EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Atlanta Repeat Offender Commission was established by the Atlanta Police Foundation in 2015 to address the increasing issue of Repeat Offenders in the City of Atlanta. Crime in Atlanta often results from the repeated criminal acts of a relatively small number of individuals.

The Repeat Offender Initiative is a multifaceted strategy aimed at reducing the crime rate of repeat offenders in the City of Atlanta while enhancing and creating a system of accountability and transparency for Atlanta's multi-jurisdictional criminal justice system. This private-public partnership provides strategic support on various levels from technology and manpower to field intelligence and operational support.

The Commission formed the Repeat Offender Tracking Unit (ROTU) in 2022 to execute the Commission's strategic objectives while creating an atmosphere of collaboration. ROTU enables officials of the relevant city, county, state, and federal agencies to work in close coordination, share relevant information in real time, and ultimately make the criminal justice system more efficient, thus making Atlanta a safer city.

ROTU 2025 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

2024 RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Improve repeat offender participation rate in Accountability Court through a pilot scholarship program **(Completed)**
2. Launch a stricter monitoring system pilot program for ROs pre-trial release **(Completed)**
3. Modify the probation order to add a “No 2-for-1” and “Serve time GDOC” boxes on the order for ease of use by the judges **(Completed)**
4. Add a repeat offender box on the revocation order **(Completed)**
5. Create an automated process through technology integrations that assist APD with identifying ROs at the time of the arrest **(In process)**
6. Track how often prosecutors are stating that an RO is an RO, a flight risk, a danger to the community, or has additional open cases, and is still granted bond **(Completed)**
7. Track what counties ROs are coming from **(Completed)**
8. Ensure ROs are properly fingerprinted and documented when being processed into the FC jail **(In Process)**
9. Recommend that the DA's office implement a unique RO identifier to be assigned to each indictment, ensuring that it is sent along with the indictment to the clerk's office to ensure the proper assignment of cases to complex and non-complex court **(Completed)**
10. Collaborate with APD to create a process to track how often warrants are denied and by whom **(In Process)**

FOURTH YEAR RESULTS

- Maintained and added to the Atlanta Police Information Network (APIN)
- Conducted analysis of the Atlanta Police Department's 2025 felony arrests to identify crime trends and track the participation of repeat offenders in the city's most serious crimes
- Identified 1,000 individual repeat offenders that accounted for at least 1,140 different felony cases
- Determined that 24% of APD's 2025 felony arrests were repeat offenders
- Identified 324 ROs that had incomplete Criminal Histories in GCIC. Worked with the Clerk of Court to update 321 (99%)
- Tracked how many ROs did not reside in Fulton County, and tracked what counties they were coming from

SYSTEMATIC CHANGES

- Expanded access to the Atlanta Police Information Network (APIN) for outside agencies
- Improved exchange of information between Fulton County District Attorney's Office case intake and the Atlanta Police Department
- Improved how repeat offenders are identified during the initial booking process

INTERAGENCY COLLABORATION

- Contributed to 2025 total crime reduction of 6%, including a 10% reduction in property crimes
- Utilized the repeat offender flag within the Fulton County District Attorney's Office to help prosecutors identify repeat offenders in the court system
- Provided requested information to Atlanta Police Department for weekly intelligence meetings
- Hosted 8 working groups and 4 commission meetings
- Trained various agencies on the Atlanta Police Information Network (APIN) system
- Hosted working group meetings with agencies outside of Fulton County and Georgia to expand the Repeat Offender Tracking system
- Collaborated with the Fulton County District Attorney's Office to host quarterly information sessions for the Court Watch volunteers
- Served as the liaison for the distribution of MARTA Be On the Look Out (BOLOs)
- Collaborated with the Fulton County District Attorney's Office to identify how many repeat offenders reside outside of Fulton County but were arrested inside of Fulton County

2026 RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Ensure probation revocation calendars are distributed at least 7 days prior to the scheduled court date.
2. Ensure repeat offender (RO) cases are consistently addressed in Complex Court, in alignment with Fulton County Superior Court terms and definitions.
3. Implement a stricter monitoring system for repeat offenders both pre-and post-conviction.
4. Reduce the time from arrest to adjudication for repeat offender cases.
5. Continue tracking the counties of origin for repeat offenders to identify patterns and trends.
6. Increase participation and utilization of Accountability Courts.
7. Establish a centralized email system for all E-File documentation to improve efficiency and tracking.
8. Expand and strengthen existing Court Watch programs to increase transparency and oversight.
9. Reevaluate and eliminate the current 30–60–90 day framework for probation revocation, if no longer effective.
10. Reevaluate how combination sentences are addressed and sentenced.
11. Develop crime reduction strategies for non-Fulton County residents.

