities together with a narrative summarizing the survey results. Also included are statistics such as the gallons included in the first usage block, revenue recovery from fixed charges, minimum water bill levels, and other information. The survey table at the end of this document includes information related to water management districts, residential monthly minimum water and sewer bill amounts, and bill amounts for usage at 4,000 and 8,000 gallons.

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Factors Affecting Rate Differentiation

The 2026 Survey is focused on publicly owned utilities. Often utility infrastructure is a community's most valuable asset. The rates established by each community for utility service are essential for operations, maintenance, and renewal of the utility infrastructure investment. At the time of this publication, utilities have been reporting elevated costs due to inflation in the cost of operations and capital project costs. Additionally, customer growth, renewal and replacement, together with regulations have compounded the cost pressures faced by utilities in Florida.

SOURCE OF SUPPLY AND WATER QUALITY

Most potable water in Florida comes from underground aquifer systems. Surface water and brackish groundwater are becoming more common as populations grow and fresh groundwater becomes less plentiful. Water quality and the level of treatment needed to meet regulatory requirements and maintain public acceptance vary widely across the state because the sources vary. Inland communities often need lower levels of treatment than coastal communities drawing more brackish water.

Several factors push treatment and supply costs in different directions across communities:

- Regulations targeting per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances affect utilities differently depending on the degree of contamination in the source
- Consumptive use permit limits cap the volume of high-quality water some communities can withdraw
- Many communities must identify and develop alternative water supplies, which are typically far more expensive to treat than existing sources
- Some communities are exploring indirect potable reuse through aquifer injection to expand groundwater production capacity at a lower cost than other alternatives
- Depending on the location of the source, an expensive transmission system may be needed to deliver water to the service area



EFFLUENT DISPOSAL

While the source of water is a large differentiator in potable water costs, the disposal of treated effluent is one of the most significant drivers of wastewater costs. The least expensive methods include land application with minimal pollutant removal. Many communities have limited land available and rely on nearby surface waters to discharge treated wastewater. Enforcement of existing regulations and recent legislation is restricting or eliminating surface water discharge in many communities, leaving capital-intensive alternatives such as deep injection wells. A growing number of systems are also upgrading to advanced wastewater treatment to meet stricter effluent quality standards, which adds further cost pressure.



SURFACE WATER DISCHARGE ELIMINATION AND WATER REUSE

State policy is accelerating the shift away from surface water discharge, and this is one of the most consequential cost drivers now facing Florida wastewater utilities. Senate Bill 64, signed into law in 2021, requires domestic wastewater utilities to eliminate nonbeneficial surface water discharges by January 1, 2032, or earlier if no approved plan is submitted. Under SB 64, utilities were required to submit surface water discharge phase-out plans to the FDEP by November 1, 2021. If a plan is not timely submitted or approved, the utility's facilities may not dispose of effluent, reclaimed water, or reuse water by surface water discharge after January 1, 2028.

The law permits certain continued discharges, including those tied to indirect potable reuse projects, wet weather backup, ecological or public water supply benefits such as wetland rehydration, and facilities that already reuse 90 percent or more of their annual average flow. The statute also includes exceptions and extended timelines for small facilities and fiscally constrained or rural areas, so the compliance burden is uneven across communities. To meet the mandate, utilities are investing in reclaimed water systems, storage, and potable reuse, and the scale of these projects varies widely by location and existing reuse capacity. The result is a meaningful and uneven addition to wastewater rate requirements through 2032 and beyond.



CONNECTION DENSITY

A key factor influencing both capital and operating costs is the number of connections within a service area. Utilities serving densely populated, compact cities benefit from economies of scale such as shorter piping networks and reduced travel time for maintenance and customer service. Connection density plays a significant role in cost efficiency and should be considered when comparing rates, particularly between combined county and city systems.



REGULATORY STRINGENCY

Water utilities must deliver drinking water that is safe and meet testing and reporting requirements. Standards such as the EPA Disinfection Byproducts Rule affect communities differently based on the source of supply, the age of the distribution system, and other factors. Meeting this and other requirements can require both capital and operating investment, which leads to higher user rates.



PFAS AND EMERGING CONTAMINANTS

Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances have moved from an emerging concern to an active compliance obligation, though the federal framework is in flux. On April 10, 2024, the EPA announced the final PFAS National Primary Drinking Water Regulation that included legally enforceable drinking water MCLs for PFOA and PFOS, as well as PFHxS, PFNA, HFPO-DA, and hazard index mixtures of these three PFAS and PFBS, requiring public water system compliance by April 2029.

The federal standards have since narrowed. In two proposed rules announced in May 2026, the EPA would maintain enforceable drinking water standards for PFOA and PFOS, while extending compliance deadlines for public water systems from 2029 to 2031, and at the same time proposed rescinding drinking water standards covering PFHxS, PFNA, HFPO-DA (GenX), and the hazard index mixture that includes PFBS. The proposal would retain the existing federal drinking water standards for PFOA and PFOS at 4 parts per trillion. Rescinding the regulations for the other four PFAS does not preclude future regulation of those compounds, and future rulemaking could still result in new or potentially more stringent requirements.

For utilities, the practical effect is the same regardless of the regulatory detail: communities with detectable PFAS in their source water face significant capital and operating costs for treatment, monitoring, and residuals management, and those costs fall unevenly depending on source water exposure. The shifting timelines add planning uncertainty to an already expensive obligation.



RESILIENCY

Over the last several years, Florida has experienced a number of significant weather events, including four major hurricanes of Category 3 or higher. These storms have hit communities hard, especially coastal areas, where flooding from rainfall and storm surge has caused major property damage and, in some cases, the loss of customers. Untreated discharges from overwhelmed wastewater facilities have drawn increasing media attention. In response, utility capital plans now prioritize improvements to treatment processes, increased facility capacity, and facility hardening such as elevating electrical panels and equipment.



