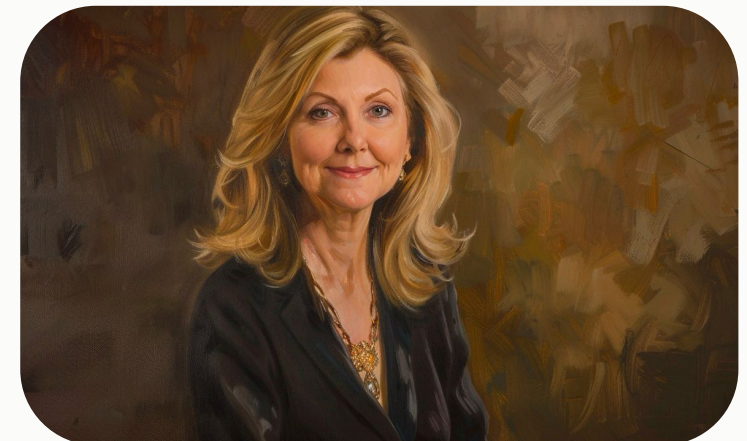
Jeanne Kirkpatrick (1926–2006)