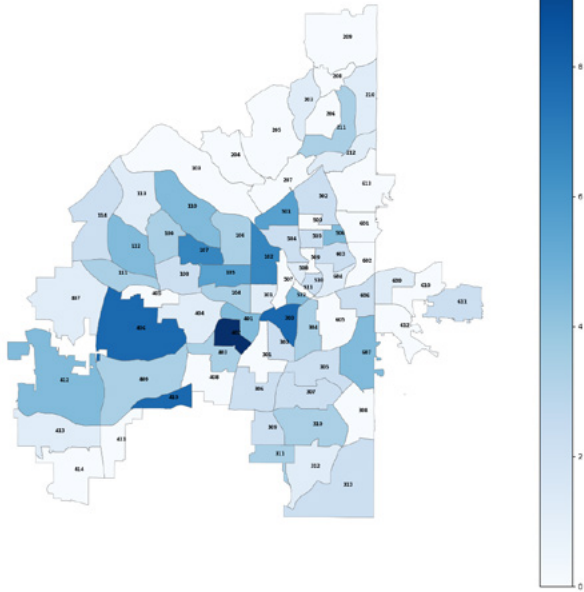


Figure 1: Choropleth maps portraying prevalence of aggravated assault by beat

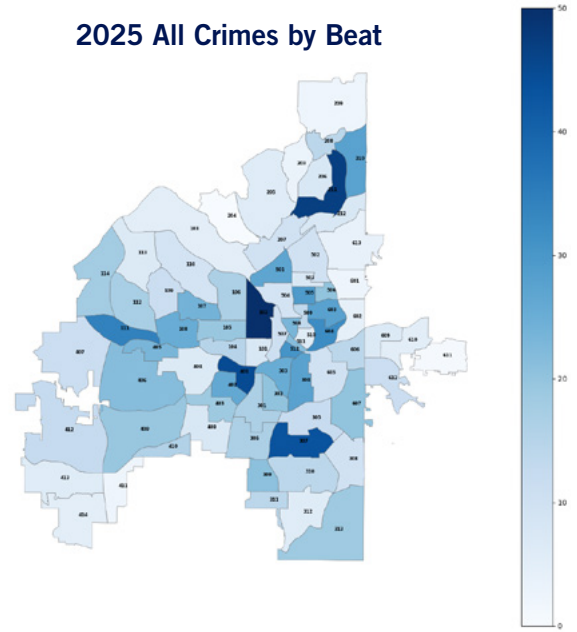


Figure 2: Choropleth maps depicting concentration of repeat offender crime in Atlanta

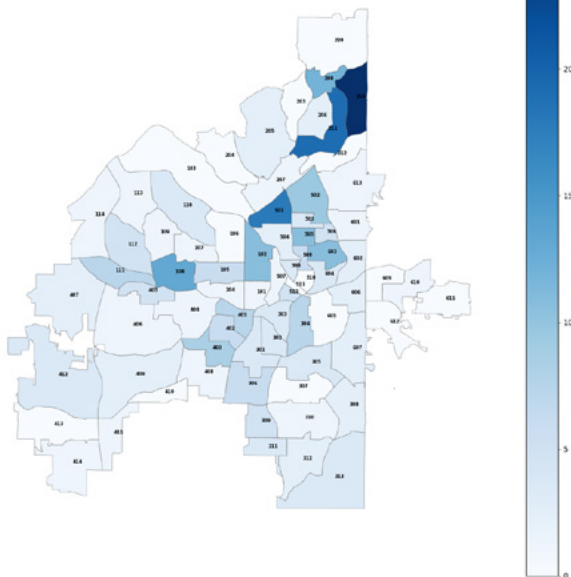


Figure 2A: Figure 2: Choropleth maps portraying prevalence of burglary and robbery by beat

2025 Crimes Committed by a Gang Member by Beat

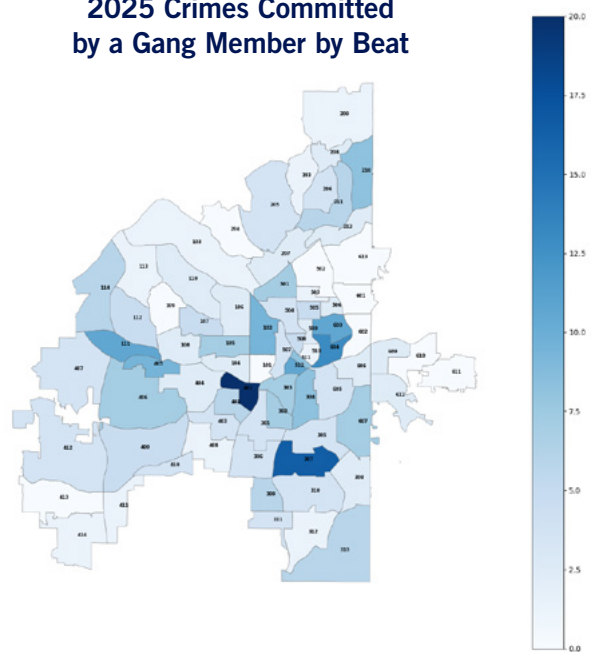


Figure 2B: Choropleth maps portraying prevalence of crimes committed by a gang member according to beat

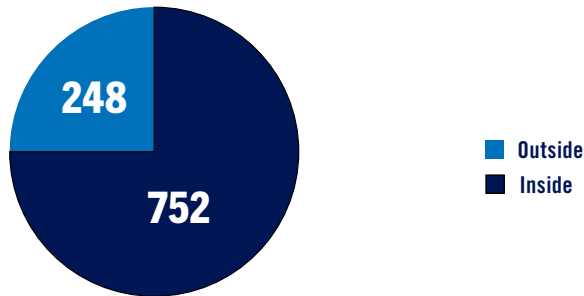
HOW MANY ROs RESIDE OUT OF FULTON COUNTY?