INFRASTRUCTURE RENEWAL AND REPLACEMENT

Florida faces sustained challenges in maintaining and upgrading its water and wastewater infrastructure. Aging systems, population growth, and a changing climate have strained existing facilities. Rising demand has pushed many utilities to expand capacity, upgrade treatment plants, and replace deteriorating pipelines, and the increasing frequency of hurricanes and flooding has reinforced the need for resilient infrastructure. These pressures drive large-scale investment, typically funded through a mix of public funding, bonds, and rate increases.

The cost of this work is substantial. Utility and infrastructure assessments project tens of billions in system improvement needs, with many local governments under financial strain. The American Society of Civil Engineers 2025 Infrastructure Report Card estimates that Florida faces long-term wastewater capital needs of \$90.5 billion through 2040, far exceeding available funding, particularly for small and rural systems. Funding has come from federal sources such as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, which has directed over \$537 million into Florida water infrastructure projects since 2022, along with state and local programs. Rising construction costs, labor shortages, higher financing costs, and stricter environmental regulations have made these projects more expensive, contributing to higher bills for residents and businesses.



DECREASING PER CAPITA CONSUMPTION

Falling per capita water use creates challenges for utilities even as it benefits the environment. As customers use less water through efficient appliances and practices, utility revenue declines while the cost of maintaining, upgrading, and expanding infrastructure stays high. Fixed costs, such as maintaining pipelines and treatment plants and meeting regulatory standards, do not fall in proportion to lower usage. Utilities may have to raise rates to cover these costs, which can seem counterintuitive to customers using less water. Lower wastewater flows can also create operational issues in treatment systems designed for higher volumes, adding inefficiency and cost. Conservation is essential for long-term sustainability, but it presents real financial and operational hurdles.



WATER RESTRICTIONS

Florida's water management districts have frequently declared water shortages and imposed watering restrictions. These restrictions typically limit irrigation days and hours and are paired with calls to cut consumption by a set percentage. Because most utility costs are fixed and do not move with demand, the lower water sales that result from shortages create financial pressure. To cover fixed costs, utilities often raise rates even as consumption falls, in order to maintain the infrastructure and services needed to meet regulatory and operational requirements.



WORKFORCE AND OPERATOR CAPACITY

Utilities across Florida face growing difficulty recruiting and retaining licensed operators, engineers, and skilled trades. A wave of retirements, competition from the private sector, and the specialized licensing required for treatment operations have left many systems short-staffed. The strain is greatest for smaller and rural utilities, which compete for the same limited pool of talent without the pay scales or career ladders of larger systems. Workforce shortages raise costs through overtime, contracted services, and higher wages, and they can slow the delivery of capital projects. These pressures feed into rates and vary considerably by system size and location.



AFFORDABILITY AND CUSTOMER ASSISTANCE

As capital and operating costs climb, affordability has become a central concern for utility governance. Rate increases needed to fund infrastructure, regulatory compliance, and resiliency can outpace household income growth, particularly for fixed- and low-income customers. Many utilities are weighing or adopting customer assistance programs, tiered rate structures, and other tools to soften the burden, and the availability of these programs varies widely. Notably, some assistance programs cover other utilities but exclude wastewater service, leaving gaps for customers. Balancing the revenue a utility needs against what its community can reasonably afford is an increasingly visible driver of rate decisions.



CYBERSECURITY

Water and wastewater systems are increasingly recognized as critical infrastructure exposed to cyber threats, particularly as utilities expand the use of remote monitoring and supervisory control and data acquisition systems. Protecting operational technology and customer data now requires investment in network security, staff training, monitoring, and incident response planning. These costs are relatively new to many utility budgets and add to the broader cost pressures reflected in rates. Smaller utilities often have the least capacity to absorb this work, which widens the gap in preparedness across the state.





EFFICIENCIES

Potable water rates also reflect a community's ability to use technology and sound management to deliver high-quality service at the lowest possible cost. Many communities report doing more with fewer resources through innovations that lower operating costs and improve accuracy:

- Automated meter reading systems that reduce operational expense and improve meter reading accuracy
- Supervisory control and data acquisition technology that improves system monitoring while cutting operating costs
- Programs that reduce unbilled water losses
- Wholesale agreements that sell excess capacity

Each of these contributes to cost savings and rate stability.



BUDGET AND TRANSFER POLICIES

The full accounting of indirect costs within a water utility varies significantly across communities. In city and county utilities, supporting departments may or may not be fully accounted for during budgeting. Even when recognized, these costs may be inaccurately reflected, with some communities understating or overstating them under budget pressure. Many communities also include payments in lieu of taxes, payments in lieu of franchise fees, or direct transfers to the general fund. The amounts and methods used for these transfers vary widely, directly affecting utility rates and contributing to pricing disparities among communities.



ACQUISITIONS AND CONTRIBUTIONS

Many Florida utilities were originally built to minimal standards by land developers to support land sales. Over time, local governments acquired many of these systems, often at prices that factored in contributions made by existing customers. The Florida Supreme Court upheld the inclusion of these customer contributions in acquisition costs as appropriate. Beyond the purchase price, local governments often had to invest in significant upgrades to bring these systems up to municipal standards. Both the acquisition expense and the subsequent upgrades are key factors in current rate levels.



POLITICAL ACTION

The local political climate plays a significant role in shaping utility rates. Policymakers often aim to keep rates as low as possible, or at least to avoid increases, while maintaining service quality. Communities that prioritize service redundancy or enhanced supply protection may accept slightly higher rates when needed. Striking this balance usually requires careful planning and periodic, modest adjustments. In many surveyed communities, rates are adjusted annually based on an inflation index or a set percentage, but resistance to increases is common until systems begin to fail or regulatory mandates require costly upgrades. Local political pressure influences rates, whether directly through policy decisions or indirectly through delayed adjustments.

