CAPABILITY SHIFT

Notion Agent can now manage connected calendars from chat, including viewing schedules, moving meetings, creating scheduling links, sending invitations and finding available times. It cannot edit or cancel events the user does not organise. Calendar scheduling and cancellation are available on web and desktop, but not mobile.

ORGANISATIONAL CONSEQUENCE

Calendar actions affect other people's time and trigger external notifications. Users can now ask the same Agent used for drafting and search to move meetings or send invitations on their behalf. The user still needs calendar access, but the path from instruction to action becomes shorter.

WHAT TO WATCH

- Invitations or meeting changes initiated through Notion Agent
- Scheduling links exposing unintended availability
- Unexpected moves, cancellations or participant notifications
- Teams becoming reliant on Notion Agent as the default scheduling interface

WHY THIS MATTERS NOW

The tools are available now on web and desktop. A moved meeting or sent invitation changes other people's commitments and may appear as an ordinary human action. Organisations using Notion Agent should confirm the boundaries before this becomes routine.

WHAT TO REVIEW

- Which calendars users can connect
- Whether shared or delegated calendars are included
- How Agent-initiated actions appear in logs and notifications
- Staff guidance for delegating calendar actions
- Whether existing approval for Notion AI covers calendar write actions

GOVERNANCE CONTEXT

Calendar tools extend an existing action-taking interface into shared scheduling. Authority remains bounded by the user's calendar rights, but recipients may not know a change began as an Agent instruction. The governance question is whether existing controls, approvals and records still cover that mode of action.

Scope Boundary: This artefact translates observed platform capability changes into operational considerations. It does not constitute policy, legal advice, or enforcement guidance.