Analysis of newly identified repeat offenders indicates that a significant number of individuals committing crimes in Fulton County reside outside the county. This pattern suggests that offenders are crossing jurisdictional boundaries to engage in criminal activity, creating increased demands on law enforcement, court operations, detention resources, and victim services within Fulton County.

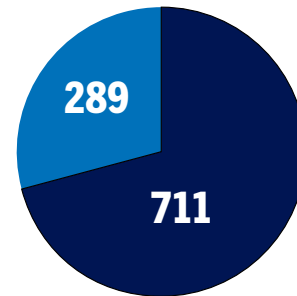

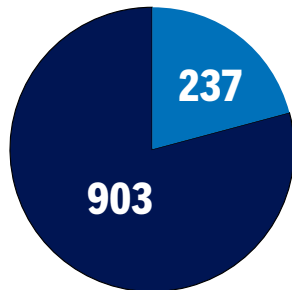

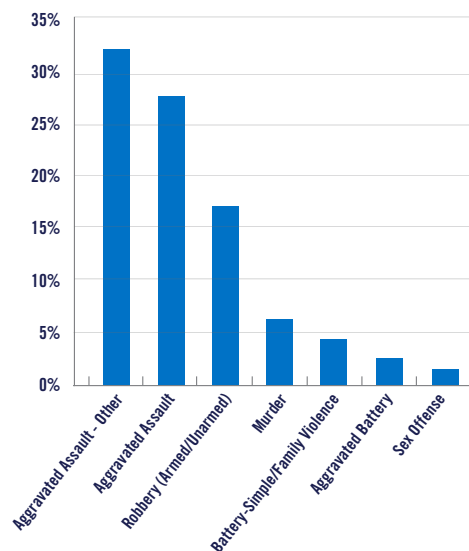

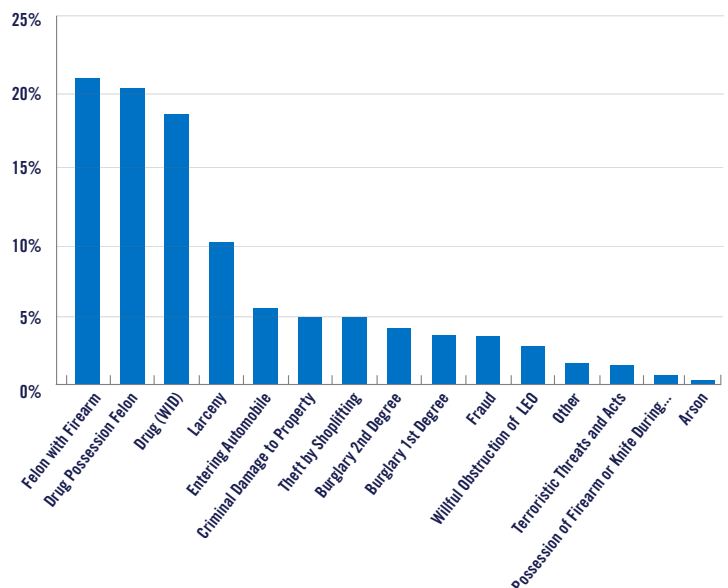

CASE 1: DAQUONTA HUNTER

Daquonta Hunter was arrested on October 8, 2020, for Aggravated Battery, Aggravated Assault, Possession of a Firearm During the Commission of a Crime, Attempted Robbery, and Possession of a Firearm by a Convicted Felon. Judge Rickman denied bond, citing Hunter as a significant risk for reoffending.

Hunter was ultimately sentenced to 10 years. He received credit for approximately three years served in custody, with the remainder of his sentence to be served on probation. He was released on March 3, 2023.

While on probation, Hunter was arrested by the Georgia State Patrol on November 26, 2023, and charged with Fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer, Purchase/possession/manufacture/distribution/sale of marijuana, Possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, along with multiple traffic violations. He was released on November 28, 2023.

Hunter was arrested again on March 8, 2024, for Receipt, possession, or transport of a firearm by a convicted felon or first offender, Trafficking illegal drugs, Purchase/possession/manufacture/distribution/sale of marijuana, Possession of a firearm during the commission of certain felonies, Possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, and fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer, in addition to several traffic-related offenses.

Despite the new arrests and violations, Judge Leftridge did not revoke Hunter's probation, and he was released on May 8, 2024.

On June 11, 2025, Hunter allegedly committed a homicide but was not arrested until August 24, 2025. He was charged with Murder, Aggravated assault, and possession of a firearm or knife during the commission of certain felonies.