Overview of the Survey

A benchmark of 4,000 gallons per month is used as a representation of indoor usage levels. This amount equates to an average demand of 131 gallons per day. A secondary benchmark of 8,000 gallons, or 263 gallons per day, has also been used in order to provide additional information for higher levels of service. Most utilities measure metered water use in terms of gallon increments. Approximately 3.0% of surveyed utilities report metered water use in terms of hundreds of cubic feet (ccf) rather than thousands of gallons. For these utilities, the usage rate data was calculated based on 5.35 ccf and 10.70 ccf of monthly usage which corresponds to 4,000 gallons and 8,000 gallons per month based on 748 gallons per ccf. Keeping in mind the narrative included earlier in this survey regarding the various reasons why water and wastewater rates vary among communities, the distribution of monthly bills at 4,000 gallons from lowest to highest is shown in Figure A.

As shown in Figure A, the average combined monthly water and wastewater bill for 4,000 gallons is \$82.46 excluding utility taxes. There is a wide distribution of residential water and wastewater bills at the 4,000-gallon usage level. As noted earlier, there are numerous reasons why utility rates are different among service providers. The average combined bill for these same utilities is \$129.78 for 8,000 gallons, as illustrated in Figure B.

Combined Monthly Water and Wastewater Bill at 4,000 Gallons (n=204)

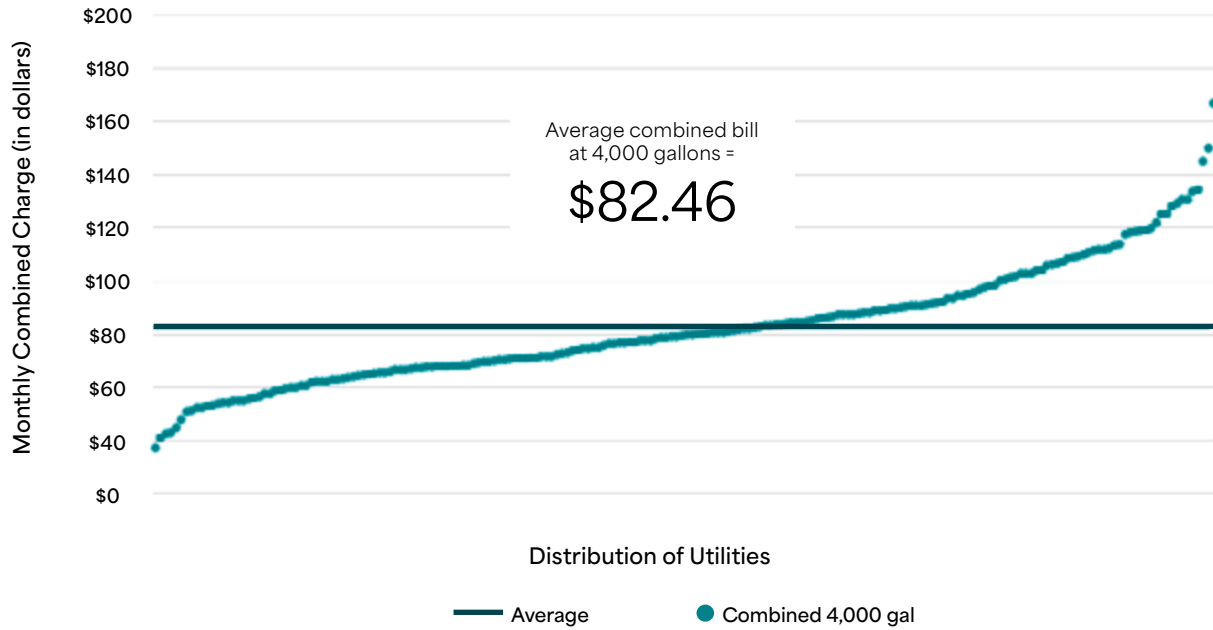
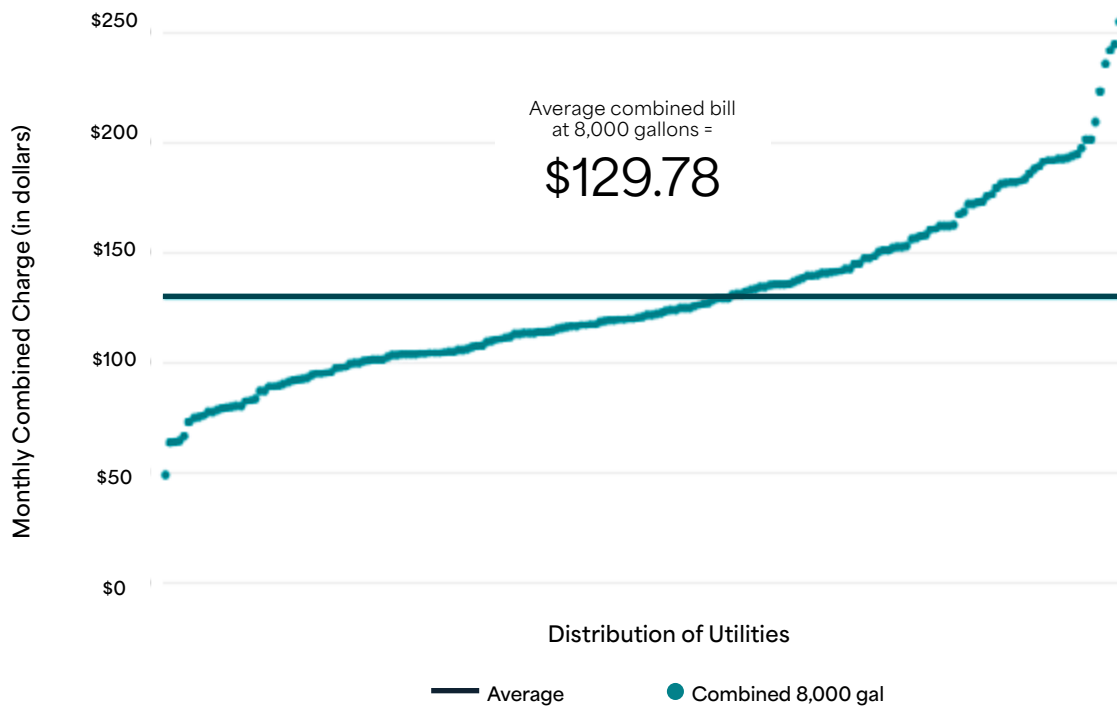

