PRO TIPS



Visit early in the morning for fewer crowds and softer light

MONTGOMERY WOODS STATE NATURAL RESERVE

Best for: Quiet Less crowded experience

Trail type: Easy loop walk

ARMSTRONG REDWOODS STATE NATURAL RESERVE

Best for: Easy access Iconic redwoods

Trail type: Well-maintained paths Flat

One of the most accessible redwood groves in Northern California, Armstrong is perfect for first-time visitors and those looking for a relaxed walk among towering trees.

Best for: Classic redwood experience

Trail type: Short loop