CASE 2: RANDY BAUGH

On August 15, 2024, **Randy Baugh** was arrested for Rape, Escape by a person in custody, and willful obstruction of a law enforcement officer. At the time of his arrest, Mr. Baugh was riding a MARTA bus. MARTA Police were able to track the location of the bus, leading to his arrest without incident.

Mr. Baugh was arrested in connection with two separate rape cases. The first occurred on March 23, 1986, at 150 Peyton Place. During an interaction with the victim, Mr. Baugh grabbed her, pointed a firearm at her face, threw her to the ground, and raped her. Following the assault, he forced the victim to walk back to her apartment, where he followed her inside and raped her a second time.

The second rape occurred on September 8, 1988, at 3909 Campbellton Road. The victim heard a knock at her apartment door from an unknown male. When she went outside to alert a

neighbor, she observed Mr. Baugh climbing onto her patio. He grabbed the victim by the throat, threatened to kill her, removed her clothing, and raped her before fleeing through the apartment window.

In 2008, DNA evidence collected from the victim was matched to Mr. Baugh. The match ultimately led to his arrest in 2023. While being held for treatment at Grady Hospital, Mr. Baugh escaped custody after the supervising officer briefly stepped away while he was handcuffed to a hospital bed.

Mr. Baugh's prior criminal history includes convictions for Robbery, Burglary, Aggravated assault, and attempted rape.

On October 8, 2024, Randy Baugh was sentenced through a negotiated plea to 40 years, with the first 30 years to be served in confinement.

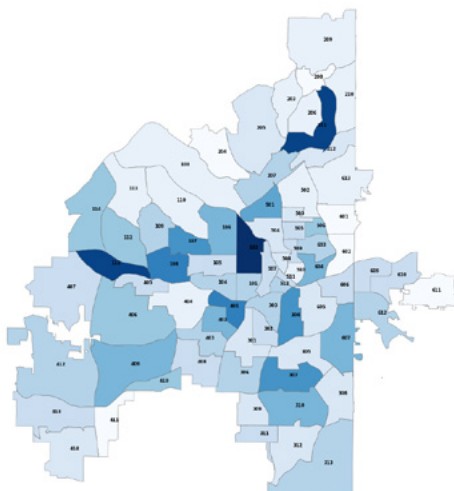

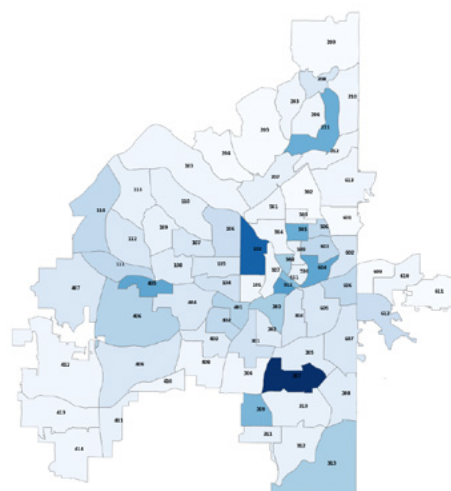

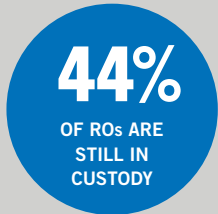

REPEAT OFFENDER ADJUDICATION REPORT

Criminal cases are randomly assigned and can vary significantly in type and complexity. The information presented in the judges' participation report is aggregate and is not intended to connect or compare the specific repeat offender crimes to sentencing outcomes.

Judges consider various factors when imposing a sentence in a criminal case, including the defendant's criminal history, the facts and circumstances of the case, the importance of deterrence, and the value of rehabilitation. Sentencing ranges are set by Georgia statute and are designed to be proportional to the severity of the offense. Judges may also consider sentencing recommendations made by the prosecution, including those associated with plea agreements.

GEORGIA 17-10-7 PUNISHMENT OF REPEAT OFFENDERS

O.C.G.A. § 17-10-7 provides enhanced punishment for repeat offenders. To trigger the enhancements, the District Attorney must file a recidivist notice. A judge cannot impose a recidivist sentence without such a notice. For offenders with one prior conviction, O.C.G.A. § 17-10-7(a) requires the judge to impose the maximum sentence, although that sentence can be probated or suspended. For offenders with three or more convictions, O.C.G.A. § 17-10-7(c) requires that any custodial sentence be served without the possibility of parole.

DEFINITIONS

Repeat Offender (RO) - A repeat offender is any person who has been previously convicted for felonies three times under the laws of Georgia or under the laws of any other states/the United States for crimes that would be considered felonies if committed in Georgia.

Combination Sentence - A form of punishment in which an offender's sentence is a combination of confinement, time served, suspended, and probation or any combination thereof.

Nolle Prosequi - The state's formal action on its decision to not further prosecute an indictment.

Dead Docket - A procedural device used by the prosecution to postpone a case indefinitely; it may be reinstated any time at the pleasure of the court. This does NOT signify a dismissal or a termination of the prosecution in the accused's favor.

