CAPABILITY SHIFT

Claude Managed Agents sessions can now load skills from a mounted GitHub repository. When a session starts, skills in the repository's root `.claude/skills` directory are discovered automatically and made available to the agent for that session. The change means repository contents can shape how an agent works without requiring the skill to be configured separately in the session.

ORGANISATIONAL CONSEQUENCE

Repository changes may therefore alter the instructions or capabilities available to an agent when a new session starts. A merged change to `.claude/skills` can affect subsequent sessions that mount that repository, making repository review and agent configuration part of the same operational control surface.

WHAT TO WATCH

- New or changed files under `.claude/skills`
- Agent behaviour or available skills changing after repository updates
- Repository changes reaching sessions without a separate platform configuration step

WHY THIS MATTERS NOW

Anthropic announced GitHub-hosted skill loading on 7 August 2026. Managed Agents can now discover repository-defined skills automatically at session start, so version-controlled changes may influence later sessions.

WHAT TO REVIEW

- Which repositories Managed Agents mount
- Who can change root `.claude/skills`
- Review or branch protections for skill changes
- How agent behaviour is tested after updates

GOVERNANCE CONTEXT

Agent behaviour may now be shaped by both platform settings and repository governance. Organisations should be able to identify which repository version supplied session skills and which controls governed those changes.