In the survey, we compare the average monthly water and wastewater bill for 4,000 gallons and 8,000 gallons between 2014, 2016, 2018, 2020, 2022, 2024, and 2026. The comparisons include only the 144 utilities that participated in all seven surveys. As shown in Figure C, the average monthly water bill for 4,000 and 8,000 gallons increased annually from 2014 to 2026 by 3.2% and 3.4%, respectively. The average monthly wastewater bill for 4,000 gallons increased by 3.3% annually, and the 8,000-gallon bill increased by 3.4% annually from 2014.

Comparison of average monthly water bill (base charge+consumption) at 4,000 and 8,000 gallons for utilities reported in 2014 - 2026 surveys

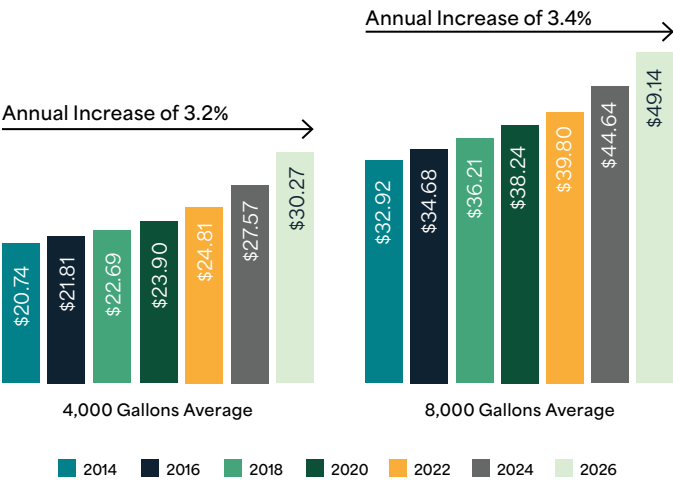
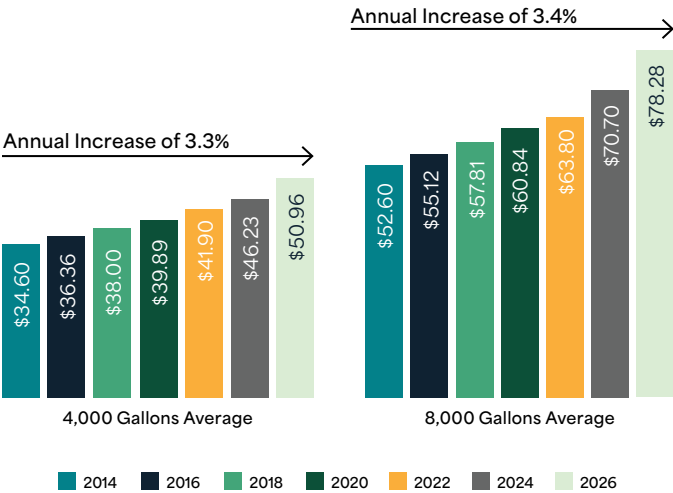