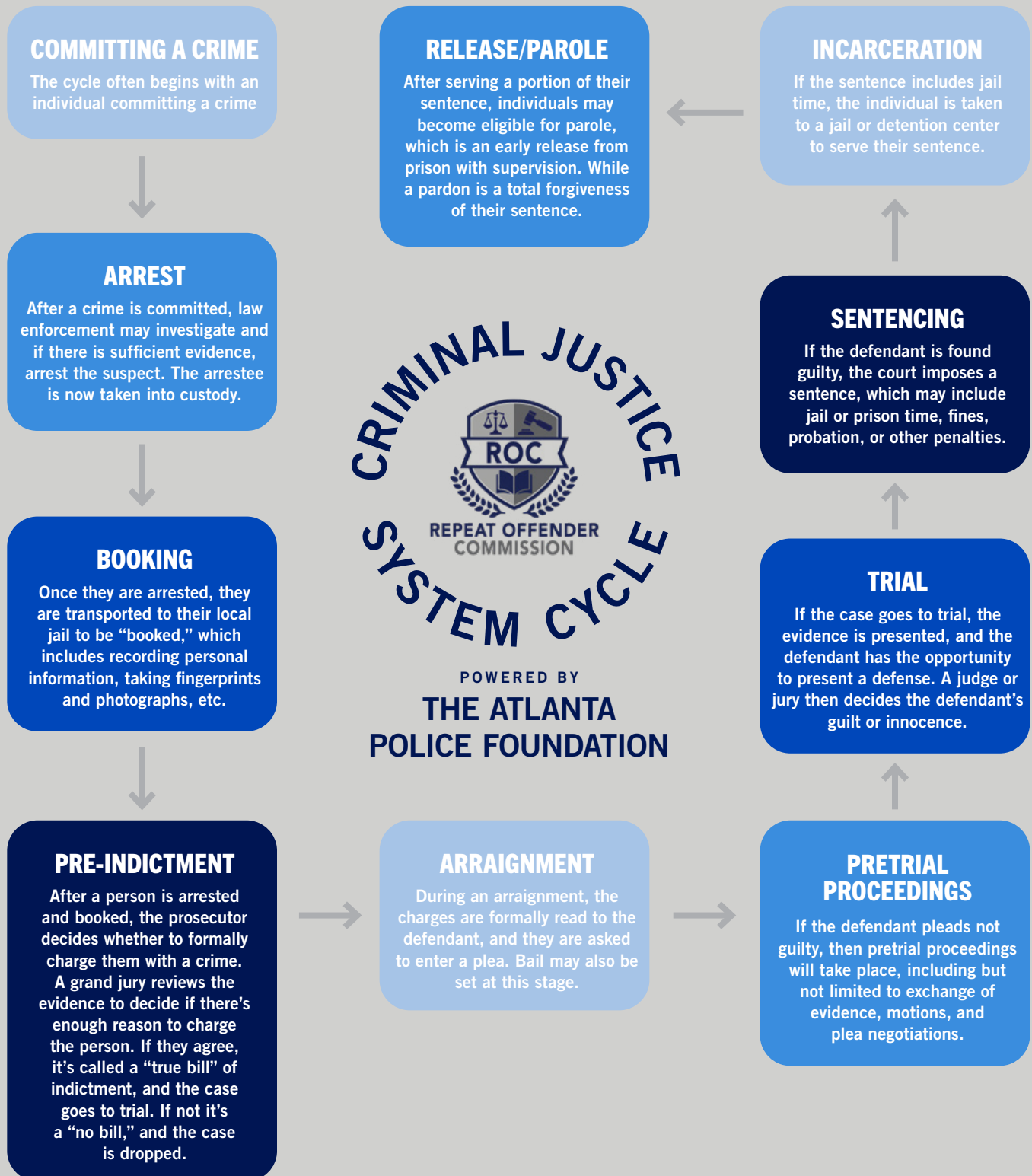
Complex Cases - Assigned to Superior Court Judges; include but are not limited to: Treason, Murder, Rape, Aggravated Sodomy, Armed Robbery, Aircraft & Motor Vehicle Hijacking, All Child Molestation, Aggravated Sexual Battery, Manufacturing & Trafficking Controlled Substances, Kidnapping, Burglary, Arson, Aggravated Assault, Aggravated Battery, Aggravated Stalking, any other Felony Sexual Offenses, and any felony involving the use of firearms. Also, any case involving a defendant with three or more prior felony convictions is classified as a Complex Case, regardless of the charges.

Non-Complex Cases - Assigned to Magistrate and/or Superior Court Judges; generally, involve all other felonies, unless the facts and circumstances of the case make it unduly complex, in which case the District Attorney can petition Superior Court to consider a transfer to the Complex Division.

