

MICROSOFT SCOUT IS AN ALWAYS-ON AGENT ACROSS MICROSOFT 365

CAPABILITY SHIFT

Microsoft introduced Scout on 2 June 2026 as its first Autopilot agent: an always-on agent that stays active in the background, operates with its own identity, and can act without being prompted each time. Scout works across Teams, Outlook, OneDrive and SharePoint. It connects to chats, email, calendar and contacts, and uses Work IQ to build context about how the user works over time.

ORGANISATIONAL CONSEQUENCE

Scout changes Microsoft 365 data use from prompt-response assistance to ongoing work-pattern learning. Existing permissions may govern access, but the operating model changes. The question is whether existing data approvals contemplated an agent learning priorities, contacts, patterns and decision context over time.

WHAT TO WATCH

- How Work IQ accumulates user context
- Whether consents cover always-on learning
- Whether Scout actions are distinguishable from user actions
- What evidence shows Scout operated within approved rules
- Which users, groups or devices Scout settings apply to

WHY THIS MATTERS NOW

Scout is in private preview for Frontier organisations and requires Intune policy configuration and opt-in attestation. The architecture signals where Microsoft 365 is heading: from prompted assistance to always-on agents that build context and act across work surfaces.

WHAT TO REVIEW

- Whether Microsoft 365 governance covers always-on agent access
- How Work IQ context can be inspected, retained or deleted
- Whether Scout actions appear in audit, eDiscovery and compliance tooling
- Whether policies distinguish Copilot from Autopilot agents

GOVERNANCE CONTEXT

This is an authority, visibility and continuity issue. The permissions may look familiar, but the behaviour using those permissions is different. Organisations need to understand when AI is assisting a user and when it is learning across their work environment.