Monthly Water Charges at 4,000 Gallons

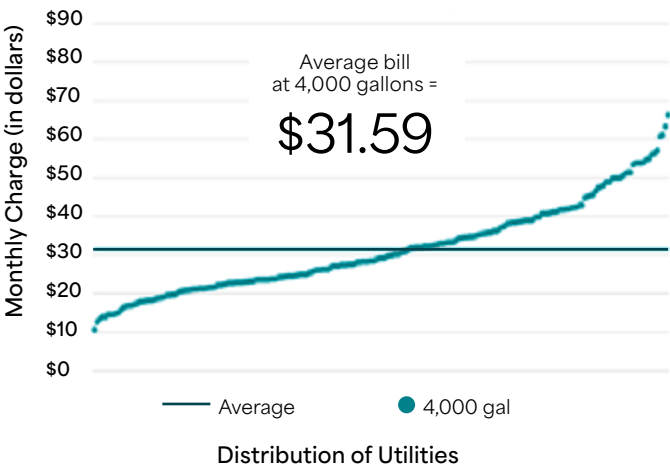

Monthly Wastewater Charges at 4,000 Gallons

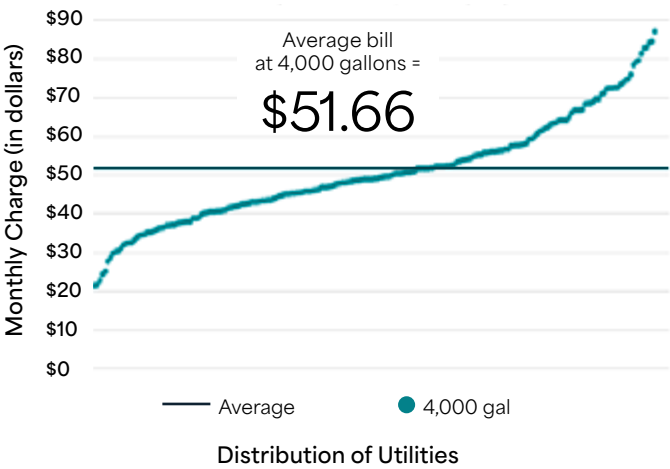

Monthly Water Charges at 8,000 Gallons

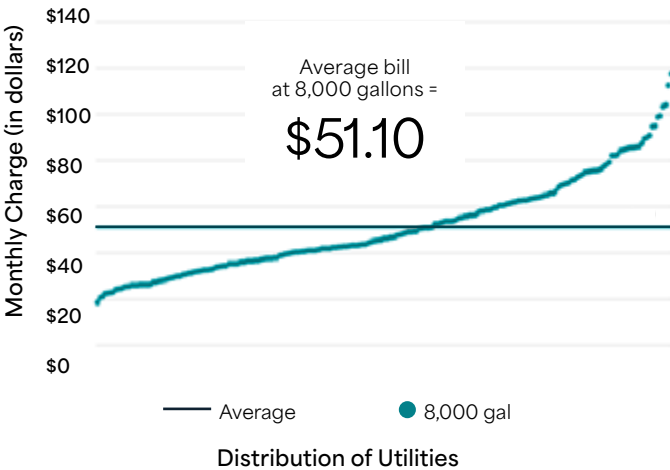
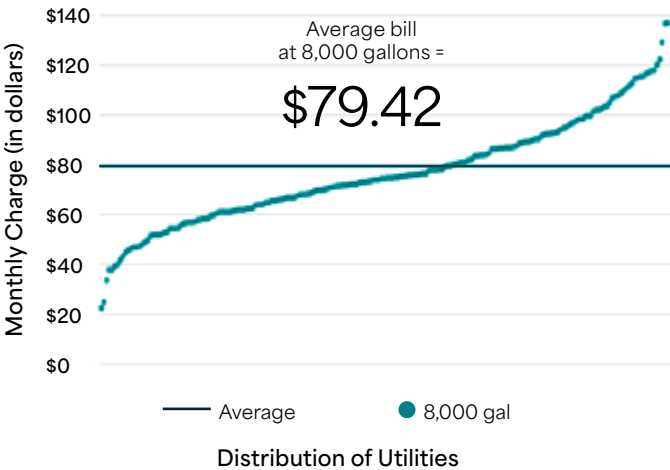
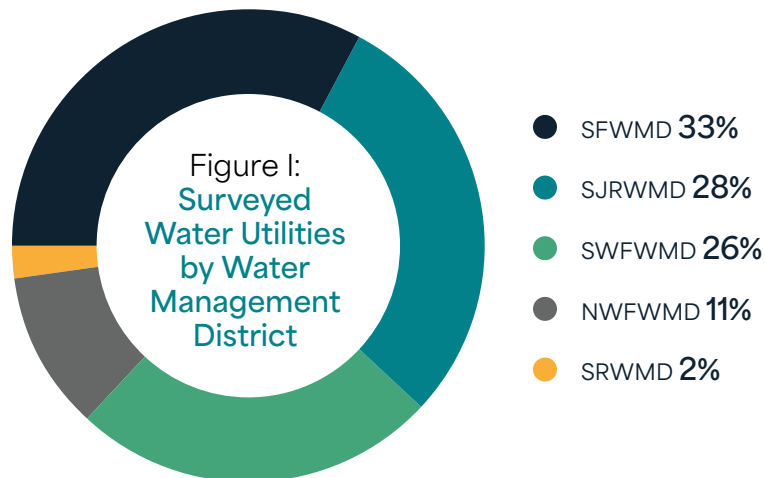

Additional Results

A table of the detailed survey results is provided at the end of this narrative. All utilities surveyed have a combination of a fixed monthly charge and a separate variable charge based on the amount of metered water use as their primary revenue generation mechanism. Most water management district consumption use permits require utilities to have a conservation rate structure (multiple variable rate blocks that are “inverted” or increase at higher usage amounts) to reduce water consumption. There are 12 surveyed utilities (6% of respondents) that use a uniform rate structure. The inverted rate structure typically produces a costlier bill at higher usage than a uniform rate structure.