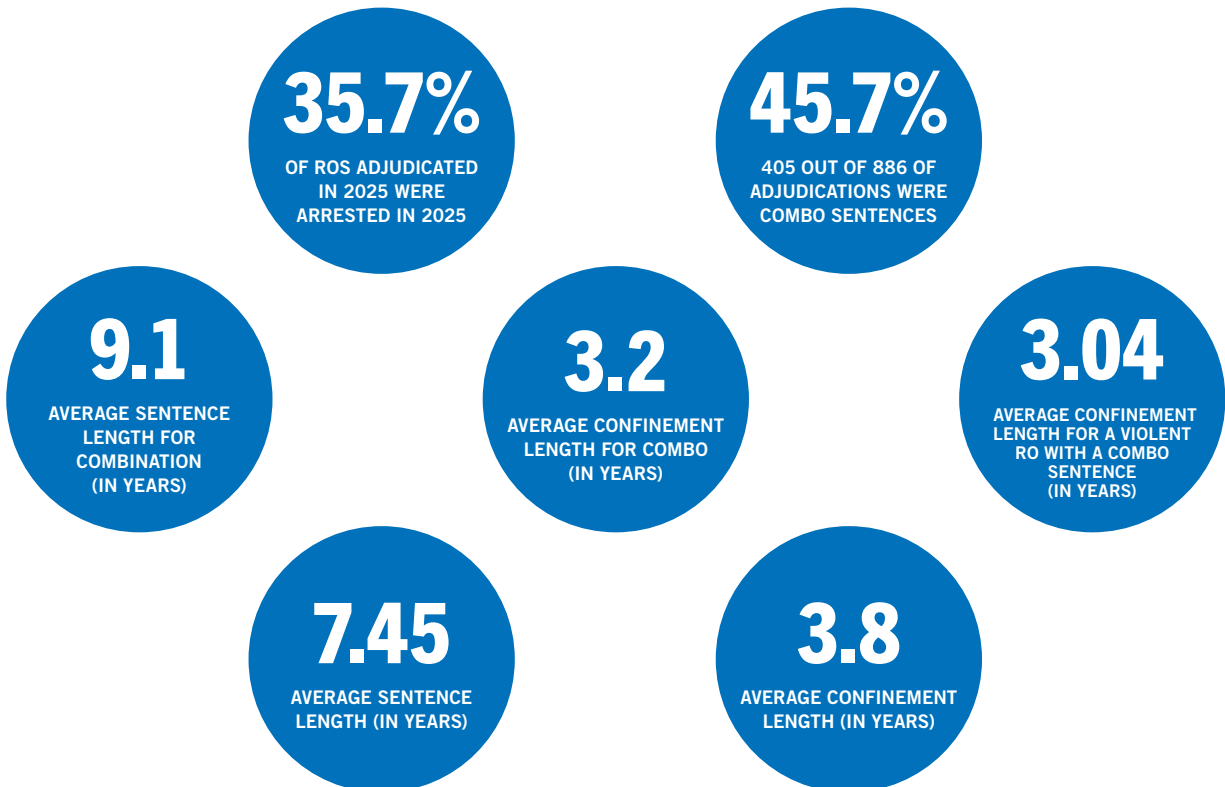
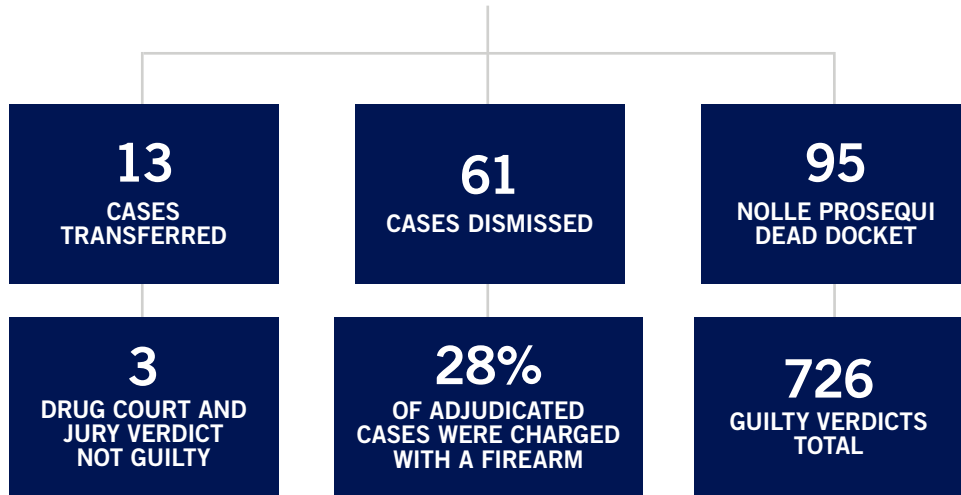

VIOLENT REPEAT OFFENDER (VRO)



The U.S. Attorney's Office's Violent Repeat Offender (VRO) initiative serves as the focused enforcement component of Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN), the Department of Justice's violent crime reduction strategy.

Each month, members of local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies meet with an Assistant U.S. Attorney to discuss the latest trends in violent crime, as well as present the recent arrests of serial offenders. These discussions serve as referrals for federal prosecution, which often yield lengthy prison sentences that must be served without the possibility of parole.

