CAPABILITY SHIFT

Google Meet is launching Room Display mode in beta for Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) meeting spaces. On supported Chromium browsers with an external display in Extended mode, Meet can place participant video and presentations on the shared screen while keeping meeting controls, chat, the participant roster and the Ask Gemini panel on the laptop.

ORGANISATIONAL CONSEQUENCE

This creates a new visibility boundary in the room. People looking at the shared display can see meeting content without seeing the presenter's controller view. That reduces ambient visibility into side-panel activity, including Ask Gemini use, and changes what participants can infer from the shared screen during live meetings.

WHAT TO WATCH

- Presenters using Ask Gemini while the shared display continues to show only meeting content.
- Meeting rooms adopting Room Display mode as the default joining path on eligible setups.
- Confusion about which presenter-side activity is visible to people in the room.

WHY THIS MATTERS NOW

Room Display mode is launching in beta and appears by default when an eligible laptop detects an external display in Extended mode. The visibility change therefore enters the normal meeting join path.

WHAT TO REVIEW

- Whether meeting guidance sets expectations for private Ask Gemini use.
- Which managed browsers permit the required Window Management permission.
- How room guides explain what stays private on the laptop.
- Whether sensitive meetings require different presenter practices.

GOVERNANCE CONTEXT

Visibility changes because Meet routes shared content and presenter controls to different screens. With no administrator control for the feature, organisations may need to rely on browser permissions, meeting practices and user guidance.