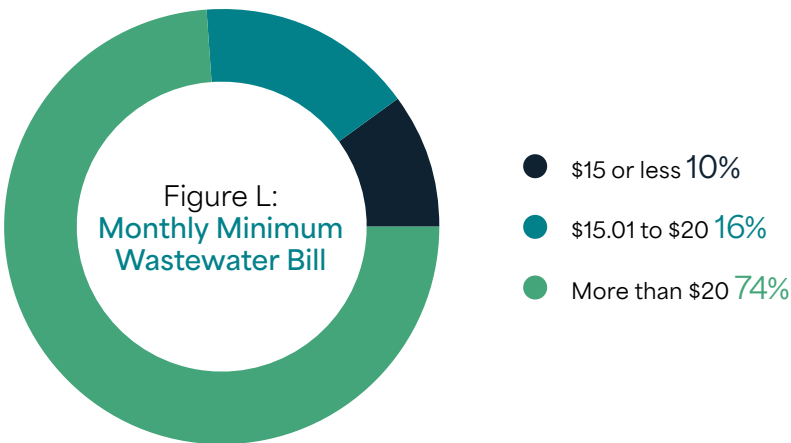
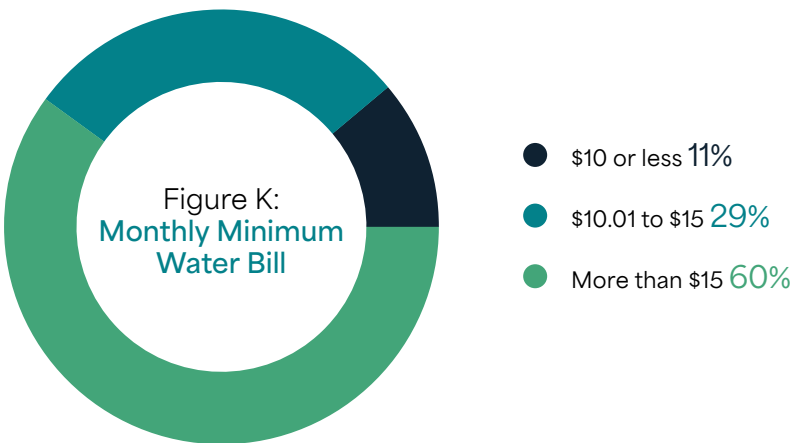
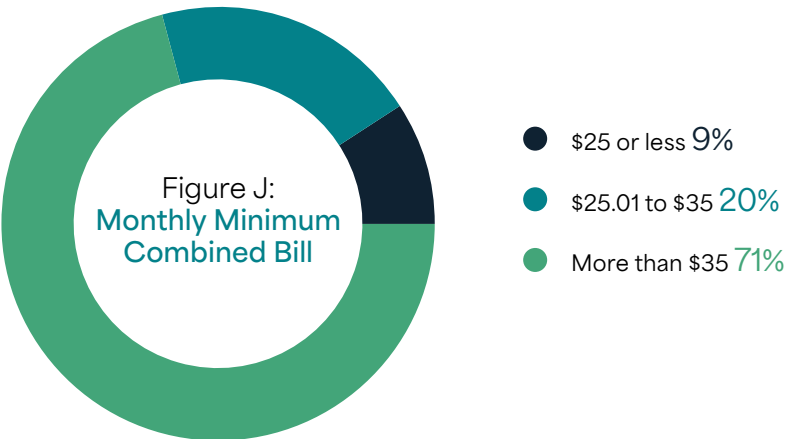
Certain other characteristics of surveyed utilities include the following:

- Monthly minimum water bill
- Monthly minimum wastewater bill
- Monthly minimum combined bill
- First water usage rate block
- Fixed portion of bills
- Wastewater residential billing cap



Monthly Minimum Bills

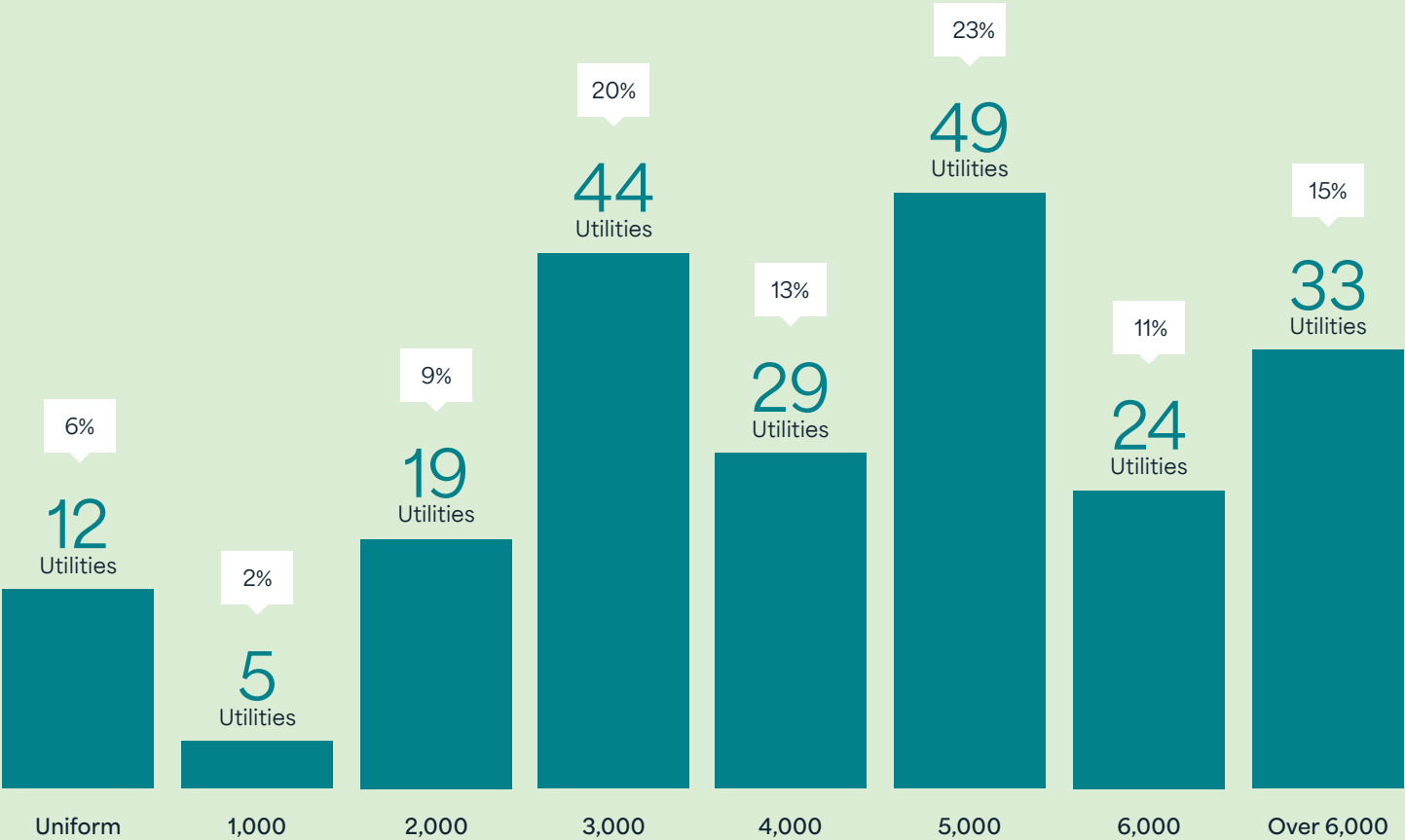
The average combined monthly minimum water and wastewater bill (i.e. the lowest possible residential bill) for surveyed utilities that provide both water and wastewater services is \$43.76. The distribution of the minimum bills is shown in Figures J, K and L.