The VRO process helps identify the small number of individuals responsible for a disproportionate share of serious violence in our communities. Through consistent information-sharing and case review meetings, partners assess emerging crime trends, evaluate offenders driving violence, and coordinate investigative and prosecutorial strategies to address the most significant public-safety threats. The VRO initiative is designed to identify the most active and dangerous violent offenders using criminal history analysis, firearms and gang intelligence, officer expertise, and other data-driven indicators of risk and ongoing criminal activity, such as criminal history severity, offending frequency, recency of arrests, weapons involvement, and demonstrated patterns of violence.

The VRO program's offender-selection process helps to ensure that enforcement resources are directed toward those offenders who pose the greatest ongoing threat to the community. Evaluations of the Northern

District of Georgia's PSN strategy, and specifically the VRO initiative, have found reductions in violent crime within targeted areas and have estimated that thousands of future crimes were prevented through the incapacitation of the most chronic violent offenders.

For example, the U.S. Attorney's Office adopted the prosecution of Steven Butler, a Fulton County offender with eight arrest cycles and felony convictions for theft, armed robbery, aggravated assault, possession of cocaine, and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. A federal grand jury charged Butler with possession of a firearm and ammunition by a prohibited person, and Butler was held without bond. In 2025, after pleading guilty, Butler was sentenced to more than nine years with more than six years to serve in federal prison without the possibility of parole.

THE FAMILY JUSTICE CENTER

The Family Justice Center (FJC) model is a proven, evidence-based strategy for reducing violent crime, repeat victimization, and offender recidivism. By co-locating law enforcement, prosecutors, victim advocates, medical professionals, legal service providers, and community-based organizations in one location, Family Justice Centers remove barriers that often prevent victims from seeking help and participating in the justice process.

Since taking office, District Attorney Fani T. Willis has made the creation of a Family Justice Center in Fulton County a priority. Over the past several years, DA Willis and members of the Fulton County District Attorney's Office have traveled across the country to study some of the nation's most successful Family Justice Centers, meet with experts in the field, and identify best practices for serving survivors while improving public safety. These efforts helped lay the foundation for Georgia House Bill 1283, historic legislation that formally authorizes and supports the creation of Family Justice Centers throughout the state. With the passage of HB 1283, the Fulton County District Attorney's Office is now working alongside community partners and local leaders to establish Fulton County's first Family Justice Center, which is expected to open in 2027.

Family Justice Centers help reduce repeat offending and recidivism by:

- Faster identification of high-risk and repeat offenders. Multidisciplinary teams can identify patterns of abuse, serial offenders, and high-risk cases earlier, allowing for more strategic intervention.
- Improved information sharing and coordination. FJC partners work together to close service gaps that offenders often exploit, particularly in metropolitan areas where victims frequently cross jurisdictional lines.

- Reduced victim recantation and case attrition. When survivors receive comprehensive support and safety planning, they are less likely to withdraw from the justice process due to fear, financial dependence, or lack of resources.

- Earlier intervention with children and families. By connecting children exposed to violence with counseling, mentoring, and healing-centered services, Family Justice Centers help interrupt cycles of violence before they continue into adulthood.

Family Justice Centers are also a public safety strategy. Domestic violence incidents represent some of the most dangerous calls for law enforcement, accounting for approximately 29% of officer line-of-duty deaths. By providing victims with a safe, centralized location to seek help earlier, Family Justice Centers can reduce repeat calls for service, decrease high-risk encounters, and improve safety for both survivors and first responders.

The ultimate goal of a Family Justice Center is not only to respond to violence after it occurs, but to prevent future violence. By increasing offender accountability, supporting survivors, coordinating community responses, and intervening earlier with families, the Family Justice Center model helps break cycles of violence, reduce recidivism, and create safer communities. As Fulton County moves toward opening



its first Family Justice Center in 2027, it is taking a significant step toward building a more coordinated, survivor-centered, and safer future for all residents.

ACCOUNTABILITY COURT PARTNERSHIP

Collaboration with Fulton County Accountability Court

The mission of the Fulton County Accountability Court is to provide a court supervised alternative sentencing program to those citizens facing a felony level charge in Fulton County, and who suffer substance abuse and/or mental health issues. Furthermore, the court will reduce recidivism, crime occurrence, reduce the cost to the community, and improve the quality of life for those participating. The court is committed to returning participants to the community as model citizens.

Torin Mott On January 17, 2023, Torin Mott assaulted a female by striking her in the head with a large rock causing serious bodily injury. He then went on to assault another female on January 23, 2023, in which he grabbed her from behind and placed his hand over her mouth. He was arrested on February 1, 2023, for the January 17 incident and was incarcerated for 925 days prior to his case being adjudicated. He was charged with False Imprisonment, Simple Battery, and Criminal Attempt to Commit a Felony and found guilty on August 8, 2025, of False Imprisonment and Simple Battery. Per recommendation from the district attorney's office, he entered a negotiated plea in which he received five years to serve one commuted to the time served with the rest probated for the false imprisonment charge. For the simple battery charge, he received 12 months probation to run concurrent with the sentence for the false imprisonment charge. For the January 17, 2023, aggravated assault incident, he was sentenced to ten years to serve one, commuted to time served with the balance probated. On September 2, 2025, while on probation, he assaulted another female outside of a Target in Buckhead. On November 3, 2025, following the Target incident, his probation was revoked. Mr. Mott is set to be in confinement until January 21, 2028.

