CAPABILITY SHIFT

Slack has introduced Code channels, dedicated project spaces where teams and supported AI coding agents work together inside Slack. Mentioning an agent on a task can create a code channel visible to the team. Code diffs and live previews can appear in-channel, higher-stakes changes can route to a person for approval, and completed channels archive automatically while remaining searchable.

ORGANISATIONAL CONSEQUENCE

Development work can therefore become visible and reviewable in Slack before traditional version-control review. Channel membership, agent permissions and inline approval practices can influence who sees work in progress and who can steer or approve agent activity.

WHAT TO WATCH

- Code channels being created for development tasks that previously stayed within developer tools
- Code diffs, previews or agent progress becoming visible to broader channel participants
- Inline approvals becoming part of the path for higher-stakes agent changes

WHY THIS MATTERS NOW

Slack announced Code channels on 20 August 2026, placing agent-driven development activity inside a workspace many organisations already use broadly.

WHAT TO REVIEW

- Which repositories or projects can be reached from Code channels, and which permissions govern access and actions
- Whether channel membership matches the intended visibility boundary for code, previews and development context
- Who may approve higher-stakes agent changes in Slack, and how those approvals relate to repository controls

GOVERNANCE CONTEXT

Authority can move closer to Slack when approvals occur in-channel, while visibility expands to channel participants. Repository permissions and formal engineering controls should remain clear where Slack review is not intended to replace them.