First Water Usage Rate Block

Many utilities have multiple usage blocks (tiered blocks) for charging water rates to residential customers. The amount of water within the first block is usually related to indoor usage or a local affordability threshold. Figure M illustrates the distribution of utilities by the gallons included in the first usage block. The utilities that do not have tiered water rates are indicated as “uniform.”

Water First Block Threshold

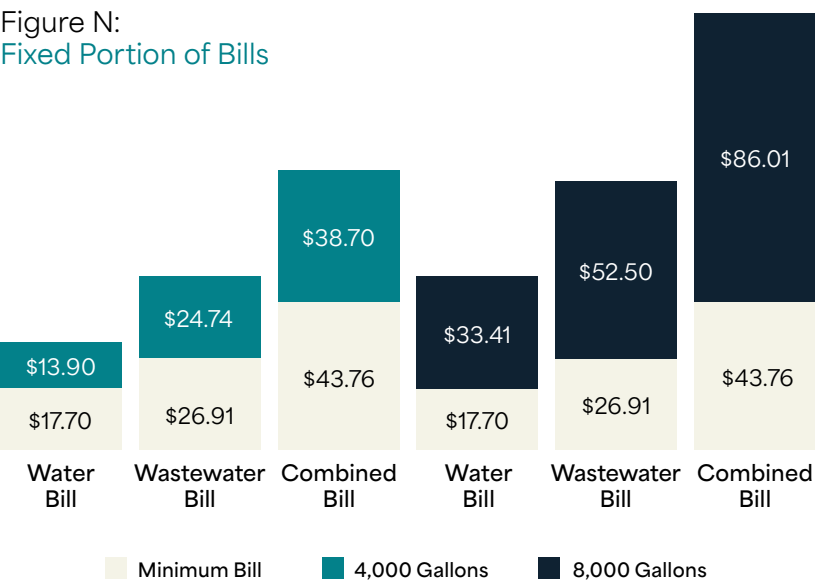


Gallons in Lowest Usage Block

Fixed Portion of Water, Wastewater, and Combined Bills

Fixed cost recovery is an important indicator of financial stability, especially considering recent trends in declining water use. Figure N provides the amount of cost recovery for water, wastewater, and combined bills at 4,000 and 8,000 gallons. It is important to note that the greater amount of costs recovered from the fixed monthly charge and initial usage block, the greater the revenue stability. While fixed costs of a typical utility are 80% to 90% of total costs, the survey results show that the fixed charge comprises approximately 53% of the average combined 4,000-gallon bills and comprises 34% within the combined 8,000-gallon bills.

Fixed Portion of Bills

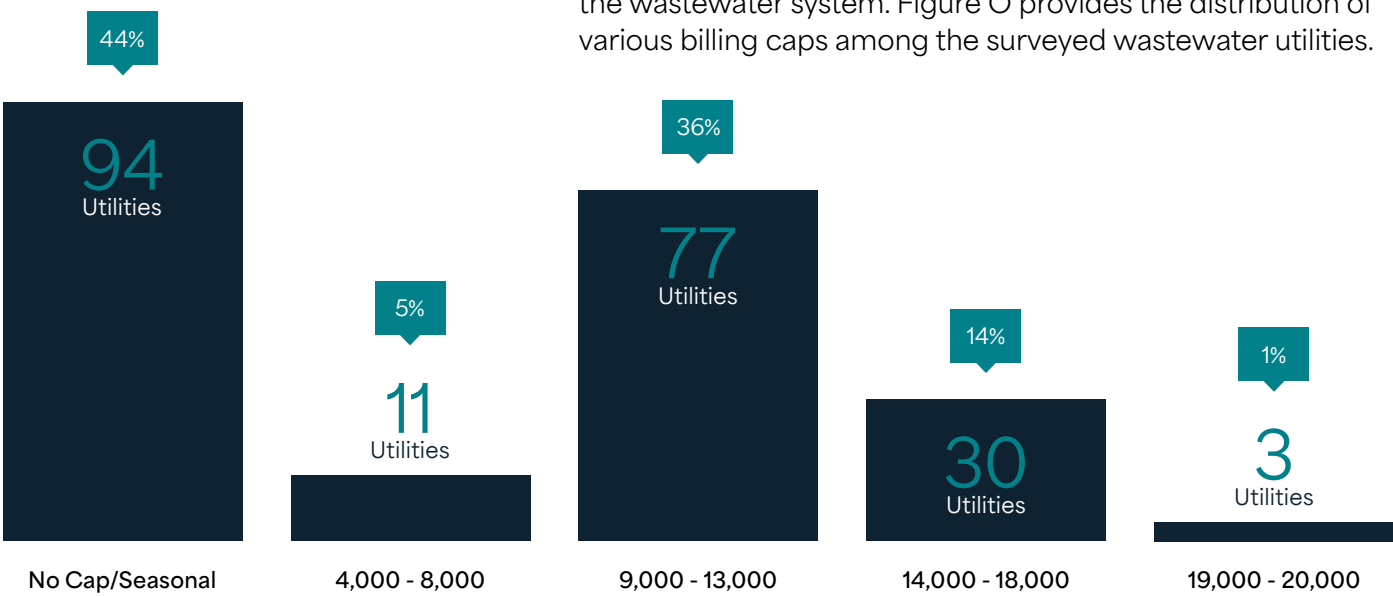


The water and wastewater bill does not equal the combined bill since some surveyed utilities that provide only one service are not included in the combined bill average. The water, wastewater, and combined bill includes data from 215 utilities, 215 utilities, and 204 utilities, respectively.