Shamuel Clay first entered the criminal justice system in 2014 on shoplifting charges and has continued engaging in retail thefts throughout the Atlanta area since. Over the years, his repeated shoplifting offenses have escalated to more serious criminal conduct, including burglary and aggravated assault charges. As a result of his ongoing theft activity, he was banned from several CVSs and Family Dollars in Atlanta.

In addition to his criminal history in Georgia, Samuel Clay also has prior arrests in other states involving theft and drug-related offenses. On September 3, 2025, he was arrested in connection with 10 separate incidents, including eight shoplifting offenses, two armed robberies, and one robbery charge. He was arrested again on December 18, 2025, on Drug Possession WID/ Trafficking charges.

As a result of these offenses and convictions, Samuel Clay is currently serving 10 years in confinement.

Through the Repeat Offender Commission and the Repeat Offender Tracking Unit, APF supports a more connected, accountable, and data-driven criminal justice response that advances the goals of the Safest City Campaign and helps make Atlanta safer for everyone.

A SEVEN-POINT STRATEGY

These seven investment priorities work together to reduce crime, strengthen operational capacity, and build the conditions required to make Atlanta the safest large city in America by 2028.

1 BUILD THE FORCE

Increase police staffing and neighborhood patrols by reaching full authorized strength of 2,035 Officers by 2028.

***Includes:** Recruitment and hiring bonuses, Patrol beat alignment and staffing study to identify police force strength 2028 and beyond.*

2 TECHNOLOGY FOR SAFER COMMUNITIES

7 ATLANTA PUBLIC SAFETY TRAINING CENTER

The Atlanta Public Safety Training Center (APSTC) serves as a collaborative hub for public safety. For the first time in 30 years, the APSTC allows sworn officers, firefighters, and civilian responders to train together on high-risk calls. This collaboration is designed to improve coordination, response capabilities, and regional public safety partnerships.

The APSTC will elevate the Atlanta Police Department to "premier law enforcement agency" status, thereby improving talent acquisition and training and resulting in better outcomes for Atlanta's citizens

***Includes:** Specialized training and equipment, capital projects advancing readiness capabilities, and long-term operational support.*

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMS



@Promise is committed to changing young lives in Atlanta. Our mission is to steer vulnerable youth, ages 12-24, away from crime by providing comprehensive services and fostering personal growth, resilience, and achievement. We seek to eliminate barriers to success, including assistance with record expungement and support for all youth, no matter their past.



The **Atlanta Police Leadership Institute** is a comprehensive program that trains APD officers to take on more leadership roles as they progress in their careers. It covers everything from policy and people management to overall departmental leadership, helping officers grow and excel in their roles.



The **Atlanta Public Safety Training Center (PSTC)** is a state-of-the-art facility designed for modern training for law enforcement agencies and first responders. It includes advanced technology, realistic urban settings, and a comprehensive curriculum to prepare police, fire, and EMS professionals for protecting our diverse city effectively.



The **Build the Force Campaign** aids the Atlanta Police Department in reaching its target of 2,035 sworn officers. APF collaborates with private sector firms to cover the hiring incentive for new officers. This initiative aims to rally community backing for APD, boost police presence to curb crime, restore staffing levels to lower crime rates, and facilitate APD's active recruitment efforts.



Connect Atlanta is the core of the Atlanta Police Foundation's smart policing plan. It's a high-tech system that connects APD, local businesses, and citizens for real-time surveillance and police response. **Operation Shield** includes a network of over 20,000 public and private cameras that monitor Atlanta's neighborhoods, business centers, public spaces, and streets. These cameras are linked to APD's Video Surveillance Center, allowing for live monitoring and dispatching of police to areas in need.



Crime Stoppers Greater Atlanta collects crime information anonymously. Citizens can report tips to police without revealing their identity through the CSGA tip line. This program relies on a partnership between the public, the media, and law enforcement to solve community problems by catching criminals and preventing crime. Tips that assist with arrests may be eligible for up to a \$5,000 reward.



The Atlanta Police Department **Mounted Patrol Unit** helps keep Atlanta safe by controlling crowds and increasing police visibility at big events like concerts, conventions, sports games, and festivals.



The **Repeat Offender Initiative** aims to reduce the crime rate of Repeat Offenders (ROs), who are estimated to contribute to over 30% of Atlanta's crime. The Repeat Offender Tracking Unit (ROTU) has upgraded the criminal justice system by sharing real-time information among City, County, State, and Federal agencies. This has helped judges better grasp arrestees' criminal histories.



The **Secure Neighborhood** program's mission is to further advance community policing by providing APD officers with an opportunity to live in the city they serve and provide them with first-hand knowledge of the people and neighborhoods they protect.
