

# Tough Love Boundary Training Program

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*A Firm, Fair, Dealer-Approved Method for Training Strong-Willed Dogs to Respect the Dog Guard Fence*

## Introduction

This training program is designed for dogs with strong personalities, high prey drive, or a history of challenging the boundary. The approach is firm but humane, based on consistency, structure, and clear communication. The goal is to teach the dog that the boundary is a non-negotiable rule while maintaining trust and confidence.

## 1. Foundation: Structure Before Freedom

- Dog must be on a leash or long line for first 7–10 days.
- No off-leash freedom until consistent respect for boundary.
- Check collar fit every session: snug, one finger under posts, correct post length, fresh battery.

## 2. Boundary Awareness Training

### 2.1 Flag the Boundary

- Place flags every 5–8 feet.

### 2.2 Leash Training at the Boundary

- Walk dog slowly along flags.
- Allow approach until warning tone.
- Immediately turn and guide dog back.
- Use verbal cue: "No. Back."
- Praise only inside safe zone.

## 3. Introducing Correction (The Tough-Love Phase)

### 3.1 Set Appropriate Correction Level

- Use a level the dog clearly notices but does not panic from.

### 3.2 Controlled Correction Training

- Walk dog toward boundary.

- Allow entry into correction zone.
- Guide back immediately.
- Praise once dog retreats.

## **4. Adding Real-World Distractions**

### **4.1 Controlled Temptations**

- Introduce distractions: dogs, joggers, toys, wildlife.

### **4.2 Reinforcing the Rule**

- Guide back if dog charges boundary.
- Praise if dog stops at tone.

## **5. Supervised Off-Leash Testing**

### **5.1 Long-Line Freedom**

- Attach 20–30 ft long line.

### **5.2 Watch for Boundary Challenges**

- Praise when dog stops.
- Guide back if dog pushes through.

## **6. Zero-Exceptions Rule**

- Never allow dog to cross boundary during training.
- Remove collar and use leash when crossing boundary.
- Never call dog across boundary.
- All family members must follow same rules.

## **7. If the Dog Still Challenges the Fence**

- Re-evaluate correction level.
- Increase structure: return to leash-only.
- Add more distraction training.
- Check system health.