Wastewater Residential Billing Cap

Since volumetric wastewater usage is billed based on the customer’s water metering readings, many wastewater utilities recognize that there is a practical limit of how much water is returned through the wastewater system. Utilities often provide a billing threshold or billing cap for residential wastewater usage charges to account for limited returns to the wastewater system. Figure O provides the distribution of various billing caps among the surveyed wastewater utilities.

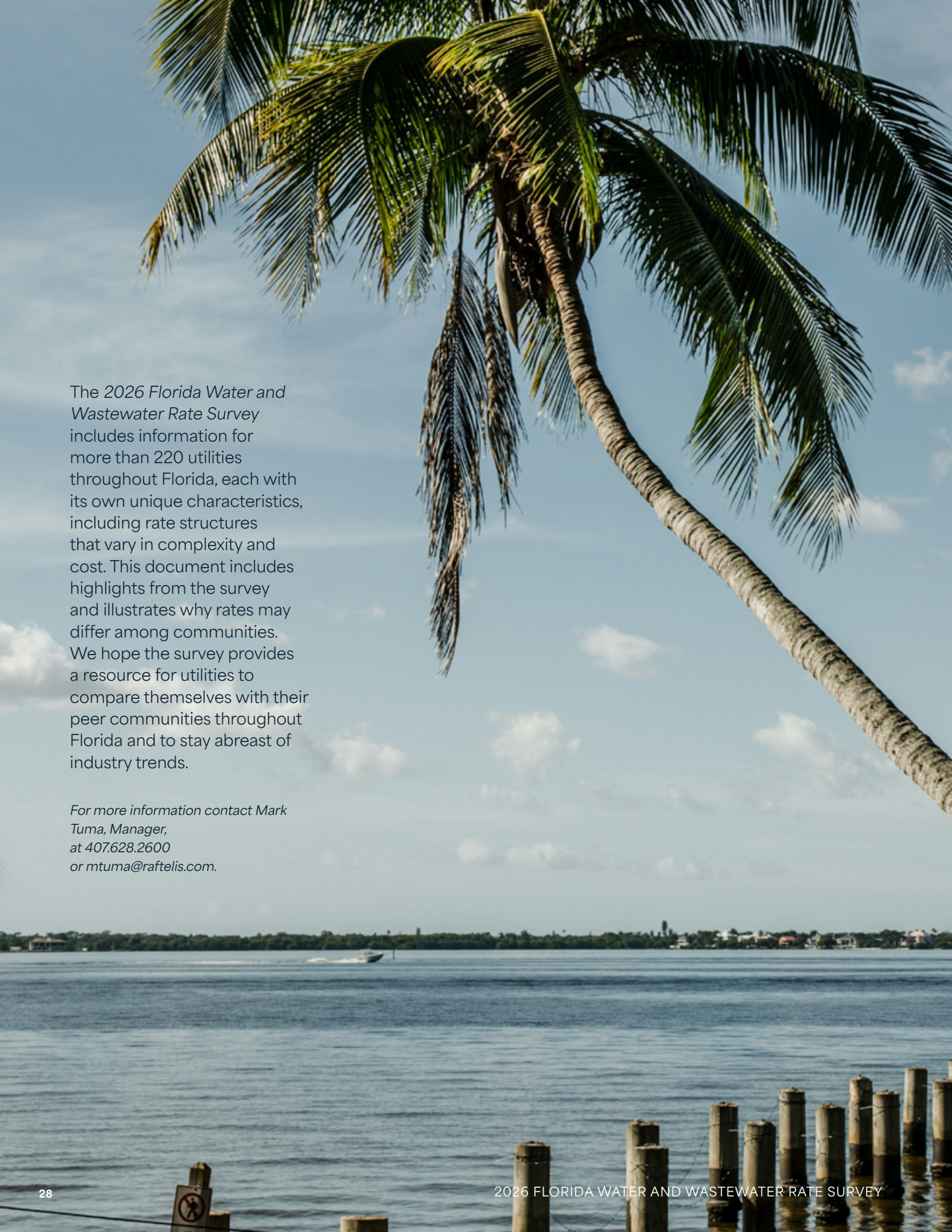

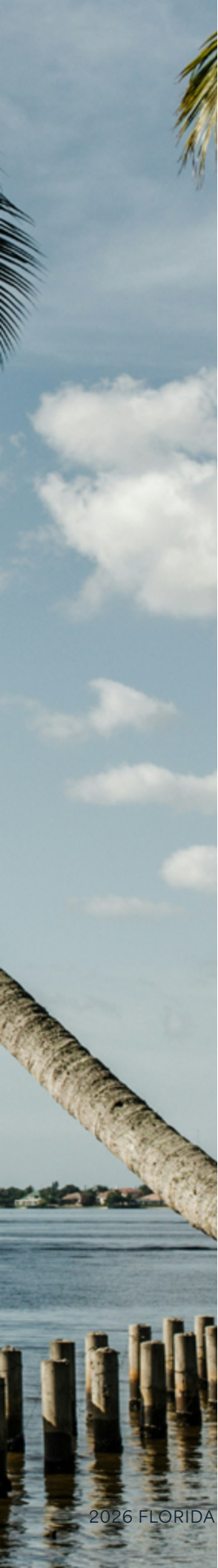
