The 2014-2015 school year is in full swing! This year to date, we are operating SEA at 7 schools across 4 different areas of Los Angeles. Three in Oxnard, one in Malibu, two in Santa Monica, and one in South Los Angeles. Our mentors are currently working with 71 children

The SEA Program starts every year with Mentor Trainings and Student Orientations. We ensure our mentors are well prepared to work with their students. All SEA Program participants learn about Emily, how doing poorly is not related to intelligence, and that with the right support, results can be improved. In addition, they learn about responsibility, not only for their school work, but in showing up for their mentoring sessions and ensuring they perform and post their good deeds for every mentoring session.

Success Stories

When Maria started working with Alexis... she had a 2 in math. At times, Maria just could not face doing math, and she would take a “time out” for a walk and fresh air. After that, she would be ready to continue. Alexis discovered that using a white board was more effective for Maria



than working with a pencil and paper. She was able to see her work and the steps that she needed to follow more clearly. Maria was able to transfer the outlined steps on the board to solve questions on her tests. She has now improved from a 2 to a 4, with the highest possible mark being a 5. Maria is fairing well in all of her other subjects, with grades of 4s and 5s. She now turns all of her assignments in on time and comes well prepared for her mentoring sessions. One day, Maria was saddened and was able to share with Alexis the cause of her unhappiness. The role of a SEA mentor is academic, but taking out time to discuss problems is important. Mentors function as someone to trust and confide in. At the beginning of their first session together, Maria was a bit shy. However, this quickly dissolved and by the end of the session, she exclaimed to Alexis, “I didn’t think you were this cool!”

Mary-Kate on her experience working with Keven . . .

“I have been working with Keven for a full semester now. And yes sometimes it is hard to leave my campus and my schoolwork and bike down to Global Education Middle School in the middle of a Tuesday or Thursday afternoon but every, single time I bike back home with a smile on my face and goodness in my heart. Helping Keven with his homework may seem like a mundane task to an outsider but it has been one of the most meaningful experiences in my life. I can see him improve every session, in every subject. If he knows 3 steps in a 20-step problem on Tuesday and he knows 4 steps in the 20-step problem on Thursday, that’s still an incredible improvement. Suddenly, I can see how learning, growing, and attaining information can transform a student and I can see how teaching, guiding, and being present for a student can transform myself. Keven has consistently showed me that he is willing to work hard, take on challenges, and overcome learning difficulties.”



Success Stories Continued

Bryan came to Kate with three D's and one F (in science). She truly went the extra mile in contacting his parents and teachers. Kate discovered that one of Bryan's main issues was in language arts - specifically with reading and vocabulary. She brought him a young adult book (The Odyssey) and had him read every night. His dad made sure he followed through with this. She patiently helped him with his reading and writing skills, in addition to his other subjects. Under her guidance, he turned in all missing assignments. His grades began to improve. Bryan now has all C's, except for that one F in science. The school year is not over! Kate will help Bryan bring that mark up too! She has helped him to improve so much - and in addition, she has reported that he is now proud when he obtains good marks.



Most important, she says that he feels more confident, and this can only lead to continued positive results.
